

Having Fun on the Water

Lake Mead and Lake Mohave have many fun water-based activities to do during the summer months. Boating, jet skiing and fishing are some of the most common activities that visitors enjoy, but there is much more to do at Lake Mead National Recreation Area.

Relax at the beach. Popular beaches are Boulder Beach on Lake Mead or Cottonwood Cove on Lake Mohave. But, there are many other beaches where you can relax and cool off in the water.

Paddle down Black Canyon in a kayak or canoe. Black Canyon National Water Trail offers a quiet and scenic day on the water, especially on Sunday and Monday when no motorized vessels are allowed. If sitting back is more your style, you can take a comfortable raft tour that launches from Hoover Dam and enjoy a float trip down to Willow Beach. Experienced guides share their knowledge of the geology, rich history and wildlife of the area.

Explore the lakes from down under. Scuba dive Lake Mead and Lake Mohave, which are some of the top freshwater lakes in the world for the sport. The lakes offer a range of depths and submerged sites for both novice and technical divers.

Enjoy the wilderness by water, while enjoying many of the comforts of home.

Rent a houseboat on Lake Mead or Lake Mohave to cruise across the lakes, admiring the scenery, then pull into a secluded cove and enjoy the beach for the evening.

Borrow a Life Jacket

Life jacket loaner stations are available at three different locations in the park. On Lake Mead, one station is located at Boulder Beach. On Lake Mohave, stations are located at Cottonwood Cove and North Arizona Telephone Cove. This summer a second station will be available at Boulder Beach and a new station at Princess Cove. Visitors are encouraged to borrow a life jacket, at no cost, and then return it for other visitors to use.

There are life jackets available in sizes infant to adult and instructions to help visitors choose the right one. Please don't use a pool toy as a substitute life jacket. Visitors, particularly children, can easily be swept away by the wind to an unsafe distance from the shore. Remember to never leave children unattended, even if they are wearing a life jacket.

Drowning is the number one cause of death in the park. In the past several years, each drowning victim was not wearing a life jacket or not wearing it properly. Life jackets save lives. Wear it for life! ¡Usalo ponte vivo!

Thank you for visiting Lake Mead National Recreation Area. This year, we're celebrating the National Park Service's 100th anniversary. We have been preserving America's special places over the past century so you and your friends and family can continue to enjoy them year after year.

During the summer, more than 3 million people traditionally visit the park to enjoy the

waters of Lake Mead and Lake Mohave. Whether you bring a boat, rent a boat or take a cruise to the Hoover Dam, the lakes offer great diversity in water recreation.

Thanks to a collaborative effort between the National Park Service and National Weather Service, we now have new land and water weather stations in the park. These stations provide real-time data, such as wind speeds, wave heights and temperatures and will be used by the National Weather Service to establish recreation and marine forecasting services.

The stations, which were funded through the Southern Nevada Public Land Management Act, provide accurate weather information and forecasts, so you can make informed decisions when planning your visit.

We want you to enjoy your adventure here, so every year, we launch a 101 Days of Summer safety campaign that focuses on important safety tips.

If you're swimming in one of our beautiful lakes, please wear a proper-fitting life jacket. All of our marinas provide life jackets with their boat rentals, and we have free life jacket loaner stations at popular beach areas.

Please see "Survival Tips" on page five for more valuable safety information.

Before launching your boat, give it a quick inspection to make sure it's ready for the water. If you have questions, our rangers or partners at the marinas, Nevada Department of Wildlife, Great Basin Institute, Arizona Game & Fish Department and U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary are here to help.

You can also stop by our visitor center near Boulder City seven days a week to get even more safety tips and information about the park.

Or, visit our website and social media pages. In addition to helpful information, we also have the special events planned for the centennial.

Visitor Information

Emergencies

In case of an emergency, dial 911 or contact the police using your marine band radio on channels 16 or 22A. Report suspicious activity and non-emergencies to 702-293-8998. Emergency call boxes are located throughout the park. See the map on the back page for locations.

Fires

Fires are permitted using fire pits in developed areas. Campfires are permitted throughout the backcountry except when fire danger is high (watch for notices). Firewood may be purchased at marinas and most local grocery stores.

Firearms

Federal law allows people who can legally possess firearms under applicable federal, state and local laws to possess them in the park. Firearms are prohibited in federal buildings, such as visitor centers and ranger stations. It is the responsibility of the visitor to understand and comply with all applicable firearm laws before entering the park. Target shooting is prohibited.

