Emergency Access Route along the Lava-Covered Chain of Craters Kalapana Road

Interim Public Comment Summary and Response Report - Comments through November 24, 2014

INTRODUCTION

On October 30, 2014 the National Park Service (NPS) approved the construction of an emergency access route along the lava-covered section of Chain of Craters Kalapana Road in Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park. Due to the emergency nature of the project there was not time to complete an environmental impact statement prior to beginning work. Therefore, NPS agreed to alternative NEPA arrangements with the Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ), pursuant to CEQ and Department of the Interior NEPA implementing regulations. As part of the alternative arrangement provisions, public comments are being accepted while construction of the road is in progress to consider adjustments to the proposed action and enhancement of proposed mitigation measures.

NPS is committed to protecting the natural and cultural resources within the park to the greatest extent possible, as this is the reason the park was established. Specifically, the purpose of the park is to protect, study, and provide access to Kīlauea and Mauna Loa, two of the world's most active volcanoes; preserve endemic Hawaiian ecosystems; and perpetuate the traditional Hawaiian culture connected to these landscapes.

This is a unique project for a national park unit to undertake and adds many challenges to an already challenging environment. NPS is working towards balancing the needs of all members of the public while continuing to provide a positive visitor experience and protection of irreplaceable resources.

SUMMARY

This report includes comments received by NPS from November 4, 2014 through November 24, 2014. During this time 209 individual correspondences were received. These were all read and then divided into separate comments that were then assigned codes based on the topic the comment addressed.

For this report comment topics are noted in **bold**, and a statement is included that summarizes the thoughts included in the comments under each topic. Representative quotes have been selected for each comment topic and the response from NPS is just below that. A report that includes all of the comments received, in their full context (with personal identifying information removed) is included as Attachment A.

Currently, the deadline for public comments is Friday, January 9, 2015 and will be extended if construction of the emergency access route is still on-going at that time. Upon the close of the comment period, a final comment response report will be completed.

COMMENTS AND RESPONSES

Not supportive of access restrictions (this includes comments assigned the codes Cultural Resources: Impacts of Proposal and Socioeconomics: Impacts of Proposal)

Many commenters expressed concerns regarding the decision to only allow residents and essential services to use Chain of Craters Kalapana Road.

Representative Quote

Please allow this road to remain open to all residents, friends and family of residents, and all people and goods that allow lower Puna to remain a viable, thriving community. Do not restrict it to residents only. (Correspondence ID 16)

Our area greatly depends on tourism and over half of the homes in Kapoho Beach Lots are vacation rentals who pay considerable taxes to the state. To ban all other visitors from our area will destroy our economy and result in many foreclosures. (Correspondence ID 25)

The Hawaiian culture is centered on large, extended families who don't always live in the same community. Our family members are often not even 'blood' related. We don't want to ever tell our family and friends that they cannot come over to visit and talk story, because our government had restricted access to the area we live. (Correspondence ID 11)

Response

The proposed action in the Environmental Review and Decision document stated, "[t]he emergency access route would be used for access by emergency vehicles, transportation of commercial goods to sustain the community, and egress and ingress of residents in the communities in the Lower Puna region that are anticipated to be cut off by the closure of existing routes, Highway 130 and Railroad Avenue. This emergency access route is not designed to handle large volumes of traffic; therefore it would not be open to general public use, only 'local' traffic."

However, based upon public comment received on the proposed action, it is apparent that visitors to the region are part of what is 'required to sustain the community during the emergency' (as described in the Environmental Review and Decision document). NPS received comments from the public that the community would not be sustained if only 'local' traffic and vehicles providing essential services were allowed to use the road and that there is a need to allow individuals to visit that would not fall under the definition of local traffic. Local traffic was not specifically defined in the Environmental Review and Decision, but was intended to include friends, family, and invitees of residents. Lower Puna region was not specifically defined, but was intended to include from the Hawaiian Beaches subdivision south and southwest to Royal Gardens (adjacent to the park boundary). Dr. Mark Kimura, a University of Hawaii-Hilo researcher in economic geography, said there are about 257 businesses providing almost 1,200 jobs in Puna that would be cut off or affected by the lava flow. This includes six hotels and lodging areas, several educational institutions and libraries, and six health services facilities.

Because of these concerns, NPS has decided to expand the definition of local traffic to include visitors to the region who will use the road in addition to residents and vehicles providing essential services (commercial goods, emergency vehicles, etc.). The park does not intend to encourage the park visitors specifically to drive down the emergency access route, but will not prohibit people from using the road to access the Lower Puna region.

The impacts of allowing visitors to the region to use the road in addition to local traffic and vehicles providing essential services fall within the impacts disclosed in the Environmental Review and Decision document. No additional adverse impacts will occur as a result of this change because it is expected that there will be less local traffic than originally estimated and any increase in other traffic would not result in levels greater than the original estimate in the Environmental Review and Decision document.

The NPS will monitor use of the road and will restrict access to only local traffic and vehicles providing essential services or apply other mitigation measures if resource or safety concerns warrant.

Support for some type of access restrictions

These commenters were supportive of creating some level of restriction on access through Chain of Craters Kalapana Road; mainly due to concerns regarding criminal activity and traffic.

Representative Quotes

Only residents who own land, rent vacation rentals or other rentals, should be allowed through Volcanoes National Park. Permission for family and friends can be reported so the park knows who is on Federal land. (Correspondence ID 105)

Unless there is control on both the Kaimu end and the Park end, visitors, whether on tour vehicles or in private vehicles, will have a great incentive just to use the C of C road as a passage into lower Puna, or conversely into the "backside" of the Park. (Correspondence ID 17)

Response

As stated above, NPS has decided to allow visitors to the region to use the road to access the Lower Puna region, in addition to local traffic and vehicles providing essential services. The emergency access route will open only after Highway 130 and Railroad Avenue are closed. There currently is a ranger station near the existing end of pavement and this site will be used to interact with visitors and residents as needed, in addition to informational signage. In addition, a ranger station/kiosk will be constructed at the park boundary on Chain of Craters Kalapana Road to manage the traffic entering the park from that direction. The rangers who staff these stations will carry out law enforcement activities as necessary. In addition, the park is seeking additional funds to support activities related to the road, some of which will support law enforcement activities.

Alternatives: Raised Highway

A few commenters proposed the idea of building a raised highway that goes over the lava flow.

Representative Quote

Please investigate the potential of an elevated roadway and or tunnels to mitigate any future flows from disruption of service. (Correspondence ID 153)

<u>Response</u>

NPS will, to the extent practicable, support and work with state and local governments to actively pursue the construction and/or creation of other long-term viable alternative routes to the park road, including other roads and harbors, to provide access to the communities on the southeast side of Hawai'i. However, the development of those alternatives is outside of the park's authority.

Alternatives: Build an entirely new road/route

Some members of the public expressed their support for the building of an entirely new road.

Representative Quote

We hope that an alternative road will soon be made to the Chain of Craters Kalapana Road. It is definitely not the first choice of residents but it may be our only choice for a while. (Correspondence ID 8)

Response

As stated above, NPS will, to the extent practicable, support and work with state and local governments to actively pursue the construction and/or creation of other long-term viable alternative routes to the park road, including other roads and harbors, to provide access to the communities on the southeast side of Hawai'i. However, the development of those alternatives is outside of the park's authority.

Alternatives: Other

A variety of other alternatives were suggested as well.

Representative Quotes

There must be other options, such as bridges, or ferries that would make more sense than turning our beautiful park into a commuters' speedway. (Correspondence ID 205)

Response

Some of these alternatives were considered in the Environmental Review and Decision document; see Section IV, Alternatives Considered, page 13, "...the options of relying on helicopters or water based access were considered. However, because helicopter access is frequently limited by weather conditions and because the area does not have access to a viable harbor, these options would not be able to provide the necessary level of access and therefore would not meet the purpose and need for taking action."

Additionally, as stated above, NPS will, to the extent practicable, support and work with state and local governments to actively pursue the construction and/or creation of other long-term viable alternative routes to the park road, including other roads and harbors, to provide access to the communities on the southeast side of Hawai'i. However, the development of those alternatives is outside of the park's authority.

A far better solution would be to expand use of Railroad Road and/or Beach Road, opening them all the way into Hilo. (Correspondence ID 48)

<u>Response</u>

Both of these roads are on land owned and managed by others and is therefore outside of NPS jurisdiction. Any decisions related to those roads would be at the discretion of the land owners or managers.

General Comment: Support for project

Several comments expressed support for the construction of the emergency access route.

Representative Quote

This letter serves as my support and request for the opening of further access roads to and from lower Puna through our Parks where it is beneficial and necessary. (Correspondence ID 75)

Response

NPS is committed to protecting the natural and cultural resources within the park to the greatest extent possible, as this is the reason the park was established. Specifically, the purpose of the park is to protect, study, and provide access to Kīlauea and Mauna Loa, two of the world's most active volcanoes; preserve endemic Hawaiian ecosystems; and perpetuate the traditional Hawaiian culture connected to these landscapes. NPS appreciates the support of the public and, as stated earlier, is committed to working with state and local governments to the extent practicable to actively pursue the construction and/or creation of other long-term viable alternative routes outside of the park, including other roads and harbors, to provide access to the communities on the southeast side of Hawai'i.

General Comment: Clarifying question

Many comments were received that included clarifying questions. These questions are addressed in Attachment B.

General Comment: Importance of Protecting Park Resources

A variety of comments were received that expressed concern regarding ensuring that the Park's resources are adequately protected.

Representative Quotes

Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park is a precious cultural and environmental landmark. Let us be mindful of this fact as we face the difficult realities ahead. Let us stop and consider what is best for the park and not let our rush to create a commuter route offset the obvious mitigations that must take place to protect this important World Heritage Site. (Correspondence ID 103)

Remember, this national park was chartered to conserve and protect lands and wildlife, not administer to evacuees. (Correspondence ID 205)

<u>Response</u>

NPS has committed to following through with numerous mitigation measures that are intended to avoid or minimize as many adverse impacts associated with this project as possible. Please see Attachment C for a list of all of these mitigations. Additionally, these measures can be found in the Environmental Review and Decision document, Section IV, page 14; and Appendix A.

