In the 1976 Point Reyes Wilderness Act, Congress recognized Drakes Estero as a unique recreational and biological resource and promised that this irreplaceable resource would formally become a wilderness area when non-conforming uses were eliminated. Your agency permitted a commercial oyster company to grow non-native oysters and clams on 1,050 acres in Drakes Estero for 40 years, or until 2012.

Your own draft environmental impact statement reveals the extensive damage that the existing operation has caused to Drakes Estero and Point Reyes National Seashore's beaches. As you know, commercial operations of any kind are not permitted in designated wilderness areas because of such damage. Further, the Park Service's Organic Act mandates protection of park resources and values and strictly limits commercial operations.

Your approval of the proposal to extend the oyster company's permit would be contrary to the Point Reyes Wilderness Act and would establish a dangerous precedent at a time when America's public lands and environmental laws are already under widespread attacks in Congress and elsewhere.

We've been waiting long enough. It is time to allow that permit to expire and to honor Congress' commitment. We want our bay back.

Much of the land comprising the Tomalas and Drakes Bay area was still private and was actively being purchased by the government for Point Reyes National Seashore.				

The enabling legislation for the Seashore stated that this was a National Recreational area that allowed business, ranching and farming to take place. The Seashore was not classified a National Park but was open space for public use adjacent to the San Francisco Metro area. Permissible uses also included: hunting, fishing, raising oysters, etc.

The National Park Service, early on, took a dim view of Drakes Bay Oyster Co. At that time it was owned and operated by a very colorful character named Charlie Johnson. He was married to a Japanese lady whose relatives ran and harvested oysters in the Bay.

The NPS feeling was that this operation was not compatible with NPS philosophy and that it should be terminated. Rangers continually watched the Oyster farm looking for any violation or other activity that might be used by the NPS to terminate the

permit and thus get rid of the Oyster Co. Continual inspections were utilized to force the Oyster Co. out of the Seashore; however, Mr. Johnson complied with NPS directives and cleaned up his operation and the disposal of oyster shells, etc.

I am not sure when the Lunny family purchased the Oyster Co. from Charlie Johnson's family but apparently the NPS philosophy has not changed over the years. They want to get rid of the Oyster Co! They have recently accused the Lunny's of disturbing harbor seals in the Bay, which would be laughable, if this situation were not so serious.

I've investigated many complaints of wildlife and marine mammal harassment while stationed in Alaska. Harbor seals exist in most all bays and inlets along the West Coast of the U.S.. They become very used of mans activities often watching what is going on out of curiosity not fear. The activity that would severely stress a harbor seal would be a kayak gliding quietly up close to a resting seal and suprising him. This would create a panic/flight situation which raises heart rates and blood pressure in the seal to high levels. Outboard motors used on oyster collection scows do not surprise, the seals hear and then casually move out of the way while the boat passes.

It is my firm belief that the Oyster farm should be allowed to continue operation. The farm provides a valued food commodity utilized all over the Bay Area and the West Coast of California. The farm provides employment and pays taxes, all necessary in todays economic climate. The farm does not pollute or disturb the morphology of the bay where the oysters are raised. And finally there is little conflict with the public while operating the Oyster farm.

Lastly, I believe the The National Park Service should stop harassing these people. This has been going on for well over 40 years and needs to stop. 2. More locally, the California Coastal Commission has recently required a landowner along Tomales Bay, who wished to repair his dock, to install expensive translucent planking so that the eelgrass could grow under and around it. This dock is several hundred square feet.

In the EIS, the "8.5 linear miles" of eelgrass destruction by DBOC motorboats is classified as only "moderate." Because the boats probably don't take exactly the same route every time, we are probably talking about hundreds of thousands of square feet of eelgrass habitat destruction and fragmentation.

The EIS description of "moderate" does not jibe with how serious the California Coastal Commission views this problem.

Drakes Bay Oyster Company purchased the remaining 7 years on a 40-year non-renewable permit in 2005.

Since then, they have lobbied aggressively to overturn the wilderness designation, with backing from interests which would like to commercialize our national parks.

The National Park Service recently released a draft Environmental Impact Statement with the best available science on the oyster operation impacts.

