Dear Mr. Carreja:

This letter is in response to your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request dated April 24, 2022, and received April 25, 2022, in which you requested "All documents, emails, videos, zoom videos, and other documents generated or dated between June 1, 2020, and April 22, 2022 and items pertaining to Forrest Fenn, jonathan "Jack" Stuef, Forrest Fenn's treasure, and the location at where the Forrest Fenn chest was found and from where it was retrieved." Your request has been assigned FOIA control number DOI-NPS-2022-003317.

It is the policy of the National Park Service (NPS) to: (1) make records of the NPS available to the public to the greatest extent possible in keeping with the spirit of the FOIA; (2) make documents requested under the FOIA available at the earliest possible date while, at the same time, protecting the rights of the individuals involved and the administrative processes surrounding such rights; and (3) withhold documents falling within one of the FOIA exemptions only if disclosure is prohibited by statute or Executive Order (EO). For your information, Congress excluded three discrete categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIA. See 5 U.S.C. § 552(c) (2006 & Supp. IV (2010). This response is limited to those records that are subject to the requirements of the FOIA. This is a standard notification that is given to all our requesters and should not be taken as an indication that excluded records do, or do not, exist.

Your request is being processed under the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act (5 United States Code 552); United States Department of the Interior ("Department") implementing regulations found at 43 Code of Federal Regulations Part 2, Subparts A through E, beginning at 2.1; and the Privacy Act of 1974 (5 United Stated Code 552a). Please be advised that additional FOIA and/or Privacy Act guidance/regulations may also be found at either the Department's web site, www.doi.gov/foia, or the United States Department of Justice web site, <u>www.usdoj.gov</u>.

Exemption 5

Exemption 5 allows an agency to withhold "inter-agency or intra-agency memorandums or letters which would not be available by law to a party... in litigation with the agency." 5 U.S.C.§552(b)(5). Exemption 5 therefore incorporates the privileges that protect materials from discovery in litigation, including the deliberative process, attorney work-product, attorney-client, and commercial information privileges. We are withholding 175 pages in part and 8 pages in full under Exemption 5 because they qualify to be withheld under the following privileges:

<u>Deliberative Process Privilege</u>. The deliberative process privilege protects the decision-making process of government agencies and encourages the frank exchange of ideas on legal or policy matters by ensuring agencies are not forced to operate in a fish bowl. A number of policy purposes have been attributed to the deliberative process privilege, such as: (1) assuring that subordinates will feel free to provide the decisionmaker with their uninhibited opinions and recommendations; (2) protecting against premature disclosure of proposed policies; and (3) protecting against confusing the issues and misleading the public.

The deliberative process privilege protects materials that are both predecisional and deliberative. The privilege covers records that reflect the give-and-take of the consultative process and may include recommendations, draft documents, proposals, suggestions, and other subjective documents which reflect the personal opinions of the writer rather than the policy of the agency.

The materials that have been withheld under the deliberative process privilege of Exemption 5 are both predecisional and deliberative. They do not contain or represent formal or informal agency policies or decisions. They are the result of frank and open discussions among employees of the Department of the Interior. Their contents have been held confidential by all parties and public dissemination of this information would have a chilling effect on the agency's deliberative processes; expose the agency's decision-making process in such a way as to discourage candid discussion within the agency, and thereby undermine its ability to perform its mandated functions.

The deliberative process privilege does not apply to records created 25 years or more before the date on which the records were requested.

<u>Attorney Work-Product Privilege.</u> As incorporated into Exemption 5, the attorney work-product privilege protects from disclosure any materials prepared by or for a party or its representative (including their attorney, consultant, surety, indemnitor, insurer, or agent) in anticipation of litigation or for trial. The privilege applies once specific claims have been identified that make litigation probable; the actual beginning of litigation is not required. Its purpose is to protect the

adversarial trial process by insulating litigation preparation from scrutiny, as it is believed that the integrity of our system would suffer if adversaries were entitled to probe each other's thoughts and plans concerning the case. The privilege extends to administrative, as well as judicial proceedings. Once the determination is made that records are protected from disclosure by the attorney work-product privilege, the entire contents of those records are exempt from disclosure under FOIA.

The materials that have been withheld under Exemption 5 under the attorney work-product privilege were prepared by or for a Departmental attorney or Department of Justice attorney in reasonable anticipation of litigation and they reflect the parties' pre-litigation thoughts and evaluation of the issues at hand. Thus, we conclude that the withheld materials are protected in full from disclosure by the attorney work-product privilege of Exemption 5.

<u>Attorney-Client Privilege.</u> The attorney-client privilege protects confidential communications between an attorney and his client relating to a legal matter for which the client has sought professional advice and is not limited to the context of litigation. Moreover, although it fundamentally applies to confidential facts divulged by a client to his/her attorney, this privilege also encompasses any opinions given by an attorney to his/her client based upon, and thus reflecting, those facts, as well as communications between attorneys that reflect confidential client-supplied information.

The information that has been withheld under the attorney-client privilege of Exemption 5 constitutes confidential communications between agency attorneys and agency clients, Federal agency attorneys and agency and Federal attorneys, related to legal matters for which the client sought professional legal assistance and services. It also encompasses opinions given by attorneys to their clients based on client-supplied facts. Additionally, the National Park Service employees who communicated with the attorneys regarding this information were clients of the attorneys at the time the information was generated and the attorneys were acting in their capacities as lawyers at the time they communicated legal advice. Finally, the National Park Service has held this information confidential and has not waived the attorney-client privilege.

<u>Commercial Information Privilege.</u> When the government enters the marketplace as an ordinary commercial buyer or seller, the government's information is protected under the commercial information privilege if it is sensitive information not otherwise available, and disclosure would significantly harm the government's monetary functions or commercial interests. In this instance, the information being withheld are conference line numbers and passcodes paid for and used on a recurring basis by the government.

Exemption 6

Pursuant to the Privacy Act of 1974 (P.L. 93-579), certain items of personal information will have been redacted. Even though this personal information may be available to you through other sources, we are prohibited from providing it to you as a matter of United States Law. Exemption 6 allows an agency to withhold "personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy." 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(6). We are withholding 41 pages in part under Exemption 6.

The phrase "similar files" covers any agency records containing information about a particular individual that can be identified as applying to that individual. To determine whether releasing records containing information about a particular individual would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy, we are required to balance the privacy interest that would be affected by disclosure against any public interest in the information.

Under the FOIA, the only relevant public interest to consider under the exemption is the extent to which the information sought would shed light on an agency's performance of its statutory duties or otherwise let citizens 'know what their government is up to." The burden is on the requester to establish that disclosure would serve the public interest. When the privacy interest at stake and the public interest in disclosure have been determined, the two competing interests must be weighed against one another to determine which is the greater result of disclosure: the harm to personal privacy or the benefit to the public. The purposes for which the request for information is made do not impact this balancing test, as a release of information requested under the FOIA constitutes a release to the general public.

The information that has been withheld under Exemption 6 consists of personal information consisting of the names of individuals, home addresses, and/or other personally identifiable information, and we have determined that the individuals to whom this information pertains have a substantial privacy interest in withholding it. Additionally, you have not provided information that explains a relevant public interest under the FOIA in the disclosure of this personal information, and we have determined that the disclosure of this information would shed little or no light on the performance of the agency's statutory duties. Because the harm to personal privacy is greater than whatever public interest may be served by disclosure, release of the information would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of the privacy of these individuals and we are withholding it under Exemption 6.

We reasonably foresee that disclosure would harm an interest protected by one or more of the nine exemptions to the FOIA's general rule of disclosure.

The National Park Service consulted with Steven M.K. Hoffman, Attorney, Office of the Solicitor, Rocky Mountain Region, United States Department of the Interior, Lakewood, Colorado, in connection with this FOIA response.

You may appeal this response to the Department's FOIA/Privacy Act Appeals Officer. If you choose to appeal, the FOIA/Privacy Act Appeals Officer must receive your FOIA appeal **no**

later than 90 workdays from the date of this letter. Appeals arriving or delivered after 5:00 p.m. Eastern Time, Monday through Friday, will be deemed received on the next workday.

Your appeal must be made in writing. You may submit your appeal and accompanying materials to the FOIA/Privacy Act Appeals Officer by mail, courier service, fax, or email. All communications concerning your appeal should be clearly marked with the words: "FREEDOM OF INFORMATION APPEAL." You must include an explanation of why you believe the National Park Service's response is in error. You must also include with your appeal copies of all correspondence between you and Yellowstone National Park concerning your FOIA request, including your original FOIA request and the Bureau's response. Failure to include with your appeal all correspondence between you and the Bureau will result in the Department's rejection of your appeal, unless the FOIA/Privacy Act Appeals Officer determines (in the FOIA/Privacy Act Appeals Officer's sole discretion) that good cause exists to accept the defective appeal. Please include your name and daytime telephone number (or the name and telephone number of an appropriate contact), email address and fax number (if available) in case the FOIA/Privacy Act Appeals Officer needs additional information or clarification of your appeal.

Hello Kelsey,

I just noticed your response, as I was looking back through my old emails.. I appreciate your help, and that of your staff. It is unfortunate, that I have not heard from the archeologist Beth Horton, and do not feel I (or the information I presented) has been taken seriously. What I turned in, and shared information about, would have likely put an end to that treasure hunt and searchers breaking the law to find it. As it currently stands, no viable solution has been presented and many think the treasure or part of it are still out there, so the searches will likely continue. I have no doubt, what hundreds of thousands were looking for was, or is, inside the hunk of concrete I turned in.. It appeared to be a native grindstone when turned over, had a bird's head indented along one edge and cupped out two omega shapes on the grey side, as I found it. It was exactly were the clues lead when starting at the Rosevelt Arch. If someone on your staff would have given me at least a little bit of consideration and been open to the possibility that it might have been correct. Maybe, just to have run a metal detector over it, or cracked it open.. this story and it's silliness might have been put to bed already. The title to what everyone thought they were looking for is/was inside that stone.

I plead guilty for removing a 1934 milk bottle, something that was less than 100 years old and as I read the law, likely as punishable as picking up a soda can from the edge of the road from a few days ago. Anyway, the real reason I am sending this email is to let this all go. Though it saddens me as people have died looking for that stone including a minister. Now, recently, I have become a widower left with a wonderful little boy (b)6 . I will tell him someday that his mother found that milk bottle that lead me to what hundreds of thousands had been looking for and in the end... the law had no room for imagination and justice to occupy the same air we breath. So I will let this go, if you all know better, then so be it. I leave you with a saying of the Tuscarora people, some of my people- "Man has responsibility not power."




I noticed when carrying it to my car and to your good rangers, it is unusually heavy. In light of recent events (the named finder of the bronze chest confirmed by the Fenn family and coming forward) it has been noted by many that something is definitely missing..

Many of the jewels originally pictured, a gold frog or two, necklaces etc. Also the 'finder', Jack doesn't seem to really know how the poem was solved and the pictures of him and Forrest with the contents of the 'chest' appear to be heavy photo-shopped etc.

Anyway, Forrest Fenn was known for casting in bronze and other mediums. He also had a story about growing lichen on rock, many stories about hidden compartments, and even one about x-raying a mummified falcon from Egypt he had bought.

Sometime in or around 1979, New York editor Byron Preiss submitted a written request to officials at Yellowstone and/or the National Park Service, asking permission to bury a plexiglass box near the Roosevelt Arch. Surprisingly, his request was granted. He then proceeded to publish a book titled, "The Secret: A Treasure Hunt," and invited readers to find it.

Before the book's release in 1982, Preiss traveled across North America and buried a total of twelve boxes, each containing a plaster "casque" and key. Thousands of hunters have searched for them. To date, three have been found: Chicago, 1983; Cleveland, 2004; and Boston, 2019. A fourth might have been identified in Tampa Bay last month. As more casques are recovered, patterns emerge. It's only a matter of time before searchers less courteous than myself uncover Preiss's secret, and start digging. The thought makes my stomach turn.

If the correspondence still exists, its most likely time frame is 1979-81. Letters would almost surely mention the Roosevelt Arch and/or Gardiner, Montana. The book gives us a Verse with lines that not-so-cryptically say, "White stone closest... At twelve paces... From the west side." Archived documents might provide more specific directions.


In addition to the north entrance to Yellowstone, my research and analysis have led me to suspect two additional casques on NPS property:

Columbia Island (GWMemPrkwy/SWashBlvd.) Fort Baker (Moore Rd. Pier) Washington, DC Sausalito, CA


The jewels associated with these three "treasures" - Opal, Garnet, and Pearl - are likely worth more than \$5,000. What a wonderful gift that would be for our National Parks! It's my sincerest hope that NPS staff and/or volunteers will remove boxes within park boundaries at their earliest convenience, and (most importantly) publicly announce the discoveries to prevent possible disrespect or disturbance in the future. I'll gladly help facilitate the key-for-jewel exchange(s).

It would be wonderful if all three "historic discoveries" could be incorporated into NPS exhibits, to allow other Secret searchers the opportunity to view the plaster casques and jewels, and to inspire curiosity and determination in future generations. If, however, *you* don't want 'em, I'm happy to take 'em off your hands.

Byron Preiss was a generous, good-spirited family man who intended no disrespect when he buried his treasures. Through his whimsical puzzles, he wanted us to learn, experience, and celebrate the story of America. In an effort to advance that story, I'm submitting this letter with the utmost respect for your time and consideration, and I thank you for both.

If you can see that.. many believe that the hunt for Fenn's treasure is not over, and for good reason. Jack often contradicts himself and statements by Fenn, no solution has been presented, because Jack says people will destroy the area, and the pictures that have been published appear to be photoshopped and manipulated. I would find it really hard to believe that a multi-million-dollar treasure hunt involving thousands of people would have a solution, that in the end, would be kept secret of how it was to be solved and leave thousands without an answer. At the same time, I believe I know why that is the current situation, who has the answers and how it can be proven and ended.

I am very serious, and you all are likely very skeptical in what I am about to declare, and for good reason. Hundreds have claimed to have solved the poem some have even sued the Fenn estate in an attempt to back up their claims. What makes my solve and evidence different? Proof, items (a milk bottle, and a stone), where they were found, and the way hundreds of things line up, especially with the treasure poem, and thousands of visual clues, as pictures in his books and tree seedlings that were used to make a huge work of art, only visible from above. Well, most of them anyway. The rock I turned in is key and. is a fake, of sorts.

The Poem, needed to solve the hunt:

As I have gone alone in there And with my treasures bold, I can keep my secret where, And bint of riches new and old.

Begin it where warm waters halt 12 And take it in the canyon down, Not far, but too far to walk. Put in below the home of Brown.

From there it's no place for the meek, The end is ever drawing nigh; There'll be no paddle up your creek, Fust heavy loads and water bigb.

If you've been wise and found the blaze, Look quickly down, your quest to cease, But tarry scant with marvel gaze, Fust take the chest and go in peace.

So why is it that I must go And leave my trove for all to seek? The answer I already know, I've done it tired, and now I'm weak.

So bear me all and listen good, Your effort will be worth the cold. If you are brave and in the wood I give you title to the gold.

When Fenn first said the treasure had been found, I was as surprised as anyone else, and thought maybe I'd given out too much information online. Though I often encouraged others to help me end it and share in the experience, because I knew by looking at other people's solves and even my original one, that I was the one with a heck of a lot more lining up than anyone else. Fenn reinforced this with his scrapbooks and such released online. One good example was when the first picture was released by Fenn of the treasure after it had been found. There was a stick laying in the box, likely a willow branch. It was positioned so the big end lined up just-so with a couple of coins, so that the big end of the stick looks like a snake's head. Fenn was avare that I carry an old walking stick with a snake carved around it, because I had sent him pictures of that walking stick. It has been handed down in my family for at least 200 years and comes from the Tuscarora side of my family. Fenn was really into native artifacts so I thought he'd like to see it, I sent him pictures of it a couple of years ago.. (when asked about the stick in the box, Jack said it might have blown in there and didn't mean anything!?)

Anyway, there was also a rusty key in the top of the box. This is a symbol of not living up to one's potential, but also it is related to a rusty looking (on one side), key-stone. As there is one where you are supposed to start at the Roosevelt Arch (half grey, half golden to rusty-brown) and where you end, the stone I turned in around the middle of August last year:

Why do I believe this is a fake? It is unusually shaped, believe most would agree with that fact. It was sitting exactly where I thought the 'chest' would be, but not exactly what I expected.. The grey side with the two eye-socket looking indentions was facing me at about chest height. It blended in with all the grey basalt except for those sockets covered in lichen. Now, anyone familiar with Fenn's book and poem would know that two omega shapes (like these) are important. They were at the very end of more than just his book "The Thrill of The Chase", but the end of a few of his books related to it also. When asked about them, he would dance around, or avoid, the question of the significance they had, so many knew they were likely big hints. When Jack was asked about them, he said they weren't important or didn't know what they might mean. In Fenn's poem they are represented especially in the line "The end is ever drawing nigh;" Note the semi-colon, at the end of that line or what you are to find at the end of the hunt. Not only does it look like a lady's 'chest' and a pair of omegas, but it also looks like a butt imprint or even a pair of eyes, or even mouse or bear's ears.

So, one way of looking at it, you're getting flashed, or mooned. The jokes continued as I tilted it forward and was not only astonished by the colors on the backside, but also the carving of a bird's head at one corner. I flipped it, and there was a bird! ... I was flipped the bird, on top of being mooned. What kind of jokester would do such a thing? I can think of one that fit the bill. It should also be noted Fenn had a short article about the different types of lichen, and trying to grow them.

At first, I did think this might be some type of Native-American grind-stone. The pigments are a brown to dark bronze and ground smooth in one cupped out large area on the back of it. Then a golden yellowish fading to white along the edges and near the bird's head. But the golden areas still look and feel rough, as if only lightly ground into. One area where the stone was chipped somehow more recently, shows the it to be a light conglomerate of sediment underneath. When I saw the bird's head, I eventually thought back to Fenn's writings about excavating near his home in Santa Fe, at the San Lazaro Pueblo. He had mentioned, almost all the pottery they had found had bird depictions on them. That would be a hell of a coincidence.. Then there's the lines in the poem "If you've been wise and found the blaze, look quickly down your quest to cease," ...'wise' hints at an owl (or bird), and looking quickly down, hints at something that looks from above (like a bird), and 'down' hints at feathers. "To cease" ...at the end.

This is further backed up in many instances throughout the poem, and especially in the lines "But tarry scant with marvel gaze, just take the chest and go in peace." Of course, the rock has a bit of a tarry look to the grey side with the lichen or the area in the back that looks like a possible pour-hole. Consider this, where are many fossils found, in tar pits. What are many 'chess pieces' made of? Stone. What is the bird of peace? a dove. Why are we to go in peace? (probably because the treasure is in the egg) and what does all that have to do with the last picture in "The Thrill of The Chase":




Last picture in Fenn's book "The Thrill of The Chase"

Why is there a dove nesting on the moon besides what I've mentioned? What is on the moon, but big grey craters (just like the stone). The dove is likely nesting on an egg (like an Easter egg, with a surprise inside). The fella is holding an axe (x marks the spot) and another hint at a grind-stone (used to sharpen an axe). There's a field of stumps, which is symbolic of the big forest fire that came through in 1988 and the opposite of the aerial clues that consist of tree seeds that were planted (or moved). How can I be sure of the aerial clues? because of the amount of them, and depictions that relate to Fenn's stories, Yellowstone history, and the end stone. After a few that are just too perfect (perfect circles, triangles and figures that relate), eventually 'coincidence' becomes not so likely at all. Here are examples, and the coordinates using Google maps (best viewed with the scale at the bottom at 200ft):

None of those aerial clues are actually needed to find the end spot, though they eventually lead to the same spot. They are a bit of a distraction, because the large easy to see ones draw your attention right on past the ending omega shaped area, and more towards the bend in the river that looks like a dove (made of the river), and the crescent moon shape in the river's southeast bank of that turn to the north. It is just like a visual magic trick, draw your eye to a distraction, to hide the trick. Eventually your eye is drawn to the harder to see images that are more camouflaged type of dot-art, leading you back towards the parking lot. Then I knew that I had reached the end where 4 images overlap, right over the horseshoe or omega shaped drain or rock field. They all hint at something covered and hidden within.



