

Harry Bailey: It was kind of a ... if you belonged to Harbor Craft Detachment, part of the ships were manned by civilians. There was always a little bad feelings there because they were drawing probably \$1000-1500 a month and we were still on that \$100 or less. On occasion, I would say probably only two, but when things got tough the Army would order us to do something, well the civilians would come up with an excuse; their anchor was tied up in the rocks or something of that sort and we'd have to go. So, there was that bad feeling but not to any great extent.

Clothes wise, I don't know, the Army did not give you clothes that were adequate for being on a ship. We were always trading with the Navy. We'd give them something in turn for one of their jackets. I remember I did have one at that time. Like I said, the Army did not equip you well. They gave you some rain clothes, the same outfit that you would be wearing if you were an infantry man. So, that wasn't one of the pleasurable moments there as far as the civilian thing and being ordered to do things that somebody else wouldn't do.
