In accordance with regulations and the delegated authority provided in Title 36, Code of Federal Regulations (36 CFR), Chapter 1, Parts 1-7, authorized by Title 54 United States Code § 100751, the following provisions apply to all lands and waters administered by the National Park Service, within the boundaries of Minidoka National Historic Site (MIIN). Unless otherwise stated, these regulatory provisions apply in addition to the requirements contained in 36 CFR, Chapter 1, Parts 1-7.

Written determinations, which explain the reasoning behind the Superintendent's use of discretionary authority, as required by Section 1.5(c), appear in this document identified by italicized print.

**36 CFR § 1.5 – VISITING HOURS, PUBLIC USE LIMITS, CLOSURES, AND AREA DESIGNATIONS FOR SPECIFIC USES OR ACTIVITIES**

**(a)(1) The following visiting hours, public use limits, and closures are established:**

Visiting Hours:

- The park grounds are open every day of the year and there is no entrance gate.
- The MIIN administration office in Hagerman, ID is open Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. as staffing permits.
- The site's visitor contact station is generally open 7 days a week from Memorial Day to Labor Day. The remainder of the year, the visitor center is open 5 days per week as staffing permits. Visitors are encouraged to phone 208-837-4793 to confirm hours.

*These operational needs are set to balance the needs of public access, visitor safety, and protection of property.*

Public Use Limits – Pursuant to §1.5(d) to implement a public use limit, the Superintendent may establish a permit, registration, or reservation system:

- Leaving property unattended for any period of time requires a permit.

*Leaving unknown property unattended in the Historic Site threatens public safety, the environmental and scenic values of the Monument, the natural and cultural resources of the Historic Site, and the orderly management of the Historic Site. Visitors seeking to leave property unattended within the Historic Site must obtain a permit from the Superintendent.*

## Closures:

- Launching, landing or operating an unmanned aircraft from or on lands and waters administered by the National Park Service within the boundaries of Minidoka National Historic Site is prohibited except as approved in writing by the Superintendent.
  - ❖ The term “unmanned aircraft” means a device that is used or intended to be used for flight in the air without the possibility of direct human intervention from within or on the device and the associated operational elements and components that are required for the pilot or system operator in command to operate or control the device (such as cameras, sensors communication links). This term includes all types of devices that meet this definition (e.g., model airplanes, quad-copters, drones) that are used for any purpose, including for recreation or commerce.

*Use of unmanned aircraft within MIIN poses a disturbance to the historic and cultural resources within the Historic Site and interferes with other Historic Site visitors who come to appreciate and photograph the historic and cultural resources. The unrestricted use of unmanned aircraft is incompatible with the mission to protect site resources and to ensure visitor enjoyment within the site. Unrestricted use of unmanned aircraft could impact sensitive historic resources, result in unnecessary noise, and pose a potential danger to site visitors. This prohibition complies with the NPS Director’s Policy Memorandum 14-05 (Unmanned Aircraft--Interim Policy; June 19, 2014).*

- The Superintendent may temporarily close the park roadways, parking area, facilities, waters, and all or portions of the park when such actions are deemed necessary to ensure public safety, protection of resources, or the avoidance of visitor use conflicts. The posting of signs, maps, media announcements, and the use of barricades and/or gates will identify such closures.
- Operation of motorized vehicles not licensed for highway use, including all off-road motorized vehicles, on all park roads is prohibited.

*Off-road motor vehicles including ATVs and UTVs are not designed for use on paved or public roads.*

- Any area closed by the Superintendent and identified with an official sign is prohibited to public access. This includes all park maintenance compounds, outbuildings and service roads that are only used for official business.

*Areas may be temporarily closed for a variety of reasons including site restoration, protection of endangered or threatened animal and plant species, protection of fragile cultural and/or historic sites, and for visitor safety. Maintenance compounds and other work areas are restricted from public access to protect government property from theft and vandalism and to prevent safety issues related to the operation of heavy machinery and power equipment.*

### **(a)(2) The following areas are designated for a specific use or activity and/or the following conditions or restrictions are imposed on a specific use or activity:**

- E-bikes – The term “e-bike” means a two- or three-wheeled cycle with fully operable pedals and an electric motor of less than 750 watts (1 h.p.).
  - E-bikes are allowed in Minidoka National Historic Site where traditional bicycles are allowed. E-bikes are prohibited where traditional bicycles are prohibited. Except where use of motor vehicles by the public is allowed, using the electric motor to move an e-bike without pedaling is prohibited.
  - A person operating an e-bike is subject to the following sections of 36 CFR part 4 that apply to the use of traditional bicycles: sections 4.12, 4.13, 4.20, 4.21, 4.22, 4.23, and 4.20(h)(2)-(5).
  - Except as specified in this Compendium, the use of an e-bike within Minidoka National Historic Site is governed by State law, which is adopted and made a part of this Compendium. Any violation of State law adopted by this paragraph is prohibited.

