CULTURAL RESOURCES PROJECT STATEMENT

1. PARK AND REGION: Kalaupapa National Historical Park, Western Region
2. PROJECT NAME AND NUMBER: C-1, Emergency Preserve 13 National Register Buildings (101)
3. STATEMENT OF PROBLEM: This is a priority combination of buildings with urgent preservation needs, high historic significance, and such integral importance to the interpretive theme of Kalaupapa that they must not be lost.

The emergency preservation is to correct structural deterioration from termites, rot, and rain which will (if not soon corrected) result in the permanent loss of these structures, all of which are of high importance to the interpretive theme of the National Historical Park. Historical Architect Henry Law listed these structures in high priority for urgent preservation treatment.

Public Law 96-565 directs the National Park Service to research, preserve, and maintain the important historic structures of Kalaupapa Settlement. These are the most urgent in need of such preservation and will not survive without stabilization treatment.

4. WHAT HAS BEEN DONE: Table 3, "Stabilization Work Done to Kalaupapa Structures in 1982 and 1983," summarizes the extent of stabilization work done to date.
5. DESCRIPTION OF WORK TO BE UNDERTAKEN: Give emergency preservation treatment to Buildings 720, 292, 5SR, 265, 264, 61, 271, 15M, 288, 115, 116, 699, and 695.

The preservation maintenance work proposed include fumigating termites; repairing roofs; repair and replacement of structural components destroyed by termites and rot; rewiring to electric codes; foundation repairs; repainting exterior walls; and repair to porches, handrails, steps, and doors; and correct health and safety deficiencies listed by Regional Historical Architects.

This is a difficult preservation package due to the isolated location (all supplies come by infrequent, unscheduled barge and tug). The longer the work is delayed, the more likely the historic fabric will be lost and costs will escalate enormously.

6. LENGTH OF TIME NEEDED: One year.
7. WHAT WILL HAPPEN IF NOT UNDERTAKEN: Termites, mildew, rot, and encroaching tropical vegetation will engulf the structures within a few to several years; the structures will be lost.

8. WHAT ARE THE ALTERNATIVES: Abandon these structures.
9. PERSONNEL: Historical Architect, GS-12, to supervise contractor and draft up contracts.

1. PARK AND REGION: Kalaupapa National Historical Park, Western Region
2. PROJECT NAME AND NUMBER: C-2, Maintain Historic Buildings (002)
3. STATEMENT OF PROBLEM: Although the park is just established, we are now responsible for an existing, ongoing community of 200 people. One hundred seven (107) are leprosy patients once exiled to Kalaupapa; now they have such emotional and physical ties, they could never leave. They occupy a village complex of some 400 buildings, use a road and trail network, and rely totally on old water/electric/sewer systems. The National Park Service must begin operation, preservation, and maintenance of this community. P.L. 95-565, December 22, 1980, directs the National Park Service at the newly established Kalaupapa National Historical Park:

"...to provide a well-maintained community in which the Kalaupapa leprosy patients are guaranteed that they may remain at Kalaupapa as long as they wish; to protect the current lifestyle of these patients and their individual privacy; to research, preserve, and maintain the present character of the community; to research, preserve, and maintain important historic structures..."
4. WHAT HAS BEEN DONE: Table 3, "Stabilization Work Done to Kalaupapa Structures in 1982 and 1983," is a composite listing of termites, painting, and roof repairs done to 57 historic structures during 1982 and 1983.
5. DESCRIPTION OF WORK TO BE UNDERTAKEN: The entire park is a Historic District on the National Register; 45 buildings are on the Register. The National Park Service is immediately responsible for community operation and maintenance of one water system, one electrical distribution system, dozens of septic tank systems, 300 acres of grounds, three cemeteries, 350 structures, 10 miles of roads and streets, and a three-mile trail.
6. LENGTH OF TIME NEEDED: This is now a continual maintenance proposal for 195 historic structures.
7. WHAT WILL HAPPEN IF NOT UNDERTAKEN: Termites, encroaching vegetation, and water damage will quickly undo the stabilization work done to date.
8. WHAT ARE THE ALTERNATIVES: Abandon Kalaupapa National Historical Park.

