








Existing foot trails wind through the beech forest


Lady slippers bloom in the spring








Town of Truro Assessor's Map








Conservation Restrictions donated by the Anthony family – 2018 and 2023, 13 acres total





Includes the headwaters of Mill Creek, flowing to the Herring River estuary














Sullivan house at 160 Nauset Light Road was demolished and removed in 2018.

In January 2019 the Sullivans donated the cleared lot on the eroding scarp to the Eastham Conservation Foundation.





The Dietrichs put 25-acre Sipson Island on the market in Sept. 2016 for \$12,500,000.





In 18 months, the fundraising team obtained 500+ private donations, including major contributions from seven partner land trusts from around the Cape.



Four structures have been demolished and the area replanted with native species.