The staff and leadership of Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park is dedicated to the mission of the National Park Service as well as the park's specific mission. Protecting, preserving, and educating the public about the unique resources of the park are vital to achieving the goals of these two missions.

Law Enforcement: Increased crime concerns

Some residents expressed concerns about increased crime as a result of a potentially large increase of people travelling through the park and using Chain of Craters Kalapana Road.

Representative Quote

You/we don't need the drunks, drug addicts, criminals, and squatters while the region and its inhabitants try to heal from the changes. Those who make money from drugs should be well aware that transporting on Federal land is not the same as transporting on state land. Suspicious vehicles should be pulled off the road and inspected inside and out. (Correspondence ID 105)

Response

NPS understands these concerns and has committed to the following mitigations to address them (Environmental Review and Decision document, section IV, page 14):

The park is seeking funding for the increased operational need, including additional staff and is working to have staff on board prior to the road being ready for use.

Increased law enforcement and other staffing (maintenance, interpretation, etc.) will be necessary to protect visitors, park resources, and ethnographic resources and rights. This includes patrolling roads, responding to emergencies, traffic control/management, resource monitoring, enforcing legislated rights (Native Hawaiian access), maintaining restrooms and other facilities along the roadways, etc.

All state and federal laws will be strictly enforced within the park boundaries.

Mitigations: Suggestions to avoid/minimize impacts

Numerous commenters provided suggestions for actions NPS could take that could help avoid/minimize the impacts of the project. Some of the suggestions had already been included in the NPS Environmental Review Document. A list of all of these suggestions, as well as responses to these suggestions and all mitigations NPS has committed to, is included in Attachment C.

Natural Resources: Invasive species concerns

A common concern from the public was regarding the potential for an increase in invasive species such as the little fire ant and coqui frogs.

Representative Quote

One obvious impact is the introduction and/or continuing spread of invasive species such as little fire ants, stinging caterpillars, and coqui frogs that will hitchhike on vehicles and end up in the park. Lower Puna is ground zero for invasive species on the Big Island. (Correspondence ID 103)

<u>Response</u>

NPS has committed to following various mitigations measures regarding invasive species; preventing them from entering the park as well as an eradication process. Please see Attachment C of this report, as well as the Environmental Review and Decision document, section IV, page 14; and Appendix A.

Controlling invasive species by eradication, prevention, and education, is something the park has been committed to since its inception. NPS has long standing practices in place for achieving these three goals and overall has been very successful in controlling the negative impacts of invasive species. The park will continue these practices, in addition to the assigned mitigation measures from USFWS to ensure this level of success endures.

Natural Resources: Concerns with impacts to nēnē

Concern was expressed regarding impacts to the endangered nēnē, with increased car traffic along roads where they are known frequent.

Representative Quote

It is not a question of IF but WHEN speeding drivers will run over and KILL Nene birds who have the well-known habit of walking along the side of the pavement where morning dew collects and so moist vegetation grows. (Correspondence ID 31)

Response

NPS has committed to following various mitigations measures regarding the nēnē. For a list of these mitigation and protection measures please see Attachment C of this report, as well as the Environmental Review and Decision document, section IV, page 14; and Appendix A. In addition, NPS is working with USFWS on formal consultation to determine if other measures are needed.

Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park has worked very hard to protect and increase the nēnē population within the park and will continue to do so when Chain of Craters Kalapana Road opens. The emergency access route will open only after Highway 130 and Railroad Ave are closed. The park monitors the locations where this endangered species frequents and will provide extra monitoring and protection to the areas near the Chain of Craters Kalapana Road where the nēnē is known to be present.

Public Communication: General Comment

One comment provided a suggestion on public communication.

Representative Quote

Have an open forum and discussion with those affected. Take the lead from how Civil Defense has been handling the situation. We get daily updates; there are weekly or so meetings, etc. (Correspondence ID 28)

<u>Response</u>

Since October 30, 2014 NPS has been attending the public Lava Flow Meetings that are held in Pāhoa every Thursday night. Information and maps are provided and staff is there to speak with the public, answer questions and address concerns. NPS representatives have also met with various small groups in the Lower Puna region and will continue to do so as requested.

Park Operations: Impact of Proposal

Several commenters expressed concerns regarding potential traffic and enforcement issues, maintenance of the emergency access route, and park staffing and operational issues,

Representative Quote

Should Chain of Craters Kalapana Road become a commuter route, the park's fiscal and personnel resources, it seems to me, will be overextended in order to patrol the evacuation zone for such potential problems as speeding, abandoned vehicles, invasive species, unsecured cargo, increased traffic, bottleneck traffic at the entrance, hazardous materials, illegal activities, vehicle breakdowns, entrance pass eligibility, etc. This is not the purpose of a national park. The purpose is to protect and preserve for the enjoyment of all. (Correspondence ID 110)

Response

The NPS understands that the opening of this road will adversely impact park operations. As described in the list of mitigations in the Environmental Review and Decision document, section IV, page 14, NPS is working on obtaining funding to support additional support staff to come on board when the road should open (the emergency access route will open only after Highway 130 and Railroad Ave are closed):

The park will seek funding for additional staff and is working on expedited hiring to have staff on board prior to the road being ready for use.

Increased law enforcement and other staffing (maintenance, interpretation, etc.) will be necessary to protect visitors, park resources, and ethnographic resources and rights. This includes patrolling roads, responding to emergencies, traffic control/management, resource monitoring, enforcing legislated rights (Native Hawaiian access), maintaining restrooms and other facilities along the roadways, etc.

Public Safety: Impacts of Proposal

Concerns were expressed regarding public safety issues such as vehicle break-downs, speeding, crime, and traffic.

Representative Quote

A significant increase in commuter traffic, often with time-stressed drivers who under-calculated the time needed to get to work, would also greatly increase safety hazards for pedestrian and tourist traffic on Crater Rim Drive. (Correspondence ID 83)

Response

The Chain of Craters Kalapana Emergency Access Road will have a speed limit of 20 mph, as this is the speed that creates the safest conditions for motorists on the gravel route. The paved portion of Chain of Craters Kalapana Road has speed limits ranging from 25 mph to 35 mph. Additionally, as stated earlier in this report, NPS is currently seeking funding to hire additional staff for this operational increase of traffic and safety related issues.

Road Comment: Pave the road

Many commenters suggested that the emergency access route be paved.

Representative Quote

Should the Chain of Craters Kalapana Road become the only means in and out of lower Puna for vehicular traffic, it will need to be paved so as not to incur unnecessary repair expense, so as to avoid causing unnecessary damage and expense for vehicles using the road, to provide reasonably quick vehicular access, and to allow for passage of emergency vehicles should a vehicle stall, especially during rush hour. (Correspondence ID 172)

<u>Response</u>

In order to create a paved road that meets NPS park road standards, significant upgrades would be needed. The roadway bench would have to be widened further to provide additional clear zone at cut slopes, and the vertical profile smoothed out to safely accommodate the higher speeds motorists will drive on a paved surface. Additionally, before an investment in pavement could be made, upgrades to the quality of the sub-base would be required (the sub-base being built now is not as well graded or compacted as would be required for a permanent facility). Storm drainage improvements would also likely be necessary. It is estimated that such improvements would cost about \$2 million per mile, or about \$11 million for the 5.5 miles total (of roadway within the park). There is no funding to pave the road and there is not time to complete this work before the use of the emergency access route is necessary. It would also be fiscally irresponsible to pave the road due to the high probability of future lava inundation. In addition, funding would be needed to complete further NEPA compliance, which would likely result in the preparation of Environmental Impact Statement.

Road Comment: Don't pave the road

A few commenters expressed support for not paving the emergency access route.

Representative Quote

I am perhaps one of the few, NOT in favor of paving the C of C road not only because of the added expense to the taxpayers and extended preparation time, but because of the unknown environmental ramifications, and the fact that a gravel road will necessarily limit speed, which is a great thing on an island where poor driving habits are the norm. (Correspondence ID 17)

<u>Response</u>

The approved road is a two-lane unpaved gravel road.

Road Comment: Open the road before Railroad Ave is covered

A few commenters suggested the emergency access route should be opened prior to other viable access routes being closed.

Representative Quote

There are thousands of people in my situation where highway 130 will be cut off and it is forecast that Railroad will be a long difficult and crowded detour. I live close to Kalapana and would mostly choose to drive a little longer and avoid the traffic jams if I am able to drive Chain of Craters. Others in my same situation would make the same choice. This would also reduce the congestion on Railroad and Beach roads. (Correspondence ID 181)

<u>Response</u>

The County of Hawai'i is currently making improvements to Railroad Avenue so that it is better prepared to handled additional use/traffic. The purpose of the park is to protect, study, and provide access to Kīlauea and Mauna Loa, two of the world's most active volcanoes; preserve endemic Hawaiian ecosystems; and perpetuate the traditional Hawaiian culture connected to these landscapes, not to provide commuter access for the local community. Therefore, the NPS will only open Chain of Craters Kalapana Road when Highway 130 and Railroad Avenue are covered or closed due to the lava flow, as stated in the Environmental Review and Decision document and as is also stated in the agreement between the NPS and Hawai'i County.

Environmental Review and Decision document, section II, Proposed Action, page 3:

The road will only be used when the NPS has determined it is safe to use and that both existing routes, Highway 130 and Railroad Avenue, have been closed because they are covered by lava or otherwise deemed unsafe (e.g. volcanic fumes).

Road Comment: Don't reopen the road

Several commenters suggested the emergency access route should not be built.

