P.W. Watson a Private of Capt. Jacksons Company "E" 45th Ala Regt. 26 years old, brown eyes, dark hair, fair complexion, five feel 11 inches high. Was born in Ala. by profession a farmer. Was enlisted the 20th day of March 1862 by W. J. Lee in Mason County, Ala. to Serve for three years or the war.

Said Soldier died at Murfreesboro, Tenn. The 18th day of Feb 1863 of wounds received in action at Murfreesboro, Tenn the 30th day of Dec 1862.

Said Soldier has received his Bounty. And was last paid by Capt. Scott to 31st day of October 1862

## Amts due by Government

To pay from the 31st of October 1862 to the 18th day of Feb. 1862. Three months and 18 days at \$11.00 per month. Amount \$39.60

Commutation from 20th of March 1862 to 8th of October, 1862. \$27.50

Commutation from 8th of October 1862 to 18th of Feb. 1863 \$48.46

## Camp near Knoxville Oct 28 1862

Dear moley it is with the gratist [sic] of pleasure that I seate [sic] myself to inform yo [sic] that I am well at this time hoping that these few lines may reach and find you and Willey injoying [sic] the same blesing [sic] of god I have nothing of mutch [sic] importante [sic] to rite [sic] to yo [sic] hit [sic] has bin [sic] some time since I heard from yo [sic] I hope that yo [sic] have bin [sic] well all the time since I hird [sic] from yo [sic] I recon [sic] yo [sic] think that I had forgottin [sic] yo [sic] but hit [sic] is misstake [sic] in yo [sic] if yo [sic] think that way I wod [sic] give all that I am wirth [sic] in the wirld [sic] to go home and stay with yo [sic] and Willey & mouter [sic] the remaines [sic] of my life. I recon [sic] yo [sic] know the reson [sic] that I have not ritin [sic] to yo [sic] be for I have bin [sic] on the march every since the 28 of August we travild [sic] about 1000 miles on half rashions [sic] that is mity [sic] hard for the soldar [sic] to live on We march throo [sic] tinnissee [sic] & kaintuckey [sic] we had too fights since we left Chatanooga [sic] I do not know

whar [sic] we will take up winter qarters [sic] at home or at Chatanooga [sic] I doo [sic] not know whar [sic] we will take up winters qarters [sic] at some [illegible] at Chatanooga [sic] hit [sic] is mity [sic] cold hir [sic] know hit [sic] snowd [sic] hir [sic] yisterday [sic] I want yo [sic] to sind [sic] me some socks by the first pasing [sic] mi pants are both far to the patch I patch for mi [sic] self tell moth [sic] to have me apar [sic] of good boots and sind [sic] thim [sic] by the first pasing [sic] and I will sind [sic] him the money as soon as I git [sic] hit [sic] I want some of thim [sic] to come to see me this winter if tha [sic] can get the chance I wood [sic] give iney [sic] thing for yo [sic] to come if hit [sic] war aplase [sic] fit for a lady to be at Moley I thought had sean [sic] somthing [sic] be for I left home had no seaniney [sic] thing I want yo [sic] to rite [sic] as soon as yo [sic] git [sic] this give mi [sic] respeck [sic] to all of the famley [sic] and save a portion for yorself [sic]

Dear wife it is with the gratist [sic] of Pleasure that I seate [sic] my self to inform yo [sic] that I am not well at this I have had the dyrear [sic] for tin [sic] days and the wirst [sic] cough yo [sic] ever saw in yor [sic] life I cough so that I cant sleep at night I don't think I can stand the camp life I am the porist [sic] thing yo [sic] ever saw in your life I recon [sic] I am some betar [sic] to day I am in hopes that I have takin [sic] a chang [sic] for the bettar [sic] if I dont git [sic] b [sic] I will try to come home and stay till I git [sic] beattar [sic] if dont come I will go to some horse pittal [sic] and stay till I git [sic] well or wirse [sic] one of the too [sic] I dont no [sic] witch [sic] I wood [sic] like to come home if I cood

