- The site has high potential to yield information addressing nationally significant research questions and data affecting theories and concepts on ethnicity and racialization as viewed in the context of settlement, subsistence, and economic patterns of northward Hispano settlement, and its attendant adaptation to the new frontier landscape.

**Integrity:**

- The Trujillo Homesteads retains a high degree of integrity.
- The archeological integrity of materials at the Teofilo and Andrellita Trujillo site is pristine. After the site burned in 1902, it was abandoned and undisturbed. The archeological integrity at the Pedro and Sofia Trujillo Home may have been impacted during house stabilization efforts in 2010. However, there are many artifact concentrations remaining on site that are likely to contain intact archeological deposits related to use of the site during the Trujillo occupation.

**Owner of Property:** The Nature Conservancy. It is located on land that is within the authorized boundary of the Great Sand Dunes National Park and Preserve.

**Acreage of Property:** 35.6 acres
