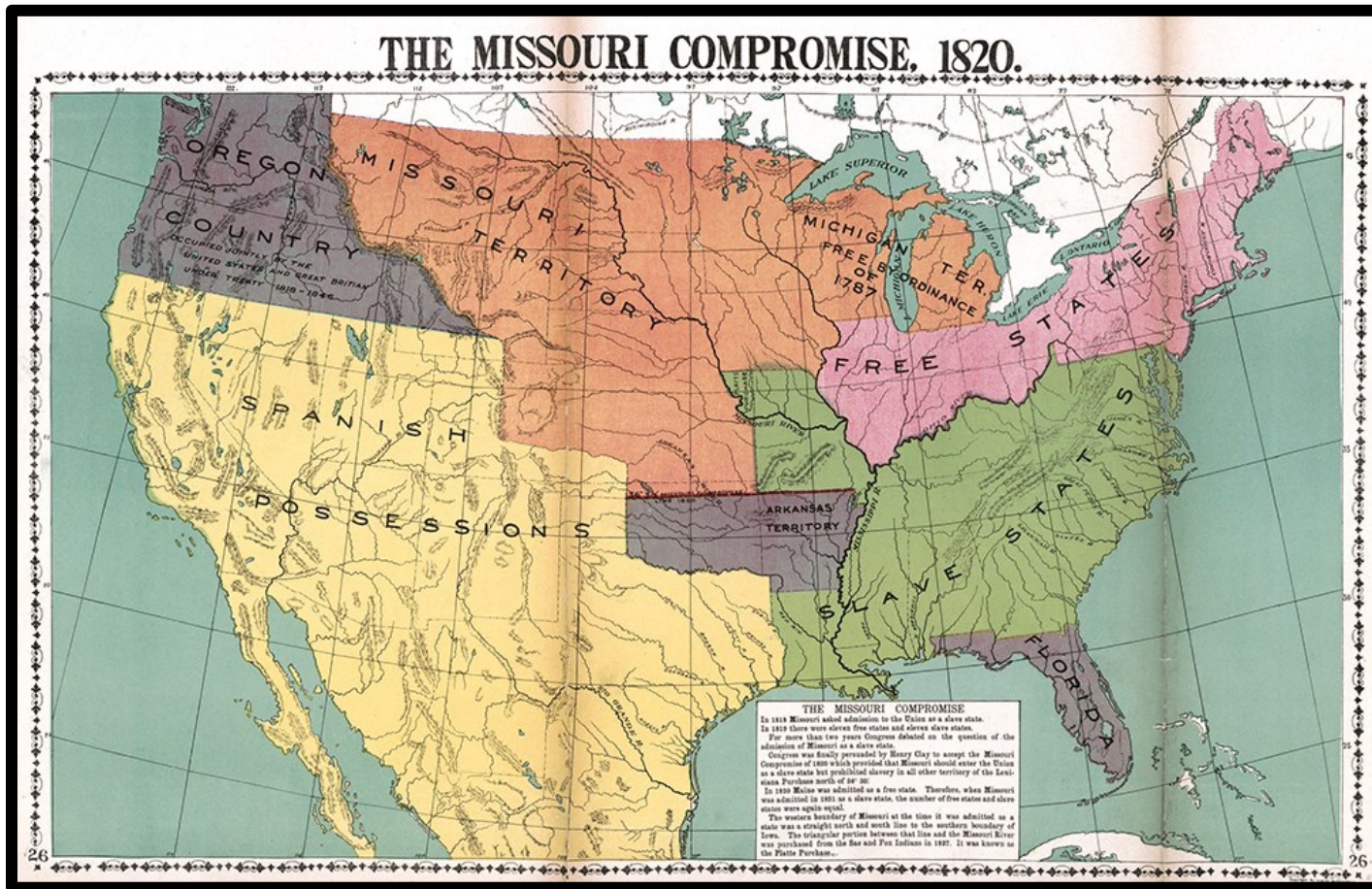

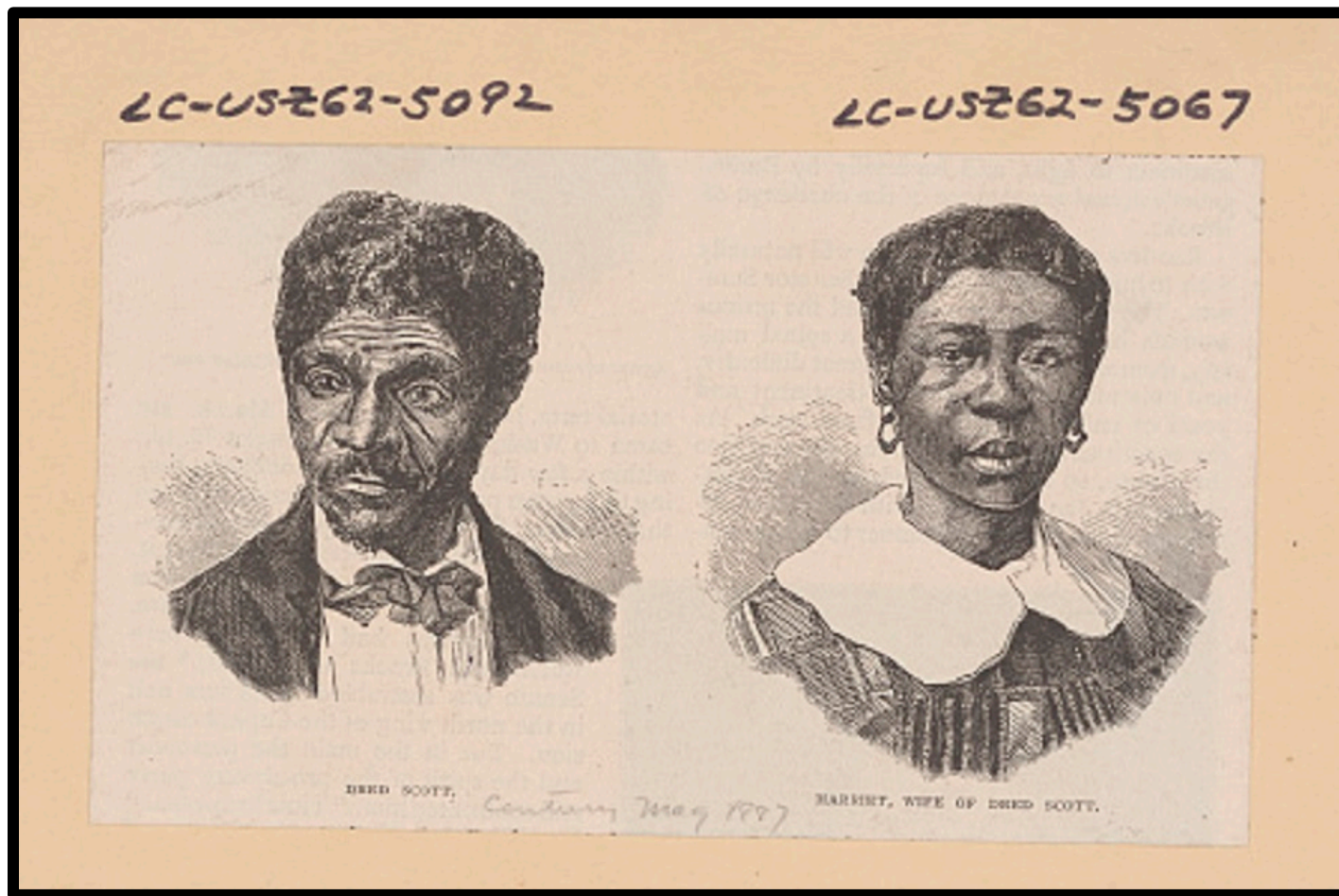
The Compromise of 1850

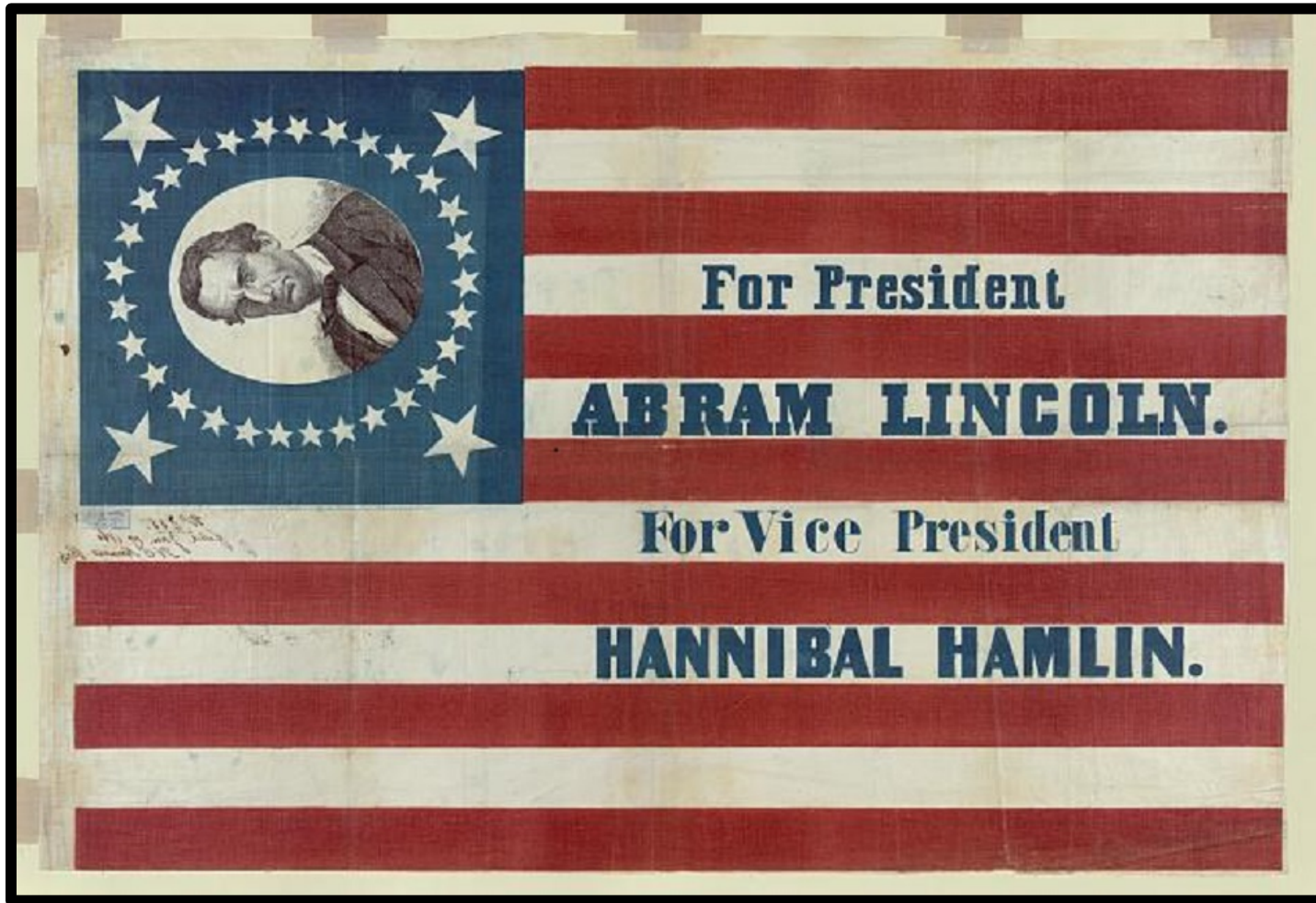

The State of South Carolina.

South Carolina

At a Convention of the People of the State of South Carolina, begun and holden at Columbia, on the seventeenth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and Sixty, and thence continued by adjournments to Charleston, and thence by divers adjournments to the Twentieth day of December in the same year.

An Ordinance To dissolve the Union between the State of South Carolina and other States united with her under the compact entitled "The Constitution of the United States of America."

Be it the Pleas of the People of South Carolina in Convention assembled, do declare and ordain, and it is hereby declared and ordained, That the Declaration adopted by us in Convention, on the twenty-third day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-eight, whereby the Constitution of the United States of America was ratified, and also all Acts and parts of Acts of the General Assembly of this State, ratifying amendments of the said Constitution are hereby repealed; and that the Union now existing between South Carolina and other States, under the name of the United States of America, is hereby dissolved.