1. PARK AND REGION: Kalaupapa National Historical Park, Western Region
2. PROJECT NAME AND NUMBER: C-3, Emergency Preserve St. Philomena Church (118)
3. STATEMENT OF PROBLEM: The emergency preservation of St. Philomena Church is to stop further deterioration of a national landmark building. St. Philomena is the most significant structure at Kalaupapa National Historical Park and the key structure to be maintained to properly carry out the enabling legislation of the park. The current condition of the structure and associated grounds are in disrepair.

The known problems of the structure and surrounding grounds are numerous. The roofing system leaks due to holes in the roofing and improper flashing. Plants are growing in the masonry parapet on the tower. Structural failure is apparent with cracks in the masonry walls due to an earthquake. The structural framing of the floor has failed under heavy loading of a mud flow. Exterior paint is deteriorated. Fences, walls, and graveyard headstones are in deteriorated condition, including Father Damien's original burial plot.

St. Philomena and its surrounding grounds are the highlight of the visitor experience at Kalaupapa. Preserving this structure will prevent the loss of the most significant structure at Kalaupapa and enhance the visitor's experience by interpreting the early history of the leprosy settlement and its association with Father Damien. St. Philomena Church is the only building left from the early days of the settlement while it existed in the Kalawao portion of the peninsula.

4. WHAT HAS BEEN DONE: Nothing.
5. DESCRIPTION OF WORK TO BE UNDERTAKEN: To make proper decisions in the rehabilitation of this structure, an historic structure report should be completed to evaluate the fabric and make recommendations for treatment. Much is unknown about what fabric is original and what kind of alterations have been made and when they were made. Some of the structural integrity is in question.

Once an historic structure report is completed, drawings and specifications are needed to implement the necessary development for preservation, and rehabilitate the structure and surrounding grounds to a state where proper maintenance can maintain the historic scene. It would be advantageous to develop an historic furnishing report in conjunction with the HSR, to lower the cost of duplicated research.

Emergency preservation needs include repairing masonry, reroofing, repainting, and repairing floor structure.

6. LENGTH OF TIME NEEDED: Five to ten years.
7. WHAT WILL HAPPEN IF NOT UNDERTAKEN: There will be critical loss of foundation, roof, and bearing structure.
8. WHAT ARE THE ALTERNATIVES: Abandon St. Philomena as a structure for National Park Service maintenance help. Sporadically private groups will "reconstruct" it but in time the historic authenticity and integrity will be lost.
9. PERSONNEL: Most of the work would be by contract. Historical Architect, GS-12, to supervise contracts and coordinate drafting contracts.

2. PROJECT NAME AND NUMBER: C-4, Emergency Preserve 12 National Register Historic Buildings (102)
3. STATEMENT OF PROBLEM: These are a priority combination of buildings with high preservation needs, high significance, are in operational use, and integral importance to the Historical Park's interpretive theme. If not corrected soon, the termite, rot, and water will permanently destroy these structures. Most are actively used by the leprosy patients. Public Law 95-565 directs the National Park Service "to provide a well-maintained community in which Kalaupapa leprosy patients are guaranteed that they may remain at Kalaupapa as long as they wish." This commitment will not be met if these buildings are lost to termites and rot.
4. WHAT HAS BEEN DONE: Table 3, "Stabilization Work Done to Kalaupapa Structures in 1982 and 1983," summarizes the extent of stabilization work done to date.
5. DESCRIPTION OF WORK TO BE UNDERTAKEN: Give emergency preservation treatment to Buildings 296, 522BV, 11BV, 117-62, 64BV, 6SR, 630, 635, 16SR, 260, 258a, and 263a.

The preservation maintenance proposed is to fumigate termites; repair roofs to stop leaking; repair structural components destroyed by rot, termites, and water; rewire to electrical codes; repair foundations; repaint exterior walls; and repair porches, handrails, and steps.

This is a difficult preservation package due to the isolated location (all supplies come by infrequent, unscheduled barge). The longer work is delayed, the more likely historic fabric will be lost and therefore costs will escalate enormously.
6. LENGTH OF TIME NEEDED: One year.