Please issue a Special Use Permit to allow Drakes Bay Oyster Company (DBOC) to continue operations at Drakes Estero. The oyster culture operation is an integral part of the economic, social, and natural environment of Point Reyes National Seashore (PORE). DBOC is a fine example of a non-polluting, sustainable, chemical-free, family owned and operated agricultural operation. DBOC provides a unique contribution to what makes Point Reyes be Point Reyes, and the area would be poorer in all respects if the oyster company is removed.

Many people drive to Point Reyes with the specific desire to visit DBOC, as they have for several generations. On the other hand, people who don't specifically look for DBOC don't generally see evidence of its existence. I visited Point Reyes half a dozen times before I wandered down the dead-end lane and discovered the (then Johnson) oyster company. I have been back many times.

Those people who complain that DBOC impinges on their "visitor experience" at Point Reyes are, for the most part, disingenuous. Unless they seek out the farm, they really don't see any evidence the oyster operation is there. They have a strong emotional, ideological reaction to the abstract knowledge of the oyster company's existence on NPS property.

Similarly, Point Reyes National Seashore personnel demonstrate an ideological hostility to DBOC. Their professed objections to DBOC fall into two classifications: legal and "scientific." Both classes of argument fail.

Legal: ? Former California Assemblyman Bill Bagley, who wrote AB 1024 giving ownership of Drakes Estero to the federal government, is crystal clear that the bill preserved the right to cultivate oysters in Drakes Estero. ? Former US Congressman Pete McClosky, who was instrumental in providing the funding for the federal government to acquire the land, agrees with Assemblyman Bagley. ? Former US Congressman John Burton, lead author of the Point Reyes Wilderness Act, states that the authors of the Act intended that the oyster farm could continue. ? Former US Senator John Tunney, who worked with Congressman Burton, testified that "existing?aquacultural uses can continue."

PORE personnel simply rewrite history when they claim that Congress mandated closure of DBOC. In fact, the record is clear that the legislative intention was for the oyster company to continue.

Scientific: The "scientific" arguments against DBOC will stand as a permanent embarrassment to Point Reyes National Seashore scientific and administrative personnel. PORE personnel simply lied to the Marin County Board of Supervisors about DBOC effects on harbor seals. PORE's "Sheltered Wilderness" document lied more broadly about DBOC effects on seals, eelgrass, sedimentation, etc. And they lied about the claimed "evidence" for the claimed effects. Although PORE personnel now claim they have been "exonerated" by subsequent investigations, in fact those investigations have been quite damning.

A committee from the National Academy of Sciences reported in May, 2009 that PORE staff "?selectively presented, overinterpreted, or misrepresented the available scientific information on DBOC operations by exaggerating the negative and overlooking potentially beneficial effects." This may sound mild to many readers, but "selectively presented, overinterpreted, or misrepresented," "exaggerating," and "overlooking" are very strong, damning language coming from scientists. Scientists don't usually say such things about other scientists-especially when they aren't charged with investigating scientific misconduct. And the NAS committee didn't even know about the cache of time-and-date-stamped digital photographs that demonstrated clearly that DBOC was not disturbing the harbor seals (contrary to PORE assertions).

The Department of Interior Office of the Solicitor (DOI OoS) declared that PORE personnel couldn't be successfully prosecuted criminally or disciplined for scientific misconduct. That was trumpeted as "exoneration" by PORE staff. But the Office of the Solicitor's investigator only said that INTENT to conceal and mislead could not be established. The details of his report are damning of the behavior of PORE personnel. Consider some of the language from the report: (From DOI OoS report, March, 2011, pages 34-35) ? "Facts and logic also contradict assertions made by NPS senior executives and scientists?" ? "?most of the NPS employees targeted by the informant [Goodman] seemingly erred and appear to have acted improperly?" ? "This misconduct arose from incomplete and biased evaluation and from blurring the line between exploration and advocacy through research." ? "Further, SE2, S1, S2, S3, and S4 violated NPS Code of Scientific and Scholarly Conduct language?" ? "?decision made by S3, S2, and S1 ? was arguably inappropriate and violative of the NPS Interim Code provision requiring 'full[] disclos[ure].'" ? "The NPS scientists?rebutted informant's assertions?in an uncontested, and seemingly improper, effort to shield their own scientific findings?" (From DOI OoS report, page 32) ? "?responses from NPS employees reveal a collective but troubling mindset?" ? "?someone in their chain-of-command should have recognized the errors, sounded the alarm, and demanded disclosure of all research?"

