Trail Loops

Ocean View Loop

Start on Tamarind Street or La Conte Avenue, follow the signed trail north with an out-and-back, and then continue to McNee Ranch State Park, passing through forests, meadows and have sweeping views of the ocean on this hike or ride.



• Difficulty Level: Easy

• Total Hiking Time: 50 minutes



Ember Ridge & Farmer's Daughter Loop

Start on Etheldore Street and walk up Moss Beach Ranch Road, take the San Vicente Trail along the ridge, and then head down through Ember Ridge Equestrian Center. Add in extra mileage with the Farmer's Daughter loop trail and/or Spine Trail. • Trail Mileage: 5.0 miles

• **Difficulty Level:** Strenuous

• Total Hiking Time: 2 hours 45

minutes

Flat Top & Clipper Ridge Loops

Start and end on Coral Reef Avenue, follow the trails to Flat Top or continue further with a loop up Clipper Ridge to French Trail for expansive ocean views.

- Trail Mileage: 1.4 miles (Flat Top Loop); 3.5 miles (Clipper Ridge Loop)
- **Difficulty Level:** Easy, Strenuous
- Total Hiking Time: 50 minutes; 2 hours
