TRAM RIDE



JOURNEY TO THE TOP

Just when you thought it was thrilling enough to ride the tram 630 feet to the top, the Gateway Arch has designed an interactive tram ride experience, *Journey to the Top*. This blast from the past has an exhibit in each leg of the Arch that educates and entertains visitors as they are waiting in the queue areas to ride the tram. Tram leaves every 10 minutes. Round trip: 60 minutes.


FITTING THE FINAL PIECE

The north leg's tram experience is a re-creation of the day in 1965 when construction workers wedged the last triangular section in the top of the Gateway Arch.

The south leg's tram experience is an incredible re-creation of the St. Louis Riverfront in the mid-1800s.

GIANT-SCREEN MOVIE

"Lewis & Clark: Great Journey West"

RIVERBOATS & HISTORIC OLD COURTHOUSE



GATEWAY ARCH RIVERBOATS

Listen to the stories of times past as you glide by famous landmarks and new sights along the waterfront. The riverboats *Tom Sawyer* and *Becky Thatcher* each sail for one hour, and an optional hot dog lunch is available. Cruises launch year-round, weather permitting. Cruise times: 10:30 a.m., 12:00, 1:30, 3:00 & 4:30 p.m.

HISTORIC OLD COURTHOUSE

Visit a restored courtroom from the 1860s, see exhibits tracing the history of the St. Louis Riverfront, learn about the historic Dred Scott case and a lot more. A visit to the Historic Old Courthouse is free and it's just a short walk from the Arch. Hours: 8:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m.



2008 – 2009 FAMILY SCOUT WORKSHOPS

Join us for a new line of programming designed to serve Tiger Cubs and their families. Each program highlights a different, age-appropriate theme. Scouts and their families will enjoy a national park service ranger-led program followed by a hands-on craft activity. All programs are from 2:00 p.m. – 3:30 p.m. on Sundays.

DECEMBER 7, 2008

CELEBRATE!

A national park service ranger will use the Historic Old Courthouse history galleries to share with scouts the stories behind our holiday celebrations, past and present. Scouts will make and take a holiday decoration.

JANUARY 25, 2009

FUN & GAMES

Explore the Museum of Westward Expansion and learn about the lives and past times of 19th century boys and girls. Scouts will make and take a pioneer toy.

FEBRUARY 8, 2009

WHERE WE LIVE!

Explore the history and cultural heritage of the St. Louis community, using historic photos, maps, artifacts, and the galleries at the Historic Old Courthouse. Scouts will make and take a Victorian valentine.

MARCH 15, 2009

COOPERATION ON THE TRAIL

In the Museum of Westward Expansion, scouts will experience some of the difficulties and challenges early pioneers faced traveling by wagon across prairies, rivers, and mountains to reach a new home in the west. Scouts will make and take a pioneer toy.

BOY SCOUT PROGRAMS

WOLF CUBS

Native American Lore

Explore the culture of the courageous Plains Indians, how they lived, dressed and interacted with each other. Scouts will take part in sign language and picture writing activities. Addresses Wolf Cub Scout Elective 10. (At the Gateway Arch.)



BEAR CUBS

The Past is Exciting and Important

Often, people do not think of their own community as a place where spirited events happened. In this program, scouts discuss the importance of local history and family lore as they explore the Historic Old Courthouse. Addresses Bear Cub Scout Achievement 8. (At the Historic Old Courthouse.)



WOLF/BEAR CUBS

Native American Life

Early residents of this area had a great number of challenges to overcome. Scouts investigate the culture of the Illini and Osage Indians of the woodland areas of the Mississippi Valley and compare it to the lifestyle of the Plains Indians. Addresses Wolf Cub Scout Elective 10a and Bear Cub Scout Elective 24. (At the Gateway Arch.)



WEBELOS

Scholars

Education has frequently taken two tracks: the practical and the cultured. Both provide for different societal needs and take effort to complete the process. Scouts encounter the apprentice system and compare it to more conventional forms of learning. Addresses the Scholars Activity Badge. (At the Historic Old Courthouse.)



Reservations for Wolf, Bear and Webelos are taken year round.

All programs listed above are approximately 50 minutes in length. A 30-day advance reservation is required. A minimum of six scouts or maximum of 30 scouts is required to book a reservation. If you have less than six scouts, we will try to place you with a previously scheduled group.

BOY SCOUTS MERIT BADGE WORKSHOPS

American Heritage

Journey along the St. Louis riverfront to learn about the important role St. Louis played in the growth of our nation as a river city during the 19th century. Addresses the American Heritage Badge. (At the Historic Old Courthouse and aboard the Gateway Arch Riverboats.)

Law

Does protecting the law involve bravery? Does telling the truth equal courage? Investigate the judicial system and its important role in our society. Scouts re-enact trials in historic courtrooms and debate historic and contemporary issues. An attorney and a National Park Service Law Enforcement Ranger discuss their roles and responsibilities in society. Addresses the Law Badge. (At the Historic Old Courthouse.)

In this full-day workshop scouts will travel aboard Amtrak from St. Louis to Springfield, Illinois, accompanied by staff members from Jefferson National Expansion Memorial. Indian Lore

In this half-day workshop, participants will explore the Plains Indian culture. Scouts will participate in simulations of the Plains Indians' daily activities: constructing a tipi, handling authentic reproduction items, communicating in sign language, and learning traditional songs and games. With the help of the National Park Service staff, scouts will be able to complete the merit badge. Reservations required; space is limited. (At the Gateway Arch.)
