SPRINGFIELD, ILLINOIS -Superintendent Dale Phillips announces that Lincoln Home National Historic Site will join the National Park Service in recognizing U.S. veterans and current members of the U.S. Armed Forces by offering “fee free” days, from November 10 through November 12, at the Lincoln Home. On these days the \$2.00/hour parking fee will be waived. “In these tough economic times, our fee-free days will give families the opportunity to literally walk in Abraham Lincoln’s footsteps whether they tour the home or enjoy a walk through the neighborhood,” he said. Lincoln Home tours are free to the public.
