

Manhattan Project History in February

- Philip Abelson began working on uranium enrichment at the Naval Research Laboratory using liquid thermal diffusion in February 1941. The construction of his thermal diffusion plant in Philadelphia began until January 1944. This same process would be used later at the S-50 plant in Oak Ridge.
- Glenn Seaborg and Edwin McMillan discovered plutonium-239 on February 24, 1941. They later shared a Nobel Prize in Chemistry for their discoveries in the chemistry of the first transuranium elements.
- Construction of Y-12 and X-10 began to take place in Oak Ridge in February 1943. Stone and Webster Engineering was in charge of Y-12 construction while DuPont handled X-10.
- One year after construction began, Y-12 was able to send 200 grams of uranium-235 to Los Alamos in February 1944.
- On February 16, 1944, George Kistiakowsky replaced Seth Neddermeyer as leader of implosion research in Los Alamos.