Lamb, Eric Sloan holding a large cowbell with cartoon character 'Ding-a-ling' on it, a native wearing a mask sitting in a bull-boat or half an egg, and Felix the cat cartoon. Overlapping at the end spot (but not needed to solve, as it is the 2nd omega or dead end in the area). The stone reflects the landscape as it, (like the landscape) has 2 omegas or notches cupped out of it).

How can I be sure something is within that stone I handed over for safe keeping? Well, first off, when my ex and I found the 1934 Liberty Glass milk bottle in the middle land peninsula of a horseshoe (or omega) shaped pond or natural cistern near Artist's Point, (going mostly off of logic and the poem). I had sent Fenn and email asking if it was his. He quickly responded with "Not my milk bottle!" Then when I asked if it had ever been his milk bottle?, he wouldn't respond.. But soon after he wore a hat that he said he would never wear again, a hat he named "Mildew". That was significant because his previous picture of it shows him standing in front of a pond, with the hat hovering in the air above his head, a concrete looking U-shaped board in front of him and a bear with his head poking out of the water behind him.. just like on the map. The name "Mildew" has hints of "mill", "mild" and "ewe" (like a sheep). Mills are known for grindstones, mild hints at something that might look like cheese, or a mild ewe or sheep. Also looking at the word backwards we see "wed" as in marriage, and lim or limb. Often associated with arbor shapes (like the Roosevelt Arch, and the end spot etc). Another relation to weddings is the stone itself and Fenn had a story about a 'canary' 'diamond', a very large yellow stone his friend Eric Sloane bought for his 3rd wife.

What else hints at the stone being cast and poured like some kind of concrete, and a treasure within? Fenn often spoke of casting many things in bronze as he got into the art business, then especially just for himself, bells and pickle jars. When you pickle something, you are preserving it in a brine (like the treasure in concrete). He also had an Egyptian falcon (another bird) that had been mummified and he had it x-rayed to see what was inside. He would also tell people in the spring to "wait until the mud dries" before venturing out to look. "Mud" muhints at a mew or sheep, but is more importantly a slang for "concrete". Fenn mentioned Moses (from the bible) several times, and the line "Hear me all and listen well" hints at a "list of ten" and Moses on the mountain.. were there not some of those stone tablets broken? Believe we know the answer to that..



Fenn, with the hat he said he'd never wear again, named "Mildew". Note the concrete slab and bear head in the background.



Just some of the forest, or dot-art, visible from Google Maps over about one square mile. Notice two of the largest images, the profile of a man (with the top of his skull open), and the large hat (with a hole in it) across the river. Most of this was made possible due to the fire in 1988. Lodgepole pines are fire-dependent, only releasing their seeds during a fire. Then, as noted by one of the Rangers, you don't need to plant the seeds in the ground for them to root. Just place them on the ash rich soil and nature does the rest.

Stones and wood are known to have knots in them. Now consider the last two lines of the poem "If you are brave and in the wood, I give you title to the gold." Brave, makes sense because it looks like a native artifact, and you need to crack it open (it is furthermore a fake, because the arch is too perfect in one of the sockets that are hollowed out, the bird's head is too perfect, and the stone is heavier than it should be). "In the wood" works because a bull's-eye are known to be of wood on dart boards, relating back to eye-sockets, and the stone also looks like a chunk of wood you would use with a couple of sockets hollowed out to start a fire (or blaze) the old way, with a bow and stick. Then consider what you see on say a wooden table, in the wood you see grain (another relation to a mill stone) and you see knots.. He said he originally named the treasure Tarzan, a reference to something being stuck in tar especially at the end, or Tar-za-n. Then he renamed it "Indulgence' now consider confections, and look at that word backwards and you may notice something sticky in the middle. So it's likely no coincidence one of the chapters in his book is titled "Me in the middle".

Fenn often said no one would "stumble upon it", for one likely reason it was well camouflaged and looked different than what everyone thought they were looking for (a stone 'chest' looking like a bra on one side and having a bronze color in one area). "S-tumble" is a good abbreviation for a stone-tumbler, what is used to smooth or grind gemstones.. Also, it was hidden in plain sight. Logically, if he had hidden the other bronze chest anywhere without burying it, there would always be the possibility that someone not looking for it, could accidently find it. Fenn also spoke of 'grinding marbles' in his pocket as a kid, a great description of the end area is a pocket in the side of the river's edge ledge. Mar-bles also looks like a hint at 'March billys' or Billy goats.. (another good description of Sheep Eater Cliff).



Stone shortly after discovered and flipped over. Note how it sticks out in color compared to the basalt. When the basalt is "knapped" or sheered it is a dark grey color, not golden or light tan.

Now just consider this, we are in "Yellowstone", the word itself hints at what I found when looking at the backside of it, but that's not nearly all. It also spells out Yell-ow-stone, now that more than hints at breaking a rock open. Now consider the word backwards "e-nots-wolley", if you use the 'n' twice it works even better "In wooly knots". Great description of the end area (Sheep Eater Cliffs) and explains how something 'in the wood' could actually be in 'stone', as the word stone, contains 'nots' too.

I could undoubtedly keep going with a mountain of evidence that leads to that spot and that 'fake' artifact, or rock. (Fenn was known for selling fakes, even advertised that they were fakes). The main point of trying to convince everyone, or anyone, that hunk of concrete contains the actual treasure, is to bring the madness to a close. Ironically, the folks who would probably have the most reason to see it over (the park services and officials), also have the item to do so like a trojan horse..

I wasn't sure when I turned it in, if there is for sure the Fenn treasure inside it. I really thought it was more of a "Golden Ticket" and Fenn

would eventually claim it. Now as time has gone by, it is quite clear that is what everyone was actually looking for and I found it, legally it should be mine as I was given 'title' to it by solving the clues and it should be considered abandoned property by Fenn with me as the finder, and yes, I would like it back. When I turned it in, I declared it as such and handed it over to the authorities to check it out. Is it my fault I was not taken seriously, or maybe even taken advantage of for being so honest? Possibly, but I made an honest attempt and still hold on to a thread of faith. Hopefully, those now responsible for it and the well-being of the park's resources, fellow workers, and guests within it, will consider what could be a good honest way to end this crazy hunt without more property damage (like the fellow digging in the cemetery, who may have also dug near where I found the stone) or more urgently people risking and sometimes dying looking for the treasure I turned in to park officials.




Photo from when the stone was turned in, and my antique walking stick with the snake carved in it.

I am pleading with whoever has it now (I believe the Rangers do from what I've been told recently) to please crack it open! You will likely find I am telling the truth, and should be, in all fairness, declared the owner. Or, ship it to me (I'll give you my UPS customer code to ship it at no-charge). I believe I am the 'solver' and rightful owner, as sure as I dropped it off with the Rangers, need more concrete proof? It is held inside it. Or, please have it x-rayed (I will pay for a company called GPRS to come scan it). There isn't much to lose, unless no action is taken at all. If things continue as they are, more people will likely be digging in the parks and some may even die trying to find real answers that have yet to been given, and the Yellowstone officials are actually in control of, though they may not believe it, or possibly... it has already been discovered what is inside and whisked away? Honestly, I'm starting to wonder, as the charge for moving it was dropped by court, as well as all court fees, and the judge didn't seem to want to talk about the rock. When I spoke with the archeologist, she believes the Ranger's still have it. When I spoke with the Chief Ranger last week, she said I was wasting my time and there was no way they would have it x-rayed. I just want it to be over and for the safest and most positive outcome, no hard feelings.

Many these days are losing faith in our government, officials, officers and truth. I believe this would be a step in the right direction

for restoring some faith, if taken seriously, and likely a great story. As I've only mentioned a smidgeon of the whole story in this letter. I also pledge, if it contains what I whole-heartedly believe it does, I will donate most of a possible sale to help the Shoshone tribe out west, and a couple of tribes related to me and where I live. For now, I will keep sending facts, until someone acts, hopefully in the right direction. I do appreciate the services and sacrifices of the park officials, please listen, lives can be saved.

I noticed when carrying it to my car and to your good rangers, it is unusually heavy.

In light of recent events (the named finder of the bronze chest confirmed by the Fenn family and coming forward) it has been noted by many that something is definitely missing..

Many of the jewels originally pictured, a gold frog or two, necklaces etc. Also the 'finder', Jack doesn't seem to really know how the poem was solved and the pictures of him and Forrest with the contents of the 'chest' appear to be heavy photo-shopped etc.

Anyway, Forrest Fenn was known for casting in bronze and other mediums. He also had a story about growing lichen on rock, many stories about hidden compartments, and even one about x-raying a mummified falcon from Egypt he had bought.



(b)6 questions were in regards to the "Forrest Fenn treasure" and how it relates to the National Park Service's policies regarding lost/found or abandoned property, specifically what happens to recovered items, such as if the "treasure" had been found by a visitor and turned in to the Park would it be returned to the finder if not claimed by the owner within a certain amount of time. I informed him that we had different processes for lost/found and abandoned property and while I didn't know the specifics of those processes or how they would relate to the "treasure", someone who did would contact him.

He also detailed what a nice time he had hiking the Glen Creek Trail in Yellowstone.

I informed him that I had written down his questions and someone from Yellowstone would contact him with more detailed answers.



We chatted about the Forest Fenn treasure on a couple of fronts:

- 1. He was in agreement that the Yellowstone was handling the treasure properly as abandoned instead of lost and found item.
- 2. He thought the timing of the park opening on a Monday and the announcement of the treasure being found later that week was interesting. I suggested that the announcement had more to do with deflecting attention away from Fenn due to the recent civil law suits filed. I reiterated the the opening of the park was delayed soley due to the pandemic.
- 3. He is convinced that if the treasure were in Yellowstone it had been placed in the park near Electric Peak. He admitted that the he was only 50% confident that the treasure even existed.
- 4. He also thought there was no way for someone from the East Coast to have found the treasure and keep it quiet. Pieces of the treasure will eventually appear on the market.
- 5. He will be finishing his indepth analysis soon and will send a copy of it to the park for review.

Pleasant conversation and was appreciative that someone had called him back.

Concessions Contract Management:

The BCS team conducted its first periodic evaluation yesterday, May 11th 2022!! The BCS team will conduct over 200 periodic evaluations over the course of the operating season. As was initiated last year, NPS District Leadership Team (DLT) members will be invited to participate in the reviews in their respective districts. We understand it's often difficult to free up time but welcome the input and involvement of the DLTs when possible.

Parkwide Roofing Projects – OF Inn Plumbing Shop, Lake Lodge Housekeeping and Location Manager house, Fishing Bridge recycling Building, Canyon Wapiti and Bison Dormitories are scheduled for new roofs or overlays this summer season.

Canyon Dormitories – Installation of new water and heating lines has been completed to the Bison, Wapiti, Grizzly and Big Horn Dormitories. Area is muddy and some elevated plywood walkways are being installed to facilitate travel to the buildings.

Great American Outdoors Act (GAOA) Legacy Restoration Fund (LRF) Utility Projects

These FY22 projects include work on: Grant and Canyon wastewater collection and treatment systems; the Mammoth wastewater collection system; and the Old Faithful Water Treatment Plant. Additionally, an FY23 project including work on the Old Faithful Wastewater Treatment Plant and collection system is in the early stages of planning.

Jacobs Engineering recently submitted schematic design drafts for the Grant, Canyon, Mammoth, and Old Faithful water projects. These drafts have been distributed to park staff for review. Comments are due to the Denver Service Center by Friday, May 20th.

Field work to provide background information for these projects has resumed. Jacobs Engineering, ProPipe, Shannon & Wilson, Collier Geophysics, and Vine Laboratories will all be onsite conducting field work throughout the summer. The work schedule will evolve based on snow conditions, but a regularly updated schedule is available on the Facilities SharePoint site:



Employee Observations

• As various commercial services have reopened in Mammoth, the Albright VC staff have been going around and introducing themselves. Each business expressed appreciation for our presence and said that visitors enjoy seeing the rangers.

• Visitors are often calling or talking to us directly about campground cancellations and their interest in snagging a campsite via this "random luck" method. We have been telling them that to inquire about cancellations they need to go to the campground in person. This will be the only way unclaimed spots will be filled.

Events/Incidents

• Two days in a row visitors encountered a grizzly on the Beaver Ponds Trail. It never acted aggressively, so extra signage about bears was posted but the trail remains open.

Tower/Lamar

Visitor Comments

- Three visitors had questions about the opening of the Slough Creek Campground Road which opened this week.
- Various visitors commented on how happy they were to see wolves. They had thought that they wouldn't have any luck viewing them.

Employee Observations

• Many visitors are getting their information from non-NPS sites such as "Yellowstone Up Close and Personal" and "Wolf Tracker." Rangers talk to people every day who know what wildlife has been seen the day before and where it was seen. Information travels quickly by social media and by word of mouth.

• This has been the Week of the Raptor. Rebecca saw golden eagles and bald eagles all week and many ospreys, hawks and kestrels. Sandhill Cranes are also still visible.

• Wolf watchers reported five black pups and one grey outside the Natal Den. One pup was reported on the other side at the Crystal Creek den but the report was not verified.

• Junction Butte wolves were visible from Slough Creek and from the south side of the road each day.

• Grizzlies are out and about in the Lamar Valley. On Saturday visitors were seeing six grizzlies. Most were seen from a distance. Sunday, a grizzly dug and grazed his way to the road then darted across suddenly. A small grizzly made an appearance two days in a row near Phantom Lake. Black bears were also causing jams. On Saturday there was a sow with cubs and two other single black bears out in addition to the bear at Phantom Lake.

Events/Incidents

• Monday there was a carcass removal, a missing person, and two bear jams happening at the same time near Tower Junction.

Canyon

Employee Observations

• A beautiful week of warmer temperatures is opening the Canyon overlooks quickly. North Rim Dr., Brink of the Upper Falls and South Rim Drives are all open to visit. The trails are:

• North Rim Trail: Slush and Mud Covered but passable to Grandview. Deeper snow is found between Grandview and Inspiration Point.

• Brink of the Upper Falls: The upper deck is packed snow, the stairs have a bare path through the snow. Morning ice may be an issue.

• South Rim Trail: Deep snow between Artist Point and Upper Falls Viewpoint, packed snow/slush from Upper Falls Viewpoint to Discovery Point.

• Other areas have varying degrees of snow cover.

Brink of the Lower Falls and Red Rock Canyon continue to be closed.

• The road from South Rim Drive south and east through the east entrance opened May 6.

- The General Store also opened May 6.
- Visitors are continuing to get close to animals. Several times in the last few weeks we have visitors reporting people getting too close to wildlife. (The information has been passed to law enforcement and bear management.)

Visitor Comments

• Visitors are consistently surprised to hear that most Old Faithful trails are part of a seasonal bear management closure.

Employee Observations

- The bear closure signs that visitors are consistently not noticing start with the word WARNING and not the word CLOSED.
- Flags flown on top of the Inn this week included the Crow Nation and Norther Arapahoe flags. Both nations had artists represented at the festivities in the Inn lobby. Bell staff indicate their intent is to try to fly the flags of all of the associated tribes over the course of the season and to coordinate the flags on the Inn with who is temporarily in residence at the Tribal Heritage Center.

Events/Incidents

• A drone was reported (and footage was provided) following and agitating a grizzly bear near the Mary Mtn TH. LE was called.

• Visitors reported seeing and being "stalked by" a mountain lion on the closed Mystic Falls Trail. Signage at the TH was dramatically increased after this report.

Digital Program

• Based on conversations with digital media staff, as well as visitor services staff, we are leaning towards removing the campground availability table we have maintained through Yellowstone Live for the last several years. The table is currently displayed on the park's website, as well as on monitors located at each visitor center, and a kiosk at Albright.

Now that there are no campgrounds operating on a first-come, first-served basis during the season, the need to update visitors about campsite availability has shifted to the rec.gov and Yellowstone Park Lodges websites, where reservations are made. Since campgrounds are filling up months in advance, maintaining daily information on Yellowstone Live seems unnecessary for the very small number of people who would be fortunate enough to get a campsite that suddenly becomes available. We also run the risk of providing inaccurate information to visitors, since there is an unavoidable delay in updating the availability table, from the time campground staff notifies the Comm Center to when it is input into the Yellowstone Live system. By removing the table from the website and visitor center monitors, we are hoping to avoid visitors coming to the park confused about whether or not they need campground reservations. This will have no effect on the current Live Roads system.

• Four students have been selected to participate in a program through Montana State University's School of Film and Photography, in partnership with Yellowstone National Park. We will be working with them over the summer as they produce, write, film, and edit their short films about different topics in the park, and will give them guidance through the permitting process. They will get school credits for their work, and will be submitting final films in December, to be featured on the park website. The students are excited about this special opportunity, and will learn a lot about filming in a national park. The NPS benefits when future filmmakers understand how to support NPS permitting programs and preservation of park resources.

Training

• Resource Education Training for commercial and partner guides took place virtually this spring. Two dates were offered to a total of over 400 participants. Topics included Yellowstone's 150th Anniversary; Ecology and Management of Yellowstone's fisheries, bears, wolves, and bison; History; Wildlife James and Emergencies; Fire Management and climate change; and Geology with the Yellowstone Volcano Observatory.

Looking Ahead: Upcoming Events in April, May

May 14: World Migratory Bird Day

World Migratory Bird Day (WMBD) is a conservation initiative that brings awareness on conserving migratory birds and their habitats throughout the Western Hemisphere. It has been an effective tool for raising global awareness of the threats faced by migratory birds, their ecological importance, and the need for international cooperation to conserve them. This year, the theme for WMBD is Light Pollution. Artificial light at night is known to adversely affect many species including migratory birds. Each year billions of wild birds migrate at night and light pollution is a significant threat causing disorientation, collisions with buildings, perturbing their internal clocks, and interfering with their ability to undertake long-distance migrations. This year, World Migratory Bird Day is officially celebrated on May 14th as migratory birds journey to nesting sites and October 8th as they return to wintering areas. However, because birds do not all migrate at the same time, WMBD programs and events are hosted nearly every month of the year.

Visitor centers in YNP that will be open on May 14 include Albright VC, Canyon VEC, and Old Faithful VEC, as well as the West Yellowstone Visitor Information Center. We will distribute information about Yellowstone's birds and point visitors to nearby areas known for their rich and diverse bird habitats, e.g., Rock Rocks Lakes National Wildlife Refuge in the Centennial Valley of Montana.

May 14-25: Canyon VEC – Installation of new exhibits in the second floor exhibit hall The VEC will be closed during installation. Visitor information will be provided from a location directly in front of the building.

May 15 – June 2: Fishing Bridge VC – Completion of restoration work in the building; installation of new exhibits in the main exhibit hall and West Wing; completion of Yellowstone Forever bookstore renovation. Grand Re-opening tentatively on June 10.

May 15 - 27: REYP Academy - Ranger Training

June: Reopening of Fishing Bridge Museum/Visitor Center; celebration of new exhibits and restoration of some building finishes and furnishings.

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA'S EXPEDITED MOTION TO INTERVENE

COMES NOW the United States of America, by and through the undersigned counsel of records, and respectfully seeks to intervene in this action for the limited purpose of protecting public lands and resources. In support of its Motion, the United States of America ("United States" or "Government") states as follows:

1. Upon information and belief, this litigation seeks to resolve, in whole or in part, matters related to certain valuable objects hidden by decedent Forrest Burke Fenn ("Fenn Treasure") and efforts of certain individuals to find and/or claim the Fenn Treasure.

2. Certain information regarding the search for and discovery of the Fenn Treasure has previously been publicly disclosed, including the discovery of the Fenn Treasure by Interested Party Jack Steuf.¹

3. Upon information and belief, Mr. Steuf was originally subpoenaed to give his deposition in this matter on April 7, 2022, which was postponed in order to address the Government's effort to intervene. The deposition has now been postponed until April 29, 2022.

