



Driving Directions from Flight 93 National Memorial

Flight 93 Memorial Chapel



The Flight 93 Memorial Chapel is a privately-owned, non-denominational chapel where visitors can pause to reflect on the events of September 11, 2001 and remember the passengers and crew of Flight 93. Outside the chapel is a memorial to the crew of Flight 93. To reach the chapel, turn left from the Flight 93 National Memorial main parking area, travel south on Skyline Road one mile to the intersection with Buckstown Road. Turn right and travel 1.2 miles to the intersection with Lambertsville Road. Turn left and travel 1 mile to Shanksville. In Shanksville, turn right at the *Stop Except Right Turn* sign. Cross the bridge in Shanksville and turn right onto Stutzmantown Road. Travel 3 miles to the Chapel on the right. Please call for hours.

Flight 93 Memorial Garden and Totem Pole, Shanksville



The Memorial Garden at Shanksville-Stonycreek School was created in 2002 by students working with artist Jan Loney, underwritten by the Cornell Corporation of Texas, and commemorates the community's response to the events of September 11, 2001. To reach the garden, turn left from the Flight 93 National Memorial main parking area, travel south on Skyline Road one mile to the intersection with Buckstown Road. Turn right and travel 1.2 miles to the intersection with Lambertsville Road. Turn left and travel 1 mile to Shanksville. In Shanksville, turn right at the *Stop Except Right Turn* sign, then immediately turn left onto Main Street. The school is a yellow brick building near the top of the hill at the end of Main Street. The garden is immediately outside the main entrance on the lower side of the building. Please be quiet when school is in session.

A 13 foot high totem pole carved from a single cedar log by members of the Lummi Indian Nation of the state of Washington was a gift to the community in 2003 intended to help bring healing after September 11. The pole is located in the community grove on Main Street, Shanksville, adjacent to the school. See directions above.

WTC Steel Cross Beam, North Tower



The World Trade Center steel cross is located at the Shanksville Volunteer Fire Department in Shanksville. The steel was part of the North WTC Tower. The steel was gifted to the Somerset County 1st responders from the Fire Department of New York Fire Family Transport Foundation (<http://www.firefamilytransport.org>), which provides transportation to the families of injured, ill, or deceased New York City firefighters. The cross was dedicated August 23, 2009 in a ceremony where hundreds of firefighters processed through the streets of Shanksville to the fire station. To see the steel, turn left from the Flight 93 National Memorial main parking area and travel 1 mile on Skyline Road to the intersection with Buckstown Road. Turn right and travel 1.2 miles to the intersection with Lambertsville Road. Turn left and travel 1 mile to Shanksville. In Shanksville, travel straight through at the *Stop Except Right Turn* sign. The Shanksville Fire Department is on the left.

Johnstown and the Johnstown Flood National Memorial



The city of Johnstown, a 45-minute drive from Flight 93 National Memorial, is home to the Inclined Plane, the Heritage Discovery Center, and the Johnstown Flood Museum which commemorates the 1889 event which claimed 2,209 lives when an earthen dam broke after days of heavy rainfall. Ten miles north of Johnstown, the National Park Service operates Johnstown Flood National Memorial at the site of the South Fork Dam.

Interpretive talks, exhibits, vivid films, and ranger-led hikes help tell the story. To reach Johnstown, turn right from the main Memorial parking area. Travel north 1 mile on Skyline Road to the intersection with Lambertsville Road. Turn right and travel 1.7 miles to the intersection with Route 30/Lincoln Highway. Turn left and travel 8 miles to the intersection with U.S. Route 219. Take Route 219 north to Johnstown, following signs. The Johnstown Flood National Memorial is located off the St. Michael/Sidman exit of Route 219.

Quecreek Mine Rescue Site



Located approximately 19 miles from the Flight 93 National Memorial, the site commemorates the successful rescue of 9 coal miners trapped for 78 hours underground in July 2002, and the heroism of rescuers everywhere. See lifesize bronze figures, the rescue capsule, and hear about the rescue from those who were there. To reach the site, turn right from the Flight 93 National Memorial main parking area and travel north 1 mile on Skyline Road to the intersection with Lambertsville Road. Turn right and travel 1.7 miles to the intersection with Route 30/Lincoln Highway. Turn left. Travel 10.2 miles west to the intersection with Route 985 at Jennerstown. Turn left and travel 6.3 miles south on Rt. 985 to the Rescue Site on the right. Hours vary with the season. Phone (814) 445-4876. An exhibit about the Quecreek rescue is also found at the Windber Coal Heritage Center in Windber, PA

Pennsylvania Turnpike (I-76), East and West



Visitors wishing to travel EAST on the PA Turnpike (toward Bedford, Breezewood, Route 70, Harrisburg, etc.) should use the Bedford or Breezewood exits. To reach Bedford, turn left from the main parking area of the Memorial. Travel south 1 mile on Skyline Road to the intersection with Buckstown Road. Turn left and travel 3 miles to the intersection with Route 30 at Buckstown. Travel east on Route 30/Lincoln Highway 25 miles to Bedford or approximately 50 miles to Breezewood.

Visitors wishing to travel WEST on the PA Turnpike (toward Pittsburgh and Ohio) should use the Somerset exit. To reach Somerset, turn right from the main parking area of the Memorial. Travel 1 mile on Skyline Road to the intersection with Lambertsville Road. Turn right. Travel 1.7 miles to the intersection with Route 30. Turn left. Travel west 2.4 miles to the intersection with Route 281 at Stoystown. Travel south on Rt. 281, 9.5 miles to Somerset.

The nearest gas stations traveling east from the Flight 93 National Memorial are 5-7 miles away on Route 30/Lincoln Highway between Buckstown and Reels Corner and on Route 160 north of Reels Corner. The nearest station traveling west is on Route 30/Lincoln Highway in Jennerstown. Snacks and beverages, books, postcards, and souvenirs are available at stores in Shanksville and Buckstown. Full meals and lodging are available on Route 30 in the Reels Corners area (traveling east), and in the Stoystown/Jennerstown/Boswell area (traveling west), and at Indian Lake Lodge. Many food and lodging options are available in Somerset and Johnstown.