- E-cigarettes – The use of e-cigarettes and other Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems (ENDS) is prohibited in all public buildings, offices, government vehicles.

*Restrictions are required to protect employees and visitors from second-hand nicotine. The use of ENDS is prohibited in areas where smoking is restricted by Management Policies (2006) and Director's Order #50D (Smoking Policy). The NPS is moving forward with revising the current regulation of 36 CFR 1.4 to include the use of ENDS in the definition of smoking. Once promulgated, section 2.21 will apply to the smoking of tobacco and the use of ENDS.*

Conditions and Restrictions on Specific Uses or Activities:

- Passenger Carrying Busses:
  - Engines must be shut down when not underway.

*The idling of bus engines adds unnecessary exhaust fumes to the air and diminishes the enjoyment by visitors of the peace and tranquility of the Historic Site.*

- Hiking and Pedestrian Use:
  - Hiking and pedestrian use is restricted to the Historic Site's trails and walkway system.
  - Leaving a trail or walkway to shortcut between portions of the same trail or walkway, or to shortcut between portions of the same trail or walkway is prohibited.

*Restricting hikers and pedestrians to the Historic Site's trails and walkways helps protect the historic and cultural resources of the Historic Site.*

**36 CFR §1.6 – ACTIVITIES THAT REQUIRE A PERMIT**

Activities requiring a permit are listed above under Public Use Limits and throughout this document under the specific 36 CFR Section that authorizes or requires the issuance of a permit.

**36 CFR §2.1 – PRESERVATION OF NATURAL, CULTURAL AND ARCHEOLOGICAL RESOURCES**

**(b) Hiking or pedestrian traffic is restricted to the trail(s) or walkway(s) listed in 36 CFR §1.5 of this document.**

*Hiking is restricted to all established trails.*

**36 CFR §2.2 - WILDLIFE PROTECTION**

**(b) Hunting and trapping**

- Hunting is not permitted within the Historic Site.

**(d) The transporting of lawfully taken wildlife through the Historic Site is permitted under the following conditions and procedures:**

- Lawfully taken wildlife transported through the site shall be completely covered or otherwise kept out of view, and must be properly tagged in accordance with Idaho state law.
- Persons transporting legally taken game must possess a valid Idaho state hunting license.
- Transporting wildlife by any other means or on any other road, trails, or National Park Service lands is prohibited without specific permit from the superintendent.

**(e) The following areas are closed to the viewing of wildlife with the use of an artificial light:**

- All of Minidoka National Historic Site is closed to use of visible and infrared lights to view wildlife.

### **36 CFR §2.3 - FISHING**

Fishing is prohibited in the Historic Site.

### **36 CFR §2.4 – WEAPONS, TRAPS, AND NETS**

**In accordance with §2.4(a)(1-2), weapons, traps, or nets may be carried, possessed or used at the following designated times and locations where the taking of wildlife is authorized by law in accordance with §2.2, or the taking of fish is authorized by law in accordance with §2.3:**

- Hunting, fishing and trapping is prohibited on the site.

### **36 CFR §2.5 – RESEARCH SPECIMENS**

**(a) Taking plants, fish, wildlife, rocks or minerals is prohibited except in accordance with other regulations of Chapter I of 36 CFR or pursuant to the terms and conditions of a specimen collection permit.**

### **36 CFR §2.10 – CAMPING AND FOOD STORAGE**

**(a) Camping is allowed in the following designated sites or areas and is subject to the following established conditions:**

- Camping is prohibited within Minidoka National Historic Site except with a permit issued by the Superintendent.

### **36 CFR §2.12 – AUDIO DISTURBANCES**

**(a)(2) Operating a power saw in developed areas is prohibited, except pursuant to the terms and conditions of a permit.**

**(a)(3) Operating any type of portable motor or engine, or device powered by a portable motor or engine in non-developed areas is prohibited, except pursuant to the terms and conditions of a permit.**

**(a)(4) Operating a public address system is prohibited, except in connection with a public gathering or special event for which a permit has been issued pursuant to §2.50 or §2.51.**

### **36 CFR §2.13 – FIRES**

**(a)(1) The lighting or maintaining of fires is prohibited within Minidoka National Historic Site.**

### **36 CFR §2.14 – SANITATION AND REFUSE**

**(a)(2) Using park refuse receptacles or facilities for dumping household, commercial or industrial refuse is prohibited.**

**(a)(5) Bathing or washing food, clothing, dishes, or other property at public water outlets, fixtures, or pools is prohibited.**

**(a)(7) Disposing of fish remains on land or in waters within 200 feet of boat docks or designated swimming beaches or within developed areas is prohibited.**

**(a)(8) In developed areas, the disposal of human body waste is prohibited, except at the following designated locations or fixtures provided for that purpose:**

- The temporary visitor center located at the Hermann House.