If these things had been said about me, I certainly would not feel "exonerated."

The saga of the time-and-date-stamped digital photographs of Drakes Estero is, by itself, enough to destroy PORE's credibility on matters "scientific." A PORE scientist installed an automatic digital camera at Drakes Estero with the specific intent to document DBOC disturbance of harbor seals. The cameras worked. But they clearly showed that DBOC operations did NOT disturb the seals. The only disturbances the cameras documented were by kayakers (whose presence PORE intends to continue, or increase). PORE simply sat on the uncomfortable evidence and didn't reveal even the existence of the photos for more than two years. When pressed later, PORE claimed the photos were not "research," not "data," not "research record." The photos were "not up to NPS standards for science." Except that: (From DOI OoS report, March, 2011, page 18) ? The photos were used by PORE in an (unsuccessful) attempt to discredit Dr. Corey Goodman and to show that DBOC boats operated on Sundays. ? The photos were used by PORE to document that a DBOC boat disturbed seals. Unfortunately for PORE, closer examination of the photo showed that the disturbing object was not a DBOC boat.

So PORE considered the photos "reliable scientific evidence" when PORE personnel incorrectly thought a few of the photos confirmed their false opinions. But PORE claims that the mass of 280,000 photos clearly showing no DBOC seal disturbance is not scientific evidence.

The discredited legalistic and scientific-sounding arguments used by PORE to justify evicting DBOC from Drakes Estero should be abandoned. <b>Correspondence:</b>	As I understand the situation, the reason why continuance of the oyster company is now an issue is that the wording of the 1960s document which allowed commercial operations (such as dairy farms) to continue operating on national park property did not specifically mention oyster bed farming. That is, it was an oversight. Certainly there is hardly a pollution issue since dairy farming run-offs during the rainy season (into Drake Estero) are far worse polluters than the commercial oyster operation. And yet dairy farming is allowed to continue operating since it was specifically permitted in the 1960s document.				

I'm also aware that both sides in this controversy (Sierra Club vs. oyster company) have enlisted their own experts concerning Estero pollution; the arguments of the experts who favor continuance of the oyster farming operation seemed more compelling to me than the arguments of the experts enlisted by the Sierra Club. But I have no credentials as a pollution expert so I must admit this is only my subjective opinion.

What motivates me to write in favor of allowing the oyster farming to continue boils down to two reasons: (1) oyster farming causes negligible pollution and probably would have been specifically allowed to continue (like dairy farming) if the framers of the 1960s law had been aware of the existence of oyster farming, and (2) I believe that national parks should encourage moderate commercial use of their land (and waters) so long as that use does not damage the land (or waters). And that is especially important in economically depressed times like these.

As a former member of the Sierra Club I am surprised at the vehemence with which the Sierra Club has marshalled its members to pressure the Park Service to get rid of the oyster farming company. Let's examine the considerations for analysis in your report from a more rational, non-political perspective: Water quality - Are DBOC operations really damaging to the environment? We know these bivalves are filter feeders. We know that there is proof that these organisms actually improve water quality in other areas in our country. We know DBOC's record on fuel spills (which are excellent) and we know they practice minimum intrusion into mudflats and use reasonably flat bottom boats and are raising shellfish in raised beds, not stirring up mud. The same applies to Eelgrass. It is doubtful that DBOC practices damage eelgrass in any level that threatens it's existence and overhead Arial photography should play this out. Looking at special species, wildlife and wildlife habitats and seal pupping, one could argue that DBOC practices have been going on for so long that there is a symbiosis. Fish and aquatic animals and coastal mammals are all well aware of aquaculture in the area and have been living with it for decades. they are not fleeing, they are thriving. Your analysis should be able to pick up any significant reduction in any of these sensitive populations. I just don't believe biased reports from organizations and the Fed regarding seal pupping grounds being disturbed. These grounds coexist and DBOC has no interest in harming them whatsoever at all in fact they go out of their way to be sensitive to these issues. The question is finding some evidence of impact justification to eliminate these operations? That is what the Fed is hoping ? to wipe out a business to look good to the general population at the expense of locals and businesses in the area. You couldn't have a better owner in Tom Lunny. Get to know this guy you will see an individual with integrity and a real desire to preserve this special area. I have followed much of the news and progress on this conflict and what stands out to me is that it looks like an all-out effort by the Fed and certain environmental organizations to besmirch a historical, valuable and carefully run organization that is working with all laws and providing such a wonderful service to the community of seafood lovers. Problems with the environmental impact survey include:

