Investigative Narrative for IMARS:

Below is an investigative summary of information gathered and complied through personal interviews, witness statements, supplemental report consolidation, and first hand investigator knowledge of the incident that happened on June 14th, 2017at approximately 1800hrs in the West Thumb Geyser Basin of Yellowstone National Park that resulted in the death of OARS kayak guide Timothy CONANT.

Incident Summry

On June 14, 2017 Yellowstone Rangers responded with multiple rescue boats and ground units to reports of a commercial kayak group in trouble, with people in the water off West Thumb Geyser Basin. The first arriving rescue boat discovered one victim already on shore who had been rescued by guides/clients and soon located a second victim still in the water approximately a quarter mile off shore. Rangers brought this second victim aboard their rescue boat and began CPR. The patient was returned to the boat ramp where resuscitation efforts continued and the patient was moved to a waiting helicopter. Efforts to revive this patient proved unsuccessful and the patient was pronounced deceased on the helipad. The first kayaker that had been rescued was transported to the local park medical clinic, treated for hypothermia, and later released. A follow-up investigation into the events of the incident is being conducted by the National Park Service and the Teton County Coroner's Office.



Training/Experience

t was CONANT's first season working as kayak guide for OARS and it is unknown if he had any

Personal Protective Equipment

On the day of the incident none of the involved guides or clients was wearing any type of dry or wet type of protective kayak clothing. CONANT was believed to be dressed in a ball cap, shirt, light weight pants, and Teva type sandals. He was also wearing a red personal flotation device. (See Coroners report for more information)

All guides and clients were found to be wearing coast guard approved personal flotation devices suitable for kayaking. When found, CONANT was still wearing his PFD, which was then cut off him by rescue personnel. This PFD was secured by investigators as evidence. (See photo logs) Two of the guides kayaks were equipped with rescue "throw bags" however they continually referred to them as "towropes" so there is some question as to if they knew what the primary use of a throw bag actually is. CONANT's kayak may have been equipped with an additional throw bag as well, however that was never found.

Inside one of the guide kayak's investigators found one paddle float while reviewing the involved equipment; however it is unclear which guide was using this kayak. All kayaks were equipped with hand pumps to pump out water. The guides claim that CONANT had the OARS "hypothermic" bag however that has not been located as of this report.

Water Conditions

Yellowstone Lake, where the incident took place is approximately 132 square miles with depths of up too approximately 430 feet. Yellowstone Lake is the largest natural freshwater lake in the United States that is above 7000 feet. It is roughly 20 miles long and 14 miles wide with 141 miles of shoreline.

Weather Conditions

At the time of the incident the air temperature was approximately 53 degrees Fahrenheit (°F) with a dew point of 35°F and an average humidity of 73 percent. The sky was clear with a variable average wind speed of 13 mph with gusts up 21mph. The temperature of the water was estimated to be about 38-43°F. There were no officially reported storms in the immediate area, however multiple statements from the parties involved indicate high winds and "unfavorable kayaking conditions".

Vessel

The kayak being used by the deceased was a fourteen foot Carolina Perception kayak, blue in color. The kayak is owned by OARS the employer of the deceased. The kayak is a single person kayak, has a rudder for steering that is controlled by two foot pedals located inside the kayak, and has storage compartments both forward and rear in the boat. CONANT's kayak was initially lost in this incident, but was then recovered multiple days later by Grant Boat Patrol adrift on Yellowstone Lake. (See Ranger Elliott's supplemental report)

Investigation

The following is the investigators (Ranger DeLuca) recount of the incident:

The OARS kayak group launched from the Grant Marina beach like any normal day and paddled along the shore toward the West Thumb Geyser Basin on a half day trip. The guides and clients were configured in kayaks as follows:

OARS Guide was not in a kayak during this incident, he remained at the company van back at the marina. The paddle to West Thumb Geyser Area was uneventful and the group was paddling back to the Grant Marina when the incident occurred. The group was about twenty-five yards off shore, the distance they normally paddle at, with CONANT and paddling up front with a group of faster paddlers. was in the rear of the group paddling with the slower paddlers when for an unknown reason ipped over and fell from his kayak into the water. immediately called for assistance from the other two guides who responded to location in the water. The other clients in the area offered to help but were directed to not put themselves in danger by the guides and to instead paddle toward shore and remain there till told otherwise. When CONANT and arrived on scene they were able to upright in getting kayak and assist back into his water filled kayak. Even though was now seated in his upright kayak he was already showing signs of hypothermia and his kayak was completely filled to the top with water. CONANT, feverishly with hand pumps to remove the water from kayak as the wind pushed them further and further from shore. At some point the kayak guides acknowledged among themselves that pumping water out of the kayak was not happening fast enough for the hypothermic client and they needed to just kayak with him inside it to shore. As the guides were attempting to make the transition to a towing operation, CONANT's kayak rolled to the inside for an unknown reason and he kayak. There is some speculation on fell from his kayak in-between his kayak and whether CONANT may have hit his head on one of the boats as he fell in between them, however none of the guides involved could confirm or deny this for sure. Everyone involved did state that CONANT immediately came back up from under the water after falling in, but for some reason did not attempt to get back into his kayak and instead just "bear hugged" the upside down kayak. stated CONANT did not seem injured but more like he was just catching his breath. Both stated that he appeared to be fine so they focused their attention on rescue and began to paddle in with in tow. stated that they had every indication that CONANT was self-rescuing and still involved in the rescue of the fact so much so that they were yelling for him to follow behind them and bring the hypothermic bag for the client. were paddling toward shore they could now see paddling out toward them to assist but they also could see that CONANT was not following them. decided that would get into shore and should go back for CONANT. A short time later arrived on scene with in their tandem kayak and began to assist in getting the rest of the way back to shore. At some point on the way back to shore the group discovers the water filled kayak with too heavy to tow in the wind and ends up back in the water where he is successfully pulled to shore between kayak and tandem kayak. On shore assisted by immediately begins to treat for hypothermia by stripping his clothes and warming him. takes his tandem kayak alone and starts paddling back out toward where he last saw and CONANT. takes guide kayak and follows back out onto the lake. stated that as she paddled toward CONANT's last known location it was obvious he had been blown even further off shore but she knew where he was because she could hear him blowing his rescue whistle for help so she paddled in that direction. When was close enough to see CONANT he had stopped blowing the whistle and was now just floating motionless in the water. further stated that CONANT was no longer holding onto his kayak, it was floating a distance away and still upside down. stated that CONANT was still wearing his red personal flotation device and the OARS company white hypothermia bag was also floating in the water nearby. It was at this point used her personal cellphone to make the first call for help from ANY of the guides in the group. attempted multiple times to call back at the OARS van

