The Kansas burn unit is north of Beverly Drive between Central and Montana Avenue in Beverly Shores.

When are we burning

Prescribed fires are conducted by fire professionals specifically trained. Fires can only be ignited when the proper wind, temperature and humidity factors allow for a fire which is not too intense, but meets management objectives. Decisions to carry out prescribed burns are based on predicted weather conditions. They are typically scheduled only 24 to 48 hours in advance. We will be trying to burn these units between late March and early May.

Why we burn

Prior to settlement of this area, natural fires occurred every 5 to 15 years, cleaning out the underbrush and accumulation of leaves. This regular cycle of fire maintained the forests and prairies in a natural, healthy state. Today we use prescribed fires as a tool to restore these natural environments and reduce the threat of wildfires.


Project Goals

- Reduce accumulated hazardous fuels near residential area thus reducing the potential for dangerous uncontrolled wildfires.
- Use prescribed fire to maintain and restore fire adapted plants.

Excuse our smoke
