State of Utah Acquires Historic Naval Yard Depot Warehouses through the Historic Surplus Property Program

In 2011, the State of Utah acquired two former historic Naval Yard warehouses in Clearfield, Utah, to be adaptively reused as storehouses for state documents. The warehouses were transferred to the State of Utah through the federal Historic Surplus Property Program, which enables state, county, and local governments to obtain historic buildings once used by the Federal government at no cost, and to adapt them for new uses.

Completed in 1943, warehouse buildings C-6 and D-5 are historically significant for their association with Naval Supply Depot (NSD) Clearfield, which by the end of World War II was the largest naval supply depot in the world. After the attack on Pearl Harbor, the Naval Supply Depot was built to meet the U.S. Navy's need for an expanded logistical support network. The depot's location in Clearfield, was chosen for its distance from the West Coast, and consequent protection against air strikes. Also, its proximity to railroads, highways, and air transportation from the nearby Hill Army Air Field, coupled with its roughly equidistant location from every major seaport on the West Coast, made Clearfield

a strategic location. Since their construction, warehouse buildings C-6 and D-5 have been used to store supplies for federal agencies including the U. S. Navy and the General Services Administration (GSA). Now for the State of Utah, the World War II-era buildings will continue this historic function.

As part of the Historic Surplus Property Program, the National Park Service works with applicants who seek to acquire the historic properties by providing guidance to ensure that any work on the property meets the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation. The Heritage Partnerships Program (HPP), which worked with the State to develop the required Program of Preservation and Utilization, helped ensure all planned work either preserved or rehabilitated the warehouses' existing historic fabric, such as their multi-pane wood windows, regularly-spaced dock doors, and open warehouse interior.


Location: Western United States, including Utah

HPP Role: Provide funding for the project, as well as expertise, guidance and advice regarding National Register and National Historic Landmarks guidelines.


