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		restrictions described above would have some adverse impact on visitor access and opportunities for recreation, however, could improve the park setting and visitor understanding of each area's sensitive resources.	Additional interpretation is planned for some sites, such as at Kirby Cove and the San Francisco Bay Discovery Site. Interpretation can offer the visitor new understanding and appreciation for park lands and structures. Trails would be an important part of this alternative's recreation component. In Marin and San Mateo Counties, some fire roads would be converted to trails, and many trails and trailheads would be enhanced to provide backcountry trail experiences. Many trails throughout the park would be connected to the regional trail system, creating an unbroken network for visitors to explore by many transportation modes: including on foot, bicycle, or horse. Some additional camping would be provided in San Mateo County as another recreational opportunity. Alternative 2 recognizes several sensitive resource areas, and accordingly requires limitations on visitor access to those areas. Rodeo Lagoon, the areas around Conzelman, Bunker, and McCullough Roads, and some offshore marine environments would all have restrictions on visitor access. Recreation opportunities would be reduced in these areas. Ocean Beach would also have an area designated to protect shorebirds, and therefore limit human use. Some other areas in San Francisco and San Mateo Counties would have areas limiting visitor use with the goal of protecting the wildlife or natural ecosystem, for example, the SFPUC Watersheds area would have highly controlled visitor access to its support biosphere designation. Restrictions would limit the visitor experience in these areas.	would allow visitors to explore the park lands by several forms of transportation. This alternative proposes additional primitive camping opportunities, which is supported by many members of the public who want the park to serve as their wilderness next door. Additional equestrian programs and expanded equestrian areas are proposed in San Mateo County, allowing equestrian uses to expand in the park, which was encouraged by some members of the public. Some areas would limit visitor access, such as offshore areas in the sensitive resources zone. Ocean Beach would have a reduced visitor access area, as would Fort Funston. While the size of the areas devoted to recreational use would be reduced, the diversity of activities that could occur in these areas would remain the same.

		Public access to park sites, including parking improvements, public transportation connections, and multimodal access would be improved as a result of the preferred alternative. Areas slated for improved parking include Stinson Beach, Tennessee Valley, Milagra Ridge, and Mori Point. Public transportation access from many of the Marin County sites would be improved. Several park sites along Highway 1 would receive improvements in the access to the highway. Several trails in Marin County and San Mateo County would be designated as multi-modal trails, and trails in all areas of the park would be better connected to neighboring lands. Many sites would also provide a connection to the San Francisco Bay Water Trail. These improvements would facilitate access to and between desired locations for all park visitors. In addition, improved public transportation opportunities will help connect park sites to a larger audience in the Bay area, improving the diversity of the visitor population. Improved access, particularly improved trail and public transportation opportunities to many park sites was one of the most frequently mentioned and encouraged topics by the public as well as park partners.	Trail improvements and connections to communities and the trail network would be the primary access improvements proposed by Alternative 2. Trail connectivity and improvements will allow more visitors and a more diverse range of visitors to enjoy park trail experiences. The south parking lot removal at Stinson Beach, which would make accessing the Beach more difficult, would be mitigated by alternative transportation. Alternative transportation would reduce traffic and congestion at the Beach, make parking less of a hassle for visitors, and reduce the noise and air pollution associated with most personal vehicles. The proposal to not restore Highway 1 between Muir Beach and Stinson Beach would reduce accessibility between these two places. Improved access to Highway 1 would facilitate access to desired locations for park visitors.	Stinson Beach would see improvements made to parking and public transportation access, giving visitors better access to the beach, and reducing traffic and congestion there. Trail improvements and connections would be a primary element of alternative 3. Trail access improvements allow visitors more convenient and safe access to and between areas within the park as well as surrounding communities and other public lands. Alternative 3 proposes a few hubs or portals-places where visitors can get started at visiting other areas of the park. Orientation and interpretive programming (with or without accommodation) would be offered in sites such as Upper Fort Mason and Shelldance Nursery, giving visitors accessible ways to experience the diversity of opportunities the park has to offer.

		Stewardship, leadership, and volunteer activities would be enhanced in the preferred alternative. New stewardship facilities and educational facilities are proposed at several locations, including Lower Redwood Creek, Fort Barry and Fort Cronkhite, Fort Miley, the Shelldance Nursery area, the Sweeney Ridge area, and at Rancho Corral de Tierra. The history of the Montara Lighthouse would also be a focus of interpretation at that site. Multiple modes of interpretive and educational offerings would lead to engagement from a wider audience as well as a deeper understanding of park resources and values. In particular, this alternative provides enhanced outdoor learning and leadership opportunities aimed at building the next generation of park stewards. Stewardship opportunities are one of the most highly valued experiences in the park and this alternative would continue to grow those opportunities with improved facilities and more locations.	Alternative 2 proposes significant increases in the stewardship programs available in the park. While Slide Ranch would no longer be a place for environmental education, new stewardship and science education opportunities would exist at Lower Redwood Creek, Golden Gate Dairy, Upper Fort Mason, the Octagon House, Fort Miley, Shelldance Nursery area, and the Sweeney Ridge area. Fort Mason in particular would serve as a hub to get people out to stewardship programs. Multiple modes of educational offerings would lead to engagement from a wider audience as well as a deeper understanding of park resources and values. Stewardship opportunities are one of the most highly valued experiences in the park and this alternative would emphasize these opportunities. Visitors would be engaged in participatory science, education, and stewardship that nurture personal connections with nature and inspire advocacy. Exploration along the vast network of trails would further highlight the park's diverse ecosystems and rich cultural resources, educating visitors to the natural and cultural resources of the park. Leadership by the park, in collaboration with community partners, would demonstrate pro-active a management in the face of climate change and sea level rise. These interpretive messages would reach visitors enjoying the coastal environment along the San Francisco Bay Trail and the California Coastal Trail. Cultural resource sites and stories would also highlight the human connection of the coastal environment; sites and stories would include archeological sites, European exploration, maritime history, and coastal	This alternative focuses on immersing the visitor in the iconic stories of the military history, the landscapes, the landmarks, and the presence of undeveloped land in the midst of an urban environment. The military history and coastal fortifications at several sites along the coast and bay would be highlighted with interpretive media and programs, giving visitors a deeper understanding of these nationally significant structures. Stewardship centers located in the park would enhance community pride and commitment in the park lands, and serve as places to teach the next generation of park stewards.