later stated when being

interviewed that she was unaware of the number to reach the National Park Service and did not know that dialing 911 from a cellphone would actually reach Yellowstone National Park Rangers so therefor she dialed her friend directly who happens to be a Yellowstone Ranger. This Ranger received her broken cellphone call and immediately alerted the Yellowstone National Park Dispatch Center who in turn dispatched rescue units to the scene. stated that when she found CONANT he was still conscious, but seemed very confused. stated that she tried to ask him questions to assess his level of alertness but he kept answering inappropriately to her questions by repeatedly refereeing to the "towrope" being wrapped stated she saw nothing wrapped around CONANT's legs. around his legs. stated that she thought that CONANT sounded like he had "water in his lungs" when he was talking. repeatedly instructed CONANT to hold onto her kayak as she attempted to paddle toward shore. Sometime time later arrived on scene alone in his tandem kayak to assist. stated that they attempted to load a still conscious CONANT into the tandem kayak however CONANT was confused and lethargic at this point empty seat of and was just not providing enough assistance with the process for them to be successful. stated they were able to hold onto CONANT between the boats and continued to paddle toward shore. estimates that they had been paddling for 7 to 10 minutes when solo kayak to also assist in the rescue of CONANT. With three people now on scene. attempted to get CONANT into the empty seat in tandem kayak however they were still unsuccessful and instead were only able to lift CONANT on top of CONANT inside the same seat as With their three kayaks together the group started paddling toward shore once again. At some point during paddling recalls seeing the NPS rescue boat approaching however she could tell the rescue boat could not see her group because her group was too far off shore. She and her group onshore instead. could tell the boat was going toward this point CONANT was now unconscious and no longer responding, his eyes were rolled back in his head, and his chin was red. stated that and herself were attempting to signal the rescue boat by waving their paddles in the air and velling The NPS rescue boat arrived on scene with (See supplemental reports from Rangers Elliott and Poley) The Rangers brought onboard and did a quick medical assessment of While this was happening, the Ranger operating the rescue boat spotted and her group offshore and started to motor toward them. Upon arrival at location Rangers in the rescue boat found CONANT unconscious, not breathing, and being held over the top of the groups kayaks. Rangers brought CONANT. onboard the rescue boat, leaving their kayaks and equipment behind and immediately begin CPR on CONANT. (See supplemental reports from responding rangers for more detail) The NPS rescue boat responded back to the Grant Village Boat Dock were it was met by additional waiting rescue and medical personnel. See EMS reports for the subsequent medical treatment of CONANT and Additional On Scene Investigation Initial written witness statements were taken from all parties involved on scene at the time of the incident, with the exception of who was transported from the incident scene by ambulance to the Lake Clinic. was later interviewed by Ranger Bock at his hotel in Cody, WY the following day where he also provided a typed statement that he had prepared himself. Rescue units from the Lake District Boat Patrol were on scene at the time of the initial incident and performed a search of the West Thumb waters to locate missing kayaks and equipment left on the water after the incident. It is believed that the only equipment not accounted for multiple hours later was CONANT's kayak, the OARS hypothermic bag, multiple kayak paddles, and a single throw bag. CONANT's kayak was found multiple days later near Breeze Point (See supplemental report by Ranger Elliott) OARS had a van full of kayak equipment and kayak equipment staged on the beach for other tours. At the time of the incident all kayak equipment that could be positively identified as being involved in the incident was impounded for investigative purposes and removed from the scene to a secure NPS facility by NPS personnel. This would include kayaks, paddles, life vests, throw bags, pumps, etc. (See photo logs)

CONANT's two personal backpacks were secured by investigators from the OARS company van and later turned over to the Teton County Coroner.

CONANT's clothes, which were reported to be pants and a shirt that he was wearing at the time of the incident were cut from his person by rescuers during his medical treatment. Investigators wear unable to locate them. It is believed that they were gathered with medical waste and trash from the incident scene and mistakenly discarded.

Follow-Up Investigation

A review of Yellowstone National Park records shows OARS commercial use authorization (CUA13-120) ie, their permit to do kayak (non-motorized boat) trips in Yellowstone is in good standing. Additionally all four guides involved in the incident have valid "guide cards" as required by the terms and conditions of their permit. Nothing in my investigation has revealed that any of the guides involved in the incident had done anything to violate any of the terms or conditions of their companies kayak CUA.

Investigators took photographs of all kayaks and equipment involved in the incident as well as performed a basic visual inspection of all the kayak's and equipment involved. Nothing out of ordinary was found. (See photologs) All equipment with the exception of CONANT's kayak and PFD were returned to OARS management. CONANT's PFD and kayak remain in evidence/storage at the Grant Ranger Station pending further direction from OSHA authorities.

Investigators conducted personal interviews with the conducted face to face interviews with anyone else involved in this incident. Multiple attempts to reach the conducted face to face interview have proved unsuccessful.

During my investigation I consulted with agents from the National Park Service Investigative Services Branch who stated their involvement in this investigation was not warranted at this time.

Nothing in my initial investigation of the incident would lead me to believe that alcohol and/or drug use played any role in the events of this day.

Nothing in my investigation revealed any violation of park regulations in this incident. No citations were issued to anyone involved.

Contributing Factors / Cause of Death

As of the writing of the investigative report the official cause of CONANT's death has yet to be determined by the Teton County Coroner. For the contributing factors and cause of death we will have to await the official report from the Coroner's office. (See the Coroner's report for additional information)