Representative Quote

I am not understanding why funds are being spent to rebuild Chain of Craters Kalapana Road so that displaced Lower Puna residents can use it for commuting from the lava flow area. This doesn't make sense for our precious park. (Correspondence ID 208)

It also does not seem to make sense to me to carve a road through an active inundation zone that most recently saw lava flows in August 2013. (Correspondence ID 85)

<u>Response</u>

NPS recognizes that the area in which Chain of Craters Kalapana Road is located is frequently covered by lava flows, most recently as 2013. The road has been blocked by lava for 37 years of its 49-year existence. NPS did not have any intention of reopening the road because of the high potential for it to be covered by lava once again (Environmental Review and Decision document, section II, Plan Conformance, page 4). However, due to the need for emergency access, NPS determined a two-lane, unpaved gravel road is necessary.

Road Comment: Keep road open permanently

A few commenters suggested the emergency access route be opened permanently.

Representative Quote

I generally agree that the Chain of Craters Road should be opened as an emergency access route, although once the road is open Puna residents (with the appropriate decal) should be able to use it regardless of whether or not Rte. 130 is closed. (Correspondence ID 48)

Response

The purpose of the park is to protect, study, and provide access to Kīlauea and Mauna Loa, two of the world's most active volcanoes; preserve endemic Hawaiian ecosystems; and perpetuate the traditional Hawaiian culture connected to these landscapes, not to provide commuter access for the local community. Therefore, the emergency access route will open only when Highway 130 and Railroad Avenue are closed and will remain open only until another viable route out of the Lower Puna region is available.

Keeping Chain of Craters Kalapana Road open permanently would require a permanent increase in the park's budget and staffing levels, which is unlikely to occur. Also, historically this area has been frequently inundated by lava it is unknown how long the road would remain viable. NPS would be required to conduct further NEPA compliance if the road were intended to be permanent, as the compliance completed for the current action was for an emergency access route only. This level of compliance would likely be an Environmental Impact Statement.

Transportation: Increased traffic concerns

Commenters expressed concern regarding traffic issues, such as congestion and speeding.

Representative Quote

The traffic through the National Park is a problem as there will be many times the normal traffic daily traffic if Puna residents need to use that path. (Correspondence ID 40)

<u>Response</u>

NPS is committed to alleviating the traffic along the roadways as much as possible. Several mitigations have been developed to address this impact. However, due to the potential volume of traffic, congestion will remain a problem. From the Environmental Review and Decision document, section IV, page 14; and Appendix A:

The park is seeking funding for the increased operational need, including additional staff and is working to have staff on board prior to the road being ready for use.

Increased law enforcement and other staffing (maintenance, interpretation, etc.) will be necessary to protect visitors, park resources, and ethnographic resources and rights. This includes patrolling roads, responding to emergencies, traffic control/management, resource monitoring, enforcing legislated rights (Native Hawaiian access), maintaining restrooms and other facilities along the roadways, etc.

NPS will, to the extent practicable, support and work with state and local governments to actively pursue the construction and/or creation of other long-term viable alternative routes to the park road, including other roads and harbors, to provide access to the communities on the southeast side of Hawai'i.

Transportation: Support for efficient residential access through park entrance

Many commenters expressed support for a system that allows quick passage through the park entrance for residents.

Representative Quotes

Install an express lane for resident use at the Volcano Park entrance to shorten our trip time. (Correspondence ID 25)

Lower Puna residents should receive a decal, allowing them free access to Chain of Craters through the park. (Correspondence ID 64)

<u>Response</u>

The NPS is supportive of allowing residents "express" access through the park entrances; the park will issue car decals to residents to address this concern. Further changes to provide for efficient entry/exit will be considered as necessary.

Visitor Experience: Impacts of Proposal

Concern was expressed regarding the impact of the proposal on the park visitor's experience.

Representative Quotes

What will the visitor experience be like when there are perhaps dozens and dozens of cars bottlenecked at the park entrance all day long? (Correspondence ID 141)

I am also concerned about Namakanipaio campground as well. It could become a layover place for commuters who want to divide their drive in half. With the limited amount of campground space that exists now, this could be a problem in terms of occupancy for those residents and visitors who enjoy camping at Namakanipaio campground. (Correspondence ID 103)

<u>Response</u>

NPS recognizes that there will be potentially significant adverse impacts to the visitor experience with the opening of Chain of Craters Kalapana Road (see Environmental Review and Decision document, section III, Potentially Significant Adverse Impacts, page 7) for more details. The key mitigation that NPS will follow in attempt to reduce the impacts to visitor experience is the following:

The park will seek funding for additional staff and is working on expedited hiring to have staff on board prior to the road being ready for use.

Increased law enforcement and other staffing (maintenance, interpretation, etc.) will be necessary to protect visitors, park resources, and ethnographic resources and rights. This includes patrolling roads, responding to emergencies, traffic control/management, resource monitoring, enforcing

legislated rights (Native Hawaiian access), maintaining restrooms and other facilities along the roadways, etc.

Having enough staff on board to protect resources, including visitors, to maintain park facilities, including trails and roadways, and to provide educational outreach will be essential in protecting the visitor experience. However, additional staffing is dependent upon the park receiving enough additional funding to support the hiring of such staff.

In addition, once the road is open, further changes may be determined necessary to address congestion and efficient flow of traffic.

NPS would also like to note that since 2012, Nāmakanipaio Campground has been managed by a park concessioner with NPS oversight. Campground users are required to pay a fee for camping.

My partner and I have lived in Kapoho for 9 years. I no longer commute daily to work in Hilo and while we try to limit our trips even into neighboring Pahoa, sometimes we need to go to Hilo for medical and/or supply reasons. Thus, as you stated, the Chain of Craters access would be our only option to travel via land if/when the lava flow cuts off Railroad avenue and the Jungle road. Hopefully, Pele will remain calm and rest for awhile, but historical odds seem to be against a long-term period of inactivity.

I have a few brief comments and a question or two:

I am perhaps one of the few, NOT in favoring of paving the C of C road not only because of the added expense to the taxpayers and extended preparation time, but because of the unknown environmental ramifications, and the fact that a gravel road will necessarily limit speed, which is a great thing on an island where poor driving habits are the norm. Also, I know that many people used to fish from the beaches on/near the Kaimu flow, and while I am not summarily opposed to persons fishing for recreation or food, a road would open this figurative "can of worms" - allowing vehicles to pull off the road and camp, whether under a popup tent or overnight. Obviously, this type of activity would further congest an already narrow road so perhaps frequent motor patrols could disallow this.

Has the issue of Kona winds been addressed, especially since they seem to be more and more frequent? That is, the closing of the road on the south and west side (as is done now within the park, at least the last time I visited) Will those same "unhealthy air conditions" be ignored if this road is built, or how will they be handled?

Also, will traffic be limited to local travelers? Unless there is control on both the Kaimu end and the Park end, visitors, whether on tour vehicles or in private vehicles, will have a great incentive just to use the C of C road as a

passage into lower Puna, or conversely into the "backside" of the Park. If Yes, access will be limited, what is the plan?

Thanks for the forum and Good Luck. We all know that regardless of what is done, there will be some naysayers and critics, but the bottom line is that we need a possible route out of lower Puna if the lava limits our options.

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Correspondence Text

1) As regards the control of invasive species. The two most threatening species to wit are the coqui frog and the little fire ant Lower Puna has been subjected to a plague of both species for several years now; they are both entrenched causing considerable harm to visitors, residents, flora and fauna alike. The USDA is culpable for failing to eradicate these pests. My suggestion is that the USDA work with County and State agencies immediately on an intensive eradication campaign. Whether or not the Chain of Craters Road is ever utilized, eventually both species will infest HVNP.

2) Lower Puna has an abundance of drugs and chemically dependent people. The DEA is remiss in failing to control this problem. I suggest that The DEA, along with County and State counterparts, work together to curtail the flow of drugs and drug money in and out of Lower Puna. Couriers, distributors, importers and manufactures, as well as users need to be brought to justice immediately. This also applies to drunk drivers. Again, whether or not the road is ever utilized, this problem, if left unattended, adversely impacts HVNP.

3) Crimes against property in Lower Puna are rampant. Federal, State, and County authorities need to control this problem. Perpetrators of these crimes operate with near impunity. Much of the stolen property is exported. Criminal organizations large and small need to be eliminated from the area altogether. Acting on this now will ease pressure on HVNP law enforcement personnel regardless of whether on not the road is open.

In all, many of the issues surrounding Chain of Craters Road access need to be addressed by the Federal, State and County agencies both prior to and during it's period of operation. Failing to do so will negatively impact HVNP as well as Lower Puna.

We have the Hot Pond, Kapoho Tide Pools, Kehena Black Sand Beach, and miles and miles of untouched wild beauty. All seen from a slow majestic drive down the 137 Hwy. Recently Hwy 137 was awarded Scenic Byway designation by the State of Hawaii.

I applaud the national park's willingness to offer the Chain of Craters Road to help our neighborhood stay connected!

Recently I heard that access to Chain of Craters road may be restricted to local residents only. This would have a detrimental effect on our lives. As much of Hawaii, our area is dependent on tourism. We have a major retreat center (Kalani), a huge amount of vacation rentals, and farmer's markets that are geared towards visitors. Many local artisans make their living selling crafts at these markets. Local food vendors, farmers, and restaurants depend on visitors ability to come here. Many area residents have gainful employment that is created by these businesses.

At the risk of sounding dramatic, I think this decision would kill our community. The ability for everyone to travel freely in and out of our area is essential to it's existence. I urge you to carefully consider this when making the final determination about access, and who shall have it. I encourage you to drive down here and see the community and all the beautiful sites. It's often described as "Old Hawaii". We need to continue to share this stunning unique area with visitors who choose to vacation off the beaten path.

Would you consider having the option for visitors to purchase a decal that was valid for the time that they are visiting? This fee would help subsidize the additional costs associated with maintaining the road. Just one thought of probably many once we try to come up with a harmoinous solutions that benefits all.

