Hampton National Historic Site offers an exceptional, perhaps unmatched, look at a nineteenth century slave estate. The mansion looks down on the overseer's house, and the overseer's house looks down on the slave quarters, reminding visitors and workers of their place in life. Objects, such as a sterling teapot or a cooking range, not only reveal the mindset of their creators and owners, but also offer a chance for reflection on the workers who sweated through a hot August cleaning them, or used them to serve their masters. A visitor today can explore the buildings and landscape, and doing so, can begin to imagine the complex human relationships that defined Hampton in the ante-bellum era.
