Welcome to the GO BIG 2020 CHALLENGE!

Big South Fork Go Big 2020 Challenge is a year-long interactive activity for visitors to complete challenges and answer questions all while exploring and experiencing destinations within the boundary of Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area. This booklet is broken up into six challenge categories. Under each category is a list of questions or tasks to complete along with their point values. A total of **100 points** is needed to earn your GO Big 2020 Challenge patch. This year, participants who receive **200 points** will earn a silver medallion, and those who accumulate **300 points** will earn a gold medallion! Share your challenge adventures with us by emailing your photos to BISO_challenge@nps.gov.

This year our GO Big Challenge theme is “A Sense of Place”. Big South Fork National River & Recreation Area has been home to generations of individuals who gave their all to make the Cumberland Plateau their home. As you look through this booklet and work toward your 100 point goal, see if you can make a connection with the special people that once called Big South Fork home and why they loved it here, even if it was difficult and “Troublesome” and they had “No Business” being there! In 2020, we challenge you to get “A Sense of Place” as you explore!

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BLUE HERON CHALLENGE

This year marks the 100th anniversary of the passage of the 19th Amendment, guaranteeing and protecting women’s constitutional right to vote. However, here at Mine 18, young women growing up in the camps seldom had vision beyond marriage and family. As you explore and fill in your book, listen to and read about their lives at each station spread across the outdoor museum. Imagine what it would have been like to live or work at Blue Heron Mining Community.

1 ♿ 3 Points: In the “Women’s Life” Exhibit, it shares the hard working and isolated life of women living in this community. How did they get through difficult times? _____

2 ♿ 3 Points: At the Superintendent’s House, there is a book named “The Ladies Birthday Almanac”. When was it published? _____

3 ♿ 3 Points: What were the impressions and attitudes of some of the women, who lived in Blue Heron? _____

4 ♿ 3 Points: While exploring the depot deck, find out when the K&T picnic was held at Bell Farm? _____

5 ♿ 3 Points: The company store was considered the hub of economic life in Blue Heron, and one of the few places women could work. The store sold nearly everything anyone needed. How did the store keep the miners from buying things from other places? _____

6 ♿ 3 Points: Schooling at Blue Heron was done in the “L” shaped building nicknamed “Little Red School House”. The most fondly remembered teachers were: _____ and _____.

7 ♿ 3 Points: Courtship was limited in this remote mining community. How did young couples meet? _____ and _____.

8 ♿ 3 Points: Marriage and starting a family was an expectation for women who came of age. What did women hope getting married would let them do? _____

9 ♿ 3 Points: Life at Blue Heron was quiet, especially for women. What were some of the things the ladies did to entertain themselves? _____

10 ♿ 3 Points: Church was a central part of life here and many ministers “heard the call” while living in the mining community. Who were the most remembered pastors in this church? _____



11 © 3 Points: Hike the 6.4 mile moderate Blue Heron Loop Trail. The K&T railroad was the only access into and out of Mine 18 until Blue Heron Road was built in 1947. Try to imagine the sense of remoteness that those living in the mining camp must have felt. During your hike, count the number of closed mine entrances you see. _____ Date Hiked: _____

12 © 3 Points: Hike to Dick Gap Overlook. Try to imagine how differently the topography of the area would have looked from 1938, until Mine 18 closed in 1962. Describe some of the differences you would notice from this overlook (both sights and sounds) if you were viewing the area during 1938? Ask a park ranger if you need help.

ROCK SHELTER CHALLENGE

There are thousands of rock shelters to be explored at Big South Fork. These locations hold a significant place in the histories of the people that have, for thousands of years, called this area home. As you visit the rock shelters listed below, imagine what it must have been like for American Indians, early settlers, and the sustenance farmers who utilized, visited, and lived in these places in the past. Rock shelters have been used by humans for shelter and a range of activities for thousands of years and some contain unique natural resources. To protect park resources, do not alter, remove or disturb anything found in or around rock shelters. Also, rock stacking is not allowed. Look and enjoy but do not disturb.

13 A 3 Points: Yahoo Falls Rock Shelter, located on the Yahoo Falls Loop trail, is a large rock shelter situated behind Yahoo Falls; one of Kentucky's tallest waterfalls. Rock Shelters like this were once used by Native Americans as a meeting destination and as a shelter while traveling through.

