## Research Grant Opportunity

### Subsistence Fishing on the Potomac and Anacostia Rivers Ethnographic Resource Study

**The closing date for this announcement is Monday, June 30, 2014.**

The National Park Service, Cultural Anthropology Program for the National Capital Region has issued a request for Letters of Interest for a new research opportunity to document subsistence fishing in national park lands along the Potomac and Anacostia Rivers in the Washington, DC, area.

It is anticipated that Phase I of the project will begin in September 2014 and all project Phases will be completed by September 2018. We are looking for a skilled anthropologist, or anthropological team, to research and develop an ethnographic resource study for approximately 44 miles of river (measured from the rivers' center line). The research will be overseen by a Principal Investigator (PI) who is an applied cultural anthropologist with a Ph.D., or comparable research experience and a record of applied experience, and high professional standing in the anthropological community. Only universities or partners within the Cooperative Ecosystem Study Units (CESU) network are eligible to apply.