Remarks: Supplemental Narrative: Summary On 6/14/17 I responded to the report of persons in the water of Yellowstone Lake near the thermal area of the West Thumb Geyser Basin in Yellowstone National Park. I assisted peripherally with Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) of one victim and assisted US Park Ranger (USPR) F. Deluca with the subsequent investigation. As a result of the incident, one male was pronounced dead and one male was treated and released for hypothermia. Incident On 6/14/17 while restocking park service vessels at the Bridge Bay Marina after an earlier boating incident, I received the report of overturned kayaks with people in the water near West Thumb. I responded to the incident via my patrol car with USPR J. Dunning. USPR Dunning stated enroute that he had received a phone message from his girlfriend saying she was having an emergency and needed help at about 1745 hrs. USPR Dunning then called Yellowstone Park Dispatch relaying the information at about 1746 hrs. Upon arrival, I checked in with USPR and scene Incident Commander F. Deluca. I observed that CPR was being conducted on one white male on the service dock and a second male was sitting in the rear deck of the NPS vessel tied up alongside the dock. I observed a female wet from the waist down, later identified as and asked her if she was cold. was visibly distraught and shivering. I asked her if she was ok and if she needed any medical assistance. She shook her head side to side indicating no and I escorted her to my patrol vehicle and placed her in the front passenger seat with the heat on and doors unlocked. I then went directly to where I had observed the second male, later identified as still sitting in the aft deck of the park vessel and escorted him to a waiting park ambulance with an ALS crew. USPR Deluca assigned me to assist with the subsequent investigation. Through those witness statements, oral statements and interviews, the following is what I learned to have occurred on the afternoon/evening of June 14, 2017. According to kayak guide for Oars, a group of three guides and nine clients met at the Grant Marina for a kayak paddle out to the "Basin Geyers" located north of the Grant Marina. said the trip typically said the guides went through all the safety talks takes 3-3.5 hours. and procedures with the clients. The three Oars guides with the group were Timothy Conant and another Oars guide was waiting back at the marina and was in charge of food. I asked what specifically is covered in the safety and procedure talks, and said they explain how to get in and out of the boats on shore, adjust the rudder foot pedals, weight distribution, how to use the paddles and when they hear a whistle blow; once means to get their attention and three times means for the group to head to shore. She continued saying that they also size the personal floatation devices (PFDs) and make sure they are fit



On 06/14/2017 at approximately 1758 Hrs, the Yellowstone Communications Center called Grant Patrol asking for a phone call. I called the Com Center and was notified that 7L37, Jason Dunning a Lake Ranger had called to notify them that his girlfriend who is an OARS Kayak Guide), had called him, stating that she was on a kayak trip on Lake Yellowstone somewhere in the West Thumb Area and that they had a couple of kayaks capsize with people in the water. Cell phone reception wasn't very good and Ranger Dunning was unable to call her back for more info. I notified Rangers DeLuca and Elliott that we might have people in the water somewhere in the area of West Thumb, while the Com Center attempted to find out more information. The Grant Visitor Center called Grant Patrol by radio to notify us that a visitor had walked in and notified them that there were some stranded kayakers near the West Thumb Geyser Basin. Ranger Chuvarsky who was in the area because of a previous incident drove to the West Thumb Geyser Basin to see if he could see anything from the board walk area. Ranger DeLuca took incident command while, Ranger Elliott and I responded to the West Thumb Geyser Basin. Area by National Park Service Vessel Eagle, from the Grant Marina. Just outside of the Grant Marina in the area of the Grant Campground two blue tandem kayaks flagged us down by waving their arms and kayak paddles above their heads. They said they were part of an Oars Trip and that there were people in the water. I asked them where at, and they said they were in the area of the Geyser Basin and they pointed towards the closest area of steam coming from the Basin. I observed another kayak paddling back towards the marina in the area of the Grant Campground I-Loop. The occupants didn't appear to be in distress and didn't try to flag us down. On the shore south of the Geyser Basin (N 44 24.787, W 11 34.034), Ranger Elliott and I observed two individuals male Victim #1, who was an OARS Client, and female later identified as who is an OARS Kayak Guide, flagging us down. Victim #1 was sitting visibly shivering on shore wearing a down jacket, a shirt on his lap, and a dry bag over his feet. The rest of his clothes and his shoes were lying next to him in a pile on the shore line. was behind the male supporting him in the seated position and was rubbing his arms and back vigorously attempting to keep him warm. At this time was wearing a t-shirt, long pants, and baseball cap. given her jacket and button up shirt to Victim #1 removing his wet clothes and placing his feet into a dry bag attempting to warm him up. I asked Victim #1 if he had any medical issues or if there was anything wrong with him other than that he was wet and cold. He stated that other than being wet and cold he was fine. I asked them if there was anyone else in the water and how many others were there, stated that there was at least one other person in the water that had capsized and that there was a group still out on the water. and Victim #1 back to the boat, which wasn't able to come completely to shore due to how shallow the water was. After getting both individuals on board, getting them wrapped up in sleeping bags, and

making sure they were ok, we headed back out on to the water to a group of blue kayaks approximately a quarter mile off shore.

Upon arrival I observed 4 kayaks grouped together with 3 individuals seated in the kayaks and one individual a white male Victim #2, who was an OARS Kayak Guide, lying across a kayak unresponsive. He was wearing a red life jacket, brown pants, and a black shirt. His complexion was pale and purple, his lips were purple, he had a red mark on his chin, and his pupils were dilated. who was on scene told Ranger Elliott and I that Victim #2 had been in the water for 20-30 minutes and was unresponsive. With the assistance of the kayakers, Ranger Elliott and I brought the individual on board the Eagle. At this time we removed the life jacket and shirt attaching the AED which advised no shock. I then called CPR in progress and requested a MedFlight. Ranger Elliott drove the Eagle back to the marina while I performed chest compressions, assisted by one of the other kayakers, while another kayaker supported his air way.

Back at the marina I assisted other Rangers with placing the individual on the dock for a larger working area to better assist with CPR. Rangers Elliott, Chuvarsky, and Derene worked on the ALS side of the incident while I supported the airway and performed rescue breathes via Bag Valve Mask. Rangers Brearley, Goins, Suarez, Niederhardt, and others performed rotations on chest compressions. Once the Flight Medics arrived I assisted with loading the individual onto a back board and gurney before transferring him to the ambulance while Ranger Chuvarsky continued to perform chest compressions.

After the ambulance cleared the scene heading to the heli-spot, I assisted Rangers Derene and Bock with taking witness statements and identifying guides and clients.

I assisted two National Park Service Maintenance Personnel, Sazima and Stoorza with placing the kayaks, life jackets, pumps, and kayak paddles into the Maintenance Stake Bed truck before securing them in the Berger Barn.

Victim #1 was transported to the Lake Clinic by ambulance.

Investigative Narrative for IMARS:

Below is an investigative summary of information gathered and complied through personal interviews, witness statements, supplemental report consolidation, and first hand investigator knowledge of the incident that happened on June 14th, 2017at approximately 1800hrs in the West Thumb Geyser Basin of Yellowstone National Park that resulted in the death of OARS kayak guide Timothy CONANT.

