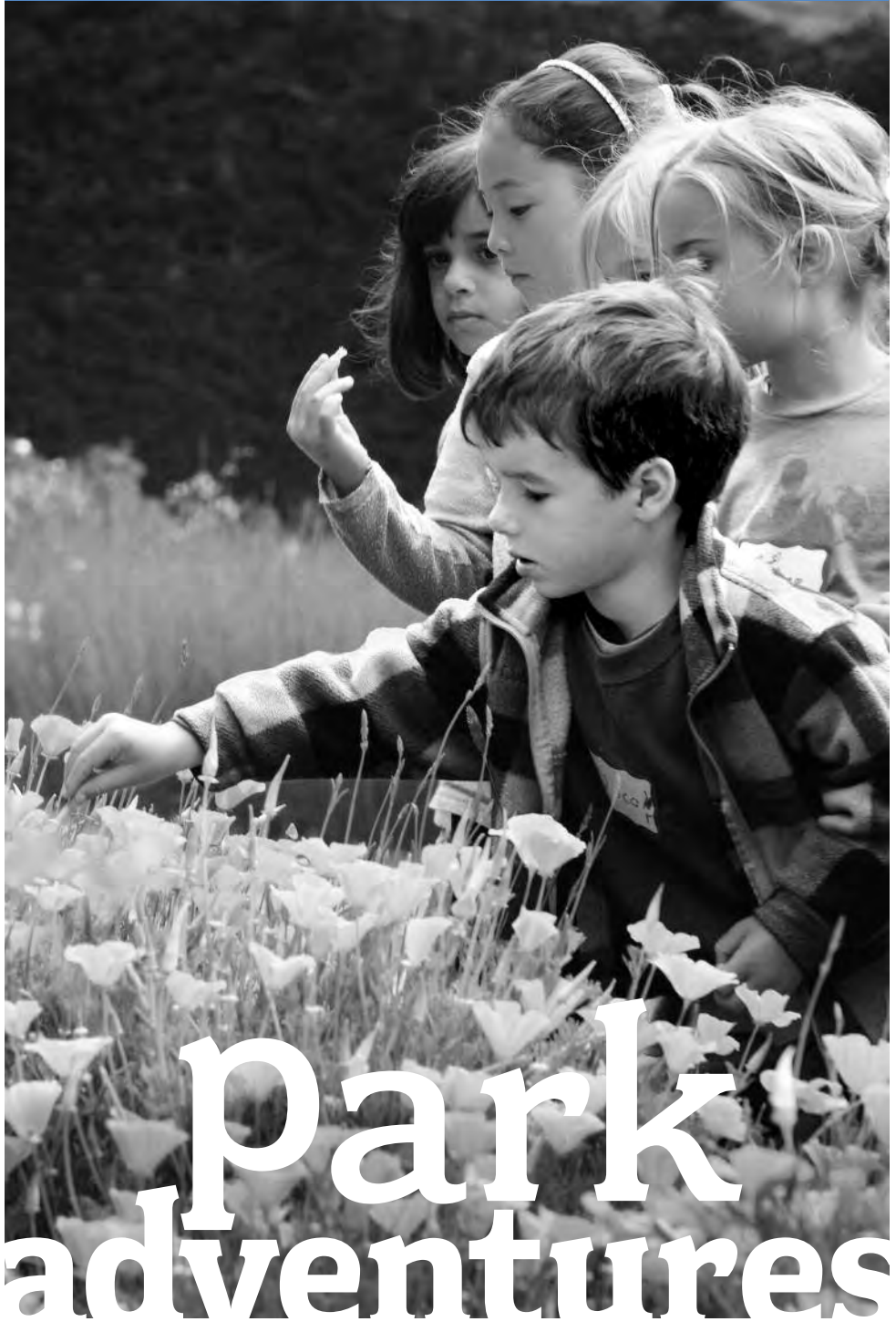

On April 5-6, National Park Service Director Jon Jarvis convened a “Healthy Parks Healthy People US” forum to discuss ways to bolster the connection between public health and public lands. The event at Fort Baker, co-hosted by the Institute at the Golden Gate (a partnership of the Golden Gate National Parks Conservancy and the NPS), served to launch the director’s commitment to a “Healthy Foods Strategy.” Director Jarvis announced his intention to continue to work with leaders in government and health, nonprofit, and environmental sectors to leverage park resources for the betterment of Americans’ health and wellbeing.

THE GOLDEN GATE NATIONAL PARKS: YOUR PLACE FOR BETTER HEALTH

HERE AT GOLDEN GATE, we embrace the notion of “Healthy Parks Healthy People,” one of the exciting emerging themes of the National Park Service (NPS). In early April, NPS Director Jon Jarvis brought together leaders in health care, the environment, government, and business to discuss how America’s local, state, and national parks can promote healthier lifestyles and greater wellbeing.

