Martin Wolf, from Dubois county, belonging to Co. B. 42d regiment Indiana vols., was killed in the battle at Wartrace, Tenn. on April 11th, '62. (Here follows a description of the skirmish, which we omit as old, this letter having come to us from Wartrace, via the Dead Letter office at Washington City.) Mr. Wolf was in the hottest of the fight, and received two wounds before he gave up. The first ball struck upon the plate of his belt, driving through into the pit of his stomach, bringing him to the ground. He arose from the ground and again commenced fighting. He fought with unparalleled bravery, but was again struck by a ball, this time in the breast, and fell to rise no more. As soon as possible he was removed from the field, and everything possible done for him. But his time had come. God saw fit to call him from the battlefield, and Martin's spirit yielded, to wend its way heavenward. He died without a murmur. He was a good soldier, always ready for duty; bore the hardships of a soldier's life with patience, knowing he was in a just cause. He was brave, and died fighting hard for his country. Long will he be remembered by the officers and privates of Co. B. May his ashes rest in peace.