Incident Summry

On June 14, 2017 Yellowstone Rangers responded with multiple rescue boats and ground units to reports of a commercial kayak group in trouble, with people in the water off West Thumb Geyser Basin. The first arriving rescue boat discovered one victim already on shore who had been rescued by guides/clients and soon located a second victim still in the water approximately a quarter mile off shore. Rangers brought this second victim aboard their rescue boat and began CPR. The patient was returned to the boat ramp where resuscitation efforts continued and the patient was moved to a waiting helicopter. Efforts to revive this patient proved unsuccessful and the patient was pronounced deceased on the helipad. The first kayaker that had been rescued was transported to the local park medical clinic, treated for hypothermia, and later released. A follow-up investigation into the events of the incident is being conducted by the National Park Service and the Teton County Coroner's Office.

Training/Experience

It was CONANT's first season working as kayak guide for OARS and it is unknown if he had any prior kayak experience or any experience kayaking on Yellowstone Lake. This was well and she stated she had only been in a kayak five times prior in her life before becoming a guide. When asked during a follow-up interview stated that she had received no kayak safety training prior to leading trips with OARS. She further stated that she received no training on what to do if a client or co-worker fell out of a kayak into the water. further stated that she also received no training on how to contact authorities for help in the event of an emergency on the water.

Personal Protective Equipment

On the day of the incident none of the involved guides or clients was wearing any type of dry or wet type of protective kayak

clothing. CONANT was believed to be dressed in a ball cap, shirt, light weight pants, and Teva type sandals. He was also wearing a red personal flotation device. (See Coroners report for more information)

All guides and clients were found to be wearing coast guard approved personal flotation devices suitable for kayaking. When found, CONANT was still wearing his PFD, which was then cut off him by rescue personnel. This PFD was secured by investigators as evidence. (See photo logs)

Two of the guides kayaks were equipped with rescue "throw bags" however they continually referred to them as "towropes" so there is some question as to if they knew what the primary use of a throw bag actually is. CONANT's kayak may have been equipped with an additional throw bag as well, however that was never found.

Inside one of the guide kayak's investigators found one paddle float while reviewing the involved equipment; however it is unclear which guide was using this kayak. All kayaks were equipped with hand pumps to pump out water. The guides claim that CONANT had the OARS "hypothermic" bag however that has not been located as of this report.

Water Conditions

Yellowstone Lake, where the incident took place is approximately 132 square miles with depths of up too approximately 430 feet. Yellowstone Lake is the largest natural freshwater lake in the United States that is above 7000 feet. It is roughly 20 miles long and 14 miles wide with 141 miles of shoreline.

Weather Conditions

At the time of the incident the air temperature was approximately 53 degrees Fahrenheit (°F) with a dew point of 35°F and an average humidity of 73 percent. The sky was clear with a variable average wind speed of 13 mph with gusts up 21 mph. The temperature of the water was estimated to be about 38-43°F. There were no officially reported storms in the immediate area, however multiple statements from the parties involved indicate high winds and "unfavorable kayaking conditions".

The kayak being used by the deceased was a fourteen foot Carolina Perception kayak, blue in color. The kayak is owned by OARS the employer of the deceased. The kayak is a single person kayak, has a rudder for steering that is controlled by two foot pedals located inside the kayak, and has storage compartments both forward and rear in the boat. CONANT's kayak was initially lost in this incident, but was then recovered multiple days later by Grant Boat Patrol adrift on Yellowstone Lake. (See Ranger Elliott's supplemental report)

The paddle to West Thumb Geyser Area was uneventful and the group was paddling back to the Grant Marina when the incident occurred. Follow-Up Investigation
A review of Yellowstone National Park records shows OARS commercial use authorization (CUA13-120) ie, their permit to
do kayak (non-motorized boat) trips in Yellowstone is in good standing. Additionally all four guides involved in the incident
have valid "guide cards" as required by the terms and conditions of their permit. Nothing in my investigation has revealed
that any of the guides involved in the incident had done anything to violate any of the terms or conditions of their companies
kayak CUA.
Investigators took photographs of all kayaks and equipment involved in the incident as well as performed a basic visual
inspection of all the kayak's and equipment involved. Nothing out of ordinary was found. (See photologs) All equipment
with the exception of CONANT's kayak and PFD were returned to OARS management. CONANT's PFD and kayak remain
in evidence/storage at the Grant Ranger Station pending further direction from OSHA authorities.
Investigators conducted personal interviews with the state of this report had not conducted face to face interviews with anyone else involved in this incident. Multiple attempts to reach the for a follow-up personal
interviews with anyone else involved in this incident. Multiple attempts to reach

interview have proved unsuccessful.

During my investigation I consulted with agents from the National Park Service Investigative Services Branch who stated their involvement in this investigation was not warranted at this time.

Nothing in my initial investigation of the incident would lead me to believe that alcohol and/or drug use played any role in the events of this day.

Nothing in my investigation revealed any violation of park regulations in this incident. No citations were issued to anyone involved.

Contributing Factors / Cause of Death

As of the writing of the investigative report the official cause of CONANT's death has yet to be determined by the Teton County Coroner. For the contributing factors and cause of death we will have to await the official report from the Coroner's office. (See the Coroner's report for additional information)

I then called CPR in progress and requested a MedFlight. Ranger Elliott drove the Eagle back to the marina while I performed chest compressions, assisted by one of the other kayakers, while another kayaker supported his air way.

Back at the marina I assisted other Rangers with placing the individual on the dock for a larger working area to better assist with CPR. Rangers Elliott, Chuvarsky, and Derene worked on the ALS side of the incident while I supported the airway and performed rescue breathes via Bag Valve Mask. Rangers Brearley, Goins, Suarez, Niederhardt, and others performed rotations on chest compressions. Once the Flight Medics arrived I assisted with loading the individual onto a back board and gurney before transferring him to the ambulance while Ranger Chuvarsky continued to perform chest compressions.

After the ambulance cleared the scene heading to the heli-spot, I assisted Rangers Derene and Bock with taking witness statements and identifying guides and clients.

I assisted two National Park Service Maintenance Personnel, Sazima and Stoorza with placing the kayaks, life jackets, pumps, and kayak paddles into the Maintenance Stake Bed truck before securing them in the Berger Barn.

Victim #1 was transported to the Lake Clinic by ambulance.

At approximately 18:00 hrs., I received a phone call from Ranger Jake Poley requesting my assistance as the boat operator. He told me that he had received a call from Yellowstone Communication Center stating that there was a report of 2 capsized kayaks and 2 people in the water. The information was nonspecific as to exact location of the incident, but they thought it was near West Thumb Geyser Basin.

