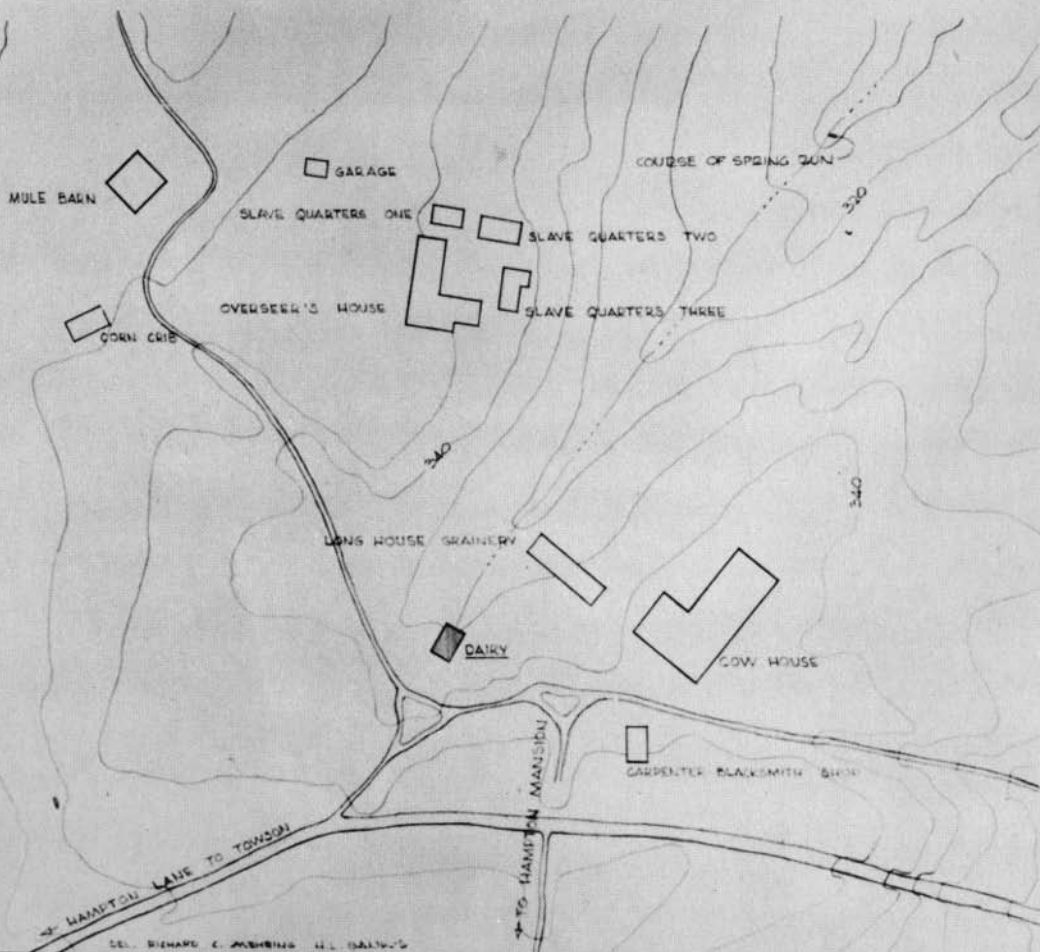


# DAIRY: HAMPTON PLANTATION OUTBUILDINGS

THIS STRUCTURE IS ONE OF THE MOST INTERESTING BUILDINGS IN THE COMPLEX OF PLANTATION OUTBUILDINGS THAT SERVED HAMPTON, THE HOME OF THE RIDGELY FAMILY FROM 1790-1948. THE BUILDING AND ITS ENCLOSING WALLS ARE BEAUTIFULLY INTEGRATED WITH THE SITE, SET INTO THE SIDE OF A HILL AND STRADDLING THE RUN FROM A SMALL SPRING WHICH SERVES AS A COOLING SOURCE AND FOR FRESH WATER.