4. In August of 2020, a Zoom meeting was held with Forrest Fenn, attorney Tom Hnasko, and Jack Stuef and Government officials. At this meeting Mr. Stuef provided detailed,

specific information regarding the location where he found the Forrest Fenn treasure box ("Fenn Treasure") on or about June 6, 2020. Forrest Fenn then confirmed the location as the same location where he left the Fenn Treasure. Using Google Earth, Chief Ranger Sarah Davis was able to locate and match the area described by both Stuef and Fenn. The following week Chief Davis, along with the Deputy Chief Ranger, went to the area described by both Stuef and Fenn. *See* Ex. A, Dec. of Sarah Davis, ¶ 4

5. The location described as the area where the Fenn Treasure was found is public land owned by the United States Government and managed by the Department of the Interior. The Department of the Interior is concerned that if specific information regarding the location were divulged, it would result in a significant increase in visitation to this area by persons still looking for the treasure site or otherwise seeking to visit the site for other reasons related to the Fenn Treasure. *See id.* at \P 5.

6. The area where the Fenn Treasure was found does not have any trails or infrastructure to support any increase in visitation to the area. Resource damage such as the creation of "social trails" (informal trails resulting from erosion due to foot traffic), littering, and improper disposal of waste are a few of the expected consequences of increased visitation. The area also contains water sites that are home to native fish species that could be threatened or damaged by an increase in visitors. *See id.* at \P 6.

7. Since the publishing of decedent Forrest Fenn's poem, The Thrill of the Chase, in which he revealed a hidden treasure with clues to its location, treasure seekers have been charged with crimes including stalking, damage and destruction of natural resources, reckless and disorderly conduct, and entering closed areas. Since the death of Forrest Burke Fenn and the announcement of the finding of the Fenn Treasure, treasure seekers have continued to visit

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various sites on public land in search of imagined unclaimed treasure or to visit the site where they believe the Fenn Treasure to have been found. If additional information about the specific site of where the Fenn Treasure was found is publicly disclosed, the Government reasonably anticipates a surge in visitors to areas not intended or equipped to receive significant numbers of people. *See id.* at ¶ 7.

8. On or about April 4, 2022, the National Park Service learned that Mr. Steuf had received a deposition subpoena in this matter, issued by the Estate of Forrest Fenn. The deposition was originally scheduled for April 7, 2022, but was postponed while the Government prepared to seek to intervene in this case.

9. The Government's limited sole purpose in seeking to intervene is to seek an order from the Court preventing the disclosure of the specific locations on public land where Mr. Steuf looked for the Fenn Treasure, as well as the location where he found it, as well as to attend depositions and hearings where information about locations on public land where the Fenn Treasure was looked for and discovered could be disclosed.

10. The United States seeks to intervene in this matter in accordance with Rule 1-024(A)(2) because it has an interest in maintaining the public land and resources that relate to the subject matter of this action, the Fenn Treasure. Because the Fenn Treasure was sought and found on public land, and because the United States' interest in protecting public land is not adequately represented by any existing party in this matter, intervention should be permitted. See Rule 1-024(A)(2) NMRA 2021.

11. The United States anticipates attending depositions and hearings in this matter for the limited purpose of protecting its interests and/or seeking a protective order prohibiting

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disclosure of specific locations on public lands where persons have searched for the Fenn Treasure, as well as the location where it was found, in any unsealed record in this matter.

12. Pursuant to Rule 1-007.1, the undersigned counsel has inquired each party's position and determined that this expedited Motion is opposed by Counter Petitioner Jamie McCracken. The Motion is not opposed by the Estate of Forrest Burke Fenn.

13. Pursuant to LR1-201(F), the United States respectfully requests expedited consideration of this Motion. Discovery in this matter is nearing its end on April 29, 2022. Upon information and belief, Mr. Jack Steuf has been subpoenaed to give his deposition on this date and the United States' interests in protecting public land and resources, as more fully described in this Motion, may be jeopardized by this testimony.

I, Sarah Davis, declare the following to be true and correct from personal knowledge as follows:

- I am the Chief Ranger for Yellowstone National Park. My office address is 4 Barracks Street, Yellowstone National Park, WY 82190.
- 2. In my capacity as Chief Ranger, I am the senior law enforcement officer overseeing the law enforcement, search and rescue, emergency medical services, 911 and public safety dispatch center, visitor services operations (fee collection and campgrounds), structural fire, wildland fire and corrals operations for Yellowstone National Park. Yellowstone National Park is located in Wyoming, Montana, and Idaho and is approximately 2.2 million acres in size. The Park is one of the busiest in the country and experiences over 4 million visitors a year and manages and preserves its public land in part by providing and maintaining roads, trails, and other areas of public access for visitors to utilize.
- I am familiar with the facts of subpoena that forms the basis of the litigation filed in the above-captioned case and am providing this declaration in support of the United States' Motion to Intervene.
- 4. In August of 2020, a Zoom meeting was held with Forrest Fenn, attorney Tom Hnasko, and Jack Stuef. At this meeting Mr. Stuef provided detailed, specific information regarding

Dec. 7, 2021: 9:30 am – 4:00 pm Dec. 8, 2021: 9:30 am – 4:00 pm Dec. 15, 2021: 9:30 am – 4:00 pm Dec. 16, 2021: 9:30 am – 4:00 pm Dec. 18, 2021: 9:30 am – 4:00 pm Dec. 29, 2021: 9:30 am – 4:00 pm Jan. 5, 2022: 9:30 am – 4:00 pm Jan. 12, 2022: 9:30 am – 4:00 pm

The morning portion of the course will be held in the second-floor classroom at the Garage and in one of the Garage Bays. The afternoon session will be a snowmobile orientation ride. There will be a 1-hour lunch break that includes time for folks to get their gear ready for the afternoon session.

The program will not automatically enforce a retake if your score is below 85. It will only provide you your score; it is up to you to retake the quiz. The test can be taken multiple times. - This month we celebrate Native American Heritage Month. To read more from or about Native Americans please check out one of these books from the library:
 - Lakota Star Knowledge : Studies in Lakota Stellar Theology by Ronald Goodman. As the temperatures cool and the days grow shorter, November is a great time for star gazing. The annual Leonid meteor shower is predicted to peak on November 17 and go through Nov 30, and Lakota Star Knowledge is a great read to put the sky in perspective through an indigenous lens. (Juvenile)
 - <u>Re-bisoning the West : Restoring an American Icon to the Landscape</u> by Kurt Repanshek. We in Yellowstone live with bison and other animals as a part of our daily lives. Native Americans, too, historically had, and currently are reestablishing, a strong connection to these Animals through strategies to reintroduce bison onto native lands and elsewhere across the west. This book outlines this effort, as well as chronicles the troubled history the bison have survived, and the importance these animals have on North American ecology.
 - As Long as Grass Grows : the Indigenous Fight for Environmental Justice, from Colonization to Standing Rock by Dina Gilio-Whitaker. This book discusses the particular circumstances surrounding indigenous environmental justice and explains how it differs from mainstream environmental justice. This book is a great introduction to an important aspect of culture and environmentalism in the US.
 - <u>I Tell You Now : Autobiographical Essays by Native American Writers</u> (Brian Swann, Arnold Krupat, Editors) Native American writers describe their perceptions of their rich culture in the twentieth century. This book was published in 1987, but still gives some useful insight to indigenous life, and the

deeply rooted culture of autobiographical storytelling embedded in both tradition and modern life.

Youth Programs Office

- Education Staff offered 18 Distance Learning (DL) programs last week and are hosting 15 DL programs this week for schools from AL, AZ, CA, FL, IL, IA, KS, LA, MI, MO, NY, TN, TX, and WY and 27 youth attending a grief camp in SC.
- Staff hosted Gardiner 6th & 7th grade classes for three days of full-day field hikes and activities to explore the geology, ecology and history of Yellowstone. They would have attended residential Expedition Yellowstone but we modified their expedition to be fully outdoors by removing the overnight part to reduce risk during the pandemic. The students, chaperones, and rangers enjoyed learning with and from one another in "Backyard Wonderland." Special thanks to Greg Dalling for sharing some historic Haynes postcards of several places the students explored. This community has some amazingly bright, perceptive, and creative youth who work together well. We appreciate the adults in their lives who support, encourage, and care for them. *(We normally host 60-70 classes per year. This was our first one since late winter 2020 and reminds us how valuable it is to get children outdoors for extended visits in the natural world, giving them opportunities for learning and deeper connections.)*
- Staff continue to assist REYP with coverage at Albright VC three days each week while their park guide positions are vacant.

Technology Services

• **AT&T Mount Washburn** AT&T is converting their Mount Washburn site from 3G UMTS to 4G LTE. UMTS service is being discontinued by AT&T in February 2022.

Rubber tracked snow cats with snow blades were required to access the site from Mae West Curve.

- Verizon Elk Plaza Upgrades were completed Monday and Tuesday. All work was inside the equipment room, no visible changes outside. As of Tuesday afternoon the site was performing poorly so things were not going well.
- Union Wireless and AT&T will begin to pay \$8,000 a year for 10 years each for rent as co-locators on the Grant Village Verizon Cell Tower. All of the money for use and occupancy on Federal lands goes to the treasury.
- The Old Faithful 100Mbps Broadband Circuit went down on Friday. Computer Support got it back on line by Monday
- The WASO Wide Area Network (WAN) group now predicts that we will not get the routers needed to connect the new broadband services at Old Faithful and Lake to the DOI Network until sometime between March through May 2022. They were ordered in July 2020. Many other parks are suffering through the same delays. We are trying to get priority status.
- **102 New Computers** were ordered under the Consolidated Buy last week.
- Joshua Huber (YELL Network Manager) leaves for Gettysburg National Military Park this Wednesday for a NTE 120 detail.
- Amanda Brown from Concessions will serve a detail in Technology Services as a Service Provider Permit Coordinator. Amanda's EOD is first week of December
- The South Entrance now has a Live Webcam. More details will be available when it is made available to the public.
- The Radio Shop is busy installing many of the 300 new Motorola Non-LE Mobile Radios purchased with FY21 FLREA Funds. They will continue to be busy with this work for a while.

The morning portion of the course will be held in the second-floor classroom at the Garage and in one of the Garage Bays. The afternoon session will be a snowmobile orientation ride. There will be a 1-hour lunch break that includes time for folks to get their gear ready for the afternoon session.

Youth Programs Office

• The Expedition Yellowstone curriculum was last published in 2004 so with residential programs suspended during the pandemic we have been using this past year to revise the curriculum. Currently, we are finalizing the history unit and the geology unit is being reviewed by YCR/Geology staff.

• We continue to assist REYP-Albright VC staff to answer phones and emails 3 or more days per week.

• Allison Newberg has returned as the YCC co-director! Thanks to Allison for all of her volunteer time with EMS and Fire across the winter.

• Distance Learning program requests keep coming in. 10 programs are scheduled for this week including a series of them for an Expedition Yellowstone group that wasn't able to visit in person.

Technology Services

• The Fire Alarm System in the Canyon 10-Plex was replaced with combination Smoke, Carbon Monoxide and Heat detectors with sounder bases. This is the standard that we are implementing with all new systems installed in overnight occupancies. This design is also currently being implemented in Officer's Row 10, 11, and 12 and in many 4-Plexes due for Fire Alarm System replacement.

• Each detector in each living unit is equipped with sounder bases that activate locally in each room.

• Local notification reduces nuisance evacuations and mitigates complacency regarding fire alarm activation so occupants are more likely to evacuate during a fire/smoke/CO emergency.

 $\circ~$ If devices activate in more than one unit, the fire panel will evacuate the entire building.

• Each sounder base emits the new low frequency audible notification which is now a Fire Code requirement for sleeping areas. Horns and strobes activate for a building evacuation.

• The low frequency notification has proven to be more effective at waking sleeping occupants than the higher frequency devices

• If you want to find the current Radio Call Sign list pdfs or lookup someone's call sign, go to the <u>Yellowstone Phone Book</u> And thanks to all the Supervisors who quickly updated the call signs previously assigned to seasonal employees arriving in April.

• Lumen intends to begin work on Old Faithful NPS and Xanterra, Lake NPS, and Canyon Xanterra Fiber Ethernet projects in late April or early May depending on snow levels. Pauly Construction is the contractor that will be trenching and boring fiber optic conduit and cable for Lumen.

• Diamond Communications is submitting another proposal for task order award and work at the South Entrance Ranger Station and 10 residential quarters for 100 Mbps shared internet services. The proposed dedicated 300Mbps Ethernet to the Ranger Station was not on the IDIQ. Trenching to the residential facilities at South will be required.

Website Statistics Point to a Busy Summer

- We compared this period of 2021 with the same approximate timeframe in 2019. It was during this period in 2020 that we saw a massive swing in website use. Case in point:
 - Virtual tours had a MASSIVE 520,900 individual users in that 3-week period in 2020 alone. That was over half of our 968,618 total website users during that time.
 - Even those 968,618 users in 2020 was 2x to 3x more users than normal.
 - With that caveat, comparing use data for 2021 to 2019:
 - Overall web traffic is up 35%
 - Home page is up 53% (174,000 vs. 114,000). In 2020 during that massive spike we had 186,000 home page users.
 - Current conditions is up 14%
 - Operating hours is up 18%
 - Maps is up 16%
 - Campgrounds is up 31%
 - Park roads is up 45%
 - Basic information is up 12%
 - Lodging is up 63%
 - Permits and reservations is up 46%

- Virtual tours is still up a massive 3,994%
- That said, two of the top pages are down
 - Plan Your Visit home page is down 2% (probably an insignificant amount or people finding the information elsewhere)
 - Webcams down 26%; however, we believe that drop reflects the fact that the Old Faithful Live Streaming Webcam is down. Dave and team will travel to Old Faithful next week to restore this ever-popular feature to full function.

So, looking at these numbers, it would not be unreasonable to extrapolate the following:

- We have 10–30% increase in visitation from 2019 numbers
- A lot of people are left without places to camp or stay

We can look back on this prediction in a few months and either laugh derisively at how wrong predictions can be, or wince at the reality of that magnitude of increased visitation.

NPS Mobile App Launches April 16

The NPS Mobile App is available to all parks. Every site has the same branded and professional product regardless of size or budget. It is scalable to the needs of each park but has additional features, and new services will continue to be added. The app includes a layer of nationwide content, where a user can learn about different parks, find national news, and configure global settings such as registering for alerts and news from parks of interest. Park-specific content for every park in the NPS System is available for use online and offline – i.e., if a person wants to download the info for one particular park to use offline, they can do so. This is an especially useful functionality in parks like Yellowstone, were cell service and wifi are limited.

Thanks to Virginia Warner and Matt Ohlen, we are on track and on deadline to provide a decently robust Yellowstone experience in the new NPS app by April 16.

However, the new NPS app will have less functionality than the current Yellowstone app, which has been available for over 2 years:

- In its current level of development, the NPS app cannot integrate Yellowstone Live, so
 - No geyser predictions
 - No campground or lodge fill statuses
 - No road condition information
 - No interpretive/education content
- On the plus side, the new NPS app has three added functionalities:
 - The open/closed status of VCs and campgrounds based on our structured data (i.e., the data that populates the park's official website).
 - The listing of volunteer opportunities
 - Users can access all NPS units from this one app and download the content of as many parks as you like for offline use.
- Overall, both apps "work" the same when in a park, with slight visual differences.

- Yellowstone and a few other parks worked with Harpers Ferry Center (HFC) a few years ago to develop apps that became the foundation for development of the NPS app. HFC will not force any existing apps to retire, so we can keep the NPS Yellowstone app indefinitely. HOWEVER...
 - We are uncertain how long HFC will continue to the old app code maintenance contract. The Yellowstone app may stop working when an OS upgrade occurs.
 - We will still have to maintain two completely separate sets of content 600+ sites, which is a workload.
- WASO recognizes importance of including live data in the NPS app. However, it may or may not appear in the next app update. When it does, there may be transitions from Yellowstone Live to a different Live format.
 - The new Live system has been years in the making and there is no firm ETA.
 - There is no plan for addressing Campground and Lodge fill status in the same, simplified way as we have now... it will be possible, but more technical.
 - Same for the geyser predictions.
 - The visitor center messages are on the list to be completed after the new live system is released, but there may be a period where we are having to maintain two systems, just like the app.
 - As yet, there is no path forward relative to including interpretation/education content, but we will continue to advocate for this functionality.
 - There is a disconnect between WASO IT and WASO Interpretation/Education.

 - Developing timeline and process for a prototype online employee orientation training.
 - Ongoing coordination of Standard Operating Procedures and Job Hazard Analyses. These have been inconsistently available, resulting in each location developing its own SOP's or having none at all. Transitioning to a One Team approach to the development, updating, and maintenance of this essential operational guidance.

Summer Operations/Updates

On March 29, Deputy Director Shawn Benge issued a memorandum to all NPS units in which the NPS formally established reduced occupancy in National Park Service facilities for pandemic response. The DOI Covid-19 Workplace Safety Plan recommends a reduced occupancy standard of 25% of normal occupancy. This standard must be applied when 100% occupancy can be readily determined. This standard also must ensure that at least six feed of physical distance between people present in the facility can be maintained. If 25% of normal occupancy cannot be readily determined, we must establish a building occupancy level that allows a minimum of six feet of physical distance between people present in the facility. These standards also apply to concessioner and partner spaces/operations.

We will work closely with George Larsen, and Phil Basak/Chris Flesch to interpret and implement these standards in our planning for summer operations. The memo has also been conveyed to the Yellowstone Forever Retail Sales Team and Maintenance Manager, and we will work closely with YF to apply guidance to bookstore spaces.

It is likely this guidance will evolve over the months between now and the target opening date of July 1 for the visitor centers listed below. We will carefully monitor all developments and adjust accordingly.

As of April 6:

Phase 1 Visitor Centers: Target Opening Date is July 1.

- Albright VC, Mammoth Hot Springs: Lobby, information desk, YF bookstore; basement exhibits and restrooms will remain closed initially and decisions to open will depend on staffing capacity and covid guidance.
- Old Faithful Visitor Education Center: Lobby, information desk, YF bookstore, public restrooms. Exhibits and theater will remain closed initially and decisions to open will depend on staffing capacity and covid guidance.
- Canyon Visitor Education Center: Lobby, information desk, YF bookstore, public restrooms. Exhibits and theater will remain closed initially and decisions to open will depend on staffing capacity and covid guidance.
- West Yellowstone Visitor Information Center: A facility shared with the West Yellowstone Chamber of Commerce – not a federal facility and therefore not covered by the mask mandate in federal facilities. Currently, West Yellowstone Chamber requires masks in conformity with Gallatin Country standards. Facility opening is tentatively targeted for July 1, but the date could more forward or back depending on covid guidance and mask requirements.

Phase 2 Facilities: Opening Uncertain or Facilities Closed for the Season

- Norris Geyser Basin Museum: Unstaffed. Opening under review based on concerns about visitors and crowding in small spaces.
- Grant Visitor Center: Closed initially; the building will need "sneeze guards," stanchions, signs, and other covid management/mitigation devices. These items will be added as the Grant area opens and access is possible.
- West Thumb Contact Station: YF will operate a small sales function; NPS will be roving the West Thumb Geyser Basin area.

Not open in 2021:

- Madison Information Station
- Museum of the National Park Ranger
- Fishing Bridge Visitor Center

REYP Rangers will conduct resource education/protection roving activities in the Upper Geyser Basin, Midway Geyser Basin, Fountain Paint Pot, Firehole Lake Drive, Madison-West Entrance corridor, Norris Geyser Basin, Canyon Area (North and South Rims, Overlooks, and trails)Mud Volcano, Hayden Valley, Yellowstone Lake shore turnouts and overlooks, West Thumb Geyser Basin, Mammoth Developed area, and the northern road corridor (North to Northeast Entrances). Staffing levels will be insufficient to offer a schedule of formal ranger-led programs. Staff will be available to support requests for VIP tours, talks, etc.