**(a)(9) In non-developed areas, the disposal of human body waste within 10 feet of a water source, high water mark of a body of water, or a campsite, or within sight of a trail is prohibited.**

### **36 CFR §2.15 – PETS**

**(a)(1) Pets are prohibited from all public buildings (including outdoor restrooms), trails, and undeveloped park property. Pets are allowed on paved paths and parking areas.**

**(a)(2) Pets must be on a leash/lead not to exceed 6 feet in length.**

*The above prohibitions do not apply to service animals, such as guide dogs accompanying persons who are visually impaired and hearing dogs accompanying persons who are hearing-impaired.*

**(a)(5) Pet excrement must be disposed in accordance with the following conditions:**

- Pet excrement shall be removed immediately from the park or disposed in a trash receptacle by the person(s) controlling the pet(s).

### **36 CFR §2.16 – HORSES and PACK ANIMALS**

**(g) Other conditions concerning the use of horses or pack animals:**

- The use of horses and pack animals is prohibited except with a permit from the Superintendent.

### **36 CFR §2.17 – AIRCRAFT AND AIR DELIVERY**

**(a)(3) Delivering or retrieving a person or object by parachute, helicopter, or other airborne means is prohibited, except in emergencies involving public safety or serious property loss or pursuant to the terms and conditions of a permit.**

**(c)(1) The removal of a downed aircraft, components, or parts thereof is subject to procedures established by the Superintendent.**

### **36 CFR §2.18 – SNOWMOBILES**

**(c) The use of snowmobiles is prohibited.**

### **36 CFR §2.19 – WINTER ACTIVITIES**

**(a) The following park roads and/or parking areas open to motor vehicle traffic may be used for skiing, snowshoeing, ice-skating, inner tubing, tobogganing, and similar winter activities under the conditions noted:**

- All site trails and roads are open to cross-country skiing and snowshoeing when conditions permit.

**(b) The towing of persons on skis, sleds, or other sliding devices by motor vehicle or snowmobile is prohibited.**

### **36 CFR §2.21 – SMOKING**

**(a) The following portions of the park, or all or portions of buildings, structures or facilities are closed to smoking as noted:**

- All federal buildings within Minidoka National Historic Site are designated as non-smoking areas, inclusive of GSA contracted facilities.

### **36 CFR §2.22 – PROPERTY**

**(a)(2) Leaving property unattended for longer than 24 hours is prohibited, except in the following locations or under the following conditions:**

- A geocache site left for over 24 hours is prohibited within Minidoka National Historic Site except with a permit issued by the Superintendent.

### **36 CFR §2.35 – ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES AND CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES**

**(a)(3)(i) The following areas and facilities within the park are closed to consumption of alcoholic beverages, and/or to the possession of a bottle, can or other receptacle containing an alcoholic beverage that is open, or has been opened, or whose seal has been broken or the contents of which have been partially removed:**

- The consumption of alcoholic beverages is prohibited within all visitor centers and government buildings, unless specifically allowed as part of a special event, with approval from the Regional Director.

*Park buildings are places of business and use and/or possession of alcoholic beverages is deemed inappropriate. These restrictions are necessary to protect visitors, site resources, to avoid visitor use conflicts and ensure safe and orderly operation of visitor use facilities.*

### **36 CFR §2.37 – NONCOMMERCIAL SOLICITING**

Soliciting or demanding gifts, money, goods or services is prohibited except pursuant to the terms and conditions or a permit that has been issued under §2.50, §2.51, or §2.52.

