




Study Area	8,222.69 acres The revised Study Area includes an expanded Core Area and routes used by U.S. forces to reach the Confederate line. Many of the routes proved muddy and difficult to traverse, slowing the Federals' progress and costing them the element of surprise.



Study Area	19,324.00 acres The Study Area includes the U.S. positions in Fauquier County from which attacks were made; the battle's three major combat areas at Brandy Station, Kelly's Ford, and Stevensburg; and road corridors used by both armies to meet threats and withdraw forces as conditions changed during the course of the battle.

Condition Statement	Despite large mixed-use developments on portions of the battlefield, many of the most significant landscapes and views within the battlefield remain in agricultural or open space uses. However, the rapid pace of land development in Prince William County signifies the need for immediate protection of the 3,000 intact acres not owned by the County.
