The Teacher Ranger Teacher program is a professional development opportunity for K-12 teachers to spend the summer acquiring new skills in experiential learning through a program provided by a partnership between the National Park Service (NPS) and the University of Colorado Denver (CU Denver). The participants spend between four and six weeks in a NPS unit developing a major educational project and participating in an online graduate course from CU Denver. The goal of the program is to train teachers in the resources and themes of the NPS so that they can return to their schools in the fall and incorporate their new skills into their classroom activities. NPS aims to especially reach students from underserved schools and districts by recruiting teachers from Title 1, urban or rural schools and from tribal schools to participate in the Teacher Ranger Teacher program.

Stipend: \$3,000 upon completion of program and graduate course requirements

Program Hourly Requirements: Total of 230 hours of effort: 160 hours of major educational project, 45 hours of online coursework, discussion, course readings, 35 hours of NPS operational experiences.

Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area is the nation's largest urban national park, containing coastal mountains, beaches, and more than 500 miles for trails. More than 17 million Americans live within an hour's drive of the park, making for a unique mix of urban and wild experiences. This is not a traditional national park and is co-managed by a number of partner organizations, including California State Parks. The mild Mediterranean ecosystem is perfect for year-round recreation and wildlife viewing. Humans have lived in these mountains for more than 10,000 years, with ranching and Hollywood filming being the more recent of human activities.

Santa Monica Mountains is offering two Teacher Ranger Teacher positions.

Position 1: Los Angeles, CA

The Los Angeles District of Santa Monica Mountains is seeking an elementary school teacher for the park's Teacher-Ranger-Teacher program. The teacher would focus on the following during their six-week tenure.

1. Review and provide feedback and changes to 4th grade field trip program
2. Develop curriculum for a variety of self-led field trips for Los Angeles parks, such as Los Angeles State Historic Park and Franklin Canyon.
3. Engage with more local schools to sign up for national park programs (optional, if time permits)

2. Develop science-based lesson (high school) for a self-guided field trip.
3. Create trip planning resources for self-guided field trips (optional, if time permits)