1. PARK AND REGION: Kalaupapa National Historical Park, Western Region
2. PROJECT NAME AND NUMBER: C-5, Maintain Most Significant Public and Historic Buildings (004)
3. STATEMENT OF PROBLEM: Of the 195 historic buildings now on the park priority list for maintenance, 57 have been given emergency stabilization at a cost of \$805,000. This work — fumigation, painting, roof repairs — must be maintained or the results of treatment will be lost. This maintenance funding will place the high priority structures on a programmed annual maintenance basis rather than project repair of crisis damage.
4. WHAT HAS BEEN DONE: To date 57 structures have been stabilized. Table 3, "Stabilization Work Done to Kalaupapa Structures in 1982 and 1983," summarizes this work.
5. DESCRIPTION OF WORK TO BE UNDERTAKEN: Workload Analysis and Proposed Action: Fumigate for flying and ground termites in 80 historic and/or public buildings at a rate of 15 structures per year to control termite damage. Reroof 80 buildings at a rate of 6 structures per year to prevent water and mildew damage. Paint 80 buildings at a rate of 10 structures per year.
6. LENGTH OF TIME NEEDED: An annual repetitive maintenance program.
7. WHAT WILL HAPPEN IF NOT UNDERTAKEN: Stabilization efforts to date will have been wasted.
8. WHAT ARE THE ALTERNATIVES: Not maintain the Park's historic structures.
9. PERSONNEL: Most work will be done by contractor, supervised by GS-12 Historical Architect.

3. STATEMENT OF PROBLEM: Initially, the Park may operate by reimbursing on-site State workers to do the required park work. Gradually, the State will move these people or abandon the workforce. The National Park Service then will need to convert or hire these people to full-time Federal positions. Needed are FTE and any difference in Federal versus State salaries.
4. WHAT HAS BEEN DONE: Cooperative Agreements with the State Department of Health are nearly negotiated and signed.
5. DESCRIPTION OF WORK TO BE UNDERTAKEN: Convert six positions to Federal.
6. LENGTH OF TIME NEEDED: Probably a few years.
7. WHAT WILL HAPPEN IF NOT UNDERTAKEN: We will likely jeopardize the Cooperative Agreement with Hawaii and thus jeopardize the use of State lands (all of Kalaupapa) for use as a National Park.

1. PARK AND REGION: Kalaupapa National Historical Park, Western Region
2. PROJECT NAME AND NUMBER: C-7, Manage/Control Visitor Use and Safety in Historic Area (003)
3. STATEMENT OF PROBLEM: Both legislation and commitment to patients require the National Park Service to manage visitor use to Kalaupapa at levels below 100 people per day. This will involve active interpretation and visitor use management to fairly allocate these opportunities among many potential visitors, competing tour groups and religious pilgrimages to Father Damien's Church when he is canonized.
4. WHAT HAS BEEN DONE: Nothing.
5. DESCRIPTION OF WORK TO BE UNDERTAKEN: Deal with 135 patients; four churches; two airlines; and two tour groups to develop a visitor use/interpretive program to fairly allocate 100 visitors per day to the leprosy community in a manner that does not intrude upon patients' lives.
6. LENGTH OF TIME NEEDED: Base operation.
7. WHAT WILL HAPPEN IF NOT UNDERTAKEN: National Park Service will violate Public Law 96-565 which states that "...the Secretary (Interior) shall not permit public visitation to the settlement in excess of one hundred persons in any one day." Already local clergy and Honolulu tour agencies are demanding information as to who the National Park Service will or will not allow to visit Kalaupapa and under what circumstances. By law we cannot delay this management.
8. WHAT ARE THE ALTERNATIVES: Not fulfill the directive of P.L. 96-565.

