Dear Governor Gianforte:

In the span of less than three months, at least 12 Yellowstone National Park wolves have been killed within Montana's wolf management units 313 (Gardiner) and 316 (Cooke City), just north of the park boundary. This exceeds the total harvests of park wolves taken from those two units in any previous year and we're only halfway through the State's hunting season.

Due to the extraordinary number of Yellowstone wolves already killed this hunting season, and the high probability of even more park wolves being killed in the near future, I am requesting that you suspend wolf hunting in 313 and 316 for the remainder of this season. I am also asking that you and the Commission strongly consider reinstating appropriate quotas in 313 and 316 in future hunting seasons. Quotas were originally put in place not only to protect the Yellowstone wolf population, but also to protect the corresponding economic and tourism interests of Montana that are derived from wolf watching in the park. We have succeeded together over the past years at achieving both of these important objectives without affecting Montana's ability to accomplish its statewide wildlife conservation goals.

The State's data shows little to no wolf-related depredation incidents occurring in northern Yellowstone and also shows that the elk population in northern Yellowstone is "At" the population objectives set by the Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks (FWP) Department. On a larger regional scale, FWP-Region 3, which includes northern Yellowstone, shows the region's elk population "Over" the objectives set by the State.

The State of Montana benefits directly from conservation investments, tourism, and wildlife viewing in and around Yellowstone. Visitors to Yellowstone spend hundreds of millions of dollars each year in communities within 50 miles of the park. Tourism to Yellowstone supports thousands of jobs and has an estimated overall benefit of \$640 million to the area's economy. The positive economic impacts of visitors viewing wolves in Yellowstone is estimated to be well over \$30 million annually, much of which is spent in local Montana communities and counties.

Wolves in Yellowstone represent over a quarter century of partnership with Montana and many other stakeholders who understand their value to Yellowstone. As we move into Yellowstone's 150th anniversary next year, the time is right for us to focus on how we can work together to accomplish our mutual objectives. Whether those objectives are strengthening transboundary wildlife conservation, providing quality visitor access and enjoyment, or improving the condition of local and state economies, our decisions today will shape what Yellowstone will look like tomorrow.

While you understandably expect me to consider the impacts of Yellowstone decision making on Montana, I am again asking that you similarly consider the impacts of Montana's decision making on Yellowstone. I appreciate the longstanding cooperative relationship Yellowstone has enjoyed with the State on a variety of major issues over past years. I believe there are no issues in which we cannot find common ground and ask for your assistance and leadership in helping achieve our mutually beneficial goals.

Dear Superintendent Sholly:

In response to your December 16, 2021 letter regarding wolf management in Montana, I share your interest in keeping our lines of communication open and working together on the many issues we share.

The Montana Fish and Wildlife Commission establishes hunting regulations in accordance with the laws of the State of Montana. The Commission adopts regulations based on the scientific data and findings from expert biologists at Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks. Montana law requires regulations to ensure a sustainable population of wolves in the state. Furthermore, the Commission adopts regulations after significant public input.

As you note in your letter, wolves from Yellowstone National Park have been harvested on land in the State of Montana. Once a wolf exits the park and enters lands in the State of Montana, it may be harvested pursuant to regulations established by the Commission under Montana law. These regulations provide strong protections to prevent overharvest.

Given the Commission's role in establishing hunting regulations or changing existing ones, I have forwarded your letter to the Commission for its consideration, and I encourage you to bring any outstanding concerns you may have to the Commission.

Thank you for your service and your dedication to Yellowstone National Park, and I look forward to continue working with you.