I hope you take pride in and make great efforts to expand the publics' horizons by infact not taking a wallpaper approach to a gravel road that will grind down in short amount of time and over long period of time need maintenace and repairs of potholes, washboard effect that would cause more expense, time, further delays, road contruction frustration of residence, their vehicles, doing business, business trucks needed to go to and from our area, generating commerce, tourism, and still going forward with life in Lower Puna.

Did this road have thermal imaging before the path was bulldozed to be made aware of hot spots of concern and hot spots to avoid? Would appreciate a two-laned PAVED road from the beginning and start as long as the asphalt will withstand the heat of any steaming lava underneath for EVERYONE'S SAFETY and EASE. Consideration must also be taken for the vehicle weight limits and safety of delivery trucks. Need the Gas Company truck driver to be able to still deliver two 23 gallon tanks of Propane to residence especially considering an aging population of seniors and those with disabilities who are not going to be physically hauling and schleping heavy propane tanks. Will big, heavy tanker trucks for ethanol free gas for generators and unleaded gasoline for transportation be able to access and travel road? Will heavy equipment trucks also be able to do the same? Will trucks hauling construction materials from Hilo be able to get us supplies when we may need to make repairs and maintain our homes and properties?

Will we still be able to have household appliances delivered such as a rusted refrigerator or oven replacement, etc? I am very concerned about the proposed limits to the "emergency access" route called Chain of Craters Road. My concerns center around: the impact on the local economy, the general restriction of access, the designation as "emergency access" only, the need for a permanent road and the difficulties presented by the suggestion of decals for access.

Impact on Economy

I am a licensed contractor who lives in lower Puna. My job is dependent on people who live here and people who visit while vacationing and decide to build or renovate here. Many of my customers are people who drove to the Puna district while vacationing and discovered this oasis and decided to invest here. I am dependent on the ability of people to freely access this part of the island. Any restriction placed on visitors to discover this part of the island will negatively impact my ability to make a living here. I also work for current owners of vacation rentals. The same issue is true for them. Many people who discover this area while driving to see the sites end up renting here and contributing indirectly to my income. Any restriction on the ability of tourists to travel in lower Puna will lower the property values in the area since so much of our local economy is dependent on these tourist dollars.

Restriction of Access

I have not chosen to live in a gated community. I want my guests and friends to be able to freely come and go as they wish at any hour of any day or night. Asking them to somehow obtain some kind of permission in advance of a visit is a restriction on my freedom and theirs which I do not welcome. I have also heard talk of a potential gate restricting travel at night. If that is true, I can not express my disapproval strongly enough. To be locked in or out of my community at any time will never be acceptable.

The inconvenience of having to present a decal for access will be outrageous for a community of this size. At present, there is usually a line of several cars and a wait of several minutes to enter the national park. It is currently

estimated that 7,000-10,000 cars a day travel through Pahoa on Highway 130. When that access to Pahoa is blocked by the lava, some large percentage of those vehicles will be passing through the National Park gate on a daily basis in addition to the current visitor load! I can only imagine the colossal backups that will happen if a decal is required to be displayed or someone needs to stop and explain why they don't have one. It is bad enough that my travel time to the nearest city of Hilo will be increasing by over 90 minutes each way. To add a bottleneck at the entrance to the park will be completely unacceptable.

The other difficulty with decals will be the logistics of granting passes to all of those who are entitled to them. Who will inform the tens of thousands of tourists who visit the Big Island each year that they will need passes to visit a large portion of the island? Who will pay for that bureaucracy? What about the many thousands of friends that those of us in lower Puna have? From whom will they have to seek permission to visit us? What about commercial vehicles? What about unmarked commercial vehicles like home health-care workers? Will they have to acquire decals? Will it cost additional money for me to have visitors to my own home?

Any solution which does not allow for unrestricted access to and from my home is unacceptable to me.

Need for a Permanent Road

We are community of many thousands of taxpayers. When the lava makes its way to the ocean, Chain of Craters road will be the only way for us to travel to and from our homes. There is no other way without crossing the active lava flow. Because it will be the only route and it will be heavily traveled, it needs to be a safe, permanent road surface. It needs reflective markers to highlight the lanes like many other roads on the Big Island. It needs shoulders for emergency stopping. It needs to be a durable surface that can be easily traversed by many of the thousands of vehicles in our community and by commercial vehicles. It will already be difficult enough to transport goods the extra 60 miles from Hilo. Eight miles of a gravel road will make some companies reluctant at any price to come to our community and contribute to the local economy.

"Emergency Access"

The designation of this route as an emergency access is a misnomer. I would like it to stop being referred to in this way. When the lava crosses State Highway 130 and the other temporary access roads through the subdivisions and then flows into the ocean, Chain of Craters Road will the ONLY possible route in or out of any area that is home to about 8000 people. There is no other place to site a road to this area which avoids the current lava flow without going through the Volcanoes National Park. This road will be the only way in or out of an area with hundreds of millions dollars in real estate investment. It will not be our emergency access road. It will be our only road to home.

The Chain of Craters road should not restrict access to only lower Puna residents, their guests, agents and vendors. As permanent residents of Keaau, we feel a deep connection to the town of Pahoa, which soon may be "so near, yet so far." We also enjoy visiting the beaches and tidepools in lower Puna, and the community gatherings at Uncle Roberts every Wednesday night. It is our understanding that the current proposal would prevent, or at a minimum complicate, our visits to these favorite locals and friends on the far side of the potential flow.

As the owners of a vacation rental property in Keaau, we also fear the impact this restricted access could have on our business, since many of our tourist guests come specifically to enjoy the businesses and natural sites that may require Chain of Craters Road access.

If Chain of Craters Kalapana Road (even if it were paved) and Crater Rim Drive are the only access between Lower Puna and Highway 11, it is pretty obvious that Lower Puna could no longer be a feasible bedroom community for Pahoa, Kea'au and Hilo due to the increased commute time. Slow winding Crater Rim Drive going past Thurston Lava Tube and the Kilauea Iki look out, with all of the tourist buses, rental cars and pedestrian traffic, was not designed to be a significant transportation link between Lower Puna and the rest of the Island. Attempting to convert Chain of Craters Kalapana Road & Crater Rim Drive to the only access for Lower Puna would be devastating to the economic engine that drives Volcano Village being the tourist spending generated by the National Park. The questions, therefore, are: 1) What would be the impact on the National Park visitor experience if Crater Rim Drive/Chain of Craters Kalapana became the only access to Lower Puna; 2) What would be the economic impact on Volcano Village and nearby communities (including Hilo's hotels and restaurants), if the visitor experience of the National Park was significantly degraded due to a major increase in traffic; 3) How would emergency services to Lower Puna be affected if police/fire/ambulance had to access the area via Chain of Craters Kalapana Road & Crater Rim Drive. A significant increase in commuter traffic, often with time-stressed drivers who under-calculated the time needed to get to work, would also greatly increase safety hazards for pedestrian and tourist traffic on Crater Rim Drive. There will certainly be people who will attempt to pass on those blind corners because they are late to work/appointment or just impatient. The National Park will need to greatly increase its law enforcement/traffic control to deal with this influx of commuter traffic.

Allowing this road to become a commuter lane does not seem to serve that purpose. I worry about invasive species being brought into the park as well as just general overload of traffic through a park that already handles several thousand vehicles a day. I also worry about the endangered nene being hit by all this extra traffic because commuters will be rushing around to get to Hilo and back. I would imagine there will be much more stress on the park's budget in overseeing the route, money that will be diverted from conservation to evacuation control, traffic enforcement and the like. Again, does not seem the domain of the national park's charter.

I very much doubt the original Chain of Craters Road was ever intended to serve as the only way out of a large, populated area that is located beneath a very active vent.

It also does not seem to make sense to me to carve a road through an active inundation zone that most recently saw lava flows in August 2013. I understand that as they were dozing they found several hot spots! What happens if surface flows bubble up or lava tubes collapse while motorists are driving on this road? Who's liable?

As a concerned citizen and huge fan of our very unique HVNP, I would beg you to please make sure that our park and its resources are protected and that all other alternate options other than running a commuter/evacuation road through a national park are examined for feasibility.

Not only will the wonderful peaceful vibe of the park be disturbed for local residents who enjoy visiting, it will also affect the visitor experience, as HVNP is the busiest national park in the state and a huge draw to our island, and thus our economy. While I acknowledge the difficult, pending situation facing Lower Puna residents in the coming months/years, I am also deeply concerned about the well being of Hawaii Volcanoes National Park. Now that Chain of Craters road will become a commuter road as opposed to an evacuation route, there are so many potential damaging impacts to the park that MUST be addressed and mitigated before a single car is allowed to pass over this road. One obvious impact is the introduction and/or continuing spread of invasive species such as little fire ants, stinging caterpillars, and coqui frogs that will hitchhike on vehicles and end up in the park. Lower Puna is ground zero for invasive species on the Big Island. Vehicles laden with trash or green waste could prove permanently damaging if drivers do not take the necessary precautions in tying down their cargo. Illegal dumping could happen as well. Will there be regulations regarding the hauling of trash, hazardous and green waste? Will any and all types of vehicles be allowed to commute through the park? It appears so, based on the proclamation signed by the governor.

Another potential problem will be vehicles speeding through the lower areas of the park in the rush to complete the long and strenuous route. I have recently learned that Nene geese are now breeding off lower CofC Road. How will this new traffic and inevitable speeding affect the endangered Nane goose; our Hawaiian state bird? Vehicular breakdowns and abandoned vehicles will also happen, guaranteed. What is the cell phone coverage like down there? I'm guessing it's nill. How will someone be able to phone for help in the middle of the night if a clunker car breaks down in the hinterlands of CofC Road? What happens when you run out of gas on your 73-mile commute? The nearest gas station is KMC in the park. The park will need to add more staff to patrol this area. Where will the funds come for additional staff? I am in favor of having a guard shack down there so that vehicles with heavy cargo, waste or hazardous materials can be cleared before entering the park, and so that shenanigans like illegal fishing, camping, etc can be prevented.