Resource and Visitor Protection (RVP)

Congratulations to Eric Amundson upon receiving the Superintendent's Commendation for his efforts and investigation into the Forrest Fenn treasure hunter, Rodrick Craythorn. Craythorn entered the park during the COVID-19 closure last year and disturbed several graves in the Fort Yellowstone Cemetery. He was sentenced to 6 months imprisonment, 6 months home confinement and ordered to pay \$31,000 in restitution to the park.

Chris Flesch will be detailed to Grand Teton as Acting Chief Ranger for PP-09 and 10.

GEOLOGY

- In this week's Yellowstone Caldera Chronicles article, Greg Vaughan, a USGS research scientist, writes about the ephemeral nature of geothermal areas, which are extremely ephemeral in terms of geologic time. New geothermal areas can heat up quickly and older systems tend to cool down slowly. You can read Greg's article here: <u>Yellowstone's Cool</u> <u>Thermal Areas (usgs.gov)</u>
- A drilling crew is working in the area west of the NE entrance road between the Trout Lake parking area and the Pebble Creek campground. The road lies upon massive landslide deposits that most likely dammed the Soda Bute Creek and created a lake. So, when you look at the Round Prairie area from the road, think about a lake water level over your head by a couple of feet that was around sometime in the last 12,000 years or so. At some point the damming landslide deposits were breeched, and the lake drained. Round Prairie is what is left behind. A team of WFLHD geologists, university researchers and Yellowstone Geology Program members are looking to find out when these landslides happened and assess the hazard of further landslides in the area.

Recent work and news

In the past month there were three major water eruptions of Steamboat Geyser, on March 3, 18, and 27. This brings the total number of eruptions for the year to 7. During winter months, the interval between Steamboat eruptions is longer than during the summer, probably due to lower groundwater levels in the absence of runoff from snow melt. If the geyser follows the patterns established since 2018, we expect to see the time between eruptions decrease as summer approaches.

Seismicity

During March 2021, the University of Utah Seismograph Stations, responsible for the operation and analysis of the Yellowstone Seismic Network, located 105 earthquakes in the Yellowstone National Park region. The largest event was a minor earthquake of magnitude 2.4 located 16 miles southeast of Mammoth, WY, on March 3 at 2:31 PM MST.

A small swarm of 12 earthquakes, with magnitudes between -0.1 and 1.8, was recorded in the area of Old Faithful, Yellowstone National Park, during March 9–16. The largest event of the swarm occurred on March 9 at 2:29 PM (MST) and was located nine miles north-northwest of Old Faithful.

Earthquake sequences like these are common and account for roughly 50% of the total seismicity in the Yellowstone region.

Yellowstone earthquake activity remains at background levels.

Ground deformation

Deformation rates and styles at Yellowstone, as recorded by continuous GPS stations, have been steady over the past year. Subsidence of Yellowstone Caldera, which has been ongoing since 2015, continued at an average rate of 2-3 cm (about 1 in) per year. In the area of Norris Geyser Basin, no significant uplift or subsidence has been detected by a nearby GPS station since the start of 2020.



Forrest Fenn treasure hunter digs himself into a federal sentence

This week, Rodrick Craythorn was <u>sentenced in federal district</u> <u>court</u> for digging in Fort Yellowstone's cemetery while looking for the Forest Fenn treasure. This case is one of Yellowstone's most significant investigations of damage to archaeological resources in recent history and the first significant ARPA felony conviction in the park. Way to go team! Forrest Fenn treasure hunter digs himself into a federal sentence

Acting United States Attorney Bob Murray announced today that **RODRICK DOW CRAYTHORN**, 52, of Syracuse, Utah, was sentenced by Chief Federal District Court Judge Scott W. Skavdahl, for excavating and damaging archeological resources in the cemetery of the Fort Yellowstone National Historic Landmark in Yellowstone National Park. Craythorn received a sentence of six months of imprisonment plus six months of home detention, to be followed by two years of supervised release. He was also ordered to pay \$31,566 in restitution.

Craythorn was found digging in Fort Yellowstone's cemetery in late 2019 and early 2020, while looking for a treasure believed to be worth millions. Rangers and special agents of the National Park Service discovered seventeen sites of illegal excavation, including damage to an historic grave. The cemetery is a multicomponent archeological site with historical human burials. The cemetery is included in the National Register of Historic Places and more specifically designated on July 31, 2003, as a National Historic Landmark. Yellowstone National Park was established in 1872 as the nation's first national park, and the U.S. Army was dispatched to the park in 1886 to protect its natural features and wildlife. Originally established as Camp Sheridan in 1891, it evolved into Fort Yellowstone and served as the Army headquarters until their departure in 1918. The Army began internments in the cemetery in 1888. At least 54 people were buried in the cemetery between 1888 and 1916, most of them civilian employees of the Army and relatives of military personnel.

A Santa Fe, New Mexico, art dealer named Forrest Fenn buried a chest of gold, silver, and gems in the western United States and then left a clue-filled poem to solve its location. The investigation into this matter revealed that Craythorn had done extensive research on the Forest Fenn treasure and documented his efforts to family and friends. Craythorn did not find the treasure during his criminal adventure. It was found later in Wyoming by another person. "Yellowstone is one of the country's most popular national parks and we must do everything in our power to investigate and prosecute those who damage and destroy its natural and cultural resources. A national park is no place to stage an adult treasure hunt motivated by greed. The harmful actions of Mr. Craythorn, no matter the reason or intent, destroyed valuable archaeological resources that cannot be undone", stated Acting United States

Attorney Bob Murray. "I am pleased with the results of this case. The teamwork between Assistant United States Attorney Stephanie Hambrick and the rangers and special agents with our National Park Service resulted in the successful prosecution of a crime that a sentence of imprisonment is rarely imposed. Craythorn deserves time in a federal prison, no matter the length. Yet this case really serves to remind those enjoying our national parks the importance of respecting and preserving it for the whole of America", Murray said.

"This is the most significant investigation of damage to archaeological resources in Yellowstone National Park's recent history," said Superintendent Cam Sholly. "I want to sincerely thank law enforcement officers, special agents, archaeological staff, the Department of Justice District of Wyoming and the U.S. District Court Judge for their outstanding work on this complex case."

"This is an example of a highly egregious resource violation stemming from the Forrest Fenn treasure hunt saga," said Yellowstone National Park Chief Ranger Sarah Davis. "Today's action by the DOJ sends a clear message that these types of transgressions will be aggressively investigated and prosecuted."

Good morning your Honor and thank you for allowing me a few minutes to speak today. My name is Sarah Davis and I am the Chief Ranger at Yellowstone National Park. I know this is probably unusual for the government to provide a victim impact statement, but the nature of this case is different from most and my presence here today is to provide the court with an understanding that even though no bodily harm came to a person, and the digging of holes were the only visible damage, the effects run much deeper. When the government presents its case, it does not show the emotional impact, the internal pain that the actions of the suspect have caused. When reports are written they based on facts. Today, Yellowstone would like to make sure everyone understands that the government is made up of people and cases like this take a personal and emotional toll.

Cultural resources, including the Fort Yellowstone Cemetery and archaeological sites, are tangible assets that embody the cultural history of the park, a reservoir of information invaluable to humanity. The park's cultural resources, protected since 1872, represent the material embodiment of one of the largest and most complete continua of human occupation in the western United States.

The Fort Yellowstone Cemetery is a contributing resource to the Fort Yellowstone National Historic Landmark. A National Historic Landmark is a type of property that is officially recognized by the United States government for its outstanding historical significance. Fort Yellowstone is significant for its association with the military administration of Yellowstone National Park and for the impact the principles and policies developed during the military administration of Yellowstone had on the emerging conservation and national park movements in the United States in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries.

Within the historic cemetery, the actions of Roderick Dow Craythorn resulted in disturbing two human gravesites. One belongs to Mr. Frank Welch, a teamster for the park's Engineering Department who has the unfortunate distinction of being the first documented human fatality by grizzly bear in the park. His headstone was moved and his grave was partially unearthed. Mr. Welch's wooden coffin lid was broken through near his shoulders and skull, resulting in the exposure of the inner coffin void. As I performed the Resource Damage Assessment for Mr. Welch's burial, we found pieces of the broken coffin lid throughout Craythorn's backfilled hole, and could smell Mr. Welch's decomposing remains. It was extremely disheartening that he was not allowed to rest in peace because of Craythorn's actions.

Immediately to the west of Mr. Welch lies Mr. William Maher, a civilian employee of the Army Quartermaster Division. Mr. Maher's Spanish American War Veteran Grave Marker was removed from his gravesite and replaced in an area where Craythorn had dug a large hole over 4 ft. wide and 3 ft. deep. We will return Mr. Maher's Spanish American War Veteran Grave Marker and the last pieces of Mr. Welch's coffin lid to their rightful locations once the ground thaws this spring.

Archaeology is the study of how humans lived in the past. Scientists in this field use artifacts (the objects made and used by people) and other physical remains to understand how past peoples lived: what they ate, what tools they used, what types of housing they built, how they adapted to their surroundings, and what factors influenced their decisions. The original context of these materials is extremely important as it is the interrelationships between these items that are examined to achieve a greater understanding of past peoples. Archeological Resource Victim Impact Statement, Fort Yellowstone Cemetery, Fort Yellowstone National Historic Landmark, Yellowstone National Park, National Park Service, U.S. Department of the Interior. Submitted by Dr. Elizabeth Horton

As an archeological site, the Fort Yellowstone Cemetery has the potential to provide information significant to our understanding of the late nineteenth and early twentieth century occupation of Yellowstone National Park, as well as our understanding of prehistoric people's use of this area. Artifacts that the NPS recovered during the Resource Damage Assessment consist of two chert flakes (a flint-like material), one obsidian flake, and one obsidian scraper. A common tool type on prehistoric sites, the scraper has evidence of intentional edge sharpening and usewear associated with food processing and the fabrication of leather, bone, and wooden tools and ornaments. These archeological resources have the potential to yield information on cultural history, resource procurement, as well as how to determine how individuals and communities travelled and traded across the landscape through obsidian sourcing.

Over 135¹/₂ cubic feet of soil was disturbed within the cemetery by Craythorn's actions. This is the most significant ARPA felony incident in Yellowstone National Park in terms of the scope and scale of the disturbance since the enactment of the Archaeological Resources Protection Act (ARPA) in 1979. Archaeological resources are non-renewable; if the original context of the artifacts and other materials is not properly documented during their removal, such as during scientific excavations, those resources are irrevocably injured and associated information on the past is lost forever.


Mr Craythorn, your actions were not only disturbing, but your actions resulted in the loss of information, loss of context, loss of history, to not only the early YNP occupation of the land, but also the prehistoric and Native Americans who were here long before. I personally am angered by the overarching reason for the damage done to Mr. Welch's remains and Fort Yellowstone Cemetery. And that is the reason was a poem and a treasure hunt. A treasure hunt where the writer of the poem specifically said it's not buried and it's not in a cemetery. Mr Craythorn ignored this because of greed. He ignored the shutdown of the Park to protect each other from the global pandemic, because of greed.

Yellowstone National Park was the first national park and was established in 1872. The Yellowstone National Park Protection Act says "the headwaters of the Yellowstone River ... is hereby reserved and withdrawn from settlement, occupancy, or sale ... and dedicated and set apart as a public park or pleasuring-ground for the benefit and enjoyment of the people." In an era of expansion, the federal government had the foresight to set aside land deemed too valuable in natural wonders to develop. In 1916 the National Park Service was established and its mission defined in the NPS Organic Act: "to conserve the scenery and the natural and historic objects and the wild life therein and to provide for the enjoyment of the same in such manner and by such means as will leave them unimpaired for the enjoyment of future generations."

The over 800 employees who protect and serve Yellowstone, live by this mission. The words conserve, and Unimpaired. Mr. Craythorn maybe to you this was just treasure hunt, but to the park employees it was much more than that.

Mammoth: In 2020, all 31 homes were manufactured and delivered to the Mammoth site. All but 3 have been lifted into place. The remaining 3 will be placed in the Spring of 2021. Also, in 2020 the site work contractor was able to complete about 75 percent of the utility work. Currently, most work is suspended for the winter and is anticipated to resume the first week in April. In the upcoming construction season, construction crews will finish installing modulars, complete final utility connections, install concrete sidewalks and curbing, and pave the site with asphalt. As of today, the site is on track to be completed by September 30, 2021.

Old Faithful: In 2020, all 10 modular homes were installed at the site.

Currently this site is also in winter suspension with work anticipated to resume the third week in May. In the upcoming construction season, construction crews will complete final utility connections, finish site grading, and install concrete sidewalks and curbing. As of today, the site is on track to be completed by August 1, 2021.

Bechler Site Work: With a late start in 2020, crews were only able to complete the clearing of trees and grubbing of stumps.

Currently this site is also in winter suspension with work anticipated to resume the third week in May 2021. In the upcoming season, construction crews will install the new modular units. One of which will be a new visitor contact station. This season the construction crews will also complete utility connections and other site improvements alongside a new solar system that will power the site. The solar system is being installed by Northwestern Energy. As of today, the site is on track to be completed by September 30, 2021.

Modular Fabrication: In 2020, Northstar Systembuilt out of Redwood Falls, MN was able to fabricate and deliver 41 modular homes to Yellowstone. Eleven of those modular homes being single bedroom units and the others being two-bedroom units. There are 40 obsolete homes sites that remain throughout the park and we are currently getting ready to order additional units to be delivered this year. The remaining sites are South Entrance, Grant, Lake, Canyon, Norris, Northeast Entrance and West Yellowstone. Work on these sites are anticipated to start this construction season, with completion of the work in 2022.




FIGURE 7 - SINGLE BEDROOM UNIT TRANSPORTED THROUGH MAMMOTH ON NEW YEAR'S EVE.

Old Faithful Overpass: In 2020 the Old Faithful overpass presented many challenges for park operations with issues encountered during construction. We are working closely with the Denver Service Center to decide the best path forward contractually in 2021 to limit impacts to the park. We appreciate everyone's patience and understanding.

At this time, work is anticipated to resume in May of 2021. It's expected that work will continue for several months into the 2021 season. Whether or not the overpass will be open to traffic to start the season is currently being evaluated by a team of Engineers. More to come on that as we get closer to our opening dates.

Nature Notes

Singing Lake

If you live at Yellowstone Lake, you likely are among the fortunate few to have experienced this natural phenomenon. In response to a request from PAO (a reporter is writing a story about Yellowstone Lake "hum"), Lake Supervisory Ranger Kristine Brunsman answered questions and shared her experiences and those of Ranger Addy Falgoust. If you are unfamiliar with this extraordinary phenomenon, read on! And if you have experienced it for yourself, we suspect no two experiences are the same.

Is it real? Yes! I've been lucky enough to hear the lake sing for the last three winters.

What's it sound like? The sound is hard to characterize. In 2018 and 2019, the sound was rather dull and often reminded me of corrugated metal flapping in the wind or maybe a far-off mechanical sound, like the engine of an airplane. This winter, in December 2020, I heard songs I'd never heard before - more ethereal notes, with whomps and whoops and whooos - akin to sonar pings or the call of a whale deep in the ocean. It gave me goosebumps. I like to imagine there's a mystical creature that lives in the depths of Yellowstone Lake calling out a lonely song, its roars echoing in isolation.

What are the theories for it? *My hypothesis is that a combination of ice cap, air and water temperature, wind and wave action, and echoing off the crown of the mountains that encircle Yellowstone Lake create the perfect environment for the sound. I'm sure localized tremors and underwater thermals also play a role in the notes we hear.*

What are the patterns as to when it occurs? It seems to happen most early in the winter or later in spring when the lake is capped in ice. We may hear it intermittently or for a few days in a row. This winter, we had extremely cold days early in the season and the lake began to freeze without its usual blanket of snow. It would make sense that the snow acts as a muffler in most years, which is why it was so clear, crisp, and loud this December.

Do people mistake certain other sounds for it? *Most often, especially people who don't know to listen for it, mistake the metallic sound for a large vehicle or heavy machinery off in the distance or simply wind in the trees.*

A group of visitors were mildly upset that Boiling River is still closed.

Employee Observations

Mammoth Hot Springs: In the aftermath of the two week holiday period, no off-boardwalk travel was observed and off-trail tracks were minimal.

Lamar Valley: Resource warnings have mostly been made to address safe parking - i.e., not parking in the middle of the road, or vehicles only partially pulled into a pullout.

Blacktail Plateau: A dead coyote was discovered and reported.

Canyon: Wildlife sightings included wolves in Gibbon Meadows and a mountain lion on North Rim Drive near Grandview Point. The mountain lion sighting information was reported to Dan Stahler.

Canyon: REYP rangers continue to work with commercial guides to improve coordination of lobby use and maintain conformity with the established capacity of the lobby. Guides have been responsive to suggestions for staggering group arrivals and outdoor options during better weather conditions.

From Nicole Sedgeley at Madison: A snowmobile guide said that, "The guides love the propane heaters at the warming hut! They have really helped reduce the crowding inside the warming hut and kept our guests warm." They went on to request that something similar to those be installed at Old Faithful.

Madison: We had one visitor get confrontational with Will, the Xanterra Warming Hut employee this week. He was asked by Will to wear a mask inside, and according to Will the visitor became agitated, throwing his wallet at Will, using profanity, and storming out of the building. When I arrived to help, the visitor remained agitated and did not want to listen to my explanation of the regulations inside the building. I talked with the visitor's snowmobile guide about the situation and the guide assured me that he would not let that visitor into any other buildings that day. When I saw the guide later that afternoon, he reported no other issues with that visitor had happened.

Madison: The wolves have been a major focus of everyone's attention and discussions this week. The signs have been posted and the guides are aware of the hazing operations. A lone wolf walked right in front of Madison Information Station this morning. Not sure the status of which pack this wolf is/was a part of.

Having the wildlife sightings on the whiteboard outside the warming hut has been a big success. Many people -- guides, and visitors alike -- routinely check and talk about the sightings.

Fountain Paint Pot has continued to be a good roving location. There were many cheers, laughs and smiles as people watched a recent eruption of Fountain Geyser. The wind was blowing all the steam back on the boardwalk and one woman was standing right in the steam, smiling, and said, "I love this! This is so cool!"

General

Jon Nicholson, Mammoth Supervisory Park Ranger, will be moving from that position to a new job in the Yellowstone Center for Resources. Jon's last work day with REYP is Friday, January 15. Jon has anchored frontline REYP operations at Grant and Mammoth Hot Springs. His exceptional dedication and hard work have benefitted hundreds of thousands of visitors and through information and interpretation, contributed to the preservation of Yellowstone's natural and cultural resources. Jon has also represented the NPS with special groups including

international delegations, Yellowstone Forever donors, and dignitaries at all levels of government. Thank you, Jon, for all you've contributed to Yellowstone's visitors and resources. We wish you the best in your new job at YCR!

The Chief's Office is gathering information and coordinating work on Program Reviews/Presentations. REYP's are scheduled for February 9 and 10.

Preparations are underway for the arrival of seasonal certificates and the hiring of the summer workforce. In conformity with park plans, hiring will begin with Wave 1 rehires from the summer of 2020.

As part of her role serving on the Intermountain Region's Interpretation and Education Advisory Council (IEAC), Tami Blackford is working with a committee to develop and deliver Interpretation Leaders Training. "Ranger Reboot: Leading Through Dynamic Change" will be held on February 17-19, 2020. The training will be offered virtually to regional Chiefs of Interpretation and will include sessions on Business Acumen, Managing Up, Visitation and Social Science, Strategic Planning, and a Leader's Panel: Leadership at every level, that will include soon to be Deputy Supt Mike Tranel. Dave Krueger is providing Teams platform support and facilitation for the training.

- Wheeled Medic 24 in service at Gallatin/West.

- Air Ambulance (Air 3) no longer available from West Yellowstone until next spring.