1. The historic cultural role of the oyster farm in West Marin is not adequately addressed. The EIS must assess the cultural impacts of eliminating an institution that has been in operation for 100 years, and that has served park visitors, local restaurants and the local food shed. 2. Environmental benefits are misrepresented. PRNS has been rebuked several times for misrepresenting the facts about the environmental benefits of oyster farming. The draft EIS misrepresents those facts again, calling the removal of the oyster farm the "environmentally preferable" alternative. The DEIS fails to address the important ecological services provided by oysters, including filtering water. Further it does not address the environmental impacts of replacing a local, sustainable food source with 35,000 pounds of oysters flown in from Asia each week. Comparisons of the carbon footprint of the existing food source with the replacement food source must be analyzed in the DEIS.

3. Economic impacts are not adequately addressed. The DEIS mentions that removing the oyster farm would cause "major, long-term, adverse effects to the California shellfish market" but does not provide a complete analysis of these impacts, nor does it include these impacts in the overall analysis. The EIS must assess and address the economic impacts of eliminating the production of 50% of California's oysters and the subsequent impact on the local, state and national economy. Further, the DEIS does not analyze the impacts of eliminating one of the largest employers in West Marin. 4. Socioeconomic impacts: The DEIS fails to address the impacts on the oyster farm's approximately 50,000 visitors annually who enjoy the oysters and the interpretive services provided by Drakes Bay Oyster Company. Visitors to the oyster farm represent a wide range of incomes, races and ethnicities, some of whom might not otherwise have any connection to the National Park System. The National Park Service itself actively searches for ways to increase access to the National Park System for underserved communities. If DBOC's Special Use Permit is denied, these underserved communities would be impacted. The DEIS must address the subsequent impacts to these visitors and how these impacts will be mitigated. 5. Impacts to local habitat restoration efforts and endangered species are not addressed. The oyster shell byproduct from the Drakes Bay Oyster Farm cannery is a critical and sole resource for reestablishing native oyster beds, and restoring Least Tern and Snowy Plover habitat in San Francisco Bay. The California Least Tern is a U.S. federally listed endangered species and the Snowy Plover is in decline due to habitat loss. If Drakes Bay Oyster farm is shut down, the restoration operations would likewise be shut down. The draft EIS does not address the impacts to wildlife or the environmental issues surrounding the loss of these restoration efforts. 6. The DEIS does not consider existing management policies. The current General Management Plan for Point Reyes National Seashore, adopted in 1980, strongly supports the continued operation of the oyster farm, as do all of the relevant Marin County planning documents. The DEIS does not address how it can bypass the existing General Management Plan and Marin County's planning processes. The failure to address these issues points to arbitrary and capricious actions on the part of PRNS.

As a long term customer of the Drakes Bay Oyster Co, an outdoor enthusiast and a person with deep commitment to the environment, I urge the NPS to renew the Special Use Permit for Drakes Bay Oyster Co.

The operation of the oyster farm rather than being a detriment to the ecosystem in Drakes Bay serves to create a built in constituency for the stewardship and protection of that resource. In so many instances, people have no idea of where there food comes from and as a consequence of this pay little attention to the food production practices. In the case of the oyster farm people can literally go to the site and not only become more closely connected to the eco system that produces the jewels of sustainable aquaculture, but also get connected to the actual producers.

Over the years I've seen continual improvement in the conditions at Drakes Bay Oyster Co and seen and increasingly diverse group of bay area residents frequent the site. Many have come for years, but in response to the slow food movement and the trends towards locally sources products, the DBOC if a fine example of how the National Park System can work in partnership with local communities to protect the environment.

I chair the board of a local non-profit that has partnered with the California State Park system to restore and maintain several local wetlands and our efforts have provided tangible results, including the return of breeding Clapper Rails. I'm of the mind that the work of Drakes Bay Oyster Co has had an equivalently positive impact of Drakes Estero and could serve as a model for sustainable practices for other communities nationally. In a 2007 report, Conservation and Stewardship Publication #14, Kevin Lunny was sited as an outstanding steward of the environment. In light of Congress's encouragement to explore the sale of traditional products in National Parks, the move to deny the Special Use Permit seems to be a contradiction, especially in light of how viable and generative this establishment has been over time.