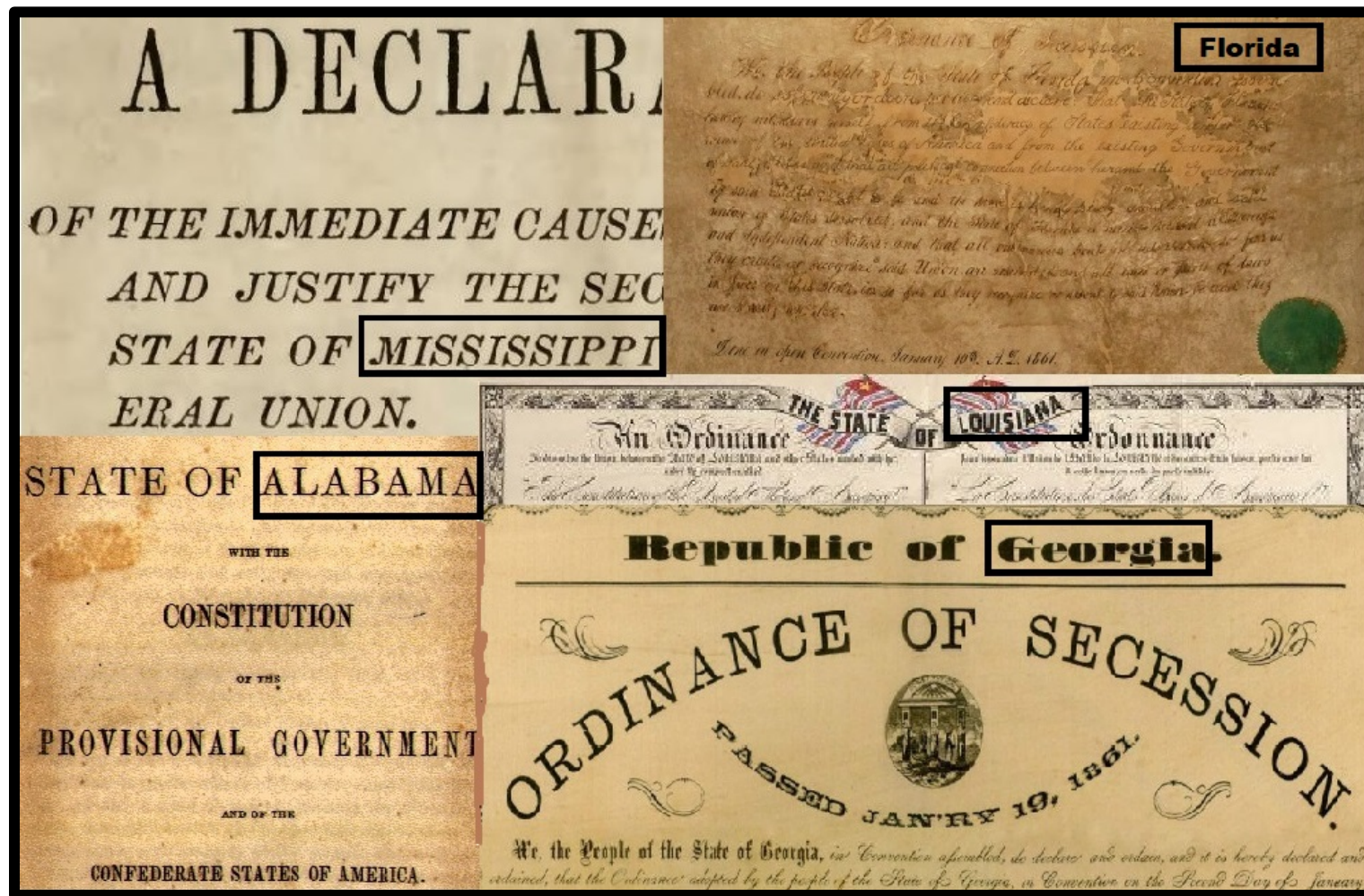
Done at Charleston, the twentieth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and Sixty.

