





EXPLORE THE LINCOLN HERITAGE TRAIL


The Lincoln Heritage Trail is made up of sites that were important in Abraham Lincoln's life. It covers three states – Kentucky, Indiana and Illinois.

- **4** Lincoln Home National Historic Site, Illinois











LEARN LINCOLN'S SPEECH


Hidden in this draft of the Gettysburg Address is the last line of the speech.