14 C 3 Points: Crack in the Rocks is located 1.4 miles up the Blue Heron Loop trail. This impressive feature was created when massive cracks formed in the bluff wall. The hike is strenuous but well worth it.

15 D 3 Points: Twin Arches Rock Shelters: Twin Arches are the largest natural arches east of the Mississippi. According to the wayside at the arches, these arches and rock shelters were formed by _____ erosion. The rock shelters were used by Native Americans and early settlers. Shelters like these were also used for mining saltpeter, or niter as the settlers called it. Saltpeter was an essential ingredient for making gunpowder. These areas were also the secret locations some settlers used for making moonshine.

16 D 3 Points: Indian Rockhouse is located along the Slave Falls Loop trail. Slave Falls trail starts at the Sawmill trailhead on Fork Ridge Road. This Rockhouse is 30 yards wide and 25 yards deep! Can you find any animal tracks in this rock shelter? If so, what kind? _____

17 D 3 Points: Middle Creek Loop offers one of the highest concentrations of rock shelters of any trail in the park. As you hike this easy/moderate trail try and count the number of rock shelters along its 3.5 mile length. Number of rock shelters counted: _____

18 F 3 Points: Fall Branch Rock Shelter is located on Fall Branch trail which connects John Litton Farm Loop with the Grand Gap Loop. This rock shelter can be accessed either by hiking the John Litton trail or by the trailhead at the end of Alfred Smith Road and is seldom seen by day hikers. You are in for a treat when you visit this area! It is especially nice after a good rain.

19 [P] **3 Points:** Mule Shoe Rock Shelter is located 0.7 miles down the Oscar Blevins Farm Loop from the Bandy Creek Campground trailhead. This rock shelter is so named because of the muleshoes that were found there years ago. Many of the areas early farmers would use rock shelters as barns in which to house their animals. Obtain an interpretive guide for this trail at the Bandy Creek Visitor Center to find the rock shelter. Date Visited: _____

20 [H] **3 Points:** Indian Dome Rockhouse is located 2.3 miles down the Pilot-Wines Horse Loop trail from the Station Camp East Trailhead. This rock shelter is unique in that the inner stone on the ceiling eroded and fell. This created a dome inside which is much higher than the entry to the rock shelter. Date Visited: _____

21 [P] **3 Points:** Hippie Cave is located on Hippie Cave trail just off Darrow Ridge Rd. Special consideration should be taken accessing this site as the road to the trailhead is **very** rough. Parking down the road and walking to the trail is advisable. At this rock shelter you will notice a wooden fence restricting where you can walk. This fence was installed by the park to protect the Cumberland Sandwort which only grows in the cool, damp rock shelter floors of the Cumberland Plateau. Date Visited: _____

22 [H] **3 Points:** The Witch's Cave Rock Shelter is located 0.3 miles down the Gentleman's Swimming Hole trail. This trail begins across from the Laurel Dale Cemetery in Rugby, TN. Although not a true cave, this rock shelter has been called Witch's Cave by Rugby residents for years. No significant reason can be found for its name, however, witches are often used in the folklore of the Cumberland Plateau area. Date Visited: _____

31 ☺ 3 points: Hike to Bear Creek Overlook. Bear Creek River Crossing below was the location of a historical crossing for the Southern Ridge Trail. This trail was a spur of the Jacksboro Road where many of the ancestors of the Big South Fork area traveled as they made their journey westward in search of new land and a life they had always dreamed of. Many of these pioneers carried very few belongings with them. An iron kettle, an axe, a good rifle, some lead and powder on a single pack animal were often their only treasures. Date Visited: _____

32 © 3 Points: From Ledbetter Trailhead, hike the Kentucky Trail to the site of one of America's first oil wells, the Beaty Oil Well. In 1819, Martin Beaty struck oil while drilling for salt. Locals thought he had drilled into the belly of hell when a black, smelly, sticky substance oozed out onto the ground and later caught fire and burned! They first sold the oil to be used as medicine and shipped it on log rafts up the Big South Fork River. What is the number on the small blue disk that is tacked on the back of the Beaty Oil Well sign located at the plugged oil well site? _____

33 D 3 Points: Hike Rock Creek Loop. Take a selfie while standing on the old railroad ties that are still the remains of the Stearns Logging Railroad from the 1938 Massy Branch spur line. Email your photo to BISO_challenge@nps.gov. Date Hiked: _____

34 D 3 Points: Obtain the Julia Marcum and No Business Creek Civil War Trading Cards from Bandy Creek Visitor Center. What was awarded to Julia Marcum in 1884 by a special Act of Congress and why?

