## Brief History of Company's War Record.

This Company was organized in the northern portion of Jefferson county, Ala., in the spring of 1861. Under orders from Gov. A. B. Moore it began its march from Mt. Pinson to Huntsville Ala., on the 12th of August of the same year. On being mustered into the Confederate service at Huntsville it became a part of the Nineteenth Alabama Regiment, commanded by Colonel (afterwards Lieutenant General) Joseph Wheeler. From this time on through the war the history of the Company became the history in part of this regiment. After remaining three months in camp of instruction at that place, the command was ordered to Dog river near Mobile; thence, after a short time, to the Navy Yard at Pensacola, Fla.; thence to Corinth, Miss., to join General Albin Sydney Johnson's army, then concentrating at that point preparatory to the great battle of Shiloh, on the 6th and 7th of April 1862. In this great battle the command received its first baptism of blood, and lost heavily in killed and wounded. Subsequently this it formed a part of Gen. Bragg's army which invaded Kentucky in the fall of 1862, and afterwards participated with it in the bloody battles of Murfreesboro, Chickamauga and Missionary Ridge. It did full service in the grand retreat of Gen. Joseph Johnston from Dalton to Atlanta. It fought in the battles around Atlanta; followed Gen. Hood into Tennessee, and took part in the battles of Franklin and Nashville, and subsequently in the last engagement of the war at Bentonville, N. C., in the spring of 1865.

In all the great battles of the Western Army, from and including Shiloh to the Surrender, as in scores upon scores of less important engagements, this command contributed its full quota of the killed and wounded. When at last, after four years of heroic struggle, of untold sacrifice and patient endurance under most trying conditions without a parallel in "all the tides of time," our armies yielded to the logic of vastly superior and overwhelming numbers, it, with decimated ranks and sorrowful hearts, returned to devastated homes and firesides to begin life anew under the no less humiliating and trying ordeal of Yankee reconstruction and Yankee misrule.

To-day, at the annual reunion of what is left of the old Company on the forty-third anniversary of its entrance into the
