Education Programs at Pipe Spring!



Teachers, the National Park Service is here for you!

Bring history and science alive for your students with education programs at Pipe Spring National Monument - an interactive primary source.

All programs are free, hands on, and connected to Utah and Arizona State Standards.

Field Trips

Let's Work, Learn, and Play! (PreK-2nd Grade) Students do chores, learning tasks, and play games that settler and Paiute children would have done to illustrate how life was at Pipe Spring compared to their current lives

A Kid's Day at Pipe Spring (3rd-5th Grade) Students explore settler and Paiute life, natural resources of the area, and human impact on the environment at Pipe Spring by doing the daily tasks of 1870s characters (Dairymaid, ranch hand, Paiute gatherer, settler, and telegrapher)

Powell Explorers (6th-8th Grade) Explore Pipe Spring's natural and cultural resources through the eyes of a nineteenth century explorer using linguistics, botany, geology, anthropology, and navigation

Museum and Fort Tours (9th-12th Grade) Guided fort tours and self-guided learning and educational media in the museum

Ridge Trail Hike (All Grades) Learn about the geology and ecosystem that makes life possible at Pipe Spring

Classroom Visits

Every Kid Outdoors (4th Grade) Have your students print off their online vouchers, then arrange for a Park Ranger to present them their passes in class!

A Kid's Day at Pipe Spring Pre Trip Activity (3rd-5th Grade) Learn about the importance of water and the different types of work done at Pipe Spring in the 1870s using explorer boxes (*This program can be done as a standalone activity*)

Show & Tell, and Games (K-2nd Grade) Students learn about Pipe Spring through demonstrations of everyday items and games common to Pipe Spring in the 1870s

Read with a Ranger (K-3rd Grade) Encourage reading skills as students read along with a Pipe Spring ranger. Following story time, rangers lead students through an activity that connects the story to the classroom. Story topics include Native American history, biology, and geology.