Hike the No Business Trail. This area was one of the first locations settled by white settlers like Richard Harve Slaven and Jonathan Blevins. At one time, over 300 people called No Business Community home. It was also an area that saw its fair share of guerrilla activity during the Civil War. The objective of these raids were to spread fear and terror, gain control and supplies, and settle personal vendettas. The No Business Trail can be accessed via the Maude's Crack Trail and the Longfield Branch Trail.

35 F 3 Points: Hike the John Litton Farm Loop. Like many other settlers of Big South Fork, John and Elvira Litton were almost completely self-sufficient. He was a farmer, a hunter and a beekeeper. Elvira made their clothes and kept a large garden. They even made their children's toys. The original structure was built around 1900 by John Litton. How many total external windows are now visible? _____
The General Slaven family purchased the farm in 1947 for \$200 and never had running water or electricity while living at this remote location. They lived here until 1979 when it was purchased by National Park Service. Date Hiked: _____

36 © 10 Points: Hike the moderate 6.8 mile Grand Gap Loop trail. According to his gravestone, how old was little Archie Smith when he died of pneumonia in 1932? _____
Archie's father Alfred Smith worked as a logger for the Stearns Coal & Lumber Company until they ceased their logging operations in the 1940s. Alfred and Elva and their remaining eight children then moved from Big South Fork so he could go to work at the "Secret City" of Oak Ridge, Tennessee (see the Manhattan Project National Historical Park in the Community Park Challenge Section).

37 **3 Points:** Hike or paddle to Parch Corn Creek Farmstead. Visit the grave of Helen Blevins. You will find the grave in the very back of the field in the far right corner. Helen was the second wife of Armstead Blevins, the son of the long hunter Jonathan Blevins. Many families in the Big South Fork area buried their loved ones close to their homes with hopes of having a family cemetery. Today, it is not uncommon to stumble upon lone graves of early settlers that are laid to rest there, waiting to be joined by their loved ones who never returned. What image is engraved at the top of her tomb stone?

38 **3 Points:** Obtain the Tackett Brothers Gravesite Civil War Trading Card from Bandy Creek Visitor Center and hike to Charit Creek Lodge. Visit the Tackett Brothers grave site. This site is located in Scott County. On the eve of the American Civil War - 1861, Tennessee seceded from the United States to join forces with the Confederacy. Scott County then seceded from the state of Tennessee and declared itself a "Free and Independent State". This made the area a prime target by Confederate guerrillas to loot and plunder. Tennessee rejoined the Union promptly following the end of the war; however, Scott County didn't officially petition to re-enter the state until 1986. Date Visited: _____

COMMUNITY PARKS CHALLENGE

This year we want to join hands with our neighboring parks and challenge you to explore something new in the community. Below you will find seven unique places with common goals like Big South Fork NRRRA. As you visit them, see if you can make a connection with the special people that once called these places home. See if you can get “A Sense of Place” like they did. For this year’s challenge, we are encouraging you to count all the trail mileage you accumulate and log it for any of these seven parks, as well as Big South Fork NRRRA.

Cumberland Falls State Park

Cumberland Falls State Park in Kentucky became a state park August 21, 1931 and this park is packed full of history! American Indians have called it home for at least 10,000 years. Tribes like the Creek, Cherokee, Shawnee, and Chickasaw often hunted throughout the land and visited frequently. Early maps even show the Cumberland River as the Shawnee River. Cumberland Falls is often referred to as the “Niagara of the South” and has been compared to Victoria Falls in Africa for its rare Moonbow! To get there, travel north on HWY 27 past Whitley City. Turn right onto Hwy 90 east.

