



Class 3 Motorized Watercraft 40 feet to less than 65 feet*

Your safety in and around the waters of Lake Roosevelt is important to us. In order for you to be safe, you need to make sure that you have specific equipment on your watercraft any time you are on Lake Roosevelt. We have developed this checklist to help you prepare for a safe and enjoyable day on the Lake. Please visit the US Coast Guard (<http://www.uscgboating.org/default.aspx>) and WA State boating website (<http://boat.wa.gov/regulations.asp>) for more information.

* Length is measured from the tip of the bow in a straight line to the stern. This does not include outboard motors, brackets, rudders, bow attachments, or swim platforms and ladders that are not a molded part of the hull.

Minimum Federal Required Equipment

- Vessel Registration on board
- Registration Decals displayed
- Registration Numbers displayed: Must be plain block style letters, no less than 3 inches high, and must be contrasting color.
- Boater Education Card (power-driven boats over 15 hp) This program is being phased in. Check the WA State boating website (<http://parks.wa.gov/boating/boatered/?subject=faq>) to see if you are required to have this card at this time.
- Life Jacket: Type I, II, III, or V (one per person, must be Coast Guard approved)
- 1 USCG approved Type IV throwable personal floatation device (PFD)
- One B-II and one B-I or three B-I type fire extinguishers (USCG Marine Approved, depends on your boat configuration, check USCG regs)
- Backfire Flame Arrestor (only for gas powered inboards and inboard/outboards)
- Ventilation system with mechanical blower on vessels with a permanently installed gasoline engine not open to the atmosphere.
- Sound Producing Devices (39.4 ft and larger must also carry a bell with clapper)
- Skier-down Flag (required when towing a skier)
- Navigation Lights (required in reduced visibility)
- Carbon Monoxide (CO) Warning Sticker
- Oil Pollution Placard
- Garbage Placard
- Marine Sanitation Device (if installed, must be secured to prevent discharge)
- Navigation Rules