Pets

Pets are allowed on all trails and beaches within the park unless there is a sign that says otherwise. Pets must be under physical control on a leash no longer than six feet at all times. Pets should not be left in cars at Lake Mead NRA. Please consider your pet's needs for water and shade in the desert heat.

Wear it for life - ¡Usalo Ponte Vivo!

Children age 12 and younger must wear a life jacket while on board a vessel. Each person aboard a personal watercraft, must also wear a life jacket.

Due to the cold water temperatures and currents between Hoover Dam and Mile 43 on Lake Mohave, all occupants of hand-propelled craft must wear life jackets when underway. Lake Mead NRA recommends wearing a life jacket while on or in the water.

Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS)

Since 2007, when quagga mussels were first found at Lake Mead NRA, significant effort has been made to ensure other AIS are not brought to lakes Mead and Mohave or spread to other bodies of water. Join the effort by practicing "Clean Drain Dry" before and after entering the lakes.

- **Clean** plants and mud from all equipment
- **Drain** water from bilge, live-well, engine and ballast tanks
- **Dry** all equipment



National Park Service Celebrates 100 Years

Meet the Twenty-First Century Volunteers

Although greater society revolves around an urban lifestyle, there is an ever-increasing call and demand for the outdoors.

The National Park Service is answering this call with partners, such as the Great Basin Institute, by actively recruiting the next generation of park stewards. These stewards are more diverse, urban based and technologically savvy than at any time in history.

The Great Basin Institute promotes environmental research, education and conservation throughout the west by hiring youth to work on public lands. The organization offers AmeriCorps positions, and these 21st century volunteers are creating new experiences so public lands remain relevant to those who visit the park.

“Our partnership with Lake Mead and AmeriCorps has been a tremendous opportunity to support youth and public lands,” said Jerry Keir, co-founder and director of the Great Basin Institute. “We are improving the National Park visitor experience through outreach while also offering young professionals an excellent introduction to the resource management field.”

At Lake Mead NRA, the Great Basin Institute is instrumental in educating visitors, especially boaters, about aquatic invasive species. With the goal of preventing the spread of quagga mussels to other bodies of water and preventing the introduction of other aquatic invasive species to Lake Mead NRA, a team comprised of National Park Service employees and interns from the Great Basin Institute educate visitors at launch ramps, attend community events and host educational programs.

In 2015, the team educated around 36,000 park visitors.

The team members also develop knowledge and skill sets for future careers, and most of the interns will qualify for the Public Lands Corps Hiring Authority upon the completion of their internship.

Thomas Valencia began working at Lake Mead NRA as an AmeriCorps intern through the Great Basin Institute, performing education and outreach. Through leading field programs, he had the privilege of taking part in the first outdoor experiences of many Clark County School District students.

These experiences have sparked his career interest in environmental education and leading

groups in the outdoors. His current role as the lead of the interpretive and education field crew allows him to share his knowledge gained through the various experiences, hopefully igniting a similar passion in those he leads.

“By getting a larger message out, people will be able to heed a greater call, one that turns a casual visitor into a lifelong steward of our public lands and national parks,” he said. To learn more about opportunities with the Great Basin Institute, visit: thegreatbasininstitute.org.

PARK PASSES

An America the Beautiful Pass is your ticket to more than 2,000 federal recreation sites. Each pass covers entrance fees at all national parks and national wildlife refuges as well as standard amenity fees at national forests and grasslands, and at lands managed by the

Bureau of Land Management and Bureau of Reclamation. A pass covers entrance and standard amenity fees for a driver and all passengers in a personal vehicle at per vehicle fee areas (or up to four adults at sites that charge per person).

Lake Mead - Annual Pass – Lake Mead only

- \$40 Annual Pass. Good for one year from month of purchase.
- Available to everyone
- Purchase the pass at Lake Mead NRA

America the Beautiful

Interagency U.S. Military Pass

- Free. Good for one year from month of purchase.
- Available to active duty U.S. military members and dependents in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, Coast Guard and Reserve and National Guard members.
- Obtain the pass at Lake Mead NRA by showing a Common Access Card (CAC) or Military ID (Form 1173)

America the Beautiful - Interagency Senior Pass

- \$10 - Good for lifetime
- Available to seniors 62 years old and older. Applicants must provide proof of age and residency or United States citizenship.
- May provide a 50 percent discount on some amenity fees charged for facilities and services such as camping, swimming, boat launch, and specialized interpretive services.(for the pass holder only)

America the Beautiful - Interagency Annual Pass

- \$80 Annual Pass. Good for one year from month of purchase.
- Available to everyone

America the Beautiful - Volunteer Pass

- Free. Good for one year from month of issue.
- For volunteers with 250 service hours with federal agencies that participate in the interagency pass program.