“Our national parks have always been loved for their symbolism and scenery, but we aim to increase the awareness of all parks as places for exercise and healthy living,” said Director Jarvis at the April meeting, convened with the support of the Institute at the Golden Gate, a Golden Gate National Parks Conservancy program in partnership with the NPS.

Many serious health issues facing our nation—such as heart ailments, diabetes, and obesity—are due in no small part to inactivity and poor nutrition. But the good news is that research shows that exposure to

nature and outdoor exercise have significant health benefits, including improved wellness and mental health, reduced stress, and lower blood pressure.

This summer, make a commitment to take advantage of your national park next door to become healthier and happier. Here are a few ideas for enjoying the natural and historic resources of the Golden Gate National Parks:

■ Pack a picnic and hike from the Tennessee Valley Trailhead to the beach. This 3.4-mile round trip has a gentle slope and incomparable pastoral scenery. To

burn more calories, bear north on the Coastal Trail to Muir Beach and retrace your steps.

■ Take a walk along the Promenade at Crissy Field for world-famous vistas. The Promenade is suitable for walkers and runners of all stripes; bicyclists wanting to ride fast should use bike lanes on Mason Street.

■ A stroll around Lands End—revitalized thanks to private philanthropy and the work of the Parks Conservancy—is sure to lift your spirits. Round trip on the Lands End Trail is about three miles.

■ Mori Point, near Sharp Park in Pacifica, is a surprise for most people. A one-mile accessible trail to the ocean is the centerpiece, but those wanting a more intense workout can hike up the bluffs for stunning coastal views.

■ Simply relax! Wherever you are in the park, find a comfortable spot, sit down, and breathe deeply!

Naturally, you should consult your doctor to set a suitable level of exercise, but whatever you choose to undertake, the parks are waiting for you.

Golden Gate Trail Crew

Third Saturdays (9 AM—NOON)

Join the Trails Forever Team and our Golden Gate trail crew of volunteers! Every 3rd Saturday of the month, help repair, maintain and enhance trails, and protect sensitive natural habitat throughout the Golden Gate National Parks.

Habitat Restoration Team

Sundays (9:30 AM—2:30 PM)

The Habitat Restoration Team, established in 1988, engages community members in the management and enhancement of the Golden Gate National Parks. Volunteers and staff meet weekly at different scenic locations to restore the parks' native habitat by removing invasive plants, transplanting native plants (a key winter activity), and seed collecting (spring through fall).

Appropriate for adults and youth (chaperones are suggested for youth under age 18).

Meeting locations vary; phone 331-0732 for locations, directions, and carpool availability.

Invasive Plant Patrol

Wednesdays (10 AM—2:30 PM)

The Invasive Plant Patrol hikes park trails to find new invasions of exotic plants, and removes localized infestations before they become uncontrolled. You'll learn to identify both malicious and benign plants during these hikes that last approximately four hours.

Appropriate for adults and youth (chaperones are suggested for youth under age 18).

Weed Watchers patrol national park trails in San Mateo, San Francisco, and Marin Counties, detecting and mapping weeds as they first invade.

If you enjoy leisurely hikes through the parks but also want to help protect natural resources, then this is the perfect opportunity for you.



Volunteers are trained in identification of priority invasive plants along with the methods to map and report their findings. After attending a training session, volunteers can join any of the weekly guided surveys or adopt their own trails. GPS training is also provided for those interested.

ALCATRAZ



Open daily (except for Thanksgiving, December 25 and January 1). Join ranger-led programs, use self-guiding brochures, and take the compelling cellhouse

audio tour to learn about this historic island.

A captioned video introduction about Alcatraz history is shown every 30 minutes in the island theater. Additional exhibits containing Alcatraz artifacts and other historic items are located in the new museum store in the basement level of the cellhouse.



Phone 561-4900, 9 AM to 4 PM, for program and general information.

Daily ferry service to Alcatraz originates at Pier 33, and the cellhouse audio tour can be purchased with ferry tickets. Visit www.alcatrazcruises.com or phone 981-ROCK for ticket reservations. Note: Alcatraz tickets frequently sell out as much as one week in advance. For more information about Alcatraz, visit www.nps.gov/alcatraz.

ACCESSIBILITY FEATURES

■ The SEAT (shuttle) transport is available for wheelchair users and visitors physically unable to walk up the quarter-mile, 12 percent-grade hill to the cellhouse.

Children under 14 must be escorted by an adult; service animals allowed.

■ Ask at Pier 33 for the loan of an assistive listening device for the duration of your visit.

■ Transcripts of the cellhouse audio tour are available for hearing-impaired visitors.

■ Ask about the visually accessible descriptor version of the audio tour.

■ Braille versions of the cellhouse audio tour are available for vision-impaired visitors.

■ Stationary ranger programs, provided at least once daily, are marked on the island's program board with a wheelchair symbol.

■ Please ask about accommodations for any program.
