M. PAUL FRIEDBERG, FASLA

Landscape architect, designer, educator, and writer
Professor Emeritus, City College in the City of New York
Founder and principal of M. Paul Friedberg and Partners, an award winning landscape design firm. Friedberg is Founder and Director of the Urban Landscape Architecture Program at CCNY, Adjunct Professor at Columbia University and Pratt Institute, and has lectured widely. The American Society of Landscape Architects (ASLA) awarded him the Design Medal in honor of his contribution to the profession in the area of design. He has also been awarded the AIA Medal for Allied Professional in recognition of his inspiration and influence upon the architectural profession. Friedberg received a B.S. degree from Cornell University in 1954.

DONNA GRAVES

Arts and Cultural Planning Consultant
Graves is nationally recognized for her work in the development of public art, public history and interdisciplinary public programming. She has worked with the Richmond Redevelopment Agency, National Park Service, San Francisco Arts Commission, Japanese Cultural and Community Center of Northern California, Catellus Development Corporation among others. Graves served as Project Director for *Rosie the Riveter Memorial: Honoring American Women's Labor During WWII*, the first national memorial to women's contribution to the home front and was Executive Director of *Power of Place*, Los Angeles, known for innovative and experimental collaborative projects by historians, designer and artists. Graves is author of *Tending the Home Front: Women on the West Coast During World War II*, University of California Press (forthcoming). She received a B.A in American Studies, University of California, Santa Cruz, 1981, MA in American Civilization, Brown University 1982 and M.A. Urban Planning, UCLA 1989.

RICHARD HAAG FASLA, HON AIA

Landscape Architect, Principal of Richard Haag & Associates
Professor Emeritus, University of Washington
Haag founded the Department of Landscape Architecture at the University of Washington in 1963. His creativity and sensitivity to the natural environment and adaptive re-use of existing structures and facilities has been expressed in the more than 500 built projects on which he has worked. He is recognized for his skill in collaborative design, innovative thinking, and community involvement. Recipient of the Gold Medal ASLA, he is the only person to twice receive the American Society of Landscape Architects Presidents Award for Design Excellence. Haag was educated at the University of Illinois, University of California at Berkeley (B.L.A.), and Harvard University Graduate School of Design (M.L.A.), awarded a Fulbright in Japan and was Resident at the American Academy in Rome. Harvard University Graduate School of Design honored Mr. Haag with an exhibition and a book, *Richard Haag: Bloedel Reserve and Gas Works Park*.

David Hollenberg has a distinguished career in the National Park Service where he serves as principal advisor to the Regional Director/Deputy with delegated authority for leadership and direction, policy development, program and management guidance. Hollenberg has participated in a host of important design competitions and worked with leading landscape architects, architects and designers and is well recognized for his work in achieving projects of significance, including his recent work on the design competition and redevelopment of Independence Mall in Philadelphia. Previous to his work with the National Park Service, Hollenberg was Vice-President and Director, Department of Architecture at the firm of John Milner Associates in Pennsylvania. He received a B.A. degree from Columbia University and an M.A. in architecture from the University of Pennsylvania and is currently on the faculty at the University of Pennsylvania.

MICHAEL ROTONDI, FAIA

Architect and Educator

Founder and principal RoTo Architects

Michael Rotondi has been an architect and educator for over twenty-five years; he founded and served as Director of the innovative Southern California Institute of Architecture (SCI-Arc). Rotondi currently teaches and is a Board Member at SCI-Arc and is a Professor at Arizona State University in Tempe. Projects range from educational to institutional, cultural, commercial and residential and include an experimental theatre complex in La Jolla, a School of Architecture in Texas, a large regional park in Los Angeles, a memorial for the Los Angeles Fire Department, a large Stupa in Santa Cruz, California, a 70 acre industrial site in Louisville, Kentucky into a central part of the city, and the development and planning of the Tempe Center site. His primary interest now is exploring how educational and professional practice can find common ground in the discipline of architecture. Recent teaching positions include the Saarinen Visiting Professor at University of Michigan, the Brown-Forman Visiting Chair in Urban Design at the University of Kentucky, and the Harry Shure Professor at the University of Virginia.

W. CECIL STEWARD FAIA

Educator

Dean Emeritus and Emeritus Professor of Architecture and Planning at the University of Nebraska College of Architecture in Lincoln, Nebraska

His academic programs in teaching and research include architecture, interior design, community and regional planning. In 1996 he founded, and is President of the Joslyn Castle Institute for Sustainable Communities in Nebraska. Steward was elected President of the AIA in 1991 and in 1999 he was awarded the National Topaz Medallion for Excellence in Architectural Education jointly by the AIA and the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture. Currently he holds a visiting faculty appointment at the University of Hawaii School of Architecture and is a Senior Fellow of the National Design Futures Council. He serves on the steering committee of the United Nations Center for Human Settlements Best Practices Network and the for the International Dubai Award for Best Practices in Sustainable Development. He also serves as the editor-in chief of the GreenSource Report, a monthly newspaper. Steward has served as a jury member on a host of large-scale design competitions worldwide. He earned his B.A. degree from Texas A&M University (1957) and M.S. in Architecture from Columbia University (1961).

SUSAN SZENASY

Design Journalist

Editor-in-chief of Metropolis Magazine

As Editor-in-chief of Metropolis Magazine Szenasy is responsible for the editorial content of the magazine, which covers architecture, culture and design. She is recognized for her thoughtful and perceptive view on contemporary design and her broad knowledge of significant issues confronting the design disciplines and the larger world community. Szenasy has special interest and expertise in the environment and sustainable design. She co-founded R. Dot (Rebuild Downtown Our Town), a coalition of New Yorkers who came together after the 9.11 tragedies to "contribute their expertise to building the 21st century metropolis on the site of the World Trade Center". She is the author of several books, including "The Home and Light". Born in Hungary, Susan Szenasy received an M.A. degree in Modern European History from Rutgers University and teaches design history and ethics at Parson's School of Design.