### **36 CFR §2.38 – EXPLOSIVES**

**(a) Using, possessing, storing, or transporting explosives, blasting agents or explosive materials is prohibited, except pursuant to the terms and conditions of a permit.**

**(b) Using, or possessing fireworks and firecrackers is prohibited, except pursuant to the terms and conditions of a permit.**

### **36 CFR §2.50 – SPECIAL EVENTS**

**(a) Sports events, pageants, regattas, public sector attractions, entertainment, ceremonies, and similar events are allowed, provided there is a meaningful association between the park area and the events, and the observance contributes to visitor understanding of the significance of the park area, and a permit therefore has been issued by the Superintendent.**

### **36 CFR §2.51 – DEMONSTRATIONS**

**(b) Demonstrations of more than 25 people are allowed within park areas designated as available under paragraph (c)(2) when the Superintendent has issued a permit for the activity.**

**(c)(2) The following locations are designated as available for demonstrations:**

- Hermann House: The grassy area just in front of the house.

#### **36 CFR §2.51 – SALE OR DISTRIBUTION OF PRINTED MATTER**

**(b) The sale or distribution of printed matter by more than 25 persons is allowed within park areas designated as available under §2.51(c)(2) (see above) when the Superintendent has issued a permit.**

#### **36 CFR §2.60 – LIVESTOCK USE AND AGRICULTURE**

**(a) Livestock are generally prohibited in any park area. They are only permitted in park areas pursuant to the exceptions provided for in §2.60(a) and only pursuant to the terms and conditions of a license, permit, or lease.**

#### **36 CFR §2.61 – RESIDING ON FEDERAL LANDS**

**(a) Residing in park areas, other than on privately owned lands, is prohibited except pursuant to the terms and conditions of a permit, lease or contract.**

#### **36 CFR §2.62 – MEMORIALIZATION**

**(a) The installation of a monument, memorial, tablet, structure, or other commemorative installation in a park area without the authorization of the Director is prohibited.**

**(b) The scattering of human ashes from cremation is prohibited, except pursuant to the terms and conditions of a permit.**

#### **36 CFR §4.21 – SPEED LIMITS**

**(b) The following speed limits are established for the routes/roads indicated:**

- 15 miles per hour on dirt roads within the Historic Site.
- Adhere to posted limits on county roads.

#### **36 CFR §4.30 – BICYCLES**

**(a) Bicycle use is permitted on park roads, parking areas, and on the following designated routes:**

- County roads, adhering to applicable state and county laws.

**The following routes are closed to bicycle use:**

- Park trails.

#### **36 CFR §4.31 – HITCHHIKING**

Hitchhiking or soliciting transportation is prohibited.

**36 CFR §5.1 – ADVERTISEMENT**

Commercial notices or advertisements shall not be displayed, posted, or distributed on federally owned or controlled lands within a park area unless prior written permission has been given by the Superintendent.

**36 CFR §5.3 – BUSINESS OPERATIONS**

Engaging in or soliciting any business in park areas, except in accordance with the provisions of a permit, contract, or other written agreement with the United States is prohibited.

**36 CFR §5.5 – COMMERCIAL PHOTOGRAPHY**

(a) Before any motion picture may be filmed or any television production or sound track made by any person other than bona fide newsreel or news television personnel, written permission must first be obtained from the Superintendent.

(b) Taking photographs of any vehicle or other articles of commerce or models for the purpose of commercial advertising without a written permit from the Superintendent is prohibited.

**36 CFR §5.6 – COMMERCIAL VEHICLES**

(b) & (c) Using commercial vehicles on government roads within park areas when such use is in no way connected with the operation of the park is generally prohibited, and requires permission or a permit from the Superintendent.

**36 CFR §5.7 – CONSTRUCTION OF BUILDINGS OR OTHER FACILITIES**

Such activities are prohibited, except in accordance with the provisions of a valid permit, contract, or other written agreement with the United States.

**36 CFR §§6.4, 6.5, 6.8, 6.9 – WASTE DISPOSAL SITES**

A person proposing to operate a solid waste disposal site must submit a request for a permit to the proper Superintendent for review by the Regional Director.

**Permit Information:**

Special regulations, restrictions and fees may apply when applying for a special use permit. Information regarding permits is available at park headquarters during normal business or calling **208-837-4793**

Permits may be denied/terminated based on 36 CFR 1.6 (a), (d), (e), (g)(1), (g)(2), and/or (h). Federal law and agency policy require that certain activities that fall outside the scope of normal visitation be managed through



the issuance of a permit. Permits may only be issued if the activity is in keeping with the purpose of the park and will not cause damage to the resources or conflict with other park users.

## **Minidoka National Historic Site Demonstration Area**

**Demonstrations of more than 25 people are allowed within park areas designated when the Superintendent has issued a permit for the activity.**

**The map below shows the Hermann House. It is off of Hunt road and is the location of the temporary Visitor Center. The red arrow indicates the location of the “First Amendment” area in the grassy section in front of the house.**