Visitor Services Office:

VSO:

- Initializing the December 2020 winter visitor stats.
- VSO received 129 visitor phone calls last week and responded to 189 visitor emails.
- Kristen is working with Tami Blackford from REYP to find more efficient ways to manage trip planning functions among our two programs.

- Rich completed snowmobile training last week. Evan will attend the winter skills avalanche training next week.
- Evan has revised the lost and found SOP to improve communication and clear written guidance for the field locations. It will be shared with field staff in the next few weeks.

Fees:

- The Fee supervisors are working on hiring seasonal VUA GS-4 and GS-5 positions and campground hosts.
- Preparing *Recreation.gov* production sites for four campgrounds to go on reservation this spring: Norris, Mammoth, Pebble Creek, and Slough Creek. We are also working with *Recreation.gov* on creating online digital fishing permits for this coming summer.
- The West Entrance is getting new replacement cash register equipment from Arctic IT to solve ongoing hardware issues.

SUP's/Filming:

- Rachel is processing a number of winter film permit requests.
- *Thank you* to the interior film monitors for helping monitor the film crews.
- Kristen and Rachel are presenting the MCC Focus Group recommendations to the SLT on Tuesday, to continue the MCC operations under a new SUP and seek project funding to address long-term building needs and improvements.

Emergency Services

- 8 total parkwide EMS calls, 5 mutual aid, 1 North District, 2 West District.
- FY2021 Ambulance order has been submitted to the Auto Shop.
- New Mutual Aid SAR Protocol is being drafted for the park, in cooperation with the park's EOc, Dispatch and County SAR coordinators.
- Sending first wave of oxygen tanks to be hydrotested. Upon return, will pull some from the interior for round two.

Communication Center (YICC)

The number of calls for service continues to increase in comparison with other years. We handled 279 CFS this week as compared to 231 in 2020, 179 in 2019, 161 in 2018, 166 in 2017 and 142 in 2016 and 2015. This increase means that we are keeping at least two Telecommunicators on duty every shift to handle the workload. There were 18 slide off MVA's, 3 MVA, 6 medicals, and 1 thermal trespass. Our cooperating stakeholder had two separate backcountry incidents in the Cooke City area, an avalanche with airbags deploying for the 3 people who were caught in it and a separate snowmobile accident with a fractured leg this week.

We answered 395 total phone calls, 367 were administrative and 28 were 911 calls. All calls were answered within 3 minutes.

Central Backcountry Office

- Backcountry reservation applications for 2021 are coming in at a steady pace.
- Calls/requests for winter backcountry permits are above average. There were twice as many backcountry permits issued in December 2020 than in December 2019.
- Backcountry permits continue to be issued remotely via phone/email. South Entrance staff have been helping issue backcountry permits.
- Preparing annual reports and compiling statistics. For the year, backcountry permits were up 7% compared to 2019 (despite no backcountry permits being issued March 24-June 14).

Structural Fire

- Mark Gleason is on leave and deployed with the Montana Air National Guard for approximately 6 months.
- VIP's are working hard around the Mammoth Fire Cache. They have put all the required equipment and hose on Truck 51 so that the apparatus is ready for service.
- The Wyoming first quarter fire training is open. We have had several sign up for classes.
 - 7 signed up for Firefighter 1
 - 3 signed up for Apparatus Driver Operator Pumper
 - 1 signed up for Fire Officer 1
 - 1 signed up for Fire Instructor 1
- The Wyoming Apparatus Driver Operator Pumper & Aerial from the fourth quarter of 2020 will complete their final skills training and course exams the week of February 8th.
- Met via conference call with Fire Protection Engineer Nick Artim. Nick will be assisting the structural fire program on a long term plan. He will be arriving in the park in midMarch to perform an assessment of the Heritage Center suppression system and to provide a design for the structural fire burn building. We will then work on building a model on fire systems, fire suppression procedures, fire training improvements, and fire prevention.
- Yellowstone Structural Fire was accepted to participate in an NFPA beta program for building community risk assessments utilizing fire codes. Once the risk assessment is completed, then a community risk reduction plan will be established. Yellowstone is the NPS representative and was one of 250 departments chosen nationally to participate in the beta program.


- January 11-14, Teets/Nagashima and volunteers conducting Winter Wildlife Surveys on the west side of the park.

WILDLIFE AND AQUATIC RESOURCES

Last week rabbit hemorrhagic disease (RHDV2) was confirmed in southeast Wyoming. It has not been documented in YELL, Idaho, or Montana but please be on the lookout for dead rabbits, hares, or pikas (lagomorphs). Do not touch or move them, but contact John Treanor, Wildlife Health Program, if you have observations or reports. He will work with you to determine whether cases should be submitted for testing and how to proceed. Please record observations of sick or dead lagomorphs including date, location, species, and number of carcasses. Include photos if possible.

We had several reports of wolves from the Wapiti pack sitting on the road with people closely approaching them. We have hazed them before, so we are working with RVP to implement more aggressive hazing - bean bags <25 yds, rubber bullets>25 yds, cracker shells, and paint ball rounds.







Property/Supply/Office Services

• 1st Semi-Annual Weapons and Ammunitions Inventory Certification: The Property Office will send out inventories to the designated CEs next week. The completed inventories will be due back to the Property Office before 26 Feb 2021. Inquiries can be directed to Evan Dickey, Supply Property Technician on email or phone (x2086).

Youth Programs Office

- All PMIS projects are entered for the FY23 SCC.
- Most staff are on non-pay status this week and the majority remain in non-pay for the month.

• The Canteen remodel is coming along and we are looking forward to moving offices from the trailer next to YCR later this month.

Technology Services

• A PR has been approved for a task order for new 300Mbps Ethernet Broadband service to the South Entrance Ranger station. Fiber Optic cable is already built to the Ranger Station. This service would replace HughesNet Satellite for the Ranger Station and Kiosks as soon as possible. Telecom is investigating possibilities for residential internet in many of the housing units.

• If approved in Spring 2021, construction of the 187 miles of fiber optic cable proposed by Diamond NII, would likely not begin until Spring 2022.

• Residential satellite internet to housing units at Northeast, Lamar, and Tower is on hold until an IDIQ contract can be developed and awarded to a qualified Satellite Internet Service Provider (ISP)

• The Avtec Scout Dispatch Radio console computer upgrade has been completed as a part of the FLREA radio replacement project. There are 8 consoles in the Comm Center, 2 at Wildland Fire Dispatch, 1 at the Fire Cache, and 2 in the Radio Shop. In addition to the Scout Consoles, there are 9 software-based Ranger dispatch consoles throughout the park that allow RVP and resource managers to communicate between districts.

• Washington has disallowed use of several software tools used by the NPS. One is a network traffic tool. If you are experiencing network outages, please call the CSS Help Desk at x2062. Another is a remote desktop support tool. CSS is limited in some remote support, but still able to work with machines remotely.

• Washington is asking all telework computer users to connect this week into the Pulse Secure VPN. They ask you to stay connected for several hours while they push updates to each computer. (The entire NPS network will be much slower while this takes place.) • AccessParks has been unable to turn up WiFi service to Xanterra operated dorms and the fast food restaurant at Old Faithful. They have equipment on Mount Washburn that is not functioning and have made several trips to attempt to bring up their link and turn service up at Old Faithful.

• Tech Services is requesting Lumen to provide NPS with an order for fiber optic broadband for the new North Entrance Station. The North Entrance currently gets internet from the HRC over an unstable dry copper pair that is leased from Lumen.



Since the beginning of Steamboat's most recent period of activity on March 15, 2018, Steamboat has broken the previous annual eruption record set in 1964 (28 eruptions), with 29 eruptions in 2018, 48 eruptions in 2019, and 48 eruptions in 2020.

On Saturday, January 2, Steamboat Geyser erupted for the first time in 2021.

Refresher Snowmobile Training

Once you have attended the initial snowmobile training (above), **<u>Refresher training</u>** is required annually and is available online by clicking <u>here</u>. The online refresher is now on MS Forms and may be taken by anyone with the link even if not on a government computer.

To date, 78 people have completed online Refresher Training with an average score of 89.7.

The online refresher has migrated to MSForms and is formatted as a quiz. You must score at least an 85% to pass. Click the "View Results" button after completing the quiz to see your score and correct answers.

The program will not automatically enforce a retake if your score is below 85. It will only provide you your score and it is up to you to retake. The test can be taken multiple times. An

Excel sheet captures the information entered by participants and score. Anyone can view the spreadsheet to verify who has completed this training and who may still need to take it, etc.

Winter Operations, 2020-21

Visitor observations and comments for the two week holiday period appear below.

Visitor (and some guide's) Comments

A visitor was upset when they found out Boiling River was closed.

Thank You for the warm place (Canyon)

My guests pay taxes, why are they not allowed to eat in warmth? (Canyon)

Great day, Miss the Rangers!(Canyon)

Out at 2pm, Great Day; Otters at Uncle Tom's; Nice and Toasty; Let it Snow; Thank You; Limit sucks, half my people have to eat outside.

Employee Observations

Significant thermal trespass continued and REYP and RVP have been collaborating during these incidents. RVP has been great at responding and explaining protocol to visitors while REYP has reported off-trail travel, photo documented violations, and completed witness reports for use in court. Dalton created a quick way to map specific violation locations using Google Earth and Word. RVP employees and the judge have liked the maps enough that multiple RVP rangers now use this technique...they refer to the diagrams as "Dalton Maps"....!

The paved area between Palette and Cleopatra Springs remains a hot spot for off trail travel. It seems without a visible boardwalk, people feel it is okay to leave the area between the snow polls. In one day, a ranger counted 12 off trail snow angles and multiple sets of far-off trail tracks in that area.

In general, the guides are coping great with the COVID restriction. As they have become familiar with our protocols this winter, they have mostly been able to monitor themselves. There are still some guides that take their guests into the crowded lobby, but most see the crowd and come back out in a few minutes. Mike and Stephanie speak individually with the guides that need information re: the set-up this year.

Kudos to all the guides for their patience as we work out the kinks of this new system this year. They are complying with our requests and trying to police themselves re: moving groups in and out of the CVEC.

People are wearing masks when not eating.

Events/Incidents

On 12/31, Dalton assisted RVP after a family of 18 was observed by visitors going off boardwalk at the terraces.

On 12/26/2020, a ranger came across six or seven bison near the boardwalk by Canary Springs. The bison seemed agitated and visitors approached and clapped at the bison. The ranger stayed in the area for over an hour to provide safety information and bison interpretation to visitors as well as keep people a safe distance away. After that time, it was near sunset and there were no longer visitors in the area.

Challenges were shared early in the week with gaining snowmobile guide compliance with the 24-capacity limit in the CVEC lobby.



- January 4, 2021 Winter Use Adaptive Management Plan (WUAMP) Winter Wildlife, Air Quality, and Soundscape monitoring programs welcomed three VIPs for the monitoring season (Grace Smith, Alex Zaideman, and Matt Olson). Thank you to Grace, Alex, and Matt.
- January 4 7, 2021 Winter Wildlife monitoring field training across winter wildlife/over-snow-vehicle interaction survey area (Norris Jct. Madison Jct. Old Faithful West Yellowstone). These staff will also evaluate trees for removal that pose potential safety (fire) threats to housing related to recent installation of wood burning stoves in West Entrance housing development.
- Completed and submitted to USACE the annual wetland mitigation monitoring reports for Norris to Golden Gate 1 and 2 and Elk Park.

WILDLIFE AND AQUATIC RESOURCES

Aerial net-gunning capture occurred during December 14-16, with 15 wolves from 4 packs, 14 elk, and 9 bighorn sheep (McMinn Bench, Specimen Ridge, Druid Peak) netted and radio-collared.

Dan Stahler and crew darted and removed a mountain lion from a snare above Gardiner on December 16th to assist Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks. The female cat was fine and radio-collared.

Erin White co-authored a paper in the scientific journal PNAS entitled "The 2018 reawakening and eruption dynamics of Steamboat Geyser, the world's tallest active geyser" that was released today.

- Variations in rainfall and snow melt were probably responsible for the changes in timing between eruptions and re-activation of Steamboat Geyser, and possibly for the variable period of other geysers as well.
- In the spring and early summer, with melting snow and rain, the underground water pressure pushes more water into the underground reservoir, providing more hot water to erupt more frequently.
- During winter, with less water, lower groundwater pressure refills the reservoir more slowly, leading to longer periods between eruptions.
- Because the water pushed into the reservoir comes from places even deeper than the reservoir, the water is decades or centuries old before it erupts back to the surface.
- Water shortages and drought can have extreme impacts on geysers.

• Climate change will likely change eruption dynamics over time.

Dan Stahler and company will conduct cougar capture and collaring between now and March 30th. Capture involves the use of trained hounds (typically two dogs wearing GPS tracking/training collars allowing us to recall them when needed) that are released on fresh cougar tracks to tree a cougar for safe darting, handling, and release. The primary capture areas will be in the Black Canyon of the Yellowstone River to Tower, Mount Everts, Sepulcher/Reese Creek area, and Slough/Lamar. Each capture day, Dan will check in with the Comm Center and/or district-specific rangers to report the area they are working in, and check out at the end of the day.

Yellowstone National Park treasure hunter pleads guilty

RODRICK DOW CRAYTHORN, 52, of Syracuse, Utah entered pleas of guilty to charges of excavating or trafficking in archeological resources, and injury or depredation to United States property in U.S. District Court on January 4, 2021. He was indicted by a federal grand jury on September 16, 2020. The indictment alleged that Craythorn was found digging in the Fort Yellowstone Cemetery between October 1, 2019 and May 24, 2020 inside Yellowstone National Park while looking for the treasure buried by Forrest Fenn. By pleading guilty Craythorn admits he is, in fact, guilty of the crimes charged.

"The hunt for the Forrest Fenn treasure was often viewed as a harmless diversion, but in this case it led to substantial damage to important public resources," said US Attorney Mark Klaassen. "The Defendant let his quest for discovery override respect for the law."

Excavating or trafficking in archeological resources carries a potential penalty of up to two years in prison, a fine of up to \$20,000, and one year of supervised release. Injury or depredation to United States Property carries a penalty of not more than ten years imprisonment, up to a \$250,000 fine, and three years of supervised release. Chief U.S. District Court Judge Scott W. Skavdahl accepted Craythorn's plea and scheduled his sentencing on March 17, 2021 in Casper, Wyoming at the Ewing T. Kerr Federal Court House.

FORREST FENN TREASURE HUNTER INDICTED FOR DAMAGE TO YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK

A man claiming to have been seeking the elusive Forrest Fenn treasure has been indicted by a federal grand jury after he was found digging in the historic Fort Yellowstone Cemetery. **RODRICK DOW CRAYTHORN** was indicted on September 16, 2020 on charges of excavating or trafficking in archeological resources and injury or depredation to United States property.

Count one of the indictment alleges Craythorn did knowingly and unlawfully excavate, remove, damage, alter and deface, and attempt to excavate, remove, damage, alter, and deface archeological resources, in particular the Fort Yellowstone Cemetery in Yellowstone National Park between October 1, 2019 and May 24, 2020.

The second count alleges Craythorn, during the same period, did willfully damage, injure, and commit depredation against property belonging to the United States. Craythorn was reported to have been searching for Forrest Fenn's treasure in the Fort Yellowstone Cemetery when these acts allegedly occurred.

Forrest Fenn, an art dealer and author from Santa Fe, hid a treasure chest containing gold, rare coins, jewelry, and gemstones somewhere in the Rocky Mountains. The Fenn treasure spurred a decade long search. Treasure hunters used clues from a book Fenn had written to scour the west hoping to find the fortune. The chest was eventually located in Wyoming in June, 2020. Forrest Fenn passed away several months later.

Craythorn, 52, of Syracuse, Utah, made his initial appearance in Federal Court on October 22, 2020 before Chief Federal Magistrate Judge Kelly H. Rankin and entered a plea of not guilty to both counts. He is set for trial on December 14, 2020 in U.S. District Court in Casper, Wyoming. An indictment is an allegation and Craythorn is presumed innocent until convicted.

Norris Geyser Basin Museum – New Exhibits!

Last week, new exhibits for Norris Geyser Basin Museum were delivered and installed (photos below). The new exhibits replace outdated exhibits from the 1990's and focus on the unique and dynamic hydrothermal geology of Norris Geyser Basin.

Built in 1929, Norris Geyser Basin Museum is one of three Trailside Museums (along with Fishing Bridge and Madison Museums) that were designated National Historic Landmarks in 1982. Their rustic design became known as "Parkitecture," and then as now, they helped visitors learn about the park.

The new exhibits have been updated with the latest science and combined with wayside exhibits throughout Porcelain and Back Basins and a self-guiding booklet, help visitors explore Norris Geyser Basin at their own pace and level of interest.

Old Faithful Visitor Education Center Marks its 10th Anniversary



On August 25, 2010, the new Old Faithful Visitor Education Center was dedicated and opened its doors to welcome visitors from around the world. It achieved the first Gold Level LEED designation for a Yellowstone National Park facility and incorporated sustainable, energy efficient elements that were unique at that time. With massive windows to frame Old Faithful Geyser in eruption, innovative exhibits, web cams, geyser predictions, a Young Scientist exhibit hall, theater, and donor wall of honor, the Old Faithful VEC was an immediate success.

The Yellowstone Park Foundation -- known today as Yellowstone Forever -- raised \$15.1 million of the \$27 million needed for design and construction of the new visitor education center. The \$12 million balance was provided by the NPS Line Item Construction Program. Major corporate and foundation donors include ConocoPhilips, Inc., Unilever, Coca-Cola Foundation, Toyota U.S.A., National Science Foundation, and the Kresge Foundation. Thousands of donations from visitors became part of the story.

A special event on August 24th was held to honor the many whose love for Yellowstone and iconic Old Faithful Geyser made possible a gift to people for decades to come.

Since its opening, the Old Faithful VEC has recorded 13,126,852 visits. Its average annual visitation is greater than that of some 300 NPS sites!


Lake

- Vehicle vs. bison on the East Entrance road vehicle totaled, bison injured.
- One of our Hayden Valley bison (fed up with traffic?) rammed a vehicle stuck in a bison jam, but the bison left the scene before a statement could be taken.

8/19 - started off a wild run of EMS/SAR calls with 4 simultaneous calls, including one that required a carry out from Red Rock Trail in the Canyon.

- Carry out from the North Rim Trail for a broken leg.
- 8/22 SAR for a person over the edge was dispatched out at the brink of the Lower Falls. However, the patient was never located as he was reportedly rescued by "two cowboys with a rope."



(not our actual heroes)

- A camper at Grant, likely high/drunk, threatened the Camp Host. Situation resolved with a mandatory court appearance.
- Three DUIs this week (two in two days!):
 - DUI report by an off-duty cop that led to an arrest on the John D. Rockefeller, Jr., Parkway (JDR) by YELL rangers.

Visitor Services Office:

VSO:

- The office received 586 calls and 207 emails last week. Calls decreased from the week before but remain steady.
- Completed July visitor stats (+2% compared to 2019), briefed the superintendent and public affairs office on the data collection, IRMA's formulas and back-end calculations.

WILDLIFE AND AQUATIC RESOURCES <u>Yellowstone Lake</u>

Lake trout suppression. Total for the week was 12,850 lake trout, bringing the total for the season up to 204,400. Although catch in the small meshes are up slightly overall from last year, they are still lower than this time for the previous 4 years. Much more importantly, we continue to see numbers of larger, older fish decline. Total lake trout catch in large mesh is currently 17,900; compared to the same weeks, it was 24,700 in 2019, 33,200 in 2018, 29,800 in 2017, and 47,400 in 2016. The crew continues checking stomachs for ciscos. No ciscos have been found.