I am also concerned about Namakanipaio campground as well. It could become a layover place for commuters who

want to divide their drive in half. With the limited amount of campground space that exists now, this could be a problem in terms of occupancy for those residents and visitors who enjoy camping at Namakanipaio campground. I'm also opposed to the granting of free passes to anybody and everybody who lives and works or commutes to Lower Puna. With the NPS threatening to raise entrance fees across the board, it is not fair to those of us residents us who have to pay to enter the park every time. There should be a time limit on these decals, and then they can buy a park pass like the rest of us. It's the least that Puna commuters can do to help mitigate the environmental impact that more cars, more traffic, etc will have on the park. It's no different than having to pay to drive a toll road. Sorry for sounding so harsh, but Puna citizens should contribute the well-being of the park if they are going to be using it as a commuter route. I cringe at the thought of commuters racing through the park to get to their destination, trash flying out of the back of pickup trucks, little fire ants and coquis hitchhiking on green waste that might fly out of the back of a truck. Speed limits must be strictly enforced.

I'm also dismayed that the county would spend up to \$15 million on a road that was inundated as recently as 2013 and is still hot. Who is the recipient of these funds? Who got the contract? Was it no-bid?

I am heartbroken for the residents of Puna who will potentially be cut off, but there are other factors to consider when it comes to this situation. The health and protection of Hawaii's most visited attraction is at stake. Hawaii Volcanoes National Park is a precious cultural and environmental landmark. Let us be mindful of this fact as we face the difficult realities ahead. Let us stop and consider what is best for the park and not let our rush to create a commuter route offset the obvious mitigations that must take place to protect this important World Heritage Site.

On any given day, the majority of those going into and out of the Park are going to be Puna residents or others visiting and/or serving lower Puna. Tourists are used to stopping, paying, and putting something on their car to identify that they have paid. I have to do this myself when parking at any hotel in the state. There should be a free lane for everyone who is not visiting the Park so as not to impede traffic or penalize people for living in or visiting lower Puna.

Anyone using the free lane and then parking or hiking in the Park could be easily ticketed with a heavy fine if they do not display a Park pass. I have a Park pass basically at all times so someone like me could simply go through the visitor gates at those times when I wish to visit the Park (as I do now) and get the pass. Or perhaps I could get a mirror hanger that I put my pass into so that when I park it is clear I have paid. Again, the burden of proof should be on visitors and NOT on residents.

I am writing to comment about the massive amount of emergency funds being spent on the rebuilding of Chain of Craters Road to serve as a commuter route for displaced residents of Lower Puna. First of all, the millions being spent on this endeavor could go up in smoke tomorrow, as this road has been inundated by lava as recently as 2013. Furthermore, it is still hot underneath the road, as shown in current thermal satellite images. Before spending any more money on this road, the County of Hawaii should evaluate if funding could be better utilized to provide an alternate access over the actual June 27 lava flow itself should it cross HWY 130. One idea would be to construct a "boardwalk" for hiking across the flow to a community parking lot in Pahoa, where people can leave their vehicles or take a shuttle bus. It seems much more practical to hike across a cool flow to get to your vehicle or shuttle (or drive across a bridge), than it would be to make the arduous 70-plus-mile journey through Hawaii Volcanoes National Park one way, speeding the entire way in all likelihood and potentially scattering hitchhiking invasive species throughout the park.

Also, I am dismayed by some of the comments I've read on social media that demonize Park Superintendent Cindy Orlando for her mission to protect the park and its environs. It's as though the County and the mayor are running roughshod over the park itself, as if park's existence and preservation are secondary considerations. In everything I've read thus far, the park has very real concerns which should be acknowledged and appreciated, not dismissed and scoffed at. Should Chain of Craters Road become a commuter route, the park's fiscal and personnel resources, it seems to me, will be overextended in order to patrol the evacuation zone for such potential problems as speeding, abandoned vehicles, invasive species, unsecured cargo, increased traffic, bottleneck traffic at the entrance, hazardous materials, illegal activities, vehicle breakdowns, entrance pass eligibility, etc. This is not the purpose of a national park. The purpose is to protect and preserve for the enjoyment of all.

Also, the notion that the park should allow anybody and everybody free access to get to Puna is absurd. Puna

commuters should pay for an annual pass after the current emergency has subsided. This will help offset the negative impacts to the park should the road become a highly utilized commuter route.

I understand the Puna needs a way out, but Chain of Craters Road as a commuter alternative will turn out to be a worse-case scenario for most people in terms of gas, mileage, wear-and-tear and the extra hours spent on the commute. It would be better and more fiscally responsible for the County to concentrate its next phase of efforts on finding solutions closer to Pahoa, such as building a bridge or boardwalk over the June 27 flow itself.

The following are my opinions regarding use by lower Puna residents and all other Puna traffic:

1. Of the two entrance gates at the Volcano side main park entrance one should be reserved for lower Puna traffic only and should be a slow but open flow with no attendant and no stopping. The other gate can be manned and service typical Park traffic. Specific signage to advise.

2. The current park policy of leaving the gates open and unmanned during the night could be officially noted and Puna traffic encouraged to use the road during those hours (possibly expanding the unmanned hours) for a freer flow.

3. No stopping of traffic at the Kalapana side park entrance.

4. No restriction of use to residents, open public use.

5. Puna traffic should not allowed to stop in park to use park facilities unless in possession of a valid park pass, displayed on dashboard. Ticketing of violators parked cars without a park pass. Signage advising us all of these concerns.

6. A wash station for lower Puna traffic entering park on Kalapana side could be made available right at the county water spigot where 137 meets 130 in Kalapana. This might help with the invasive species. It could be an optional free carwash that we are encouraged but not required to use.

Thank you for agreeing to a 2 lane road through the Volcano National Park, but this road should be as it was in the past, a paved road. I have owned a vacation rental home in the Kapoho area since 2010 and presently have 4 rental properties, all of which have suffered a 70% dop in revenue, due to the bad press we have been receiving in Lower Puna/Pahoa. For the NPS to state on their websites that only locals will have access to Lower Puna/Pahoa is very damaging to the East Hawaii tourism industry. There would be in excess of 300 vacation rental units/farmstay units in lower puna. On VRBO alone there are 285 listings, not counting numerous eco/farm stays on AirBnb etc. Only Kona has extensive hotels and resorts, this is why vacations rentals are normally in such high demand in East Hawaii and to reduce lodging in the area would have a negative impact for everyone associated, including the NPS. We need positive press for Pahoa/Puna. Please consider that likely more than 10,000 people (large numbers of rural people are not being counted due to living on a property without a permitted permanent house) living in lower Puna simply cannot sell their homes/properties to afford to move to another area and must do their best to survive in what was already a depressed economy. We need tourism and the ability to do business in our area and not be restricted. Only today I called the Big Island Visitors Bureau and Hawaii Visitors and Convention Bureau and their call centers both told me the same exact thing, only residents could enter Pahoa, you could drive HWY 130 around Pahoa but could not enter Pahoa. This is a completely false statement being propagated for months by the Hawaii Tourism Authority and which has never been true since the June 27 lava flow commenced and is to the detriment of East Hawaii tourism.

Please consider that the NPS depends upon tourism as does at least 24% o Hawaii. The Chain of Craters road should be open to the public, not just for local and commercial services use. If the road is not open to the public, many businesses will slowly die in the Puna area. How are restaurants and other service industries expected to survive if more than 50% o their public clientele is shut out.

My suggestions:

1. The road should be 2 lane paved road with no speed bumps and open to the entire public. If you must limit the public entrance here could be public entry days 4 days a week. The other 3 days could then be better utilized by locals to make their shopping trips to Hilo and of course open to holiday rental guests and commercial service vehicles. To stop or limit public entrance to lower Puna you would be required to construct and man another entrance station near the newly constructed road which would be another truly unneeded expense and another impediment to local traffic and trip driving time.

2. There should be at least 2 stations to enter the NPS and one should be an automated park entry system that electronically reads the park passes for lower puna residents, commercial service vehicles, visitors with pre-paid accommodation bookings in lower puna, tour buses etc. This would ease the congestion and actually cut back on staffing costs. I suggest you offer a 3 day pass at Reduced and Affordable Family Rates, for those visitors staying in Lower Puna/Pahoa who will be entering and exiting the Puna area via Chain of Craters Rd, which means they would be covered by a paid pass when both entering and exiting the park and actually increase park revenues. Resident Cars should not be stopped for routine inspection for fire ants, coqui frogs, insurance and registration verification, etc. 90% o my vacation rental guests pay to see the National Park on their visit here and have been driving from Puna to the park for years and the park has thus far not been overrun by fire ants and coqui frogs from these visitors cars, so they are very unlikely to become a major threat from future cars transporting them into the park or the park would already be experiencing heavy infestations of fire ants and coqui frogs.

3. Open the road when it is completed, let the busy bodies check it out before the road it is really required as the only road in and out and would thus cut down on the initial rush to drive the new road. Why spend Millions of taxpayers dollars on a road that no one is initially allowed to use?

4. The Park is not likely to attract more visitors due to the reopening of Chain of Craters Rd and there will likely be no more visitors to the actual park attractions, as residents will not be stopping in the park except for a possible restroom break, via their very long trip to Hilo. There could be a need for more restrooms in the park, placed at more isolated spots in the park. The Park experience may change slightly due to increased traffic but so will life for all those living in this area. Day Tourist cars could be banned from the park and NPS vans or mini buses could do hop on/hop off stops throughout the park, creating a much more pleasant park experience.

In addition, we pay property, General Excise, and Transient Accommodations taxes to the State of Hawaii (in excess of \$20,000 in 2013) from these properties.