At 18:10 hrs Ranger Poley and I responded in a Park Service patrol boat in the direction of West Thumb Basin. At 18:15 hrs., approximately in front of the Grant Campground, a group of two tandem kayaks signaled to us they needed assistance. We stopped and spoke to the group who told us there were members of their group who needed help in the direction of the Geyser Basin. Further information from The Yellowstone Communication center then indicated that new reports suggested one of the parties in distress was "stuck" in the lagoon near the geyser basin. At 18:18 hrs., we located two individuals, later identified as a guide and a client, huddled together on the shoreline just south-west of West Thumb Geyser Basin. Ranger Poley assessed the party, determining no immediate life threats were present, and we loaded the party onto the patrol boat.

As Ranger Poley was assessing the two individuals on shore, I could see what appeared to be several blue kayaks, grouped together, floating approximately one-quarter mile off shore. With binoculars, it did appear to be 2-3 kayaks rafted together. The individuals on the kayaks made no attempt to attract our attention. They did not signal nor wave their paddles. They were not actively paddling. They appeared to be just sitting in their boats. As soon as the first party was loaded aboard, we responded to the rafted group of kayaks. At 18:32 hrs., we made contact with the group of kayaks. We immediately observed a white male, approximately in his mid-twenties, supine across the kayaks. One of the individuals in the group, possibly the guide, stated that "he has been unconscious" and that "he had been in the water submerged, for 20-30 minutes. The victim was pale, not breathing, and upon initial assessment determined to be pulseless. His pupils were fixed and dilated.

We quickly transferred the victim onto the patrol boat. After applying an AED and beginning Basic Life Support, we left the scene and proceeded directly to Grant Marina to meet the awaiting ambulance.

Summary of Incident:

On 06/14/2017, Yellowstone Rangers responded with multiple rescue boats and ground units to reports of a commercial kayak group in trouble, with people in the water off West Thumb Geyser Basin. The first arriving rescue boat discovered one victim already on shore (rescued by guides/clients) and soon located a second victim still in the water approximately a quarter mile off shore. Rangers brought the second victim aboard their rescue boat and began CPR. The patient was returned to the boat ramp where resuscitation efforts continued. The patient was transported via ambulance with both NPS and flight crew continuing resuscitation efforts. Efforts to revive this patient proved unsuccessful and the patient was pronounced deceased on the helipad.

Timothy Hayden Ryan CONANT's Manner of Death was recorded as drowning as a result of cold water submersion and cardiac arrest. CONANT's death certificate, 2017-002209, was recorded by Wyoming Vital Statistics on July 17, 2017.

<u>Incident Investigation and Response:</u> On June 14, 2017, the OARS kayak group launched from the Grant Marina beach and paddled along the shore toward the West Thumb Geyser Basin on a half day trip. The guides and clients were configured in kayaks as follows:

Air 3 had arrived on scene at Grant Village, and were transported down to the dock where the NPS rescue boat and responders were performing CPR on CONANT. At 19:20 hours, Air 3 Crew arrived on scene with the patient and assumed patient care. After receiving assessment both Air 3 and NPS EMS personnel continued resuscitation efforts, moved the patient into the ambulance and transported CONANT to the helipad. Jamie B. Graham consulted with medical control, Rosenberg at 19:58 hours. After consultation it was determined patient was non responsive to life and resuscitation efforts, all EMS crew members agreed and resuscitation efforts ceased. Time of death was: 1959 hours.

<u>Identification of the Decedent:</u> Deputy Coroner Matthew Chuvarsky and I viewed the body in the Ambulance Bay at the Grant Ranger Station. The resuscitation and rescue efforts were witnessed by multiple people, both raft guides and guests, who were able to positively identify the individual as Timothy CONANT.

The facial and other physical characteristics of the individual matched the photo identification of the driver's license belonging to Timothy CONANT.

Notification of Family: The evening of June 14, into the morning of June 15, 2017; Deputy Coroner Matthew Chuvarsky and I made several unsuccessful attempts to contact CONANT's mother, In addition, we searched for additional contact information for the family. The following morning, June 16, 2017, Deputy Coroner Matthew Chuvarsky received a return phone call from It was at this point that definitive notification was made with the mother. I received notification from Deputy Coroner Chuvarsky, and spoke with her later that afternoon.

Examination of Body: I examined and photographed CONANT's body at the Grant Ranger Station, beginning at approximately 23:27 hours on June 14, 2017. CONANT was covered in a blanket and strapped to a longboard, located in the Grant Ambulance Bay. Next to his body was a blue hat and sandals.

When I removed the blanket, CONANT was not wearing any clothing and was in a supine position. He still had the medical equipment from resuscitation efforts, and these were documented with photographs. I photographed the body and took notes of any possible injuries and medical treatment. Eyes were partially open, fixed and dilated. AED pads were left in place on the chest, and IO (interosseous) line remained in place on the left leg at the proximal tibia (approximately 2 finger breadths below the patella, and 1-2 cm medial to the tibial tuberocity. Additional, IO line remained in place at the right proximal humerous, and blood pressure cuff remained on his right arm. Also there was an 18 gauge IV initiated in the left Antecubital. There were heat packs placed next to his

body, on the longboard. CONANT had a C-collar in place, and the Endotrachial tube and NG tube that had been placed for an airway; there was a red mark located on his chin.

CONANT had multiple small, red bruises on both legs from his ankles up to his thighs. The skin on his upper chest, shoulders and neck were mottled. Lividity on his back.

<u>Toxicology</u>: Femoral blood, urine and vitreous fluid was taken and sent to the AXIS toxicology labs. The results indicated the following:

Blood – Positive for cardiovascular agents, Amiodarone (resuscitation efforts)

Urine – Positive for opiates; morphine.

Vitreous fluid – was inconclusive.

Confirmed with AXIS laboratories that the positive result in urine and not blood samples is not unusual, and inconclusive.


<u>Disposition of Body</u>: Timothy CONANT's body was released to Valley Mortuary on June 15, 2017; and transported to Jackson, Wyoming.


CONANT was a healthy, twenty three year old male, with no known medical conditions.

