




Mount Baldy Trails

Mount Baldy is the tallest moving sand dune in the national lakeshore. The half-buried trees on its south slope attest to this movement. Without vegetation to hold the sand, Mount Baldy will continue its deliberate march inland.

Do not climb the closed dune slope. Please hike the trail to access the summit and beach. By staying on designated trails, you are helping preserve Mount Baldy for this and future generations.

The national lakeshore was established in 1966 to preserve for the educational, inspirational, and recreational use of the public, certain portions of the Indiana Dunes and other areas of scenic, scientific, and historic interest and recreational value in the state of Indiana. About two million annual visitors enjoy the park's 15,000 acres of wetlands, prairies, sand dunes, oak savannas, forests, and historic sites. 

Water Safety

Lake Michigan waters can be hazardous. Rip currents occur frequently during periods of high wind and waves. During the winter, shelf ice forms along the lakeshore and is never safe to walk on. Check with local authorities about conditions and potential hazards.

Note: There are no lifeguards at any portion of the national lakeshore beach during the fall, winter, and spring.