It is essential to us that these vacation renters, as well as any guests or service people, have the ability to get here within a reasonable period of time, on a road that rental car companies will allow their cars on.

Many people live in this area and require supplies and services. This is not a wealthy area. We need these things to be affordable. This means that their access to our area must be affordable to them as well.

We also need to go to Hilo regularly, to jobs, stores, services, supplies, courts, etc., that are not in our community.

For all these reasons, we need a road that can accommodate a large amount of traffic going both ways. It needs to be a good road that meets rental car requirements, paved and sufficiently wide to permit maximum speed travel. It should be separate from the Park system's roads. We should not be slowed down by having to wait in line to receive permission to go through.

I realize this is a lot to ask, considering the terrain, distance, and the fact that it is Park Service land. But Puna is a viable community, and needs to stay viable and be able to thrive. We all hope and pray that our current road system

For one thing, for people driving from the Ka'u or Kona side, it would be shorter and more convenient than having to go to Kea'au and then down to find the two 'new emergency access roads'(if they ever open them to the public)

To state a few facts:

*the covered section of Chain of Craters road was open to the public at one time, so it's not as if this is a novel idea, and if lava had not covered a section of it, it would still be open today.

*I understand the needs of the park charging admission, so an entrance toll gate can be built on the 'new entrance' side but build it away from the threat of another Pu'u O'o eruption going south - maybe just before the hairpin curves.

At the junction of Chain of Craters Road and existing Park Entrance, the visitors could then turn left to go on into the Visitor Center area of the park to continue their visit and the locals using the road as a through-way can take a right towards the exit to Hwy 11.

*At the new toll gate booth, legal Puna residents would just need to display their Park Entrance Permit decals on the windshield and all others, island residents who live in other areas of the island and visitors alike, would need to pay the entrance fee.

After reading through the document, overall I found the issues valid and the concerns raised appropriate for the conservation role of the National Park Service.

The system for allowing local-only use of the CoC emergency access road is not well defined and is probably the most contentious issue for the lower Puna Community.

With a local-only policy, there are State and County Parks that would not be accessible to Hawaii residents and visitors should CoC be the only access route. How are these interests balanced against the NPS concerns?

Businesses appear to be the most at-risk by the arrangement due to the lack of public access. A temporary guest pass system may work for family visitors and businesses with few, less frequent and preplanned visitors (rentals, tours, etc) but this would not be feasible for the restaurants, markets, and other operations that depend on numerous guests without prearranged visits.

Are there methods that can help alleviate these impacts? A tally system for outside visitors? A toll for non-local traffic? Passes that can be validated by local businesses in lower Puna for a reduced cost? Other options?

Without a reasonable system of balancing the NPS concerns with the negative impacts for the lower Puna Community, a demand for free unlimited access seems probable and justified.

At any rate, I just don't think it's a good idea for people to rely on this road for daily travel between Puna and Hilo. This should be considered primarily an evacuation route, and possibly a once a week road. Who could even afford the trip more than twice a month? That would cost the average person \$25.. and a van or pickup driver about \$50 bucks.

You could make it a one way loop to avoid greater chance of invasive species transport. (If Hwy 130 is closed, then of course two way traffic would be required.)

If it were opened as part of a 1-way loop, it would reduce traffic in the park as anyone who starts down Chain of Craters road must continue on to return via Hwy 130.

The loop would also be a boost to Pahoa businesses, as tourists would be regularly travelling through.

Lower Puna will likely lose a lot of residents who need to live closer to Hilo and other centers of jobs and education. The region will suffer economic decline and decay if there is not a regular access road for tourists and other visitors to Lower Puna. The town of Pahoa, vacation rentals, and other destinations for visitors need a stream of income to keep businesses open and provide employment for those who remain in Lower Puna. The National Park draws many visitors every day and it should be made known to those visitors that they may continue their journey through the National Park and Chain of Craters Road to the beautiful, mostly unspoiled Lower Puna coast. If such low impact tourism developed, it would be beneficial to the region otherwise isolated by the lava flow.

It seems to me that the National Park could set up a temporary paid entry point a few hundred yards beyond the current entrance point. It is seemingly clear that without an invitation, no one will be allowed to use the emergency access who is not a resident or an authorized person.

This is I believe a huge mistake.

Business cannot begin to thrive in such an environment. As the lava progresses, lower Puna will become a ghost town. It is as if it is being amputated from the rest of the island. It is bad enough that it will be an island within an island, but to make it an island where no one is allowed is terrible. This has elements of pre-war Germany going on.

We as residents of this island need more focus on dealing with the lava and less focus on dealing with the people. We have lived with the lava as long as we have lived on the island. We do not require herding and a plethora of new rules. We require access.

I do recognize that the park is land set aside for the enjoyment of the public. It is too bad that the lava has made it necessary to allow traffic through the park that is not park-destination traffic. Essentially the people who will be using the road will be residents. Visitors to the island will be be choosing to drive such a lengthy and roundabout route to visit lower Puna, as long as there are other roads available. Once Chain of Craters is the only route, it is

truly unconscionable to deny access to a whole segment of the island to all but those who reside there.

Aloha Cindy,

I do not agree with the marshal law you are infringing on lower Puna. Businesses will go down due to the NPS take over of Hawaiian Kingdom lands. Since the U.S. and Department of Interior have no Treaty of Annexation between the U.S. and the Hawaiian Kingdom holding Hawaiian Nationals and practitioners from Puna is pillaging. Under the Geneva Convention on Human Rights, it is a war crime to keep us from our ancestral lands of lower Puna.

In recent meetings the DOI came to Hawaii islands to ask Hawaiian Nationals if they should make rules for us, making way for Federal Recognition, 97% of us said, "you have no Treaty of Annexation and no jurisdiction." We do not ever consent to the DOI making rules over our sacred grounds.

As a Hawaiian Cultural Specialist of kanaka 'oiwi Hawai'i, I protest any rules, questioning, or permits to enter into our sacred grounds. I go there all the time to make offerings. I refuse to be questioned. My great grandmother was born in Kalapana and raised there. She was in the Hui 0 Pele which gives her and her descendants the right to gather in our sacred grounds in perpetuity without being harassed by rangers or the ranger police. It is none of their business where we are going or what we are doing in the park. Ceremony is sacred and not for us to go blurting it out to people who are occupying our lands.

I respect you and know this is your job but you have no right to make "any" rules for us. 97% kanaka 'oiwi are against Federal Recognition so the answer to the DOI is a resounding, "no." We do not appreciate a bankrupt government telling us what to do on our own lands.

I reserve my right to go to Uncle Robert's Farmers Market to support the economy of lower Puna. If highway 130 is

shut off, I reserve the right to use the Chain of Craters Road. We are thinking of reviving the certificates for Hui O Pele not that we need to show any paperwork but to assert our rights to use the sacred lands of Volcano, Holei, and Kalapana.

I do respect you but I do not respect the DOI for the pillaging of our people and culture with disrespect in forcing Federal Recognition on Hawaiian Nationals.

There are three vacation rental management companies who manage quite a few vacation rentals In the area that will be affected by the cutoff. In Beach Lots and Kapoho Vacationland there are approximately 100 vacation rentals. In all of lower Puna, the number is much larger.

If access Is not given to vacation rental guests, many people will be affected, from house cleaners, to maintenance crews, to property managers and many more. This have a very large and negative Impact to our area.

Most of these vacation rental homes have mainland owners and they rely on the income from the rentals to make their house payments and maintain their homes. A loss of vacation rental business will GREATLY affect them.

Real estate is still active in lower Puna, as Ienders and insurance companies are still making loans and issuing Insurance In areas that are not close to the potential lava flow. If prospective clients don't have access to lower Puna and are unable to use the Chain of Crater Road to view and purchase these properties, many real estate agents and homeowners selling their properties will also be greatly affected. These clients also need to be given access to lower Puna.

And, if vacation rental guests are not allowed in the area, Pahoa restaurants and other businesses

This is not acceptable since it implies use is only in the event of an emergency. This is far short of what the Park can deliver.

According to case law:

Easement by necessity may exist over federal government land, and may exist in favor of state government; but when servient property passes into private ownership, easement disappears because necessity disappears, since state may obtain substitute easement by eminent domain. Moores v. Walsh, 45 cal. Rptr. 2d 389 (cal. App.1995)

Without an easement to the State of Hawaii, residents are unable to reach their properties without the same degree of insurable and legal access.

The actions of the volcano are unpredictable and repetitive. It is not feasible for Park officials to be declaring an emergency is or is not occurring every other month.

A permanent easement to the State of Hawaii is possible, more beneficial to property owners, and more practical.

A potentially more serious issue is coming HAVO's way. According Mayor Keoni's talk with the Puna folks on the 11th, He stated that when the lava reaches the ocean and completely cuts off the folks in lower Puna they will be working with the National Park to open the Chain of Craters road. This options has been on the table for years, however never needed to come to the planning stage. That is my worry, that no one in the park will move proactively on this, get some folks from Denver Service Center (or Tom Fake out of retirement) over and map out a route that protects any remaining cultural features, maintains a scenic view scape (no miles of straight line road, but blend with the topography) and is no wider than necessary. There area other considerations also that the Denver engineers may note. This is not just an emergency bypass, it is potentially the new and permanent chain of craters road. When Harry Kim first hit me with this concept, I was not excited about permanently re-opening the road due to lack of planning for long term public use of the area which would include protection, interpretation, fee management and facility management. I thought more about it being an emergency road much like the Escape Road, that when not needed would be closed to vehicle traffic and used as a hiker, biker path. Of course as we know, the flows will probably return to the older flow field after it does it's work in lower Puna, so

Attachment B – Frequently Asked Questions – Interim from Comments through 11/24/14

1. Will visitors/tourists be able to use Chain of Craters Kalapana Road when it is open?

Response:

Yes. The proposed action in the Environmental Review and Decision document stated, "[t]he emergency access route would be used for access by emergency vehicles, transportation of commercial goods to sustain the community, and egress and ingress of residents in the communities in the Lower Puna region that are anticipated to be cut off by the closure of existing routes, Highway 130 and Railroad Avenue. This emergency access route is not designed to handle large volumes of traffic; therefore it would not be open to general public use, only 'local' traffic."