Statement regarding the events of 14 Jun 17, approximately 1530 - 1600 on Lake Yellowstone. The This document created 15 Jun 17. three O.A.R.S guides were Tim (lead), My family and I began a Kayak tour from the Grant Village boat ramp about 1430. Everything was fine on the outbound leg of the 4 to 5-mile event to the West Thumb Geyser Basin. Sometime after 1646 (local—based on the date-time stamp on the last photo my wife took of me in the kayak) on the return leg of the trip (bank to the right), with wind from the shore, my single person kayak capsized to the left. Leading up to that point, I had not encountered significant difficulty maneuvering the kayak, the wind blowing from the shore kept pushing me farther out. I had noticed what I believed to excess water in the kayak, but somewhat assumed it was largely from paddling—but suspected was more than that. I used right rudder to turn toward the shore and the group. Turning, with the accumulation of water shifting more to the left side of the kayak (I assume), and a gust of wind from the shore (right) sufficiently changed my center of gravity for the left side of the kayak to dip into the water and capsize. After a few minutes in the water, the female guides arrived first, followed by Tim as he was at the front of the group and I was at the end. All three righted the kayak, helped me back into it and began pumping. The pumping was not evacuating sufficient water and one of the guides said the water was coming in behind me. Their crosstalk focused on the need to get me to shore soonest. About this time, Tim's kayak dipped to the right (he was on my left, the females to my right) and he capsized. I believe he wound up sitting on the upturned kayak. The females left, left, right) began towing me in the submerged kayak (tied off to kayak - not sure how I may have been tied to kayak). Shortly—a few minutes perhaps, said we needed to jettison my kayak (too much drag) and they would tow me to shore with both paddling and me I the middle holding on to both of their kayaks. During our trip to shore, hailed Tim at least two times, maybe more, about the hypothermia bag and getting it to us. I don't recall him responding (could not see him), but had the impression he might not be paddling to shore on behind us. I think, but cannot remember fully, that he may have been sitting on his capsized kayak. They kept me talking and asked me to kick. I had been and told her so. No estimate of how long it took them to get to shore—they were both paddling very aggressively against a headwind. Reaching within feet of the shore, I stood up, walked on and sat down in the trees within 5 or so feet of the water. As soon as was out of her kayak, she helped me up and led me to a sunny spot about 8 – 10 feet away in the direction of the West Thumb Geyser Basin. She directed to return to Tim and assist. A young male and female (brother and sister) team beached about that time and the sister (NFI—see ranger reports from the dock) assisted in getting me out of my wet clothes, into acket and shirt (the shirt wrapped around my hips). The brother left about the time we started-I learned later both were certified lifeguards-to head to Tim's kayak ... the sister wanted to go to Tim as well and took kayak. Back to my location on shore ... worked hard to warm me, despite being somewhat wet herself I


believe from the waist down, possibly just knees down, and having given me her flannel shirt (extra) and jacket. She kept rubbing me and wrapped her arms around me using her body heat to attempt to warm my core temp as much as possible. She kept me talking and after a bit I asked about a Park Service boat ... realizing someone from our party would have to contact them. Not sure of the time the Park Service

boat arrived, one of the rangers (not the helmsman—ranger 1) and helped me to the boat. Shortly after I arrived at the boat the second ranger (helmsman—ranger 2) finished his radio updates based on information about Tim having capsized and still off shore with his kayak. Both rangers and worked together to loaded me up and immediately headed out to Tim's location. I was placed in a hypothermia bag as the boat raced out. It might have taken a minute to reach the group with Tim with the brother and sister, to the best of my knowledge) and the rangers transferred him to the boat and headed to shore. I think ranger 1 started chest compressions on Tim—not completely sure. Once at the dock, a group of Park Service LE, etc. moved Tim to the dock, attached the appropriate leads for heart beat and defib machine. Your people have the info on Tim and their activities on the dock.

I remained in the boat, in the bag and as out of the way as best I could. After maybe 5 – 10 minutes an ambulance arrived and I was helped out of the boat and into it. The EMT and on LE ranger were with me on the ride to the clinic—they have their notes on what they did and I have only my side.





CONDITIONS OF THIS AUTHORIZATION

- 1. The holder is prohibited from knowingly giving false information. To do so will be considered a breach of conditions and be grounds for revocation: [RE: 36 CFR 2.32(a) (3)].
- 2. The holder shall exercise this privilege subject to the supervision of the park area Superintendent. The holder shall comply with all applicable laws and regulations of the area and terms and conditions of the authorization. The holder must acquire all permits or licenses of State or local government, as applicable, necessary to provide the services described above, and, must operate in compliance with all applicable Federal, State, and local laws and regulations, including, without limitation, all applicable park area policies, procedures and regulations. The commercial services described above are to be provided to park area visitors at reasonable rates and under operating conditions satisfactory to the park area Superintendent.
- 3. This authorization is issued upon the express condition that the United States, its agents and employees shall be free from all liabilities and claims for damages and/or suits for or by reason of any injury, injuries, or death to any person or persons or property of any kind whatsoever, whether to the person or property of the (holder), its agents or employees, or third parties, from any cause or causes whatsoever while in or upon said premises or any part thereof during the term of this authorization or occasioned by any occupancy or use of said premises or any activity carried on by the (holder) in connection herewith, and the (holder) hereby covenants and agrees to indemnify, defend, save and hold harmless the United States, its agents, and employees from all liabilities, charges, expenses and costs on account of or by reason of any such injuries, deaths, liabilities, claims, suits or losses however occurring or damages growing out of the same.
- 4. Holder agrees to carry general liability insurance against claims occasioned by the action or omissions of the holder, its agents and employees in carrying out activities and operations under this authorization. The policy shall be at least \$500,000.00 and naming the United States of America as additional insured. Holder agrees to have on file with the park copies of the above insurance with the proper endorsements.
- 5. Costs incurred by the park as a result of accepting and processing the application and managing and monitoring the authorization activity will be reimbursed by the holder. Administrative costs and estimated costs for activities onsite must be paid when the authorization is approved. If any additional costs are incurred by the park, the holder will be billed at the conclusion of the authorization.
- 6. Benefit Neither Members of, nor Delegates to Congress, or Resident Commissioners shall be admitted to any share or part of this authorization or derive, either directly or indirectly, any pecuniary benefit to arise therefrom: Provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to extend to any incorporated company, if the authorization be for the benefit of such corporation.
- 7. This authorization may not be transferred or assigned without the written consent of the park area Superintendent.
- This authorization may be terminated upon breach of any of the conditions herein or at the discretion of the park area Superintendent.
- The holder is not entitled to any preference to renewal of this authorization except to the extent otherwise expressly provided by law. This authorization is not exclusive and is not a concession contract.
- 10. The holder shall not construct any structures, fixtures or improvements in the park area. The holder shall not engage in any groundbreaking activities without the express, written approval of the park area Superintendent.
- 11. The holder is to provide the park area Superintendent upon request (and, in any event, immediately after expiration of this authorization) a statement of its gross receipts from its activities under this authorization and any other specific information related to the holder's operations that the park area Superintendent may request, including but not limited to, visitor use statistics, and resource impact assessments.
- 12. The holder is to maintain an accounting system under which its accounts can be readily identified within its system of accounts classification. This accounting system must be capable of providing the information required by this

authorization. The holder grants the United States of America and the Government Accountability Office access to its books and records at any time for the purpose of determining compliance with the terms and conditions of this authorization.