Streams Restoration

The Gibbon River between Little Gibbon Falls and Virginia Cascades was treated with the piscicide Rotenone. During the treatment, the last of the remaining brook trout in this section of river were removed. This was the final year of applying piscicide to this area, paving the way for introducing Arctic grayling and westslope cutthroat trout. Three hundred westslope cutthroat trout were stocked immediately following chemical treatment. Arctic grayling and cutthroat trout were found in abundance during the treatment, indicating that they have been drifting downstream from the Grebe/Wolf Lakes, an area that has been intensively stocked the past three years. We also found westslope cutthroat fry in a tributary near Virginia Cascades, suggesting that the dispersing fish have naturally spawned and are reproducing in this section of the river. With competition from brook trout eliminated, the native species will thrive in the Gibbon River upstream of Virginia Cascades.

Bryce, Dean, Kelsey, and Renee and other agencies in Mammoth/Gardiner were the direct recipients of Ellen's hard work done well.

We had few calls and stops in Lamar and an MVC and 700 did great for us too.

Kaelyn, I just wanted to note one thing (I tried to call you but you were off) as a minor clarification for the motorcycle MVC at Lava Creek.

I believe Kelsey and Renee (on duty patrol) were at Obsidian Cliff with the Forrest Fenn resource guy.

When the MVC happened I believe 700 paged Tower EMS first which is fine as Mammoth or Tower folks will always roll either way in 5 seconds to help.

I do not believe Mammoth EMS was paged first or at all. Bryce and Dean were working out prior to shift and were available as were possibly other on/off duty EMS providers in Mammoth.

Mammoth folks were a lot closer to the scene and I believe as protocol/standard practice should have been paged first due to the proximity of the call to Mammoth.

If Mammoth had no response to the page, or inadequate needs or ALS were not available, or there were multiple patients, sure, page Tower, we're coming!

Tower folks got there as fast as we could based on bison everywhere and the patient was taken care of.

Please do not take this the wrong way, Ellen did a great job yesterday, all day, as did the entire staff in 700.

This one aspect of yesterday's madness could have been important if the patient/incident was more serious in nature.

Thanks - nice job Ellen and all our dispatchers.

Youth Programs Office

• Education staff are gearing up to lead a Gardiner-based Youth Conservation Corps crew from July 6-August 7. Staff are training this week with the Backcountry Office to lead crews in trailhead sign installation in July.

• Education staff were trained last week in Visitor Use Management social science data collection. The Education Specialists and YCC Crew will be assisting with data collection on average 2 days per week this summer.

• A few distance learning programs are still being hosted for school groups this week.

Technology Services

• New Dell Storage Array: Replacement network storage arrays (hard drives) are scheduled for delivery by July 1, 2020. These storage arrays will replace the existing hard drives holding all data for the network drives in Mammoth (G:, I:, K:, N:, O:, P:, U:, V:,

etc.). More information will be provided on scheduling and potential data unavailability as we transition to the new hard drives.

• New Avtec Radio Console Computers/Servers: The radio shop is working with the selected vendor (ACG) to replace 14 Avtec radio dispatch computers and two Gateway servers in the Comm Center, Wildland Fire Dispatch and Telecom. All hardware has exceeded its useful life and is an in-kind replacement on new operating systems. Project completion is expected by July 30. No outages are expected.

• New NON-LE Radios: 300 Motorola APX1000 radios are being shipped. These are the last of the non-encrypted/non-LE radios being purchased on the Radio Upgrade FLREA project.

• New Codan Base Stations: Delivery of 10 new base stations were received in Technology Services / Radio Shop. Factory custom configuration was not up to the Yellowstone requirements so extra time is being spent to change and test equipment settings so it will perform correctly on our system. It is likely we will ask the vendor for consideration.

• **Portable Radio Deliveries:** If you have employees who still need radios/pagers you can email <u>yell_radio_shop@nps.gov</u> to arrange for pickup at the back of Telecom. Or to arrange a delivery to your location, contact VIP Bob Greenburg by

email (<u>bob_Greenburg@partner.nps.gov</u>) or phone (344-2462). The property form for all equipment must be signed by the individual being issued the equipment.

• Underground Utility Locates (One Call)

• Underground utility locates are required anytime the ground is disturbed in developed areas.

• Locates in Recommended Wilderness are only required within 50 feet of any trail head or developed structure, i.e. cabin, gauging station, solar array, etc.

• Mark all dig locations with white paint or white flags **BEFORE** submitting your locate request.

• Allow AT LEAST 3-TO-5 FULL BUSINESS DAYS for all non-emergency locate information submitted here to be organized and called in to WY or MT One Call.

• FOR LARGE LOCATES (i.e. more than 2 separate dig sites), contact Deb Guernsey **at least 7 days in advance** at <u>debra guernsey@nps.gov</u> or 307-344-2470 for instructions on how to submit your Locate request.

• Call 307-344-2470 or 307-344-2070 if you have questions.

• Emergency Locates e.g. broken water/sewer lines, buried power lines, do not require advance notice.

• Locate tickets are valid for 14 days after the legal start time. After 14 days you must resubmit the ticket if you are still digging in the area

Business & Commercial Services

Operations:

The YELL Concessions Team is working to establish its periodic evaluation schedule of all concession contract services offered during the summer season. The team is responsible for conducting evaluations to assess operations relative to the established service standards. The YELL team is implementing a fully collaborative periodic review/contract review process and will be inviting and encouraging other NPS and concession team members (District leadership, etc.) to participate, if available or to provide input, when evaluations are conducted, allowing other perspectives and expertise to benefit the program/partnerships.

Yellowstone currently has 364 Commercial Use Authorizations, consisting of 248 companies, operating for the 2020 season (reported 426 CUAs last week but realized duplication error in database). The park continues to receive inquiries, applications and COVID plans from those wishing to operate. Additionally, the park is receiving a number of inquiries from tour bus companies interesting in operating again. Commercial Services Management has drafted a COVID-19 mitigation plan template to share with interested tour bus companies as they will also be required to submit a plan before they are allowed to operate, and only when the park, State leadership, and Public Health officials determine appropriate. Commercial tour bus operations will be reassessed when the park transitions to Phase III.

Now in Phase II of the park's re-opening plan, many of the concession operations are open and visitor services available, including: cabins with private baths, General Stores, restaurants (providing Grab N Go food only - no sit-down dining, at this point), gift shops, Service Stations - wrecker and repair services - with more coming on-line in the next couple of

weeks including campgrounds, marina services, and trail rides. For the most updated information on facility opening/closing schedules, please see: Example a see: Example a

Resource Education & Youth Programs (REYP)

Field Operations

Field Operations staff at all locations are expanding roving activities. REYP rangers answer questions, educate visitors about park regulations such as staying on trails in thermal areas, watching wildlife from safe (and legal) distances, provide impromptu talks on a full spectrum of park resources and issues, and during this summer of ongoing pandemic response, may encourage visitors to social distance and explain other park recommendations such as wearing masks.

The presence of uniformed NPS employees provides a deterrent to thoughtless or deliberate vandalism. Sign and wayside exhibit inventories and condition assessments are being compiled, and resource conditions are noted. Thermal areas receive careful attention in order to compile long term observations of the behavior of hot springs, geysers, mud pots, and fumaroles, and thermal feature/area vandalism (including objects that accidentally or deliberately find their way into thermal features) is noted and remedied when feasible.

Ranger Observations

Old Faithful

Over the past week the Old Faithful team has noticed that visitation is overall fairly low, with parking lots at OFVEC not filling up or overflowing just yet. However we are starting to see a fair number of vehicles parking at Midway Geyser Basin. We have also noticed that visitors are not social distancing, and crowds are forming out at Old Faithful with various different people gathering together in close proximity. Staff have also noticed an uptick in resource damage, as there have been people marking bacterial mats and walking their dogs on the boardwalks. Few visitors are wearing masks. Rangers are being asked about where visitors can obtain hiking information and Jr. Ranger Booklets.

Lake-Fishing Bridge

Here is Lake we are seeing substantially reduced visitation, and anecdotally, an uptick in local visitors from 11 and 22 counties. Few people are wearing masks, but many are social distancing appropriately. My staff are using the techniques they learned from Joe Bueter to encourage a safe distance with verbal and physical cues.

I'd say larger animal jams are one of the riskier things happening since we have so many people competing for space in a small area. We're also seeing some issues with the one-way directional signage at Mud Volcano. While most people are following the signs, when bison block the boardwalk visitors are then conflicted about whether to pass too close to the bison or turn around and walk the wrong way.

Additionally, we're working on getting Bridge Bay Ranger Station running as a contact station. It's been set up so that visitors can queue outside and we can still speak to them through a window that's been fitted with lexan and sell boat permits, answer questions, etc. We plan to have that staffed 8-12 once Bridge Bay Campground opens on Wednesday. So far, we've done two trial runs which have gone very well.

Mammoth

Visitation around Mammoth seemed to increase this last week as did the number of resource warnings. The majority of the warnings were due to visitors approaching elk. I witnessed a near miss, where an elk charged and stopped short of a young boy. While running away the boy stumbled and cartwheeled away from the danger.

COVID related - Request for Junior Rangers is increasing as more families arrive in park. Most visitors are not wearing masks, but groups are physical distancing on the boardwalks.

Norris

General observations are that about 1/4 of visitors are wearing masks, 90% of them are social distancing. No negative interactions.

<u>General</u>

On Friday, June 12, Steamboat Geyser erupted for the 100th time since this cycle of eruptive activity began in 2018.

Training continues, with sessions on workplace culture (Green Dot training), CPR and First Aid, and required DOI training making up the majority of training assignments. De-escalation Training is also being modified to better align with the visitation of Yellowstone NP and sessions will be offered throughout summer.

Distribution of bear safety and bear education materials is underway parkwide.

New designs for NPS bulletin board displays have been developed and are being distributed. These will clean up the often chaotic appearance of posted flyers; provide easier maintenance when materials become faded, stained, or torn; and provide consistency and accuracy of prioritized messaging.

North June 7th to June 13th

On June 8th a grizzly bear killed an elk calf on the Parade Grounds in front of Officer's Row and while being hazed out of the area, ran behind officer's row and the Admin. Building before being hazed out of the developed area.

More elk calves being born – closed off several different areas temporarily to protect people from angry cows. Lots of people being charged.

Multiple Mandatory Appearance VNs issued for separate incidents of possession of natural resources, including antlers and obsidian from Obsidian Cliff.

NPS employee reported a drone being flown around Upper Terraces, unable to locate which delayed flight operations at the helibase for several minutes.

Steamboat geyser erupted for the 100th time since its recent period of frequent activity starting in 2018. Eruption occurred on Friday evening around 11:00pm. Reports that people would be OB camping to witness the event were curtailed by LE presence or bad weather.

Multiple mandatory VN's issued for reckless motorcycle: speed, traffic control device, interference, skull and antlers, no BC permit.

Lots of bear jams around Tower and wolf activity around Slough Creek.

MVC's - car vs bison near Buffalo ranch, no injuries but bison was killed, car towed. - 2 vehicle minor MVC at bear jam Tower Hill - vehicle almost backed over the edge Floating Island Lake, used engine 6 to stabilize until tow truck arrived.

- axle broke on snowmobile trailer Hubbard Hill, traffic control until tow arrived.

Agency Assists - lockout in Cooke City

- Cooke City medical - transport patient to Livingston.

- Cooke City medical, patient refused transport prior to NPS arrival.

Maintenance installed a 2nd vault restroom at entrance to Slough Creek.

West June 7th to June 13th

West Incidents/LE:

- Two adults and child ran across the thermal bacteria mats within the Grand Prismatic boardwalk loop creating resource damage. Cited mandatory appearance. Investigation ongoing.

• EMS program staff are operational at Madison and Old Faithful. They will provide EMS service at the EMT and Paramedic levels.

West Resource/Other:

- West District Traffic Ranger worked 10 traffic jams, assisted with projects and incidents.
- Madison Campground VIP hosts arrived and have begun training and orientation.

- New West district SAR cache cleaned and organized
- Bison have been moving across the landscape (in and out of the park).
- Trail clearing continues in lower elevation backcountry areas not clogged with snow.

Administration

<u>Central Backcountry Office</u>

• Preparing for remote backcountry permit issuing when the park opens to backcountry camping on June 15.

- Calls for information increased significantly once the announcement was made that backcountry camping would open on June 15.
- Created and added 10-day backcountry campsite availability calendar to the backcountry camping page on the park website. The calendar is updated daily by CBCO staff.

CommCenter

The past week the Yellowstone Interagency center handled 759 calls for service as compared to 771 in 2019, 826 in 2018, 769 in 2017 and 1031 in 2016. We answered 1276 phone calls (all of which were answered within a 5 second period) of which 52 were 911 calls and 1224 were administrative in nature. Last year we answered 1266 total phone calls of which 125 were 911 and 1141 were administrative in nature.

Total calls for service included 231 traffic stops, 50 camping out of bonds, and 4 thermal trespass calls.

Visitor Services/Fees

Fees:

• Parkwide visitation has been steadily increasing during the 2nd week of full reopening, with an average visitation this past week of 67% of 2019 levels. The weekend was busier, with 90% of 2019 on Saturday and 83% of 2019 on Sunday.

• The VSO staff are reviewing current fee rates and doing comparability studies for campgrounds, fishing permits, boat permits, and special use permit fees.

VSO:

- The VSO team answered a record of 1,018 phone calls last week. (This is a 224% increase from the same week in 2019 with 453 calls.) The team answered 158 emails. Thanks to Albright staff for helping us out in the office!
- The majority of visitor calls are asking if the park is open, if reservations are required for entrance, and if campgrounds and other facilities are open.

SUPs:

- Working with religious organizations to revise service schedules, so far the LDS and Catholic groups have cancelled for the season. ACMP has sent a revised schedule and have yet to hear from the 7th Day Adventists.
- Newly revised SUP webpage is live!
- Rachel continues to work with REYP and GIS to create a First Amendment Handout and updates for the web. Will run by DRs for final approval before released.
- We are starting to issue permits for weddings and church services for groups of 10 or less.
- Effective immediately, all new wedding requests for the chapel will require a wedding permit in addition to a reservation. Weddings that already have reservations are grandfathered in; weddings cancelled due to COVID, have a year to reschedule without the additional permit requirement. Thanks to the chapel committee for their continued upkeep and management of the historic building.
- Old Faithful Cycle Yellowstone tour just applied for their annual fall ride from West Yellowstone to Old Faithful; Rachel will be working with West DR and CRO to determine if an event this size will be allowed this year.

Film:

- Expedited permit for KGB out of Jackson Hole to shoot non-thermal b-roll for GoRV over the weekend; they were shooting a ski video in the Beartooths and wanted some Yellowstone footage. Rachel coordinated with the USFS to ensure permit compliance across agencies.
- Cornell Lab of Ornithology has revised their filming application which they cancelled in March to film Clark's Nutcrackers, staff and researchers. They will be filming non-thermal b-roll in June and film with talent at a later date.
- Multiple annual film permit renewals

Wildland Fire

- Helicopter 3BH is pre-positioned at Montrose, Colorado for fire response with a crew of 8.
- Hazard fuels reduction work at Northeast Entrance continues.
- Remote Automated Weather Station yearly maintenance and fire effects plot data recording continues.

Yellowstone Center for Resources (YCR)

CULTURAL RESOURCES

• Kudos to all emergency staff that responded to the freon leak at the HRC. Everyone from dispatch to first responders (IC, fire truck, ambulance) all reacted quickly and really cared about not only the safety of the building but also the safety and welfare for all personnel in the building. Marty/maint. also responded quickly to assess the problem and ensure that the leak was stopped and assess what was needed to fix the problem. A great team effort!

GEOLOGY AND HYDROLOGY

- In coordination with Ray McPadden (YELL's Wild & Scenic River Coordinator), park hydrologist Erin White and hydrology intern Maddie McKeefry collaborated with staff from YELL's RVP, GRTE's RVP, USGS, NPS-WRD, and USFS to acquire the first set of acoustic doppler current profile (ADCP) measurements on the Lewis and Snake Rivers Tuesday June 2. These data were collected to support flow quantification for the Wild and Scenic River designated segments in YELL. YCR staff thank YELL & GRTE RVP for their extraordinary support and coordination. The next ADCP measurement is Tuesday June 9.
- The Reese Creek pipeline project was completed on June 5. A final walk-through with stakeholders occurred on May 29 with YCR staff Ann Rodman, Stefanie Wacker, and Erin White.
- Madeline (Maddie) McKeefry, Hydrology Assistant, joined the YCR last week from the USGS NOROCK in Bozeman. Maddie will work with Erin White through the end of November. Please welcome Maddie to YELL!

SCIENCE COMMUNICATION

- The 2019 Bear Report was published online and a subset of the reports will be printed.
- The 2019 Fisheries Report is in production.
- Working on the first all digital edition of *Yellowstone Science* focusing on grazing. Look for this issue in late June!

VEGETATION AND RESOURCE MANAGEMENT OPERATIONS

• Hazard tree removal is continuing in campgrounds (CGs). RMOps staff felled 27 trees in Norris CG this week. Indian Crk, Slough Crk, and Pebble Crk. CGs will be done June 22-25. All Xanterra campgrounds, but Bridge Bay have been assessed and that information has been passed or is being passed onto Xanterra. Bridge Bay will be surveyed 6/10.

• A lot of timber is recovered this way – RMOps would like to coordinate with/engage in the park's firewood program/plan.

WILDLIFE AND AQUATIC RESOURCES

Lake trout suppression. Over 75,100 lake trout have been removed from the Yellowstone Lake population, with 22,040 of those removed this past week . At this time last year, we had removed just 68,100. We were able to get started earlier this year, thus have had more nets in the water compared to this time last year. However, catch rates in both small and large meshes are down slightly compared to this time last year: small mesh catch per unit effort (cpue) was 7.8 lake trout per net night fished in 2019 and 7.2 in 2020; large mesh cpue equaled 1.7 lake trout per net night fished in 2019 and 1.5 in 2020. Both are good signs, but it is too early in the season to say anything definitive.

Both Hickey Brothers and NPS crews fished large mesh in the non-motorized zone of South Arm this week. This is an area where we find gravid fish in the fall but have not located a specific spawning site. We were able to tag and release 7 lake trout. These along with others tagged in previous years could help with the question of where those fish are spawning. One loon was seen in the closed area well west of the netted area and one was heard calling south of Peale Island, also well away from the netted area.

The NPS lake trout removal crew gillnetted 2,031 lake trout from both the South and Southeast Arms this past week. Large mesh accounted for 461 of these fish. Catches have been dropping in the larger meshes, those nets have been taken out of the water and replaced with smaller mesh, which is the reason for increase in catch with little increase in effort. Gillnetting occurred M-F, with almost all work happening on the boat Cutthroat. The Cutthroat has been running well and Nathan Mansor has been doing most of the captaining.

Lake trout telemetry. Tagging occurred 4 days this week with 21 lake trout receiving surgically implanted acoustic tags. To date, 3 tagged lake trout have been recovered this year. The first was a mature female originally tagged in 2016 whose tag was no longer working. Unfortunately, the other 2 were fish tagged in the last 2 weeks. Total tagged for the season is currently 35 still in the lake. The north portions of Breeze Channel and West Thumb were tracked on Wednesday. Locations were obtained for 8 lake trout. Tracking was cut short for Covid-19 testing. A map with location and depths was produced and given to Hickey Brothers netters the same day.

Stream Restoration

Streams crew was in upper Pebble Creek for the week collecting YCT for spawning. 17 adult female and 32 adult male YCT were collected and held in live cars for later spawning. Crews will head back in on Monday. Staff from MTFWP Big Timber Hatchery will also go to Pebble Creek and hopefully spawn the YCT on Tuesday (16th). USFWS personal will be on hand on Tuesday to collect tissue samples for a complete health analysis of the system. (NPS staff will not be camped with biologists from outside YNP and will wear masks and maintain safe distancing while working)

Bison Restoration

This winter 105 bison were entered into the Rehoming Program as an alternative to being sent to slaughter. YNP captured 548 bison at the Stephens Creek Facility during February-March 2020 to reduce conflicts when large numbers of bison migrate out of the park. The 105 bison will undergo a 1-2.5 year quarantine for brucellosis before being transferred to the Fort Peck Tribes

YCR and Corrals staff completed installation of 1,700 of 5' woven wire fence needed to separate animals into separate pens for males and females. Animals must be separated by two fences ten feet a part to prevent nose-to-nose contact and potential disease transmission. Completion of this benchmark will allow us to begin the multiyear testing program, which involves catching and blood-testing each animal for brucellosis every 30 days this summer.

