Simmons Three-Piece Steel Bed

Head—Foot—Spring—Showing Three Units Dis-assembled

As will be seen by the illustration, the oval tubular spring frame, with Simmons twisted link fabric all in one, provides the third unit—a mattress bottom that is support, strong, and perfectly aligned, which, with the stress of weight, becomes an integral part of the bed. The elimination of the old-style side rails not only reduces freight costs, but simplifies your entire bed-selling problem as well.