APPENDIX SPECIAL PARK CONDITIONS

Yellowstone - Specific conditions continue below:

- 1. Damages The holder will leave the area(s) authorized for use under this permit in substantially the same condition as it was prior to the activities authorized herein and shall pay the United States for any damage resulting from this use which would not reasonably be inherent in the authorized use.
- 2. The holder will not advertise, solicit business, collect any fees, or sell any goods or services on lands owned and controlled by the United States Government. Websites must include a statement that the holder is an authorized permittee of the National Park Service; brochures and rack cards are optional. CUA holders are not allowed to use the NPS arrowhead or Authorized Concessioner Mark.
- 3. The CUA holder is not allowed to use a form that asks clients to waive liability or indemnify their company. CUA holders may require an Acknowledgement of Risk. CUA holders are encouraged to use the NPS approved Acknowledgement of Risk Form, which will be provided electronically upon request. CUA holders may add a description of specific risks and dangers inherent to the particular authorized activities but may not modify the text. A current Acknowledgement of Risk form or statement that one is not used must be on file with Yellowstone National Park (YELL) Concessions Management Office.
- 4. All incidents involving vehicle property damage or personal injury must be reported to park's Communication Dispatch by calling (307) 344-2640 or a park ranger as soon as possible or within 24 hours. These incidents must also be relayed to the Concessions Management Office of YELL within 24 hours: yell concessions@nps.gov
- 5. CUA holders and employees are prohibited from possessing firearms while on duty within the park. CUA holders are responsible for determining whether state or local laws allow the possession of firearms by their clients. All CUA holders must have a current copy of their firearm possession policy on file with the park.
- 6. The CUA holder may use legally obtained plant, animal, geological and cultural specimens for client educational purposes only. Clients must be advised that possessing, destroying, removing or disturbing specimens in a National Park is strictly prohibited. To comply with park regulations, all specimens or parts thereof must remain inside the vehicle and remain out of sight of other visitors while operating in Yellowstone National Park. Prior to bringing items in the park, the CUA holder must obtain a Permit to Transport permit from an entrance station.
- Guides and/or group leaders must have in their possession an Authorized Guide Card and a copy of their current CUA.
- At a minimum, one guide on each trip must be currently certified in Standard First Aid and CPR and carry
 a first aid kit. Wilderness First Aid or Wilderness First Responder certification is recommended for Day

Hiking, Overnight Backcountry Trips, Non-Motorized Boating, Stream & Shoreline Fishing, Guided Bicycle Tours and Guided Skiing & Snowshoeing. A written list of guides, with description of basic qualifications and expiration dates of their first aid and CPR certification, must be provided to the Concessions Management office prior to beginning operations and as staffing changes. The NPS will provide a form to submit. CPR and 1st aid cards need not be submitted.

- 9. Guides must be at least 18 years of age and trained in basic safety, resource protection, Leave No Trace principles, park rules and regulations and in the requirements of the CUA terms and conditions.
- 10. The holder will ensure that clients are properly clothed and equipped for the authorized activity.
- 11. This authorization does not confer exclusive use of any area in the park. All groups must honor the rights of others and conduct themselves in an orderly manner at all times.
- 12. "Foot travel in all thermal areas and within the Yellowstone Canyon between the Upper Falls and Inspiration Point must be confined to boardwalks or trails that are maintained for such travel and are marked by official signs." 36 CFR, Ch1, se. 7.13(i) No off-trail travel is allowed; stay on designated boardwalks and trails.
- 13. The CUA holder must ensure that all clients and guides *maintain* a distance of at least 100 yards from bears and wolves. A distance of 25 yards is required from bison, elk and other animals.
- 14. The CUA holder or guide shall provide all clients with an orientation prior to the trip which emphasizes safe practices while hiking in bear habitat, Leave No Trace ethics, park rules and regulations, and specific nature, demands, and dangers of the particular trip.
- 15. Guides may not meet clients on park concessioner's land assignments or at NPS Visitor Centers.
- 16. The holder will not conduct any form of guided activity that conflicts with National Park Service ranger-led interpretive programs or conducted activities.
- 17. The CUA holder must provide all visitor services in a manner that is consistent with and supportive of the interpretative goals and objectives of the park.
- 18. While in Yellowstone, the CUA holder or guide is responsible for their clients during the guided portion of their trip.

19. Entrance Fees:

- Guides leading trips and employees of commercial operators conducting business inside the park area must identify themselves at area entrance stations.
- Participants age 16 and older entering the park area must pay applicable entrance fees.
- Guides and employees of commercial operators entering the park area to recreate personally must pay appropriate entrance fees.

20. Food Services: REFER TO APPENDIX A

- All food service and sanitary procedures are subject to U.S. Public Health Standards and inspections.
- If food is provided for a charge, that fee must be included in the Concessioner's gross receipts.
- The CUA holder must obtain all food brought into the park from a food facility that is approved, inspected, and licensed by the appropriate state or local authority.
- The CUA holder may provide cold box lunches.
- If hot meals are provided, it must be obtained from an approved source, and must be transported in a

manner that protects the food from contamination and maintains an internal temperature of greater than or equal to 135 degrees Fahrenheit.

- The temperature of refrigerated food will be maintained at 41 degrees Fahrenheit or less.
- The thermometer must be used to monitor temperatures.
- · Pocket knives or sheath knives must not be used for food preparation.
- All CUA holder-provided water must be from an approved potable water source. Acceptable potable water sources include approved public water systems and/or commercially bottled water. Drinking water supplied from a public water system must be transported and held in smooth, cleanable, tightly-sealed, food-grade containers with a spigot or other sanitary means for dispensing (no dipping from the container). The CUA holder must provide individual, single-service cups for dispensing from these containers. Drinking containers must be kept free from contamination and be disinfected between every use.
- Disinfection Procedures: Drinking water containers must be disinfected by utilizing proper wash/rinse/sanitizing procedures in a licensed commercial food facility. Alternatively, if commercial food facilities are not available, proper disinfection of drinking water containers between uses will be provided by placing 2 tablespoons of 6% chlorine bleach in a 5 gallon container of water, mixing and allowing to stand for 30 minutes. The container will then be emptied, rinsed with potable water, and finally filled with water from the approved source.
- The holder must make every effort to prevent bears from having access to human food sources. All
 employees working in the park area must follow the park's food storage regulations, which can be
 found in section 2.10 (d) of the Superintendent's Compendium.
- 21. The holder will abide by the applicable activity-specific operating plan.

