

Vic Krygowski: So, I had a couple of excellent torpedo men, I was a torpedo officer, and I had a couple excellent men on there. One guy was named Kellogg and the other ones name was Scully [William E. Kellogg, TM 1/c and John F. Scully, TM 3/c. Per V. Krygowski, July 15, 2008]. Kellogg was the first class torpedo man and Scully was a third class torpedo man--petty officer. So I moved them to the base, you don't want to be on the Devilfish, off you go. So they went to the base and were subsequently, both of them were reassigned to the USS Snook, S N O O K – that's another submarine that was subsequently sunk with all hands, including Messieurs, Kellogg and Scully. So they got out of the frying pan and into the fire without knowing about it. [The Snook (SS279) was declared lost in the spring of 1945. Per V. Krygowski, July 15, 2008]

Janis Kozlowski: They would have been better off staying with you.

Vic Krygowski: Yeah, yeah. We at least survived.