America the Beautiful – Interagency Access Pass

- Free
- No expiration.
- Available to U.S. citizens or permanent residents with permanent disabilities.
- May provide a 50 percent discount on some amenity fees charged for facilities and services such as camping and boat launch (pass holder only).
- Applicants must provide documentation of permanent disability and residency or citizenship.

Every Kid in a Park Fourth Grade Pass

- Free. Valid for fourth grade year until first day of fifth grade.
- Available to U.S. fourth grade students.
- Fourth grade students may present a valid voucher which can be exchanged at any fee collecting park for the fourth grade annual pass. Download the voucher at: everykidinapark.gov

Survival Tips

Water fun is the best fun at Lake Mead and Lake Mohave during the summer time. As the desert heats up, get in the water (with a life jacket) and cool off.

Best desert tip for the heat: DON'T GO HIKING during the heat of the day. If you step away from your car, carry water with you – even if you think you are not going far. Do not spend time out in the desert in the mid-day sun. Find shade, play in the water and drink at least a gallon of water per day. The dry conditions in the desert cause your sweat to evaporate before you feel it, resulting in a false sense of coolness.

Dangerous Heat-related Illnesses

Heatstroke - The ability to sweat fails and the body temperature rises. Symptoms are very hot skin, possible confusion, coma and seizure.

- Move victim into a half-sitting position in the shade
- Call 911
- Spray victim with water
- No aspirin, acetaminophen or anything to drink

Heat Exhaustion - When the body loses an excessive amount of salt and water. Symptoms are similar to the flu; headache, nausea, vomiting and possible diarrhea. Other symptoms include profuse sweating, clammy skin, dizziness and rapid pulse.

- Move victim into shade or air-conditioning
- Call 911
- Supply drinking water or other cool, non-alcoholic drink
- Get in a cool shower or apply wet towels

Heat Cramps - Muscle spasms occur due to low salt levels in the body. Symptoms are muscle cramps often after physical activity.

- Move to shade
- Supply drinking water or other cool, non-alcoholic drink
- Stretch affected muscles
- Seek medical attention if the cramps are not gone in an hour

We invite you to enjoy the lakes and the desert safely.

Goldstrike Canyon, Arizona Hot Spring Trails Closed Until Sept 30

After seeking input from the public, Goldstrike Canyon and Arizona Hot Spring trails are closed May 15 through Sept. 30.

Park management implemented temporary emergency closures on these two trails in the summers of 2014 and 2015 after public safety incidents significantly increased.

In 2013, there were 17 incidents, which resulted in one fatality, 31 patients and five medical transports. In the first seven months of 2014, there were 37 incidents, resulting in three fatalities, 35 patients and 13 medical transports.

Park management added signs to discourage summer hiking, but the signs did not have the desired effect. People continued to hike the trails, endangering their lives and the lives of other visitors and rescue crews.

Goldstrike Canyon is a strenuous hike, requiring bouldering and climbing. It leads to Goldstrike and Nevada hot springs and the Colorado River. The area known as White Rock Canyon has multiple trails leading to the Arizona Hot Spring, Liberty Bell Arch and the Colorado River.

During the closure period, visitors may still access the popular hot springs via the Colorado River. Other less strenuous trails through the park will also remain open.

Saving Energy Under the Desert Sun

The National Park Service is committed to reducing environmental impacts in the park. Recycling, reducing greenhouse gas and conserving energy are only a few of the ways we integrate sustainable practices into everyday operations.

Lake Mead NRA has installed solar arrays to light parking lots and power communication towers. We have also installed photovoltaic solar panels at the Lake Mead Visitor Center. In addition to electricity coming directly from the commercial energy provider, the dual axis tracking solar panels take photon energy from sunlight and convert this light into DC electricity to offset consumption. Although a similar amount of energy is used each day, the solar panel installation offsets about 20 percent of the energy use at the visitor center.

Air conditioning and heating units throughout the park utilize energy-efficient features that help reduce the impact of park facilities on the environment. All new replacement units are Energy Star rated to help reduce the upfront energy consumption.

The fleet of vehicles utilized by park staff and partners include hybrid cars and trucks powered by a combination of gasoline and electricity.