Not only does this operation provide 30 plus people with employment in the sagging economy, but the presence and interest in this unique resource also provides important economic stimulus to the communities, travelers pass through on their way to the oyster farm. It seems that the right and patriotic thing to do, especially in this economy is to find ways to do right by the environment and save jobs rather than destroy them. Employed workers and surrounding communities have a vested interest in protecting this resource; they are a built in environmental constituency.

The pattern of covert surveillance and inconsistency of unsupported data and blatant falsehoods communicated in reports purporting harm to the estero's population of Harbor Seals due to oyster feces suggest an intentional effort to shut down the operation rather than earnest efforts to explore the viability of this sustainable enterprise. Failing to renew the oyster farm's Special Use Permit based on false claims and troubling acts of scientific misconduct seems to be ill advised and mean spirited, not to mention setting a bad precedent that could further erode public trust in government agencies.

In times of economic uncertainty, when many of our parks futures hang in the balance we need to be creative in looking for new solutions and possible collaborations to meet the needs of the environment, as well as a growing population w/ a desire for sustainable agricultural products and a need to access the outdoors.

I encourage the National Parks Service to support the reissue of the Special Use Permit; this is a wonderful and special resource we can't afford to lose.

It is hard to know where to start addressing this inadequate EIS. Not sure what the point of the document is other than blatantly to put the Oyster Farm out of business. Every alternative presented is designed to make the oyster farm fail. Clearly state the goal of the EIS in a statement, not just a hatchet job disguised as an EIS. It is offensive. There is little data presented, just potential impacts. Where is the data??

#### Alternatives and Project Description

2. NEPA and CEQA all require a "no project" alternative. Section 1502.14(d) requires the alternatives analysis in the EIS to "include the alternative of no action." There is not one in this document. The EIS needs to be amended to establish a proper no project alternative, one that accepts existing conditions, a baseline, that is. There is no adequate project description for the existing oyster farm and according to the owner, there was no effort to get this information. What was the field work done to prepare this EIS?

3. There should be an alternative that incorporates the idea of creating a visitor center at the oyster farm for the hundreds of annual visitors and restores and remodels the old buildings on site. There is an EA for this project that follows the plans in the 1980 General Plan.

4. State clearly the impacts of shutting down the operation and the source of production availability to replace the DBOC oysters?? Where is there a cannery, what is the replacement source for 40% of CA's oysters now grown by DBOC?

3. The existing Reservation of Use exists in the current authorization (PL11-88 sect 124) and NPS cannot revoke this. The EIS should clarify the existing ROU and the Fish and Game rights in the Estero and not try to revoke them through this process. . 4. The Seashore's own 1980 GMP and the official national policy supports and encourages mariculture operations. Where does that appear in the EIS? There is no description of the oyster farm, its history and relationship with the California Department of Fish and Game or other regulatory agencies such as National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) and the County's Local Coastal Plan regulated by the state Coastal Commission that usually provided in an Existing Setting Section. (basic information)

#### Biology and Mariculture

5. The biology in this report is off the wall. The Estero is saline. Any biologist would know there could not be red-legged frogs present in a saline environment. Any local biologist would know that there is no habitat for snowy plover in the Estero.

6. There is not real discussion of the beneficial effect of oyster filtration on water clarity and the benefits to eel grass beds. There is no discussion of the huge expansion of eel grass beds under the lunny era of operation. There is no discussion of the role these eel grass beds play in other invertebrate and fish natural history. There is a silly mention of raised nitrogen levels in winter rainy season and no mention of the role the presence of oysters play in regulating this.

6. There is a lack of discussion of the role of the oyster operation in California's mariculture industry. How would the 40% of CA's oysters grown by DBOC be replaced? How does the industry tie into CA'S food security and health. Fewer than 1% of imported oysters are inspected and how does that compare to the food security provided by oysters grown locally in a pristine Estero?

7. There is little mention of the native oysters growing in the Estero that are also found in the Indian mounds.

#### Socio-economics

8. There is no consideration of the number of Park visitors that come to the Lunny farm nor of their composition. Every

weekend dozens come and enjoy picnicking and a tour of the oyster operation. There is no consideration of the nationality of those that visit which in actuality is a great mix of ethnic types compared to the totally Causasian kayakers. No discussion of public enjoyment of the oyster facility and the loss resulting from its closure.

