From 1812 to 1950, the Cape Lookout Lighthouse was served by many “keepers of the light.” They held the position of Head Keeper, First Assistant Keeper or Second Assistant Keeper. There might have been several serving as “Third Assistant Keepers” or laborers for a short period of time as well.

Each of the names listed have been verified against archival documents. However, there are dates that are incomplete, and “gaps” between keepers suggesting names are missing. Research continues to locate and verify names and dates of service at Cape Lookout Lighthouse.



Charlotte Ann Mason was the only woman who officially served as a lighthouse keeper at Cape Lookout. Her service dates were 1872 to 1875.

Cape Lookout Lighthouse was initially overseen by the U.S. Lighthouse Service, the Lighthouse Board (both a part of either the Treasury or Commerce Department) and in 1939, integrated into the U.S. Coast Guard. Keepers were still able to remain as civilians or accept a USCG rating. In 1950, the tower was fully automated and the last in-resident keepers retired.



Above is the Assistant Keepers' Quarters built in 1873. This building originally housed all three keepers. When the 1907 Keeper's Quarters, shown below, was completed, the Primary Keeper moved into the new building and the Assistant Keepers and their families shared the 1873 house.

Today, the main floor of the Assistant Keepers' Quarters is a museum with exhibits on the U.S. Light House Service, U.S. Life-Saving Service, and barrier islands as well as a short film entitled “Ribbon of Sand.”

The Primary Keeper's Quarters was sold by the U.S. Coast Guard in 1957 and moved approximately a mile and a half south of the lighthouse in what is now the Cape Lookout Village Historic District.
