

The Doney-Clark House was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1994 for its local significance in the areas of architecture and social history. The house was built circa 1885 by Mathias Doney, a Kingman brick maker and contractor. The house was an example of the gable-front-and-wing house type, which descended from the Greek Revival style and became especially popular in rural areas. At the time of nomination, the four-room cottage contained most of its original woodwork and retained the original floorplan.

An ongoing audit of National Register-listed properties in Kansas by the Kansas State Historic Preservation Office discovered this property was no longer extant. The City of Kingman has confirmed this and estimates it was demolished 10 years ago. The Kansas State Historic Preservation Office requests the property be removed from the National Register.
