



Pets in the Parks



Protecting People, Pets, & Parks

For the safety of visitors and all animals (domestic and wild), and for the continued protection of your parklands, pets—with the exception of guide animals—are not allowed on park trails, at ranger-led programs, or in park buildings.

What's the Harm?

- Predators including bears, mountain lions, and coyotes may see pets as prey, placing both pet and owner in danger.
- Some pets may mark territory with scent or spread domestic disease, interfering with natural patterns and causing injury to wildlife.
- Dead salmon, found along riverbanks throughout the parks, can be extremely toxic to dogs.
- Even normally well-behaved pets can become stressed by unfamiliar surroundings, threatening visitors and wildlife in close situations such as on park trails.
- Pets moving through poison oak can collect toxic oil on their fur which can then be deposited on anything it touches—other pets, your car, your house, and/or you!

Places for Pets

Redwood National and State Parks

Pets on a leash not exceeding six feet in length, under owner control, and without creating disturbance to visitors and wildlife are allowed only:

- *Within all designated, road-accessible campgrounds.*
- *At designated picnic areas, parking areas, and public roads.*
- *On Crescent, Gold Bluffs, Hidden, and Freshwater beaches (excluding dune habitat).*

Nearby Public Locations

Pets under your control are allowed at the following locations (be sure to inquire locally for specific regulations), from north to south:

- *Smith River National Recreation Area (pets allowed on trails; must be leashed in all developed campgrounds and picnic areas): west of Crescent City, Calif. via U.S. 199.*
- *Public beaches in Crescent City, Calif.*
- *Moonstone Beach: Westhaven Drive exit off U.S. 101, just south of Trinidad, Calif.*
- *Clam Beach County Park: Clam Beach exit off U.S. 101, near McKinleyville, Calif.*
- *Arcata Community Forest in Arcata, Calif.*

Suggested Pet Walks

From north to south, we suggest the following locations for experiencing the wonders of the parks and surrounding areas with your pets:



Myrtle Creek Trail (Smith River NRA)

Trailhead: ~1 mile east of Hiouchi, Calif. near junction of U.S. 199 and South Fork Road.



Craig's Creek Trail (Smith River NRA)

Trailhead: ~½ mile south of U.S. 199 on South Fork Road (before 2nd bridge and junction with Douglas Park Road/Howland Hill Road).



Jedediah Smith Campground and Day Use Area

10 miles east of Crescent City, Calif. on U.S. 199.



Walker Road

~3 miles west of Hiouchi, Calif. or 7 miles northeast of Crescent City, Calif. on U.S. 199.



Howland Hill Road

10 miles, one way from Crescent City, Calif. to junction with U.S. 199 near Hiouchi, Calif.



Crescent Beach Day Use Area

~3 miles south of Crescent City, Calif. on U.S. 101, exit Enderts Beach Road and continue ¾ mile south to day use and picnic area.



Wilson Creek Day Use Area

~14½ miles south of Crescent City, Calif. on U.S. 101.



Alder Camp Road

1 mile south of Klamath, Calif. on U.S. 101, exit Klamath Beach Road/Coastal Drive and continue ~½ mile to Alder Camp Road.



Cal-Barrel Road

6 miles north of Orick, Calif. on U.S. 101, exit Newton B. Drury Scenic Parkway and continue 1½ miles to Cal-Barrel Road.



Elk Prairie Campground and Day Use Area

6 miles north of Orick, Calif. on U.S. 101, exit Newton B. Drury Scenic Parkway and continue 1 mile to turn-off for visitor center. Follow signs to campground and day use area.



Gold Bluffs Beach and Campground

2½ miles north of Orick, Calif. on U.S. 101, exit Davison Road and continue 5½ miles to beach and campground.



Redwood Creek picnic area and Freshwater Lagoon spit

Picnic area is 2 miles south of Orick, Calif. on U.S. 101; continue <1 mile south to roadside parking on spit.
