### INTERAGENCY AGREEMENT Between The USDI, NATONAL PARK SERVICE LASSEN VOLCANIC NATIONAL PARK And The USDA, FOREST SERVICE LASSEN NATIONAL FOREST

This INTERAGENCY AGREEMENT is hereby made and entered into by and between the USDI, National Park Service, Lassen Volcanic National Park, hereinafter referred to as "LVNP," and the USDA, Forest Service, Lassen National Forest hereinafter referred to as the "U.S. Forest Service," under the authority of: the Reciprocal Fire Protection Act of May 27, 1955 (42 U.S.C. 1856a, Pub. L. 84-46).

This agreement is tiered to the Master Interagency Agreement for Wildland Fire Management between the Department of Interior and the Department of Agriculture, Forest Service Agreement No. 16-IA-11132543-057, National Park Service Agreement No. G9560160054 executed March 20, 2017.

Title: Manzanita Lake Interagency Fire Station

### I. PURPOSE:

The purpose of this agreement is to document the cooperation between the parties to provide for a wildland fire engine module at the Mazanita Lake Interagency Fire Station in accordance with the following provisions and the hereby incorporated Operating and Financial Plan, attached as Attachment A. Benefits of this Interagency Agreement (IAA) will be the reduction of costs and increased productivity through elimination of the duplication of services and facilities for both agencies. In addition, this situation will further increase the available resources for emergencies, maintenance, and project work within both LVNP and on U.S. Foreset Service administered lands.

In consideration of the above premises, the parties hereto agree as follows:

### II. THE LVNP SHALL:

- A. Perform in accordance with the Financial and Operating Plan, Attachment A.
- B. Plan to regularly provide the following facilities: Office space in cabin #15; Engine Bay and storage areas (MZL Maintenance Shop); Barracks buildings #11B and #12; Cache area for storage of fire gear; LVNP will attempt to provide living quarters for up to four Forest Service employees from approximately May 15

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through the end of the fire season. LVNP will provide maintenance for all of the listed facilities.

- C. Pay for all utilities for the provided facilities (electricity, water, sewer, garbage).
- D. Provide a secure high speed data connection circuit for U.S. Forest Service employees to access the U.S. Forest Service network.
- E. To maintain cabling, switches, routers and to contact local internet provider when outages occur.

### III. THE U.S. FOREST SERVICE SHALL:

- A. Perform in accordance with the Financial and Operating Plan, Attachment A.
- B. Personnel Requirements: U.S. Forest Service will attempt to regularly staff the engine module as a 5 person 7 day effective module during the annual established fire season.
  Budgetary and/or personnel issues may require a minimum staffing of 5 people effective 5 days a week.
- C. The U.S. Forest Service will provide organizational staffing structure for the engine module per the U.S. Forest Service, Region 5 staffing guidelines.
- D. Provide computers and the necessary equipment for Forest Service employees to access the U.S. Forest Service network through the internet service provided by LVNP.

# IV. IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED AND UNDERSTOOD BY AND BETWEEN THE PARTIES THAT:

- A. Supervision: The Engine Captain or acting is responsible for the direct supervision of the engine module, including scheduling tours of duty, leave, performance appraisals, assignments of work and disciplinary action. The Engine Captain or their acting is accountable to the U.S. Forest Service, Hat Creek Ranger District Duty Officer.
- B. Equipment/Supplies: Equipment required to support the Engine module is as follows: One Type 3 Wildland Fire Engine with accompanying support equipment to be provided by U.S. Forest Service; One support vehicle to be provided by U.S. Forest Service. The benefiting agency will provide necessary supplies/equipment used by the engine module for individual work projects. The Engine Captain or acting in coordination with the assigned project leader will select appropriate supplies from U.S. Forest Service or LVNP inventories or procure required items through the benefiting agency.
- C. Communications: Base station radio system will be provided by U.S. Forest Service; Wildland fire engine will be equipped with U.S. Forest Service mobile and portable radios. Radios will all be programmed with common interagency frequencies.
- D. Conduct & Public Image: Engine Module employees and associated personnel will conduct

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themselves in a professional and courteous manner toword Park and Forest visitors, employees and cooperators. This will include: maintaining adherence to the appropriate agency's uniform and Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) standards as circumstances and situations require.

Providing accurate and appropriate informative and interpretive information to visitors, employees and cooperators in a professional manner. Employees will comply with both agencies civil rights and employee conduct regulations and guidelines.