Daniel Boone National Forest

Spread across 21 counties of southern and eastern Kentucky, more than 708,000 acres of National Forest System lands are managed within a 2.1 million-acre proclamation boundary. It was officially established in February 1937 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. When established, it was named the Cumberland National Forest. Later in 1966, it was renamed as the Daniel Boone National Forest in recognition of the adventurous frontiersman that explored much of that Kentucky region.

55 ♿ 4 Points: While visiting Daniel Boone National Forest, drive up Hwy 27 North to Whitley City, Stearns District in KY. Hike the Barren Fork Accessible Heritage Trail and read the wayside exhibits located along this concrete trail. When was the school built at the Barren Fork Community?

56 4 Points: Continue driving north on Hwy 27 past Whitley City for 5 miles; turn left on KY 927 for two miles and follow the signs to the Natural Arch Picnic Area. There is a \$3 fee per vehicle to enter. While visiting this scenic area, read the wayside exhibits and view the Natural Arch from this accessible overlook. What type of footwear is pictured on the wayside exhibit titled "Protect America's Past"?

Pickett State Park

Pickett Civilian Conservation Corps Memorial State Park lies within the 20,887-acre Pickett State Forest. In 1933, the Stearns Coal and Lumber Company donated nearly 12,000 acres of land to the State of Tennessee to be developed as a forest recreational area. Initial development of the area by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) occurred between 1934 through 1942. The CCC constructed hiking trails, five rustic cabins, a recreation lodge, a ranger station and a 12-acre lake. The park memorializes and preserves the unique work of the CCC who first developed the park. The park office is open 8:00 am to 4:30 pm CST every day but Thanksgiving and December 25 and the park closes at sunset.

59 4 Points: Hike the 1.6 mile moderate Hazard Cave Loop Trail. While under the cave (rock shelter), stop and rest on a bench made from an American chestnut tree in the 1930s by the CCC. This almost perfect tree was rot-resistant and typically grew up to 100 feet tall. Settlers used this tree for furniture, fencing and homes and the nuts were crucial to the diets of many different kinds of wildlife. Unfortunately, the American chestnut was wiped out by a blight fungus in the early 1900s. (Don't forget to log your miles on your log sheet.) Date Hiked: _____

Sgt. Alvin C. York Historic Park

Sergeant Alvin C. York State Historic Park is located nine miles north of Jamestown on Highway 127 in Pall Mall, Tennessee and pays tribute to one of the most decorated soldiers of World War I. He received the Medal of Honor for leading an attack on a German machine gun nest; killing 25 enemy soldiers and capturing 132. The park visitor center is open daily except Thanksgiving and December 25, 8:00 am to 4:30 pm CDT with the grounds open 8:00 am CDT to dark.

Historic Rugby

Historic Rugby was founded in 1880 as a utopian colony for the “second sons” of the English gentry. The colony was the idea of Thomas Hughes who authored Tom Brown’s Schooldays, the first modern children’s book. The settlement survives today with 18 original buildings. Among these are Christ Church Episcopal and the Thomas Hughes Free Public Library, which houses the original 7,000 volume collection of books and periodicals.

Obed Wild & Scenic River

Looking much the same today as it did long ago when the first white settlers arrived, the Obed is indeed both wild and scenic. The river allowed for trapping and hunting but farming was never an option due to poor soil. Today, a variety of outdoor adventures await you. Obed Visitor Center is open 9:00 am to 5:00 pm ET in Wartburg, TN and is closed on Thanksgiving, December 25, and January 1.



Manhattan Project National Historical Park

The Manhattan Project has a very interesting history. Did you know the top secret Manhattan Project happened during WWII and ultimately led to the nuclear bombs that were dropped on Japan, ending the war? Oak Ridge is referred to as The Atomic City, The Secret City or The City Behind the Fence. These names were given because during WWII this was a top-secret city that was constructed and housed over 75,000 people. The facilities at Oak Ridge produced enriched uranium through an electromagnetic separation process. Today, you can learn more about the Manhattan Project and the history of Oak Ridge by visiting the NPS visitor center, which is located at the Children’s Museum of Oakridge, 461 West Outer Drive Oak Ridge, TN.


