

Land use is little changed since the period of significance. Sailor’s Creek presents one of the best opportunities in Virginia for preservation of an entire battlefield landscape.







Condition Statement	Much of the landscape is altered and fragmented, but some essential features remain. In addition to and complimenting the remaining battlefield lands, Saltville's system of defensive fortifications is remarkably intact but unprotected. Focused

preservation efforts over the next decade can likely save all of the remaining battlefield land and the entire system of earthen defenses.
