Starting a New Life - Peak Immigration Years (2nd Floor)

Some immigrants who went through Ellis Island went to New York's Lower East Side. Many different groups lived in this neighborhood. What advantages do you think immigrants from the same ethnic group may have living in an area like this? Why do you think the immigrants form "Ghettos?" (Note: The word ghetto has been defined as a part of a city in which members of a particular group or race live usually in poor conditions).