[sic] you and mouther [sic] cood [sic] docktor [sic] me beattar [sic] than iney [sic] boday [sic] ilce [sic] in the wirld [sic] I think of yo [sic] and mouther [sic] are my hold studdy [sic] I think of Willey [sic] some too but not like I doo [sic] you and mou [sic] Id give iney [sic] ehing [sic] to seen yo [sic] and mouther [sic] rite [sic] know I wood [sic] like to sea the rest of the famley [sic] virery [sic] well I am glad to hir [sic] from the contry [sic] by iney [sic] sorce [sic] I am glad that you have [sic] had rain we have not had rain enough to run since we go hir [sic] the crops is sorery [sic] hir [sic] thar [sic] is nothing but corn in this part of the contry [sic] the land is por [sic] hir [sic] hit looks like rain to day I wood bea [sic] glad to see rain for the dust is so bad that the solgars [sic] cant see how to drill We li [sic] down in the dust at night the next morning blankits [sic] is hid in dust yo can gess [sic] how we sleap [sic] you know that dust is mity [sic] bad to iney [sic] unter [sic] with that is a grate [sic] miney [sic] deaths hir [sic] is this bridgaids [sic] we are in Ionesis bridarde [sic] mustard dirreishion [sic] all the ridgmints [sic] is from Lusania [sic] tha [sic] are all dutch and irish & frinch [sic] the maddist [sic] pople [sic] in the wirld [sic] I think tha [sic] can stand it no mo [sic] than we can tha [sic] have bin [sic] raisd [sic] hard not on [illegible] anuf [sic] to eate [sic] in thir [sic] lives the most of thim [sic] are from new orleanes [sic] tha [sic] livd [sic] on beaf [sic] all of thar [sic] lives I cant eate [sic] beaf [sic] we git [sic] one pond of bacon for the man for sevin [sic] days the rest of our rashions [sic] is beaf [sic] & syrup rice I wood [sic] like to have some vedgitations [sic] to eate [sic] now we cant git [sic] nothing to eate [sic] in that line I am in hopes that the war will ind [sic] soon if hit [sic] does ind [sic] I will come home as soon as I can git [sic] thar [sic] to saive [sic] my life thar [sic] is sixteen of our company is gon to the lorderdail [sic] springs and eighteen sick hir [sic] and nine dead and sevin [sic] home on furlos [sic] whitch [sic] leaves twenty eight to doo [sic] duty hit [sic] gives the boys down the contry [sic] thar [sic] is from tin [sic] to twelve on gard [sic] every night we have got the wirt [sic] lookin [sic] company yo [sic] ever saw I recon [sic] tha [sic] have some of thim [sic] got the bloose [sic] the wirst [sic] yo [sic] ever saw in yo [sic] lif [sic] I will close on the subjeck [sic] I will sind [sic] yo [sic] some money by John parrl whin [sic] he co home Moley don't yo [sic] recon [sic] that imely [sic] parrl will take afit [sic] win [sic] john gits [sic] to stay with hir [sic] I wirsht [sic] the chance that John has got to come homey [sic] Moley I will come as soon --- he will god knows the best hoo [sic] is the wirst [sic] off I will take cir [sic] of ma [sic] self the best I can I will rite [sic] to you every weake [sic] whin [sic] I can git [sic] paper hit [sic] is hard for us to git [sic] hir [sic] we cant git [sic] no post stamps vo [sic] mirst [sic] not think hard of one for paying the poorstidg [sic] on the letars [sic] I sind [sic] to I cant git [sic] no posstamps [sic] nevarmind [sic] I will make it rite [sic] for you moley dockter [sic] Swanson is dead & [illegible] Harper too tha [sic] died on the 7th of July died rite [sic] clos [sic] to us I wint [sic] to see harper burid I want yo [sic] to tell nath pranf and parrl to rite [sic] to me amediatiley [sic] tell thim [sic] not to git [sic] mad with me for not riting [sic] to thim [sic] I cant git [sic] no paper to rite [sic] on hardly to rite [sic] to yo [sic] as long as I can git [sic] a strip of paper and ink tell all of thim [sic] to rite [sic] to me I [illegible] to all of thim [sic] I haveant [sic] had the chance to rite [sic] to iney [sic] bodey [sic] elce [sic] but yo [sic] I mirst [sic] close for the presnt [sic] for hit [sic] is morst [sic] night rite [sic] soon as yo [sic] git [sic] this give my respeck [sic] to all of the famley [sic] and save agood [sic] portion of love for yor [sic] self and mother and kiss Willey for me hir [sic] is one from me to tell all of the famley [sic] to rite [sic] as soon as yo [sic] git [sic] this tell mouther [sic] god bles [sic] hir [sic] sweate [sic]

old time I doo [sic] love her kiss hir [sic] for me tell all the famley [sic] howdy for me so no more at present I remain your sinsir [sic] husband till death P. W. Watson to Mary A E Watson and the famley [sic]