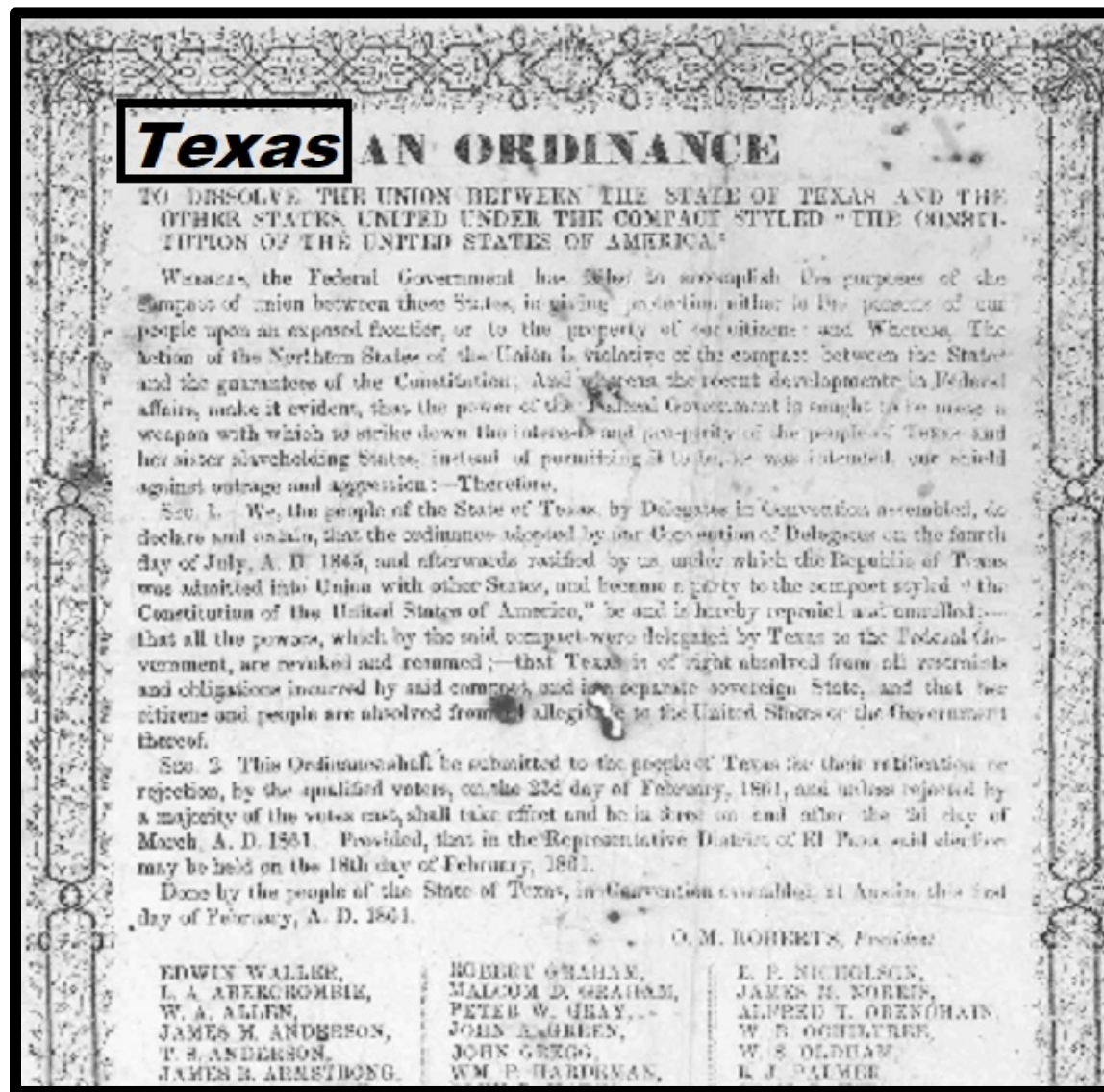

AN ORDINANCE TO RATIFY OF THE CONFEDERATE STA

WHEREAS, On the eleventh day of February, 1862, at Montgomery, in the State of Alabama, a Congress of delegates from the States of Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, Texas, and Virginia, united under the name of the Confederate States of America, which Constitution hath been ratified by the said States;

Now, therefore, this Convention, in behalf of the said Constitution, doth, in behalf of the State of North Carolina, adopt and ratify the form of Government, the tenor of which is hereto annexed.

North Carolina

AN ORDINANCE

To dissolve the union now existing between the State of Arkansas and the other states united with her under the compact known as "The constitution of the United States of America."

WHEREAS, In addition to the well founded grounds of complaint set forth by this convention, in resolutions adopted on the 11th March, A. D. 1861, against the sectional party now in power at Washington City, headed by Abraham Lincoln, he has, in the face of resolutions passed by this convention, pledging the State of Arkansas to resist to the last extremity any attempt on the part of such power to coerce any state that had seceded from the old Union, proclaimed to the world that war should be waged against such states, until they should be compelled to submit to their rule, and large forces to accomplish this, have by this same power been called out, and are now being marshalled to carry out this inhuman design, and to longer submit to such rule or remain in the old Union of the United States, would be disgraceful and ruinous to the State of Arkansas.

