

Castle Clinton National Monument is one of more than 400 national parks across the country and one of 22 special destinations in the 10 parks that make up the National Parks of New York Harbor.


National Park Rangers care for all National Parks, but it is a job we cannot do alone. The stewardship of the American people is vital to the well-being of our national treasures.

The sequoia tree and the bison represent nature, the mountains and water represent recreation, and the arrowhead represents history and archeology.


The emblem symbolizes the values of National Park Rangers.



Did You Know?

Castle Clinton is approximately two blocks west of where Fort Amsterdam stood more than 400 years ago, when New York City was known by the Dutch name New Amsterdam.

Immigration and the Castle

Did You Know?

Castle Clinton was very nearly destroyed in the 1940s as part of a project to build a second Brooklyn bridge. The project was not stopped, but moved underground. Today, the Brooklyn-Battery Tunnel (officially the Hugh L. Carey Tunnel) runs under the site.



Find the Cannons

The cannons at Castle Clinton are what helped give the site its original name "Southwest Battery."

The term "battery" means a group of cannon in a fixed fortification, for either coastal or frontier defense. It also refers to the placement of artillery during a battle.




- 1. How many cannons do you see?

Crossfire Challenge



Castle Clinton, which is in Battery Park in Lower Manhattan, was part of a series of fortifications around upper New York Harbor that included Castle Williams on Governors Island, Fort Gibson on Ellis Island and Fort Wood on what is now Liberty Island. The idea was that by placing these forts and castles (circular forts(so that the cannon fire from them overlapped, then the military could prevent other countries' warships from sailing into the harbor and attacking Manhattan. In 2011, Castle Clinton, Castle Williams and Fort Wood all turned 200 years old. How old are you?