22. Reporting Requirements:

 CUA holders must meet the following annual and monthly reporting requirements in order to maintain a valid authorization. Reporting requirements include:

COMMERCIAL USE AUTHORIZATION FOR GUIDED NON-MOTORIZED BOATS - DORIES, KAYAKS & CANOES OPERATING PLAN - EXHIBIT B

General Provision

- The CUA for Non-Motorized Boats allows the CUA holder to conduct guided touring using dories, single or tandem kayaks, canoe, and other small non-motorized vessels in Yellowstone. Lewis and Shoshone Lakes.
- Overnight backcountry use is not an authorized use unless the CUA holder has a CUA for Overnight Backpacking Trips.
- Incidental fishing by clients is permitted provided clients have a Yellowstone National Park fishing permit and obey park fishing regulations. Fishing permits are required for anyone 16 years and older.
- 4) There is a maximum limit of 15 boats per group excluding the guide, and are limited to three groups per day. Each group must have a qualified guide. Launch times must be scheduled 30 minutes apart. Group size may increase with written permission from the park.
- 5) While on Yellowstone Lake, Lewis Lake, or Shoshone Lake, the CUA holder or guide shall remain with their clients for the duration of the trip.
- 6) Every vessel must have a current Yellowstone National Park boat permit and a map of Yellowstone and/or Shoshone Lakes when operating there. Operators are required to be familiar with and follow the rules and regulations found in the "Yellowstone National Park Boating Regulations" publication.
- To prevent Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS), the CUA holder must ensure gear, tackle, clothing, and equipment (especially wading boots) are cleaned and dried before entering or changing Yellowstone waters.
- 8) All watercraft, trailers, towing vehicles and water recreational gear (including any inflatable or float tube and associated water recreational articles) must undergo an Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) inspection prior to entering any water within Yellowstone National Park. AIS inspections must be done at the same time a boat permit is issued and conducted only by authorized NPS AIS staff.
- Any watercraft, trailer, tow vehicle, or other article immersed in park waters known to contain Aquatic Invasive Species, shall be thoroughly inspected and cleaned prior to entering any other waters within the park.
 - Waters contaminated by Aquatic Invasive Species include: Yellowstone Lake, Yellowstone river (Yellowstone Lake to the park north boundary), Pelican Creek, Gardiner River (Mammoth Hot Springs to the park north boundary), Lewis River (south of Lewis Falls), Madison River, Gibbon River (Madison to Norris), Firehole River (Madison to Old Faithful), and Nez Perce Creek.
- 10) Boats are limited to drift within 25 feet (~7.5 meters) of shoreline thermal features, and are not allowed to land within 32 feet (~10 meters) of thermal features.

Grant Rangers were returning from another SAR when they were notified via radio of a report of a kayak group in trouble off the West Thumb Geyser Basin Boardwalk. The initial report came in via cellphone to a Lake Ranger's cell phone and had little information except that people were in the water in the West Thumb Area. A second report was also being received at the West Thumb bookstore by volunteers about a kayak that was "stuck" on the Lake near West Thumb.

Incident Narrative

Based upon the initial report, Elliott and Poley responded immediately to the Grant marina and launched the Grant patrol boat the "Eagle" out in the the West Thumb basin area. Chavarsky responded to a begin a hasty search of the West Thumb shoreline and DeLuca set up a command post in the Grant Marina parking lot. DeLuca identified over the radio that the commercial kayak group still out on the water was "OARS Kayak" based on who was parked in the parking area and gave a description of the kayaks.

While on the way out of the marina, the Eagle encountered part of the OARS group confirming other members of the group were further down the shoreline, toward the Grant Campground, and that people were still in the water, and possibly hypothetic. Elliott reported this to DeLuca, and DeLuca requested additional boat resources from Lake Boat Patrol to respond to the scene.

As the Eagle proceed down the shoreline they located the first injured kayak client who was on the beach with a kayak guide between the marina and the geyser basin. Elliott brought the boat into shore and Poley did a quick patient assessment. This patient was suffering from mild hypothermia but was stable. The patient and guide were then loaded onto the patrol boat. Using binoculars Elliott was able to locate another group of kayak's rafted together about a 1/4 mile off shore and started toward them.

Upon arrival at the second group Elliott reported via radio that he had located and unconscious, unresponsive Patient, who had been in the water for up to 30 minutes and they were beginning CPR.

At 18:34 hours DeLuca contacted the comm center via radio and requested additional units and a Life Flight to the Grant Helipad.

Upon arrival at Grant Marina Boat Ramp CPR was continued by medical providers and additional arriving Rangers as the patient was moved from the patrol boat to the dock. Grant Fire Department was paged to be the ground contact for the Landing Zone in Grant Village. At this time it was still unclear whether any additional kayaks were

missing so Lake Boat Patrol Rangers who were now on scene in the West Thumb Geyser Basin begin a grid pattern search looking for missing kayaks.

Bock was assigned to begin to interview the bystanders/witnesses in more detail, assisted by DeLuca.

Lake Ambulance 1 arrived on scene and assumed patient care of the kayak client who was found on the beach suffering from hypothermia. This patient would later be transported to Lake Clinic and later released.


The Lifeflight landed at the Grant Helipad and CPR continued as park paramedics consulted with medical control via cellphone. Flight Medics were brought to the scene and joined in the resuscitation efforts. The patient was then moved to the Grant 1 ambulance and transported back the waiting helicopter at the Grant Helipad where resuscitation efforts continued. At some point at the heipad the patient was pronounced dead. (See corners report/medical reports for details)

As a result of Ranger Bock's investigative interviews we were able to gather witness statements and determine there were no additional missing persons from this incident and Lake Patrol Units began to focus their efforts on recovering missing kayaks and equipment. In the end they were unable to recover the deceased kayak guides kayak or drybag's.

A coroner response was requested through dispatch and the body of Timothy Hayden Ryan CONANT was then transported to the Grant Ranger Station were it was transferred to the custody of the Deputy Coroner, Christine Farrar.

Command was terminated at the scene. The continued investigation of this fatality was transferred to DeLuca with Bock assisting. (See investigative report for further if needed)