However, based upon public comment received on the proposed action, it is apparent that visitors to the region are part of what is 'required to sustain the community during the emergency' (as described in the Environmental Review and Decision document). NPS received comments from the public that the community would not be sustained if only 'local' traffic and vehicles providing essential services were allowed to use the road and that there is a need to allow individuals to visit that would not fall under the definition of local traffic. Local traffic was not specifically defined in the Environmental Review and Decision, but was intended to include friends, family, and invitees of residents. Lower Puna region was not specifically defined, but was intended to include from the Hawaiian Beaches subdivision south and southwest to Royal Gardens (adjacent to the park boundary). Dr. Mark Kimura, a University of Hawaii-Hilo researcher in economic geography, said there are about 257 businesses providing almost 1,200 jobs in Puna that would be cut off or affected by the lava flow. This includes six hotels and lodging areas, several educational institutions and libraries, and six health services facilities.

Because of these concerns, NPS has decided to expand the definition of local traffic to include visitors to the region who will use the road in addition to residents and vehicles providing essential services (commercial goods, emergency vehicles, etc.). The park does not intend to encourage the park visitors specifically to drive down the emergency access route, but will not prohibit people from using the road to access the Lower Puna region.

The impacts of allowing visitors to the region to use the road in addition to local traffic and vehicles providing essential services fall within the impacts disclosed in the Environmental Review and Decision document. No additional adverse impacts will occur as a result of this change because it is expected that there will be less local traffic than originally estimated and any increase in other traffic would not result in levels greater than the original estimate in the Environmental Review and Decision document. The NPS will monitor use of the road and will restrict access to only local traffic and vehicles providing essential services or apply other mitigation measures if resource or safety concerns warrant.

The emergency access route will open only after Highway 130 and Railroad Avenue are closed and the emergency access route will be closed to vehicular traffic when another long-term viable access route is available. There may be checkpoints on either end of the gravel route within the park, particularly when the road first opens. These checkpoints would be locations where residents could obtain information on free decals, park staff could answer questions, and any other information could be exchanged.

2. How will residents obtain the decal necessary to access the Lower Puna region via Chain of Craters Kalapana Road?

Response:

NPS has developed an application form (similar to other park decals issued) that will be provided to residents. An on-line application method is being investigated. As part of the application, residents will need to show proof of residency (a utility bill, rental agreement, or something similar). Once the application has been reviewed and approved, the resident will be given a free sticker decal to place on their vehicle so that they may pass through the NPS entrance station off Highway 11 as quickly as possible.

NPS plans to begin distribution of the applications and decals prior to Chain of Craters Kalapana Road opening, so that everyone can be prepared in advance. NPS will continue to reach out to the communities in the Lower Puna region and provide updates on the decal process, as well as park information as the time gets closer to when the road will open.

The free decal is for access through the park only to the Lower Puna region via Chain of Craters Kalapana Road. For those individuals wanting to recreate in the park, payment of the entrance fee is still required and is valid for seven days. Individuals with recreational passes (annual, senior, etc.) would continue to show their pass at the entrance station for recreational purposes, but can get a resident decal (if applicable) to expedite entry into the park when they are only traveling through the park and not recreating within the park.

3. How will non-residents obtain the documentation necessary to access the Lower Puna region via Chain of Craters Kalapana Road?

Response:

Visitors to the region: People who do not reside in the Lower Puna region, or residents that do not want to obtain the free decal but want to travel through the park to access the Lower Puna region will need to obtain an non-recreation day pass, at no cost, from the park entrance station upon stating the need and purpose (access to Lower Puna region) for the non-recreation pass. As previously stated, anyone wanting to use the park for recreational purposes will still be required to pay the entrance fee.

Commercial/Delivery Services: For vendors that are in an unmarked vehicle, they will need to obtain a non-recreation day pass to travel through the park to access the Lower Puna region. Any vendors operating a vehicle clearly marked for commercial purposes (i.e. Pepsi, Lays, etc.) will not be required to obtain a non-recreation day pass (as is the case currently).

4. What is the cost difference between creating a paved road versus a gravel road, including maintenance costs?

Response:

The project as it is currently being built (a two-lane, gravel road 7.74 miles long, of which 5.5 miles is within the park) has been estimated to cost approximately \$12 to \$15.5 million, and is currently being funded by the County of Hawai'i with the possibility of reimbursement by the Federal Highway Administration and/or Federal Emergency Management Agency.

The cost of maintaining the road will vary depending on how often and how heavily the road is used. However, NPS estimates that it will likely cost approximately \$300,000 per year for the physical road maintenance and an additional \$1.2 million per year for increased operational needs (law enforcement, interpretation, resource monitoring, maintenance, emergency services, etc.).

In order to create a paved road that meets NPS park road standards significant upgrades would be needed. The roadway bench would have to be widened further to provide additional clear zone at cut slopes, and the vertical profile smoothed out to safely accommodate the higher speeds motorists will

drive on a paved surface. Additionally, before an investment in pavement could be made, upgrades to the quality of the sub-base would be required (the sub-base being built now is not as well graded or compacted as would be required for a permanent facility). Storm drainage improvements would also likely be necessary. It is estimated that such improvements would cost an additional \$2 million per mile, or approximately \$11 million for the 5.5 miles total (of roadway within the park), on top of the current estimate of the cost to construct the gravel roadway. There is no funding currently available to pave the road and there is not time to complete this work before the use of the emergency access route is necessary. It would also be fiscally irresponsible to pave the road due to the high probability of future lava inundation. In addition, funding would be needed to complete further NEPA compliance, which would likely result in the preparation of an Environmental Impact Statement.

5. Which contractor was selected to complete the road resurfacing work and how were they selected?

Response:

Since all of the funding for the road is currently coming from the County of Hawai'i, NPS does not have this information. Anyone interested in learning about the contractor and contractor selection process should contact the County to obtain this information.

6. Will there be regulations regarding the hauling of trash, hazardous and green waste?

Response:

The County of Hawai'i operates solid waste transfer stations in Kalapana and in Pāhoa, so transport of these materials by individuals through the park should not be necessary. All hauled material must be secured and covered if transported through the park (e.g. trucks serving the transfer stations). State and federal laws will be strictly enforced (e.g. 36 CFR §2.14, §4.2, etc.).

7. Should the public be concerned about lava tubes collapsing while motorists are driving on the road?

Response:

NPS has used ground penetrating radar twice thus far to test for voids (e.g. lava tubes) under the roadway. The results have been provided to the County for consideration during construction. The small lava tubes encountered during the initial road ripping were collapsed and filled. There is a chance that unidentified lava tubes exist, but the likelihood of a collapse from an unidentified lava tube is not very high. Steam vents have been observed near the roadway, but are not anticipated to be a hazard (similar to steam vents found in other areas of the park, including near park roadways).

8. Will emergency services to Lower Puna be affected if police/fire/ambulance had to access the area via Chain of Craters Kalapana Road & Crater Rim Drive?

Response:

Emergency services for the Lower Puna region are the responsibility of the County of Hawai'i, which has developed plans for continuation of services. Please contact the County for detailed information. The park will continue to coordinate emergency response through the park with the County and the road is being constructed to allow emergency access. Traffic on the road will be required to yield to emergency vehicles, as is the case on other roads.

9. How will residents and non-residents be able to travel this route at night when the entrance station is closed? Will there be any restrictions placed on night travel?

Response:

The park is open 24/7 and at this time, access through the park at night will not be restricted. Upon opening the road for emergency access, the conditions will be monitored and adjustments to operations may be necessary. Visitors coming to the park for the first time (for recreational purposes) will need to stop at the Kīlauea Visitor Center to pay their entrance fee if the entrance station is closed, as is currently required.

10. Will Chain of Craters Kalapana Road have the same restrictions as other park roads in relation to vog/poor air quality?

Response:

Yes. NPS will continue to monitor the air quality in the park. There are currently nine air quality monitoring stations in the park, including one at Kealakomo and one near the end of the pavement on Chain of Craters Kalapana Road. Informational signs are posted in known areas of frequent vog with instructions for avoiding the vog. The park takes additional safety measures as air quality conditions warrant.

Attachment C – Summary of Mitigations from Public Comments – Interim from Comments through 11/24/14

Introduction

Many comments were submitted that included suggestions for actions that could be taken by NPS to help avoid or minimize the impacts of the project. Some of these suggestions were already included in the Environmental Review and Decision document (Section IV, page 14; and Appendix A), and thus NPS has already committed to following them.

The first section of this document includes the mitigation suggestions submitted by the public, and responses to those suggestions. The second section of this document includes a table that lists all of the mitigations that NPS has already committed to following in order to avoid or minimize impacts associated with the project.

Suggestions from Public Comments

Public Transportation

- A mass transit system from Puna to Volcano should be put in place; i.e. Regular bus trips in order to reduce the number of vehicles utilizing the Chain of Craters/Kalapana Road with a secure location in volcano to leave personal vehicles so that upon arrival in volcano personal vehicles can be used to go to Hilo/Keaau etc. from a central end-route location. (Correspondence ID 204)
- Shuttle bus round trip from Uncle Robert's up to Volcano Village, or a new Hele-On route. (Correspondence ID 117)
- Day Tourist cars could be banned from the park and NPS vans or mini buses could do hop on/hop off stops throughout the park, creating a much more pleasant park experience. (Correspondence ID 136)

Response:

NPS does not have the funding available or the staffing capacity to own or operate shuttles within the park along Chain of Craters Kalapana Road. Any public transportation outside of the park boundary is outside of NPS jurisdiction and would likely be funded and operated by the County of Hawai'i (e.g., Hele-On). Please contact the County to determine whether public transportation routes will change when other access routes (Highway 130 and Railroad Avenue) are closed due to lava.

