


Women at the Springfield Armory

Primary Source Activity



The best way to learn about someone or something from the past is to examine primary sources. A *primary source* is an immediate, first-hand account of a topic, from people who had a direct connection with it. To learn more about the role that women played in the history of the Springfield Armory, you will examine newspaper articles and photographs from 1941 and 1942.

THE SPRINGFIELD SUNDAY UNION AND REPUBLICAN, SPRINGFIELD, MASS : AUGUST 24, 1941



Brig-Gen Gilbert H. Stewart, Springfield Armory commandant, said yesterday the shortage of skilled male labor may mean that women will be trained then employed for certain industrial pobs at the Armory.

Manager George F. Harding of the Springfield office of the state employment service predicted several months ago that the Armory would be one of several firms in this area which would eventually be forced to place women in industrial jobs to meet the labor shortage.

Gen Stewart said yesterday that funds have been asked to train women in some of the simpler industrial tasks.

During the World war women went to work in the Armory plant in order to release men for more skilled jobs in ordnance work, the general said.

In preparation for the employment of women at the Armory, questionnaires have been sent out to 18 industrial firms in this area from which tentative wage schedules will be prepared. Thus women employed at the Armory will be paid wages equal to those paid by private industrial firms.

Use the following questions to examine and analyze the newspaper article from 1942. Answer using complete sentences unless it states otherwise.

- 1. What details indicate when and where this was published?
- 2. Look at the title of the article. What does the article tell you about the contents of the article?

<u>Part II:</u>

- 3. According to the article, when did women start working at the Armory? Why were they being hired?
- 4. What jobs were women performing at the Armory? How did the women interviewed feel about doing those jobs? How can you tell?
- 5. *"A young man keeps an eye on his production record when he realized there is a girl ready to step into his shoes and perhaps do a little better on the job. It has happened."* What does this line tell you about how women were performing in their jobs at the Armory?

- 6. What can you tell about the point of view of the person who wrote the article? Use evidence from the text to support your answer.
- 7. What does this article tell you about attitudes towards women in society during this time? Use evidence from the text to support your response.