1. PARK AND REGION: Kalaupapa National Historical Park, Western Region
2. PROJECT NAME AND NUMBER: C-8, Record Oral History from Living Leprosy Patients (103)
3. STATEMENT OF PROBLEM: Only 107 Kalaupapa resident patients now remain. They average 55 years and have a lower than normal life expectancy. If oral history is to be recorded, it is urgent to commence at once. This is a one time only opportunity to acquire first-hand accounts from the people themselves who with leprosy were sent to Molokai forever. We particularly need people's recollection of what structures were used for, personal recollection, and incidents related to the structures and recollection of appearances of structures.
4. WHAT HAS BEEN DONE: Ted Gugelyk and Milton Bloombaum of the University of Hawaii have conducted interviews with Kalaupapa patients. However, none of the line of inquiry pertains to patients' recollections as to uses and appearance of historic structures.
5. DESCRIPTION OF WORK TO BE UNDERTAKEN: Record recollections of leprosy patients still living at Kalaupapa, concentrating particularly upon oldest residents. This will provide both a history of patients' experiences while in exile at Kalaupapa and will become a basis of interpreting the Kalaupapa Settlement in future years.
6. LENGTH OF TIME NEEDED: Two years.
7. WHAT WILL HAPPEN IF NOT UNDERTAKEN: Opportunity to tap memory of only living patients exiled to Kalaupapa will be lost.
8. WHAT ARE THE ALTERNATIVES: Not secure oral history.
9. PERSONNEL: Contract with University of Hawaii Sociology Department to secure investigators with past successors at Kalaupapa and knowledge of Hawaiian language.

1. PARK AND REGION: Kalaupapa National Historical Park, Western Region
2. PROJECT NAME AND NUMBER: C-9, Emergency Preserve 11 National Register Historic Buildings (104)
3. STATEMENT OF PROBLEM: These are both ruins or sites of highest historic value and fundamental to the historic theme of the park or are historic buildings in use and high urgency for preservation treatment. If not soon corrected, encroaching vegetation, termites, rot, and water will permanently destroy these structures and remaining ruins left of the earliest Kalawao Settlement period.

Historical Architect Cox listed the structures as third most significant in need of preservation. The ruins are those remaining of the highest historical significance of the Kalawao period.

Cox's work estimates for the structures are attached.

6. LENGTH OF TIME NEEDED:

Total time one year. If summer HABS Team were used, it might take four summers.

7. WHAT WILL HAPPEN IF NOT UNDERTAKEN:

The data will be lost for structures which are currently beyond restoration. Data needed in the restoration/preservation of significant structures would not be available when needed.

8. WHAT ARE THE ALTERNATIVES:

The National Park Service is legally required to mitigate the loss of historic structures beyond restoration by preservation of the data on the structures. The collection, if not properly accounted for and provenance noted, will lose some of its important history. Cataloging is part of the preservation process and is required by National Park Service policy and regulations.

They are in various states of preservation, mostly poor, due to the poor environment in which they have existed in the past. In order to preserve them for the future, most will need some level of treatment. To determine the needs, a survey of their condition should be done by a professional conservator.

4. WHAT HAS BEEN DONE:

In 1982, as part of the Collection Preservation Guide site visit, two conservators from the Bishop Museum visited the area and completed a general report on the objects observed then.

5. DESCRIPTION OF WORK TO BE UNDERTAKEN:

The collection should be surveyed on site by a conservator. That person should examine a random selection of the types of materials contained in the collection. In addition, a more detailed report should be completed on certain items that are determined to be a great value or are in a rapidly deteriorating state.

One month.

Objects are self-destructing and will continue to do so. The National Park Service is required to preserve the objects in its care.

3. STATEMENT OF PROBLEM: Knowledge of archeological sites on Kalaupapa peninsula is necessary so that park operations avoid damage to these sites. The peninsula has extensive prehistoric human use and one is likely to encounter archeological sites in any operation or maintenance endeavor.
4. WHAT HAS BEEN DONE: No systematic archeological survey has been conducted in these portions of the park.
5. DESCRIPTION OF WORK TO BE UNDERTAKEN: Archeological survey designed to locate, identify, and record all archeological resources, both prehistoric and historic, within those portions of Waikolu Valley, Nihoa, and Topside areas of the park (approximately 460 acres) that can be surveyed on foot.
6. LENGTH OF TIME NEEDED: Two years.
7. WHAT WILL HAPPEN IF NOT UNDERTAKEN: Extent and nature of archeological resource base will continue to be unknown.