YCR, Corrals, and Special Projects staff completed installing feeding infrastructure needed to keep bison healthy. Bison are fed high quality alfalfa pellets to simulate the nutritious foods they would get in the park, but cannot get while in the 10-20 acre quarantine pens. Making this happen included laying a 16' x 16' gravel foundation and installing a 30 ton overhead feed silo. The silo is adjacent to the quarantine pens and visible from Highway 89N about mile marker 5. Each week, YCR and Corrals staff fill 6 wheeled feeders each holding 2 tons of pellets and provide another 10 tons of long-stem grass hay to the bison.

Trumpeter Swan Restoration

As part of a long-term trumpeter swan restoration program, two swan territories - Swan and Grebe lakes - had artificial eggs deposited under incubating females. The live eggs, taken from the nest, will be placed in an incubator. In approximately two weeks, live swan cygnets will be brought back and placed under the female on the nest. They will be raised by that pair as normal. This procedure has been done many times with swans and has been successful previously at Grebe Lake. The purpose is to reduce mortality due to predation and failure due to nest flooding, both previously documented during the incubation phase. Once the swan population is no longer in danger of extirpation, this practice will end. This is a public/private partnership with Ricketts Conservation Fund and the Wyoming Wetlands Society.

• **Mount Holmes Repeater:** Went down Sunday morning. Flight scheduled during Tuesday weather window cancelled due to weather. On Wednesday, found and replaced a bad transmitter. Back on line at 1000.

• Norris Network and Phones down Friday June 5: A ticket was submitted to CenturyLink Friday to repair the T1 circuit that supports network/phone circuits. Circuit including network and phones back up on June 10.

• **Diamond Communications Fiber Optic Network Proposal:** Diamond Communications began burying fiber optic cable in Moose Wyoming last week. Yellowstone is in contact with Diamond Communications on a regular basis regarding their application for 192 miles of fiber optic network along Yellowstone road corridors.

• **East Entrance Network:** Josh and Jerry installed temporary 300' cable on the ground between the Ranger Station and Entrance Station to bypass the poor wireless network extender. Network to entrance station improved with the temp cable. The in-house trenching/fiber optic project will occur when all materials and equipment for the project arrive in Yellowstone.

• AccessParks application for Xanterra Wi-Fi: The second public comment period on the effect to historic properties has gained a lot of attention again. The need for a second period of public comment is due to the applicant releasing more information to be shown to the public.

• **Grant and Lake Verizon:** Grant Verizon continues have microwave link issues between the cell site and Mount Washburn. Lake Verizon has not been cut over to the new higher capacity Verizon circuit yet. Both locations continue to suffer from dismal service. If you have a personal cell phone and live at Grant or Lake, we encourage you

to call Verizon customer service and report poor service in your area of residence. Telecom has been contacting Verizon engineers on a regular basis to complain about poor service and we encourage them to complete their planned improvements. While it is in Verizon's best interest to meet the needs of their wireless customers, the NPS has no authority to require them to do so other than the authority to terminate their permit upon expiration or for abandonment.

• **Dan Downing retired last week:** and we miss him already. Dan was a great asset to the radio shop and to the Branch of Technology. If you need radio assistance, email John Darr and Trent Coppinger at <u>yell_radio_shop@nps.gov</u>.

• **Portable Radio Deliveries:** If you have employees who still need radios/pagers you can email <u>yell radio shop@nps.gov</u> to arrange for pickup at the back of Telecom. Or to arrange a delivery to your location, contact VIP Bob Greenburg by

Business & Commercial Services

Operations:

426 CUAs have been processed to date for 2020 and 155 COVID operating plans have been reviewed and acknowledged (many CUA holders hold multiple authorizations thus 426 CUAs / 166 COVID plans). There are a couple more COVID plans to review that were received over the weekend. 18 Stock Outfitter concessioner COVID plans have been reviewed and acknowledged; 1 is pending review and acknowledgement. All commercial operators must present their authorization letter (acknowledgement) at the entrance station to confirm COVID plan submittal and gain entry.

The park's Concessions Management and Back Country Offices coordinated a spring meeting via conference call with Saddle and Pack Stock contract holders on Tuesday, June 2. The call allowed for concession contract and back country office updates prior to operating season. Fifteen stock contractors attended the conference call meeting. Two contract holders, to date, have advised they are not operating this year due to health concerns.

WASO has released a memo announcing an extension of the moratorium on releasing concession contract opportunities through July 30, 2020. The park found information on the WASO memo on the public commercial services site and expects to receive information regarding same at the park level in the very near future. The memo states "As we continue to consider the consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic on park operations, travel restrictions, and group gathering restrictions and work to develop a fair and consistent approach for managing prospectuses Servicewide, we have determined to continue the moratorium on releasing solicitations for concession contracts and leases through July 30, 2020. We may extend this moratorium as the situation continues to evolve." YELL has two concession contracts currently in prospectus development and awaiting release: YELL002 (retail, food and beverage - general stores) and YELL004 (automotive service stations, towing). The park is following up with WASO for guidance specific to these two contracts. More to come...

As reported previously, James Lewis will EOD at YELL later this week as a Concessions Management Specialist. Jim was most recently a Park Ranger, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in Evansville, Indiana, and holds a Bachelor's Degree in Natural Resources/Conservation from the University of Alabama.

Asset Management:

The final punch list inspection at the Lake Lodge Kitchen project took place on Monday (June 8) after being rescheduled from last week. The certificate of occupancy was signed Friday for the Lake Lodge.

The roofing project at Mammoth building M8 next to the Haynes building will begin this week.

We are expecting a report on Laurel Dorm from an environmental contractors testing of the

facility this week or next, which should disclose the effectiveness of mitigation measures put in place last fall to address moisture concerns.

Facility Management and Operations

COMPOSTABLES - The park is, once again, collecting residential compostables from bins located at the Mammoth Community Center (MCC), and Mammoth Hotel/Aspen Dorm recycling sites. If you collect compostables at home, or in the office, please bag-it and deposit inside the designated bins.

The park can only collect residential compostables from the Mammoth area and does not provide in-house collection containers. Individuals wishing to haul their residential or office compostables from the interior, to deposit in a Mammoth bin, are welcome to do so.

Compostables are collected annually, June 1-October 1, from park restaurants, employee dining rooms, the MCC, and the Mammoth Hotel/Aspen Dorm sites. Last year 555 tons were collected (instead of going to the landfill) and mixed with wood chips to create compost at the West Yellowstone Compost Facility. The material is utilized by area construction contractors, Gardiner/Mammoth Earth Day give-away, and some park projects. He worked in Yosemite as a Wilderness Education and Outreach Ranger, and recently completed a detail in Shenandoah National Park as the Acting Wilderness and Backcountry Manager. Ken has worked in Interpretation at Katmai, Everglades and Great Basin, as a VUA at the Grand Canyon, and in various positions with the Forest Service. His broad experience will be valuable in his new role leading the REYP Training Academy, where he will facilitate Resource Education training for partners and NPS employees, resource and issuesfocused education forums, and coaching for CUA guides and partners. Ken's two children Sasa (8) and Micah (4) are settling in with all the new friends they have found at the park. Ken enjoys hiking, wildlife viewing, building unusual LEGO creations for the kids and woodworking.

Field Operations

Field Operations staff at all locations are expanding roving activities. REYP rangers answer questions, educate visitors about park regulations such as staying on trails in thermal areas, watching wildlife from safe (and legal) distances, provide impromptu talks on a full spectrum of park resources and issues, and during this summer of ongoing pandemic response, may encourage visitors to social distance and explain other park recommendations such as wearing masks.

The presence of uniformed NPS employees provides a deterrent to thoughtless or deliberate vandalism. Sign and wayside exhibit inventories and condition assessments are being compiled, and resource conditions are noted. Thermal areas receive careful attention in order to compile long term observations of the behavior of hot springs, geysers, mud pots, and fumaroles, and thermal feature/area vandalism (including objects that accidentally or deliberately find their way into thermal features) is noted and remedied when feasible.

Field Operations – Ranger Observations

Lake – Fishing Bridge:

Worked a bear jam and it was fairly calm and very manageable. Visitors were pretty mindful of others space and mostly kept together in the group they were in. Some of the wildlife photographers were a little more cozy, but not bad. One or two did have masks.

- Roved LeHardy Rapids and observed people at Mud Volcano. At LeHardy only a few groups passed through besides the wildlife photographers shooting shots of the Harlequin ducks.
- At Mud Volcano, observations were made from the opposite side of the parking lot to view the lower loop and the lower part of the upper loop. 95 percent of visitors were following the directional signage. There were large and small groups of people but most of them were spread out and following the signs. About 15 people were wearing masks.
- Families with kids asked for stickers. Pleasant interactions.
- Overall most visitors were following guidelines. Family groups do not social distance but would not expect them to. Visitors were from Colorado and West Virginia.

Resource and Visitor Protection (RVP)

<u>CRO</u>

On June 1, 2020, Yellowstone-Grand Teton Special Response Team (GRTE SRT) received a request from Deputy Chief of Operations and Policy, Lena Pace. The request was to supplement U.S. Park Police (USPP) personnel in Washington, D.C., with the violent protests associated with the George Floyd tragedy. On June 2, 2020, GRTE SRT traveled to Washington, D.C., and began working on June 3, 2020. GRTE SRT provided 5 team members to the operational request. The team consisted of Ryan Bock (YELL), Dan Kowalski (YELL), Gabe Gassman (YELL), Brad Griest (GRTE) and Jake Olson (ISB).

Because of GRTE SRT's previous relationship with USPP SWAT, the teams were integrated and formed one team. The team acted as a quick reaction force located in Lafayette Square. The mission was to protect and maintain a safe distance from the White House fence replacement/reconstruction project for demonstrators to safely exercise their first amendment rights.

Building on a previous training partnership, SRT integrated seamlessly with the SWAT team and was able to provide additional less lethal capabilities and tactical assets.

A majority of the violent and destructive portions of the demonstrations were completed by Tuesday night. GRTE SRT participated in no significant less lethal deployments and assisted with a major incident involving two national guardsmen being struck by lightning in Lafayette Square.

As of Monday, June 8th, the five team members contributed a total of over 380 hours in both Lafayette Square and East Executive Avenue as an integrated unit with USPP SWAT

DISTRICTS

Backcountry

- The outfitter meeting occurred on Tuesday morning.
- Canyon, Lake, and Snake River Staff completed backcountry specific training this week. Clearing trail with hand tools, and hanging food-poles on Monday and Tuesday. This was completed along the east shore of Yellowstone Lake and at campsite 7L8 on the Flat Mountain arm, so that we could take advantage of doing needed work as a part of the training. Kayak training was completed on Thursday. Completed repair work on the Canyon Corrals on Wednesday.
- Mammoth and Tower operations picked up their stock early in the week. Both operations are out clearing trails. The north end trails opened for day use on Monday.
- The last LE seasonal EOD'd this week at West. West crew is clearing trails.
- Bechler staff finished moving from West to Bechler. Bechler area and trails opened on Monday. Bechler staff worked on backcountry specific training.

Lake

A coyote was hazed at West Thumb. The coyote was not actively engaging with visitors, but it was very comfortable with human presence. It was weaving under the boardwalk with visitors above it without any fear.



Reports of a wolf between Chittenden Bridge and Mud Volcano have been coming in. The wolf is becoming aggressive towards humans. Direction for aggressive hazing for this wolf has been issued and may save the animal.

Brink of the Upper Falls opened to the public this week. The end section of railing was not part of the contract, so rangers and maintenance teamed up to clean the area of construction debris. Together they also constructed buck and rail fencing along a portion of the walk that was considered hazardous so the area could open.



A crane tipped over while working on the new bridge in the Pelican area. EMS, Structural Fire, and Law Enforcement responded. The contractors were able to get the equipment back in an upright state with the use of tie downs and forklifts. No one was injured in the incident.



We are in the process of finishing our orientation for seasonals and two newer seasonals have started R.O.E. Two permanents are also headed back to FLETC and FTEP respectively.

<u>North</u>

2 significant elk incidents this week:

- Xanterra employee suffered broken/dislocated shoulder after falling while being chased by an angry cow elk. The elk did not make physical contact with him. Multiple employees spent several hours monitoring the elk which were chasing people in the area. One elk was bear sprayed twice.
- A seasonal Medcor employee was charged by an elk behind HRC while walking her dog. Deployed bear spray 4 separate times to keep the elk back. The elk struck and killed her dog. Employee remained trapped for several minutes until a Park County Deputy was able to get her safely away after being trapped himself.

Lots of elk hazing and close calls around Xanterra cabin, rec hall, and hotel area over multiple days.

12 Fire calls for Mammoth fire this week, including 4 calls in one day.

• Propane leak in lower Mammoth – assisted by Tower Fire Company / Refrigerant leak in the HRC Bldg / truck backed over electrical transformer box near Xanterra Warehouse / Smoke in the Mammoth Hotel Map Room

5 Ambulance transports to Livingston this week + 2 ALS mutual transports with Gardiner ambulance.

Kelsey Bauer and Casey Lewis are now endorsed as Park Medics and doing ALS runs with other providers to get checked off.

Several separate contacts and several VN's issued for closure violations at Boiling River.

4 Resource-related VN's issued and 3 Possession of Controlled Substance VN's issued this week.

Lots of out of bounds campers throughout the district.

Plenty of bear and wolf activity in Lamar.

MVA - Truck & fifth wheel trailer off road near Tower Jct. - no injuries.

Old Gardiner Road opened for the season.

West

West Incidents/LE:

• Report of hit and run crash on Highway 191 in construction zone, vehicle located by West PD resulting in pursuit through West Yellowstone, then out of town on Highway 20 and into Idaho. Vehicle spike stripped near Ashton, ID. Suspect arrested on Felony eluding charges and DUI. • Opening day out of bounds camper at Madison Junction with possession of controlled substance, resource damage from illegal fire, food storage violations, rock collecting and driving off road.


• Rollover crash on West Entrance Road. No injury. Driver left scene and was likely DUI. Mutual aid from Hebgen Basin Fire and EMS and West PD.

• Consent contact (visitor pulled up to rangers to ask for directions) was subsequently arrested for drug DUI. DRE later concluded medical rule out for a medical condition. Driver was un-arrested and cited for possession of controlled substance.

• Protest sign in reference to George Floyd placed at Yellowstone entrance sign on west entrance road.

• Mutual Aid assistance to Gallatin County Sheriff's Office for multiday SAR involving lost dementia patient. Patient located in remote, steep, forested terrain at dusk and extricated via short haul.





• Other incidents: Multiple forest Fenn treasure hunters (Fenn announced the treasure has been found!), visitor vehicle lockout, bear in Old Faithful developed area, unattended vehicle parked multiple days in park and report of tour buses at Old Faithful.

• Other citations/MA's: Multiple for speed (one at 93 mph in a 55 mph), suspended license (x2), out of bounds camping, possession of controlled substance and food storage violation.

• Warnings: multiple for speed, expired registration, failure to maintain lane

- Montana State DOT repaying project ongoing along Hwy 191 within the park. Reduced speed to 35 mph and one lane closures 24 hours a day.
- Lots of traffic on the Bechler/Cave Falls road. Bechler Ranger Station now accessible to wheeled vehicles. Seeing increased traffic in Bechler area.
- Bechler staff have moved into Bechler Ranger Station.
- Rangers completing required training, orienting new employees, summer prep, etc.

West EMS/Fire:

- Ambulance Status: Old Faithful 18 and 14 in service at Old Faithful. Medic 20 in service at Madison.

- Bison have been moving across the landscape (in and out of the park).

- Administrative Staff sending out monthly budget reports and working on spending plans with program managers.

Central Backcountry Office

- Preparing for remote backcountry permit issuing when the park opens to backcountry camping on June 15.
- Marked and submitted line locates for trailhead installations in preparation for training YCC staff and installing trailhead exhibits later this month.
- Concessions Management and the Central Backcountry Office typically conduct an annual meeting with the commercial stock outfitters in early June. This year the meeting took place as a conference call on June 2.
- Developed maps and signs for closures in the Tower/Canyon and Gardiner's Hole areas.

Comm Center

This past week the Yellowstone Interagency center handled 618 calls for service as compared to 822 in 2019, 765 in 2018, 740 in 2017 and 896 in 2016. We answered 1104 phone calls (all of which were answered within a 5 second period) of which 49 were 911 calls and 1055 were administrative in nature. Last year we answered 950 total phone calls of which 107 were 911 and 843 were administrative in nature.

Total calls for service included 187 traffic stops, 37 camping out of bounds, and 4 thermal trespass calls.

The center is still down one seasonal dispatcher due to background check not being completed.

• Kristen spent Wed. 6/3 at the South Entrance Station, meeting with the team and learning the operation. She also met with AIS inspectors at Lewis Lake and Bridge Bay.

VSO:

- The VSO team answered 682 calls last week and 143 emails.
- We've started seeing an increase in callers asking if they need a reservation to enter the park.
- We also learned that some callers are seeing an outdated version of our website if they have the websites cached on their phone or computer. If the site has been opened before in certain browsers, the browser defaults to the last time the page was opened, which is now outdated information. Many callers stated they saw on the website that we were closed and called to ask if we were open. We're recommending callers refresh their webpages and that seems to work.

Everyone from dispatch to first responders (IC, fire truck, ambulance) all reacted quickly and really cared about not only the safety of the building but also the safety and welfare for all personnel in the building. Marty/maint. also responded quickly to assess the problem and ensure that the leak was stopped and assess what was needed to fix the problem. A great team effort!
- Cultural Resources and Technology staff held an onsite pre-construction meeting with VIKOR (a Verizon sub-contractor) and Summit Sealants to discuss the rehabilitation of the historic Mt. Washburn Fire Lookout. Participants discussed materials, logistics, strategy, safety and timelines. The rehabilitation of the lookout is one of several mitigation measures that resulted from the compliance process for the up-grades and telecommunication mounting structure at Mt. Washburn

GEOLOGY AND HYDROLOGY

• In coordination with Ray McPadden (YELL's Wild & Scenic River Coordinator), park hydrologist Erin White and hydrology intern Maddie McKeefry collaborated

with staff from YELL's RVP, GRTE's RVP, USGS, NPS-WRD, and USFS to acquire the first set of acoustic doppler current profile (ADCP) measurements on the Lewis and Snake Rivers Tuesday June 2. These data were collected to support flow quantification for the Wild and Scenic River designated segments in YELL. YCR staff thank YELL & GRTE RVP for their extraordinary support and coordination. The next ADCP measurement is Tuesday June 9.

- The Reese Creek pipeline project was completed on June 5. A final walk-through with stakeholders occurred on May 29 with YCR staff Ann Rodman, Stefanie Wacker, and Erin White.
- Madeline (Maddie) McKeefry, Hydrology Assistant, joined the YCR last week from the USGS NOROCK in Bozeman. Maddie will work with Erin White through the end of November. Please welcome Maddie to YELL!

SCIENCE COMMUNICATION

- The 2019 Bear Report was published online and a subset of the reports will be printed.
- The 2019 Fisheries Report is in production.
- Working on the first all digital edition of *Yellowstone Science* focusing on grazing. Look for this issue in late June!

VEGETATION AND RESOURCE MANAGEMENT OPERATIONS

- Hazard tree removal is continuing in campgrounds (CGs). RMOps staff felled 27 trees in Norris CG this week. Indian Crk, Slough Crk, and Pebble Crk. CGs will be done June 22-25. All Xanterra campgrounds, but Bridge Bay have been assessed and that information has been passed or is being passed onto Xanterra. Bridge Bay will be surveyed 6/10.
 - A lot of timber is recovered this way RMOps would like to coordinate with/engage in the park's firewood program/plan.

