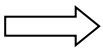


Follow Rosaria Esposito's route through Ellis Island:

Great Hall (2nd Floor) (Audio Tour Stops #111 and #112)

When you ascend the stairs, six men in uniform look over individuals with a very discerning eye. While you passed the medical examination seamlessly, your fourteen year old brother, Adolfo, gets pulled aside and "Sc" is written on his coat with a piece of chalk on his chest. Doctors pull him away for further inspection at a medical station fifty feet away.

Imagine being separated from family and friends after you've just arrived in a new country and are unsure of where to go next. How would you react?



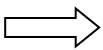
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Through America's Gate (2nd Floor) (Audio Tour Stop #114)

Walk through the exhibit, *Through America's Gate* to get a detailed account of how immigrants were processed at Ellis Island.

Head to the gallery "Medical Inspection" and take a look at the chart, "Step-by-step through the Inspection Process." Consider how your situation may be different if Adolfo gets sent for further medical treatment. How might your choices be different if Adolfo's condition worsens?



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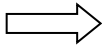

Dormitory Rooms (3rd Floor) (Audio Tour Stop #146)

You have decided to stay to look after your brother, Adolfo, who has to receive treatment for favus (a scalp condition) and will be detained here over night, and maybe much longer. Proceed to the third floor and explore the cots that you will be staying in tonight. 1) What will it be like to sleep in this dormitory room? 2) What would you do to pass your time?



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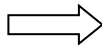


Graffiti Walls (3rd floor in the center corridor underneath the sign “3 EAST”) (Audio Tour Stop #125)

Immigrants detained here over night like you, Rosaria, vented many of their frustrations on the wall at Ellis Island.



Try to interpret some of the inscriptions written on the graffiti columns either on the third floor or on the graffiti columns exhibit near the end of *Through America's Gate*. What do you think the detainee wrote on the wall? OR What feelings do you think the detained immigrant was expressing through this graffiti? 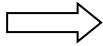
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Peak Immigration Years (2nd Floor) (Audio Tour Stop #135/#136)

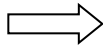

What would help you decide where you and your brother, Adolfo, are going next? How can organizations like Mutual Aid Societies help you with this process?

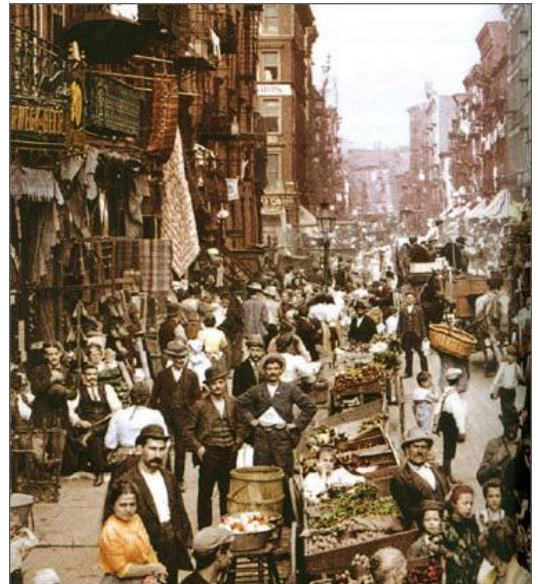


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As you walk by this gallery, what are some traditions that you, as Rosaria, would want to keep as an immigrant? What would help you preserve these cultural and religious traditions?