- E. Designated interagency fire management facilities and associated equipment will be maintained in a safe and organized manner. This will include: completing regular (daily) facilities cleaning and organization (ie. janitorial tasks); ensuring equipment and supplies are adequately secured and stored to prevent hazardous situations and environments; ensuring all associated fire management equipment is regularly maintained and functional to ensure safety and a professional appearance. This will not include techincal, structural and/or otherwise designated facilities/equipment maintainence and repairs required to be completed by other agnecy staff or service professionals.
- F. Emergency Dispatching: Primary dispatching duities will be automatically handled through the Susanville Interagency Fire Center (SIFC). The U.S. Forest Service, Hat Creek Ranger District, Duty Officer will coordinate and communicate engine module staffing, status, and determine the need for cover engine requirements thorugh SIFC. Secondary dispatching duties and coordination with Cal Fire Shasta Ranger Unit Emergency Coordination Center (ECC) and Lassen Dispatch may be required for mutual-aid.
- G. Training: The engine module will be available to participate in appropriate training sessions presented by LVNP and U.S. Forest Service. Training should include at a minimum: All Mandatory and Critical Training requirements per the employing agency's specific manual direction for wildland fire resouces and personnel (ie. FS Manual 5109.17).
- H. Project: The LVNP Fire Management Officer (FMO) and Hat Creek Ranger District Assistant District Fire Management Officer (ADFMO) will collaborate and agree upon project priorities and objectives with input from the engine captain during a annual preseason meeting prior to June 1. The Engine Captain will review projects and adjust priorities on a monthly basis or as circumstance and situation requires. Communication of unplanned changes in project work scheduling, timelines and priorities should be made between the Engine Captain and appropriate project manager within two days prior to the work interuption to facilitate contingency planning and operations if feasible. The Engine Captain is responsible for accomplishing those objectives agreed upon during the annual preseason meeting with a minimum requirement of supervision. The Engine Capain will assure that projects are performed in such a manner as to meet required initial attack response times if the individual project does not require formal commitment of the resource.

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	I.	Salary for all project work within established duty hours will be paid for by the	
		U.S. Forest Service. Overtime, Hazard Pay, Sunday and Night Differential for	

U.S. Forest Service. Overtime, Hazard Pay, Sunday and Night Differential for incident responses will be paid for by the incident. Overtime or Hazard Pay associated with project work will be either billed to the project account or compensated in a mutually agreed upon manner by the appropriate agency duty officers. Any materials and supplies required for project work will be paid for by the benefitting agency.

Any endeavor involving reimbursement will be handled in accordance with applicable laws, regulations, and procedures. The services requested and provided will be outlined in separate agreements and shall be independently authorized by appropriate statutory authority and signatures.

K. <u>NOTICES</u>. Any communications affecting the operations covered by this agreement given by the U.S. Forest Service or LVNP are sufficient only if in writing and delivered in person, mailed, or transmitted electronically by e-mail or fax, as follows:

To the U.S. Forest Service Program Manager, at the address specified in the agreement.

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To LVNP, at programs's contact's address shown in the agreement or such other address designated within the agreement.

Notices will be effective when delivered in accordance with this provision, or on the effective date of the notice, whichever is later.

- L. <u>USE OF U.S. FOREST SERVICE INSIGNIA</u>. In order for LVNP to use the U.S. Forest Service insignia on any published media, such as a Web page, printed publication, or audiovisual production, permission must be granted from the U.S. Forest Service's Office of Communications. A written request must be submitted and approval granted in writing by the Office of Communications prior to use of the insignia.
- M. <u>INFORMATION SECURITY</u>. By accepting this agreement, the servicing agency agrees to comply with all Federal information technology (IT) laws, regulations and requirements; and shall be responsible for properly protecting all information used, gathered, or developed as a result of work under this agreement.

The servicing agency shall, upon request, provide to the U.S. Forest Service Information Security staff for review and examination documentation which supports the servicing agency's assertion that adequate security controls are in place to protect U.S. Forest Service information and data which it holds. Documentation may include, but is not limited to, certification and accreditation documentation, security testing results, audit and assessment results, and risk documentation.

- O. <u>TERMINATION INTERAGENCY AGREEMENTS</u>. This IA may be terminated upon 30 calendar days' written notice by either party. If this agreement is cancelled, any implementing contract/order may also be cancelled. If the IA is terminated, the agencies shall agree to the terms of the termination, including costs attributable to each party and the disposition of awarded and pending actions. If the Servicing Agency incurs costs due to the Requesting Agency's failure to give the requisite notice of its intent to terminate the IA, the Requesting Agency shall pay any actual costs incurred by the Servicing Agency as a result of the delay in notification, provided such costs are directly attributable to the failure to give notice.
- P. <u>ALTERNATE DISPUTE RESOLUTION INTERAGENCY</u>. The parties to this agreement shall settle any disputes that may arise under this agreement by following direction in the