9. No discussion of the public service the oyster farm provides in cleaning up the estero from past oyster operations and present kayakers and hikers. There is no discussion of the kayaker's activities and levels of disturbance.

10. There is no mention of the value of having a regular human presence on the Estero 24 hours a day year round. This is in fact an extension of Park personnel.

11. There is inadequate attention to the impact of the loss of the jobs at the oyster farm. Most are Hispanic and are part of the farm community in West Marin. The loss of these jobs and the impact to the West Marin economy is poorly addressed. There is a disproportionate economic impact on an underrepresented minority. This is not discussed!

12. There is inadequate discussion of cultural resources and environmental justice issues. The loss of this 100 year old oyster operation will result in the loss of both and needs to be addressed adequately.

13.. The poor science in the Becker paper remains and should be thoroughly removed. His statistical analysis was complicated and was misused to create an impression of harm to harbor seals. This has been discredited by distinguished scientists and should be removed. That no consideration of the three years of secret photos taken are not considered is evasive and no credit to the Seashore . Staff kept them secret but they have been revealed and do exist and should be acknowledged. They were analyzed by the Seashore staff, the Marine Mammal Commission, EAC and Sierra Club types and should be a part of the record.

14. The Lunny family invested \$300,000 of their own money to clean up the Estero and now this document states that they should remove all buildings if no permit is forthcoming. Is this vindictive EIS writers or Park staff or what??? This sort of thing goes well beyond the goal of the NEPA and CEQA laws and the Park should remove this item from the EIS and be ashamed of themselves.

15m The lunnys provide oyster shell to projects in San Francisco Bay to reestablish their oyster industry. Without these oyster shells, available only from DBOC, this project cannot proceed. This is not addressed.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Draft Environmental Impact Statement for the Drakes Bay Oyster Company Special Use Permit. The following comments are made on behalf of The Otter Project, our 3000+ members and our Board of Directors. The Otter Project exists to promote the rapid recovery of the California sea otter, an indicator of near shore ocean

health, by facilitating research and communicating research results to the general public and policy makers.

Before the fur hunts of the late 1700s and early 1800s sea otters ranged from (what is now) Hokkaido, Japan, around the Pacific Rim, to mid-Baja. There are many good reliable historic records of sea otters occupying the Pt. Reyes area. In 2010, the range of the southern sea otter was roughly Half Moon Bay in the north to Santa Barbara in the south. The southern sea otter is listed as "threatened" under the Endangered Species Act. The current population estimate is 2711 animals and declining based on the 2010 three-year running average.

Natural range expansion is one of the most important actions to further species recovery. Sea otters, generally young males, are often seen far to the north and south of their populated range. Sea otters are occasionally seen in San Francisco Bay , the Farallone Islands , and at Pt. Reyes. This year an otter was seen as far south as San Diego. The Pt. Reyes vicinity has had up to 20+ sea otter sightings in one year (very likely multiple sightings of the same small group) and the most recent sea otter sighting in the Point Reyes vicinity was this year.

Waves of young male otters moving in and out of an area are generally considered a precursor to a more stable range expansion. We are in no way suggesting that sea otters will soon "invade" Drakes Estero; we are suggesting Drakes Estero is within the otter's historic range, range expansion is essential to species survival and recovery, and that sea otters, most likely young males, are repeatedly observed at Point Reyes.

Sea otter and oyster farming are most likely mutually exclusive. Sea otters have a voracious appetite for shellfish consuming 25-35% of body weight per day and have caused problems at mariculture facilities in the past. We believe human-sea otter conflict will inevitably arise at Drakes Bay Oyster Company. Certainly, conflict will occur when sea otters are present in large numbers; but we also believe conflict could occur when single otters (already occurring) discover the abundant food resource at Drakes Bay Oyster Company.

The purpose of the DEIS process is to determine how best to: ? Manage natural and cultural resources to support their protection, restoration, and preservation. ? Manage wilderness and potential wilderness areas to preserve the character and qualities for which they were designated. ? Provide opportunities for visitor use and enjoyment of park resources.

We believe that returning Drakes Estero to Wilderness and avoiding the inevitable conflict between humans and otters best serves the stated purposes of this process.

Please adopt Alternative A, the No Action Alternative.