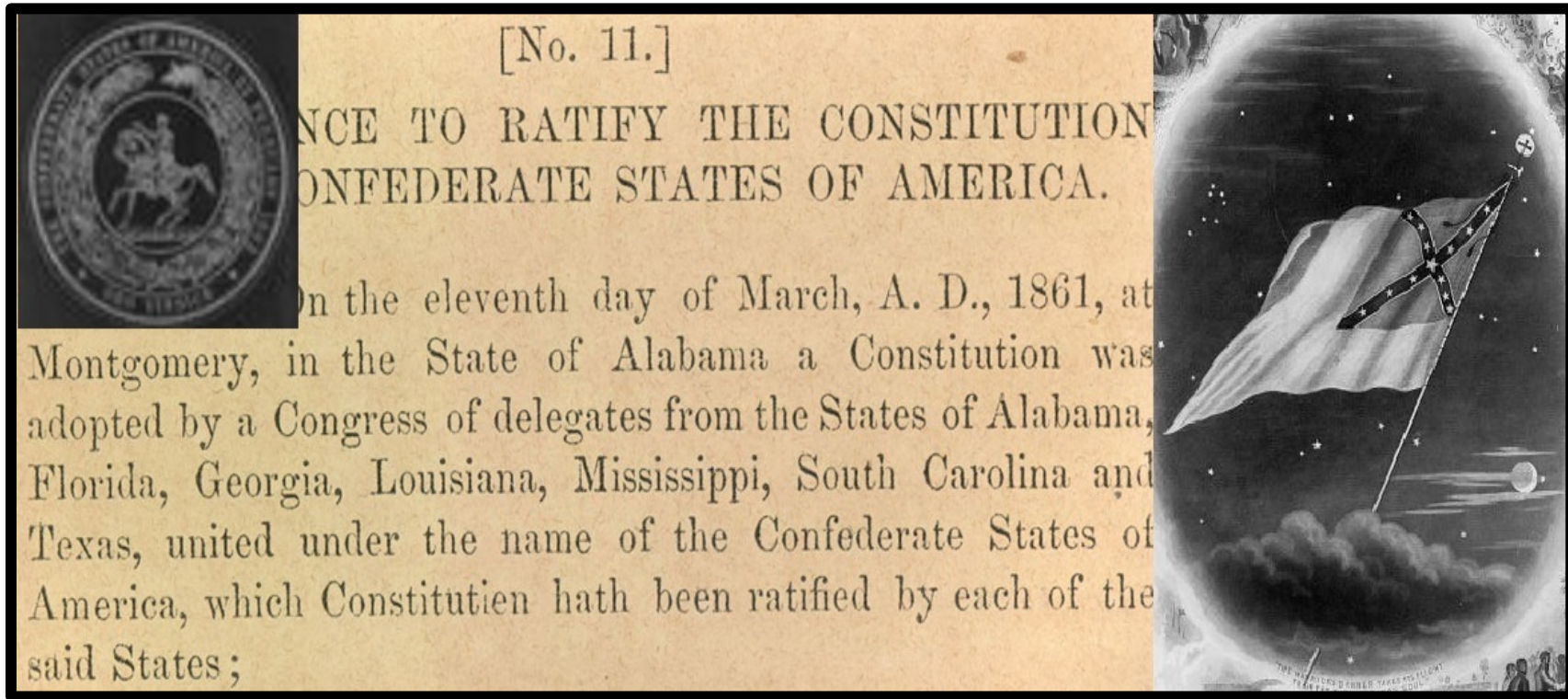
Therefore, we the people of the State of Arkansas, in convention assembled, do hereby declare and ordain, and it is hereby declared and ordained, that the "ordinance and acceptance of compact," passed and approved by the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas, on the 18th day of October, A. D., 1860, whereby it was by said General Assembly ordained that, by virtue of the authority vested in said General Assembly, by the provisions of the ordinance adopted by the convention of delegates assembled at Little Rock, for the purpose of forming a constitution and system of government for said state,

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE AND ORDINANCE
DISSOLVING THE FEDERAL RELATIONS BETWEEN
THE STATE OF TENNESSEE AND THE UNITED
STATES OF AMERICA.

Tennessee

First. We, the people of the State of Tennessee, waiving any expression of opinion as to the abstract doctrine of secession, but asserting the right, as a free and independent people, to alter, reform, or abolish, our form of Government in such manner as we think proper, do ordain and declare that all the laws and ordinances by which the State of Tennessee became a member of the Federal Union of the United States of America, are hereby abrogated and annulled, and that all obligations on our part be withdrawn therefrom; and we do hereby resume all the rights, functions, and powers, which by any of said laws and ordinances were conveyed to the Government of the United States, and absolve ourselves from all the obligations, restraints, and duties incurred thereto; and do hereby henceforth become a free, sovereign and independent State.
