Across 1. The Choctaw chief who said "The Americans have been our friends and we shall stand by them."

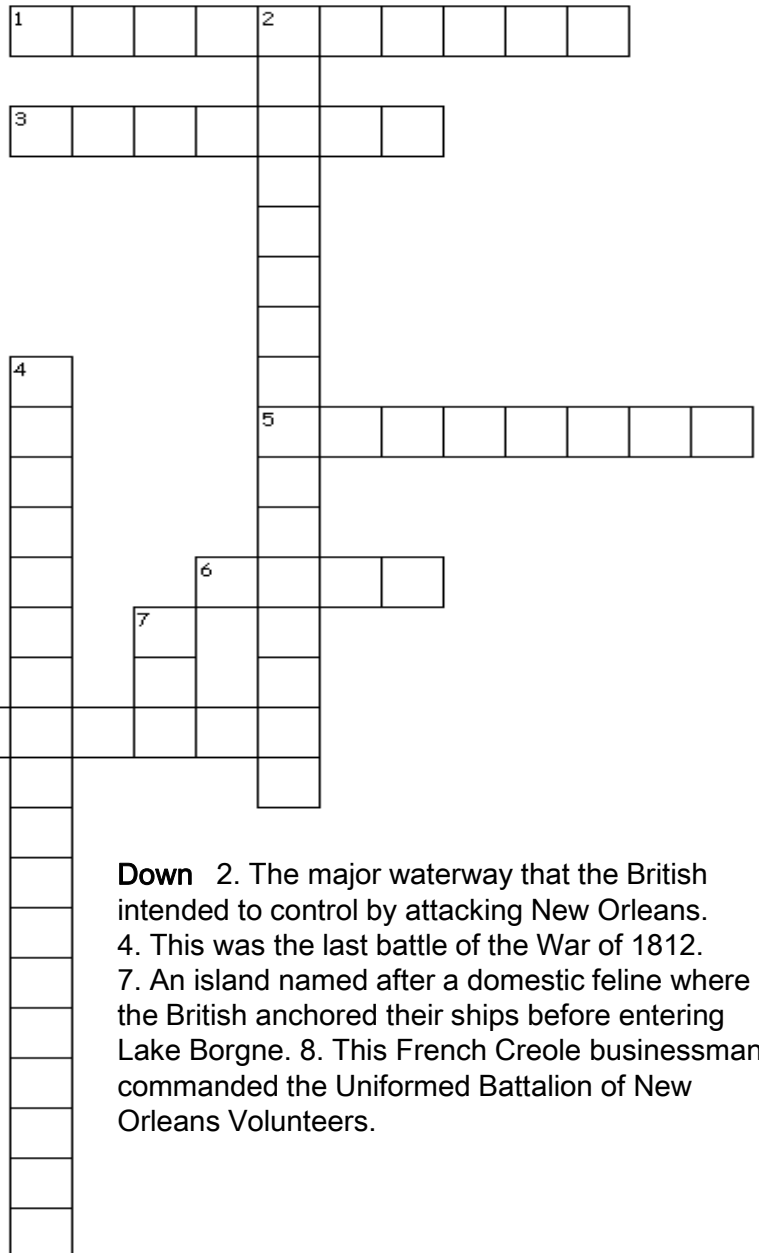
3. When this veteran arrived in New Orleans on 12/1/1814, he ordered defensive improvements and recruited local militia to defend the city.