WILDLIFE AND AQUATIC RESOURCES

Wolves: Continued hazing of several habituated wolves in the Hayden and Lamar valleys.

Yellowstone Lake

Lake trout tagging: Original plans for 2020 lake trout telemetry monitoring called for tagging 188 lake trout. With current staff and budget reductions, this number was reduced to 77 for this field season. This week, with three days of tagging, we were able to equip 16 lake trout with acoustic transmitters. Analysis of a fin clip from each fish will allow a positive sex identification, which is important during spawning tracking. Fin clips with be submitted to a lab in Idaho at the end of tagging for this analysis.

Lake trout gillnetting: Catch rates are dropping in all meshes as is usual after the first few weeks after ice-off. Typically they will continue to drop until the adults start their spawning movements in mid August. Overall catches are lower than seen in the last few years. Catch rates are very similar to what we've seen for this time of year in small meshes and down slightly in the larger meshes.

The NPS lake trout suppression crew caught 807 lake trout in gill nets this week. Gill nets were predominantly large mesh and all set in the South Arm. One boat was gillnetting M-F. The crew

has been starting at 5 am, which has allowed them to be off the water by early afternoon as the wind picks up.

Total lake trout removed: 53,927 with a catch rate of 5.8 fish per net. Last year at this time, crews had removed 45,140 lake trout with a catch rate of 6.1 per net. This is based on about a 19% increase in effort over this time last year, primarily due to ice off conditions between years.

Weather and boats: Saturday, at 5:30 am, crews were met with 3-foot waves and winds gusting up to 30 mph, so 3 of the 4 Hickey Brothers crews left their nets for another day. The fourth crew, working in the West Thumb, was in a fairly protected area of the lake and were able to lift their nets.

Lake trout fry trapping: Traps were set for lake trout fry at Thomas Bank, Carrington Island, Olson Reef, and FMA Elbow and 63 fry (total length ranged from 22 - 29 mm) were collected (3 at Olson Reef, 60 at Thomas Bank). Electrofishing for lake trout fry occurred at Carrington Island and Thomas Bank and 0 fry were collected. One 600' gillnet with 1/4" bar measure (micromesh) was set for 24 hours just east of Olson Reef and captured one juvenile lake trout 85mm in total length. These young lake trout will be analyzed to estimate hatch dates at Yellowstone Lake spawning sites.

Temperature logger stringers were set at the four historic plankton sampling sites (West Thumb, South East of Stevenson (Main Basin), South Arm, and Southeast Arm). These data are analyzed for long-term monitoring of abiotic conditions (DO and temperature) within Yellowstone Lake.

Stream Restoration

Communicated with Chris Phillips at Montana Fish Wildlife & Parks Fish Hatchery in Big Timber to establish tentative schedule for stocking Grayling fry in upper Grayling Creek in September.

Westslope cutthroat trout gametes were collected from the Sun Ranch brood pond and are being reared at the hatchery there for stocking to the upper Gibbon River tributaries.

Crew made a day trip into upper Pebble Creek to assess YCT spawning condition. Snow and water were high and water temperature was low. Fish sampled were not ready to spawn. Will reassess next week. Gametes will be collected to supplement the state of Montana YCT broodstock. This brood source will be used in the Buffalo Creek restoration.

I wanted to take a moment and fill you all in about ongoing conversations I have had with the FBI PIO regarding the Vallow investigation and search in the park.

- The FBI PIO, Sandra Barker, reached out to me about a month ago and said that she was interested in disseminating a news release at some point in time about the ongoing investigation and search in Yellowstone. Her logic was that she had and continues to receive media inquiries about the search and wants to acknowledge publicly that a search occurred in the park. I concurred with her that we too had received inquiries.
- At that time, she asked about a joint release between the FBI and YELL. The release would acknowledge the search in the park and remind park visitors not to conduct their own search (if possible, we want to avoid the Forrest Fenn syndrome).
- I agreed with her that a joint release would be ideal.
- A few weeks ago, ISB Chris Smith and I spoke (he had received a media inquiry from the Fox News Crime Stories with Nancy Grace show about the search) and Chris also suggested a public statement to Yellowstone visitors. Chris is my ISB contact for now while Les is on a detail.
- Chris and I drafted language and shared it with Sandra.
- Now, Sandra is in the process of drafting the release. Once complete, she will share it with me. I will then share it with all of you, Chris Smith, and per Chris's request Kathy Kupper at WASO Comms, so that you can react to it, edit it, etc.
- Sandra and my tentative plan is to push send on the release as the search in Yellowstone wraps up (so as not to compromise the search and bring undue attention to the searchers). Sandra will make the release public and then Yellowstone will share it with employees, partners, and news media (our process will be the same as when we shared the 1st FBI Vallow release). If Sandra and I get multiple inquiries while the search is ongoing, we may push send during the search. There have been leaks in this investigation and because it is so high profile, we both anticipate a leak that could lead to media asks either before or during the search.
- Once the release is public, Yellowstone's response to all media inquiries will be that this
 is an ongoing investigation and we'll redirect reporters to either the FBI or the Rexburg
 Police Department. In addition, I anticipate national, regional and local TV outlets to
 come to the park to do stand ups and collect b-roll. Per the FBI and Rexburg,
 Yellowstone will not be doing any news media interviews. Of note, an assistant to Nancy
 Grace (Fox News) reached out to the public affairs office a few weeks ago asking about
 camping options in the park in the middle of June.
- Sandra and I are also talking about what communications would look like if investigators find something during the search.

I welcome your thoughts on all of this.

Business & Commercial Services

Operations: The team continues to review COVID-19 safety plans as they are submitted for CUA holders and Saddle and Pack Stock Outfitter contract holders. To date, over 136 CUA plans and 14 Stock Outfitter plans have been reviewed for completeness, and communication sent to those entities advising them they are authorized to operate in the park. CUA and Stock Outfitters must present their authorization letter at the entrance station to confirm COVID plan submittal and gain entry. Additional Commercial Use Authorization applications are also being submitted now that the park is opening and will be processed as soon as possible.

In lieu of an annual spring meeting of the Saddle and Pack Stock Outfitter contract holders, a conference call has been set for Tuesday, June 2, to touch base and provide park and back country office updates prior to their operating season.

YELL has two concession contracts currently in prospectus development, YELL002 (retail, food and beverage - general stores) and YELL004 (automotive service stations, towing). A moratorium was placed on prospectus development by WASO Commercial Services due to COVID-19 through early June. The park understands that a guidance memorandum from WASO Commercial Services is to be received by the field in the very near future providing an update and status on prospectus/contract development. More to come...

New team member: James Lewis will be joining the YELL Business and Commercial Services team as a Concessions Management Specialist, scheduled to EOD next week. Jim is currently a Park Ranger, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in Evansville, Indiana, and holds a Bachelor's Degree in Natural Resources/Conservation from the University of Alabama.

Asset Management: This week the punch list inspection will be done at the Lake Lodge Kitchen project. Work continues on the Grant Lodges door replacement project. Work has been completed on the Old Faithful Inn West Wing carpet replacement and the roof replacement on the G5 quarters at the North Entrance. A pre-construction conference will be held at Mammoth quarters M8, which is located next to the Haynes building for the roof replacement project and that work will begin.

Resource Education & Youth Programs (REYP) REYP Field Operations

Field Operations have conducted vehicle-based roves with the goals of observing visitors and compiling information about visitor numbers, behavior in general, compliance with COVID-19 mitigation measures, and home states as represented by license plates. Sign and wayside exhibit inventories and condition assessments are being compiled. Resource conditions are also being noted, especially in thermal areas where vandalism has been documented.

Observations from the last days of May appear below.

From Jake McCommons (Madison):

On Sunday 5/31 along the Firehole River: None of the parking lots seemed full. I did not see anyone with masks. I saw a few flyfishermen.

On Monday 6/1 from 8:30-Noon I drove the West-Madison-Fairy Falls trailhead corridor. In the morning there were virtually no cars going West with most traffic flowing East in spurts. No issues, but also no masks being worn by visitors. When driving south along the Firehole I had to manage traffic for a herd of bison cows and red dogs that were causing an ebbing and flowing traffic jam. I received alot of shouts of "Thank you!". No issues other than a few people slowing for pictures. As I continued to drive around I didn't see any parking lots full but also didn't notice anyone wearing a mask.

From Kristine Brunsman (Lake):

We have tons of wolf activity in Hayden right now, which has been exciting for everyone. Overall, visitors have been generally very well behaved (particularly noteworthy at jams where they "self-managed"), maintaining social distancing suggestions, and following directional signage at Mud Volcano. From Michael Carter (Old Faithful):

Over the last few days, I mostly saw large groups/gatherings of visitors at the Old Faithful and Midway GB boardwalks. (I only saw small groups of visitors on other trails in the district). While monitoring/predicting Old Faithful's eruptions, several dogs were seen on the boardwalk (near the benches), though occasional visitors read the warning signs and stopped or turned back at that point.

As I was walking through the VC parking lot, several visitors asked where they could get fishing licences. Most of them seemed to be annoyed when I told them that only the gateway communities were selling them and that they couldn't be obtained in the park at the moment.

From Will Abbot (West)

Sunday 5/ 31, 8am-Noon - Observational auto rove-Individual contacts 17; most questions were about "where to see wildlife."

Gibbon Falls- no visitors present, Firehole Canyon 4 visitors seenFountain area- about 35 vehicles total, singles, family groupsMidway- 5-20 vehiclesFirehole Lake Drive- 7 vehicles- (4 waiting for Great Fountain geyser eruption).

Overall, traffic nearly non-existent.

No unusual circumstances.

From Helen Johnson (Grant):

Elk are beginning to return to West Thumb and storing their calves under the boardwalk, leading to significant closures and ending the one way traffic COVID precaution temporarily. Two staff members observed elk charging one another on the boardwalk Thursday afternoon. By Monday one way traffic was restored in West Thumb Geyser Basin and all boardwalks were reopened.

From Phil Officer (Old Faithful):

On Monday 6/1, 5 hats were reported scattered about the runoff channels of Midway Geyser Basin

Several visitors expressed surprise that they could not exit the Montana Gates prior to today (many said that they were aware that you couldn't enter from Montana but didn't know you couldn't leave).

Visitors have called asking about the status of Beartooth Highway.

Rebecca found a few instances of images/writing carved into bacterial mats on Geyser Hill.

Visitors have been seen multiple times too close to bison

A coyote was hazed at West Thumb. The coyote was not actively engaging with visitors, but it was very comfortable with human presence. It was weaving under the board walk with visitors above it without any fear.



Reports of a wolf between Chittenden bridge and mud volcano have been coming in. The wolf is becoming aggressive towards humans. Direction for aggressive hazing for this wolf has been issued and may save the animal.

Brink of the Upper Falls opened to the public this week. Parts of the walk were not completed by the contracting company so Rangers, both Protection and Maintenance, cleaned the area of construction debris as well as constructed buck and rail along a portion of the walk that was considered hazardous so the area could open.



A crane tipped over while working on the new bridge in the Pelican area. EMS, Structure Fire, and Law Enforcement responded. The contractors were able to get the equipment back in an upright state with the use of tie downs and forklifts. No one was injured in the event.



We are in the process of finishing our orientation for seasonals and two newer seasonals have started R.O.E. Two permanents are also headed back to FLETC and FTEP respectively.

<u>North</u>

- Elk calving season has begun multiple calves were born in the admin and housing area this past week. Elk calf stashed inside the Supply Yard that was separated from its mother was moved and eventually reunited.
- Mutual aid request for a kayaker in the water in the Yellowstone River large mutual aid response, but kayaker was found to not be in distress.

Dave has invested great amounts of blood, sweat, and tears in his work and passion for our park- saying thank you Dave seems weak, but THANK YOU DAVE! Under the circumstances, like so many other retirements and departures this year, a traditional/proper acknowledgement/celebration of Dave's accomplishments may not be possible. Please take some time to let Dave know you're thinking of him as he is closing out this chapter of ranger life.

Administration

Central Backcountry Office

- Seasonal staff EOD 5/24. Working on training and preparing for issuing backcountry permits remotely.
- Phone calls and email volume increased significantly once it was announced the MT entrances would open 6/1.

CommCenter

Just a reminder:

Any calls for law enforcement, fire and emergency medical assistance needs to come via the Yellowstone Interagency Comm Center. DO NOT call the Ranger directly via their cellphones or radio. There is several reasons for this. Please use the phone to contact us if you have a phone available rather than by radio as we can get better information faster on the phones.

1-Officer safety- The unit may be out on a priority call with officer safety risk. Your calling them directly may put them at unnecessary risk as the phone distracts from the event they are actively working. The 911 telecommunicator knows the status of all units and is in a better position to allocate them to the correct call for their safety.

2-Liability--if you are calling them directly then you assume the same liability as a trained 911 telecommunicator. You are dispatching them to a call without the training and knowledge needed to provide a complete picture. When the courts request the tape of the call they will not have the initial call and questioning and could request that you testify as if you were the initial dispatcher for this event and hold you to the standards as you are an agent for the agency. The event is not properly documented and response times are not correct as we may not be involved until after the unit arrives on scene which can cause issues with the court process.

3-Resource allocation- we allocate resources to events based on priority and need to best protect our visitors and resources. Going direct may pull a unit that is critically needed for a priority event.

If you have any medical call needing a unit to respond dial 911

If you have any fire call needing a fire unit to respond dial 911

If you have a law enforcement emergency needing a law enforcement officer to respond dial 911 Just like you would if you were in any city. Do not call them directly. This month the YICC handled 1183 total calls for service. This is compared to 2662 calls for service in 2016 (the highest level in 7 years). The answered 2583 total phone calls with 2479 of those being admin in nature. We answered 103, 911 calls this month. All calls were answered with a 3.2 second period.

There were 373 traffic stops, 67 assist citizen calls, 46 trespass complaints, 43 camping out of bounds calls, and 41 alarm maintenance responses, We are still awaiting on the background to clear on one of our seasonal employees. NCIC training continues for field staff.

<u>Corrals</u>

Emergency Services

Justice Program

We commissioned three seasonals who are training to staff the Jail. One more seasonal is expected to be added if we can make it work. Much of the staff has had some supporting role with Mammoth and ISB on the cemetery case that is under investigation. We are still entering training certificates and reports into the database and IMARS as they come in and from the stack. Court is now in session for defendants to see the judge. Masks are expected in the Justice Center, especially in the courtroom. Tim Wilkinson is acting in the LES position as a temporary/detail assignment.

Structural Fire

<u>Trails</u>

- Seasonal Staff EOD 5/24. Ongoing orientation and training.
- Continued staff intermittent telework; inventory and repair work in Trail Caches and project scoping and set up.
- Continued planning, compliance, SOPS for projects and COVID-related needs.

Visitor Services/Fees

Fees:

- The South Entrance welcomed 10,092 visitor vehicles and the East Entrance welcomed 7,604 visitor vehicles during May 18 31, 2020, for a total of 17,696 vehicles through the two entrances since reopening. (Note: these are *vehicle* numbers and not the full *visitor* stats, those will be available on irma.nps.gov in the next two weeks.)
- The West, North and North East entrances opened this morning, June 1st. There were between 10 to 30 vehicles waiting at each entrance when we opened. (West Entrance pictured below, 8:30 am 6/1/20)



VSO:

- The office fielded 539 visitor phone calls last week (4-day week), which is an 85% increase over the same week in 2019 (during a 75-day week). VSO received 133 emails last week, which is standard for this time of year. The majority of calls regarded reopening plans, including what areas of the park and which services were open and accessible.
- We had our highest call volume day ever with 175 calls on Wednesday, May 27th. (Highest previous record was 164 calls on 7/23/18.)
- Thank you to Jon Nicholson for providing Albright VC staff to help answer visitor calls in our office. Thank you Dalton and Nicco for assisting in the office last week!

Film/SUPs:

- Rachel is back in the office after ~2 months of teleworking and continues to participate in the plans section on the COVID19 IMT
- Issuing annual permits for crews of 2 to film scenery and wildlife in nonthermal areas with a COVID safety plan. Denying requests that require NPS monitors right now per COVID mitigations.
- Receiving applications for larger shoots with talent, interviews, thermal filming and crews sizes up to 25 people; we will be waiting until later in the summer to approve interviews, thermal filming and large crew sizes.
- Working with Flight Over America; no permit required since they will not film from the ground. They plan to film here July 6-8 and will be in contact with 700Fox.
- Issued Special Event Permit for the Gardiner Graduation class of 2020 to have a parade (via Park street) on Sunday May 31st to carry the graduates to their outside ceremony.
- Working with the DRs to create a First Amendment handout and updated website information for normal FA operations but also to prepare for potential demonstrations that we are seeing across the country.

GEOLOGY AND HYDROLOGY

- On Friday, Erin White and other YCR staff (see below) participated in a final walk through of the Reese Creek pipeline project.
- On 6/2 YCR staff (White, Madeline McKeefry) will collaborate with USGS, GRTE and YELL RVP to conduct flow quantification measurements at the confluence of the Lewis and the Snake Rivers to determine peak in stream flows per the Snake River Headwaters Comprehensive River Management Plan.

GIS AND CLIMATE SCIENCE

- The Phenology Project is under way 14 citizen science field volunteers will complete the 5th round of 2020 pitfall samples and plant observations at seven climate monitoring sites on June 5th. Ten additional lab volunteers are processing 1,000-2,000 insect samples every two weeks.
- The Citizen Science Raptor team conducted 18 nest observations for bald eagles, ospreys, and red-tailed hawks over five weeks. They are scheduling shifts to provide visitor education at Swan Lake Flat to reduce nest disturbance.

- Gardiner High School senior Alona Stacy completed her Phenology Project internship focused on spider distribution and will attend Lewis and Clark College this fall.

The contractor will address a few items stakeholders asked to be changed or completed before they left. The contractor will likely finish on Tues and need another day to remove their equipment and supplies.
- Vince Nagashima and AIS staff are continuing to refine protocols for visitors to complete boat inspections and obtain permits (it is a new process this season). So far all is going well, but lines are short and will get longer as visitation increases.

WILDLIFE AND AQUATIC RESOURCES

Wolves: Hazing of several habituated wolves in the Hayden and Lamar valleys continues.

<u>Yellowstone Lake restoration</u>: Lake trout suppression is in full force now; between NPS and HBR (Hickey Brothers Research), we have 729 gill nets in the lake. This equates to about 40 miles of net, a third of which is lifted and reset each day 6 days a week. Although it is too early to put much weight in catches so far, getting a fair amount of small mesh set in West Thumb just after ice-off facilitated fairly high catches in those meshes.

For the small mesh, 31,532 lake trout have been removed this season with similar catch rates as last year, but almost twice the effort so far this year. In large meshes, 4,044 lake trout have been removed, with slightly lower catch rates this year. Total removed so far this year of 35,576 compared to just under 20,000 at this time last year. (effort spreadsheet attached)

Traps were set for lake trout fry at Thomas Bank, Carrington Island, Olson, Snipe, and FMA Elbow and 12 fry were collected (1 at Olson, 11 at Thomas Bank). Electrofishing for lake trout fry occurred at Carrington Island and Thomas Bank, and 1 juvenile lake trout 92 mm was collected. These young lake trout will be analyzed to estimate hatch dates on Yellowstone Lake spawning sites.

Water samples were obtained from Carrington Island and Elk point for analysis of phytoestrogens, potentially introduced during the organic pellet treatment of Carrington Island in Oct 2019. Plankton sampling occurred at four long term monitoring sites on Yellowstone Lake.

Stream restoration

Arctic grayling gametes are being reared at MFWP Big Timber Hatchery for stocking as fry to upper Grayling Creek.

Westslope cutthroat trout gametes were collected from the Sun Ranch brood pond and are being reared at the hatchery there for stocking to the upper Gibbon River tributaries.
