Clara Small received her Bachelor's degree and first Master's degree in history from North Carolina Central University, and her second Master's degree in liberal arts from St. John's College, Santa Fe, NM She started her doctorate at the University

of Missouri and completed her doctorate in history at the University of Delaware. She authored a book titled "Reality Check: Brief Biographies of African-Americans on Delmarva." She also co-authored with the Rev. David Briddell "Men of Color, To Arms! Manumitted Slaves and Free Blacks from the Lower Eastern Shore of Maryland Who Served in the Civil War." Small has been the recipient of numerous awards including the University System of Maryland Regents' Award for Public Service; the Community Foundation of the Eastern Shore's Frank H. Morris Humanitarian Award; and the Faithful Service Award from Pi Gamma Mu, the International Honor Society for the Social Sciences.

Louis S. Diggs joined the National Guard in 1950 and served in the Korean War. From 1957-1964 he served as the Sergeant Major of the ROTC Detachment at the then-Morgan State College. He graduated from the University

of Baltimore with a BA degree (cum laude) in 1979 and a Masters of Public Administration Degree in 1982. He did post graduate studies at the George Washington University in Washington, DC. In 1995, Louis published his first book, "It All Started on Winters Lane." In 1997, he published his second book, "Holding On To Their Heritage," a book that documented the history of two other historic African American Communities in Baltimore County, MD.