Invasive Species

- The USDA should work with County and State agencies immediately on an intensive eradication campaign [of invasive species]. (Correspondence ID 18)
- A wash station for Lower Puna traffic entering park on Kalapana side could be made available right at the county water spigot where 137 meets 130 in Kalapana. This might help with the invasive species. It could be an optional free carwash that we are encouraged but not required to use. (Correspondence ID 122)

Response:

NPS has committed to following a variety of mitigations concerning invasive species (see Table 1, Invasive Species). Additionally, NPS will continue to educate the public about invasive species and how they can help reduce the chances of them entering the park. Fresh water is not available within a reasonable distance to the park's eastern boundary, so a wash station within or directly adjacent to the park would not be feasible. The NPS would support the County's effort to install a wash station, such as near the county water standpipe near the junction of Highways 130 and 137.

Law Enforcement

- I suggest that the DEA, along with County and State counterparts, work together to curtail the flow of drugs and drug money in and out of Lower Puna. (Correspondence ID 18)
- I am in favor of having a guard shack down there so that vehicles with heavy cargo, waste or hazardous materials can be cleared before entering the park, and so that shenanigans like illegal fishing, camping, etc can be prevented. (Correspondence ID 103)

Response:

Please see Table 1, Mitigation SA-3. NPS is seeking additional funding for the increased operational needs such as hiring law enforcement prior to the opening of the road. There are no specific plans to clear heavy cargo vehicles at either entrance, as this would contribute to congestion issues. However, NPS is committed to being flexible throughout this process and if vehicles with heavy cargo, waste or hazardous materials become an issue, changes can be made to address the issues.

Traffic/Road Conditions

- Speed TABLES (not bumps) could be installed where needed to manage traffic speeds. (Correspondence ID 19)
- Clear signage from the park entrance to CoC would be important. (Correspondence ID 19)
- Perhaps park visitors could be routed off the feeder routes to CoC. (Correspondence ID 19)
- Install an express lane for resident use at the Volcano Park entrance to shorten our trip time. (Correspondence ID 25)
- The National Park will need to greatly increase its law enforcement/traffic control to deal with this influx of commuter traffic. (Correspondence ID 83)
- Maybe rest stops, pull outs or an on call emergency service based in the Park. (Correspondence ID 117)
- Solar emergency phones and water available in case of overheating up CoC Rd. (Correspondence ID 117)
- Maybe the stretch of road thru to Kalapana should have a gate like the top entrance? (Correspondence ID 117)
- The current park policy of leaving the gates open and unmanned during the night could be officially noted and Puna traffic encouraged to use the road during those hours (possibly expanding the unmanned hours) for a freer flow. (Correspondence ID 122)
- No stopping of traffic at the Kalapana side park entrance. (Correspondence ID 122)

- Regarding the intersection of Chain of Craters with Crater Rim Drive an alternative flow could be temporarily established. Traffic approaching chain of craters from the Volcano park entrance direction could be given the right of way to go left onto C of C without stopping. Traffic approaching C of C after going the long way around Crater Rim could be stopped by a temporary 'stop' sign at that intersection. (Correspondence ID 130)
- If you must limit the public entrance here could be public entry days 4 days a week. The other 3 days could then be better utilized by locals to make their shopping trips to Hilo and of course open to holiday rental guests and commercial service vehicles. (Correspondence ID 136)
- There should be at least 2 stations to enter the NPS and one should be an automated park entry system that electronically reads the park passes for lower puna residents, commercial service vehicles, visitors with pre-paid accommodation bookings in lower puna, tour buses etc. This would ease the congestion and actually cut back on staffing costs. (Correspondence ID 136)
- At the junction of Chain of Craters Road and existing Park Entrance, the visitors could then turn left to go on into the Visitor Center area of the park to continue their visit and the locals using the road as a through-way can take a right towards the exit to Hwy 11. (Correspondence ID 144)
- This should be considered primarily an evacuation route, and possibly a once a week road. (Correspondence ID 165)
- I hope that the road will be lighted at night and that there will be some form of public transportation available. (Correspondence ID 168)
- It would be a wonderful tourist loop through the park and back on Hwy 130 (before it is closed). You could make it a one way loop to avoid greater chance of invasive species transport. (If Hwy 130 is closed, then of course two way traffic would be required.) (Correspondence ID 170)
- I ask that the Chain of Craters Road be paved and call boxes installed should someone need help. Also areas for cars to pull over if necessary. (Correspondence ID 184)

Response:

Please see Table 1, Mitigation Measures for Safety and Traffic. Additionally, traffic calming devices will be installed within the park boundary on the paved section of road for approximately 1.5 miles before the gravel section begins in order to protect park resources and increase safety in that area. NPS is supportive of allowing residents "express" access through the park entrances; the park will issue free decals to residents to address this concern. Additional changes to provide for efficient entry/exit will be considered as necessary. At this time an electronic pass system is not being considered due to funding constraints and logistics.

Up to nine pull outs will be constructed along the gravel road for emergency situations. A solarpowered emergency phone currently is located at the Pu'uloa Petroglyph parking area. Additionally, NPS is working with cellular providers to determine if enhancement of cell service in this area is possible.

The park consists of public lands and will be made available to everyone who wishes to visit. The only reason the park would close is if there are extremely hazardous conditions and closing the park is necessary to protect public safety.

The Chain of Craters Kalapana Road will not be lighted at night, similar to other roads within the park. This is to protect Dark Night Skies (a natural resource protected in all National Parks).

Fees/Access

- Would you consider having the option for visitors to purchase a decal that was valid for the time that they are visiting? This fee would help subsidize the additional costs associated with maintaining the road. (Correspondence ID 30)
- I'm curious why the chain of craters kalapana road should even consider limited access to just residents? If it's funding issues, set a toll for non-residents. (Correspondence ID 66)
- To help mitigate and manage the traffic impacts, I would support the concept of a toll road. (Correspondence ID 70)
- All people who don't actually live there should pay or have park pass. (Correspondence ID 71)
- Residents of lower Puna as well as delivery trucks making deliveries to those residents should be allowed to pass through the park without paying any fees, while others are still allowed to use the road to access lower Puna when they pay the park fee. (Correspondence ID 87)
- With the NPS threatening to raise entrance fees across the board, it is not fair to those of us residents us who have to pay to enter the park every time. There should be a time limit on these decals, and then they can buy a park pass like the rest of us. It's the least that Puna commuters can do to help mitigate the environmental impact that more cars, more traffic, etc will have on the park. (Correspondence ID 103)
- Instead of requiring nearly 9000 of us to have decals, why not have all paying Park visitors be given a pass to put on their dashboard or rearview mirror? (Correspondence ID 106)
- Also, the notion that the park should allow anybody and everybody free access to get to Puna is absurd. Puna commuters should pay for an annual pass after the current emergency has subsided. This will help offset the negative impacts to the park should the road become a highly utilized commuter route. (Correspondence ID 110)
- A system to identify and admit family, guests and customers of vacation rentals (short term residents) maybe matched with a resident's decal number upon request. A phone number we can reliably call to get guests admitted or an online registry process? (Correspondence ID 117)
- Puna traffic should not allowed to stop in park to use park facilities unless in possession of a valid park pass, displayed on dashboard. Ticketing of violators parked cars without a park pass. Signage advising us all of these concerns. (Correspondence ID 122)
- A temporary free 24/7 carwash station at the lower Puna side near the existing water spigot if offered to area residents would probably be widely used. (Correspondence ID 130)
- I suggest you offer a 3 day pass at Reduced and Affordable Family Rates, for those visitors staying in Lower Puna/Pahoa who will be entering and exiting the Puna area via Chain of Craters Rd, which means they would be covered by a paid pass when both entering and exiting the park and actually increase park revenues. (Correspondence ID 136)
- Stickers for residence and guest who have rented vacation homes should be allowed to pass and tourist and non-residents can pay the park fee. Or simply charge residence a \$25 year annual fee

and non-residents the day or week guest-pass but I think the fee is only warranted if it is a paved road. (Correspondence ID 140)

- I believe that the people of Puna can contribute to the park's burden by paying for a yearly park pass, which isn't too much to ask. (Correspondence ID 141)
- I understand the needs of the park charging admission, so an entrance toll gate can be built on the 'new entrance' side but build it away from the threat of another Pu'u Ō'ō eruption going south maybe just before the hairpin curves. (Correspondence ID 144)
- A temporary guest pass system may work for family visitors and businesses with few, less frequent and preplanned visitors (rentals, tours, etc.) but this would not be feasible for the restaurants, markets, and other operations that depend on numerous guests without prearranged visits. (Correspondence ID 164)
- Are there methods that can help alleviate these impacts? A tally system for outside visitors? A toll for non-local traffic? Passes that can be validated by local businesses in lower Puna for a reduced cost? Other options? (Correspondence ID 164)
- It seems to me that the National Park could set up a temporary paid entry point a few hundred yards beyond the current entrance point. Most park visitors will choose to pay and proceed straight ahead to the Visitors Center and other attractions. A left turn, providing free access leading past Thurston Lava Tube to the coast road would probably not result in much loss of income to the park. Few tourists would choose to save \$10 and see only a small part of the park's attractions. (Correspondence ID 176)

Response:

At this time, residents, delivery vehicles, and visitors to the Lower Puna region who do not intend to recreate in the park will not be required to purchase a park pass to access the Lower Puna area via Chain of Craters Kalapana Road. However, anyone who wishes to recreate in Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park, for any amount of time, will need to pay the entrance fee in full or show the appropriate recreation pass at the entrance station (e.g. annual, Senior, etc.). Details on how the process of issuing decals and non-recreation passes are still being worked out; NPS will communicate directly with the residents of the Lower Puna area as the process develops.
