

The Spanish flee south for 12 years. The Spanish follow El Camino Real when they return to New Mexico and begin rebuilding missions and settlements. Mexico gains its independence from Spain. The Santa Fe Trail opens and El Camino Real becomes a trade route south from Santa Fe. A treaty is signed that makes New Mexico a part of the United States, including the lands traversed by El Camino Real north of El Paso.


