





**Condition Statement**

The battlefield has been transformed from rural to suburban land. Only previously protected areas remain. In an effort to provide visitors with a better sense of the battlefield's historic setting, the City of Franklin has taken a series of actions to reclaim, restore, and reconstruct portions of disturbed battlefield for interpretive purposes.

**Historical Designation**

National Historic Landmark, Franklin Battlefield (1966), consists of the following four non-contiguous properties: Carter House, Fort Granger, Winstead Hill, and Carnton and the McGavock Cemetery. In addition, the following sites are listed independently on the National Register of Historic Places: Harrison House (1975), Roper's Knob Fortifications (2000) and the Alpheus Truett House (1988). While these isolated sites are located within the Study Area, the battlefield landscape is not listed in the National Register.
